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OFHS students excel at SkillsUSA nationals

Four students earn top 15 finishes in three categories

Four Oconto Falls High School students placed among the top 15 competitors in their categories in this year's SkillsUSA national championships.

Devin Dorn, Kolton Krueger, Bryce Christensen and Grant Bouche had advanced to the challenge in Atlanta by winning gold medals at the state SkillsUSA event in Madison April 26.

Dorn and Krueger earned a ninth-place finish in the area of additive manufacturing. Christensen took 10th in the nation in sheet metal, and Christensen placed 14th in motorcycle service technology.

SkillsUSA is an organization serving more than 395,000 students and trainees nationwide in trade, technical

and skilled service occupations. The competitions take place June 19-23 during the annual SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference.

During the Oconto Falls School Board meeting July 17, Krueger explained that additive manufacturing is another term for using a 3-D printer. Judges presented the competitors with a task, and they were to create an engineering notebook and build the parts for a machine to execute the task.

Specifically, the group had three days to develop and fabricate a clamp mechanism that moved three different objects of different shape, size and height from one pillar to another, Krueger said.

"On top of that, they give you a bunch of specifications so you can only use so much material, so much

support, it has to have multiple tiers that can functionally move, it has to be within a certain build time," he said.

The teams were allowed to work for three hours a day for those three days and could not take any material away to work on their project offsite, except for the notebook.

Judges praised Krueger and Dorn's engineering notebook as "the best they'd ever seen," and they kept the notebook to use as an example for future competitors, Krueger said.

Krueger was a sophomore this year, and Dorn just graduated with the class of 2023, "so we'll have to find Kolton a new partner so he can hopefully go back next year," teacher and coach Matt Beschta said to the board.

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New middle school name pondered

Site development underway along County Road I

What will be the name of the new Oconto Falls middle school?

Will it keep the name "Washington Middle School" when students are moved from the old building in the fall of 2025? Will it just become Oconto Falls Middle School, like the high school and one of the school district's two elementary schools, or will it have a new name altogether?

The question was raised July 17 during Superintendent Dean Hess's monthly report on the projects voters authorized in a November 2022 referendum question.

"This came up in a planning meeting as to have we thought about what name we're going to have for the new middle school," Hess said. "I hadn't thought about it."

The board agreed to discuss the matter at its August meeting.

The \$37.6 million referendum granted approval to replace the aging middle school, install more secure entrances at the school district's other three buildings and perform roof repair work at the older schools.

Hess reported that the work at the other three buildings should be completed by the beginning of the new school year in September, except that the roof repairs at Oconto Falls Elementary School are planned for the summer of 2024.

As for the new school, the job trailer is expected to arrive in mid-August, and Hess said the board might notice some site development already underway along

County Road I across from the middle school.

After the July 11 groundbreaking for the new Oconto Falls fire station, City Administrator Peter Wills approached Hess and asked if the district would have any interest in some fill from the city project.

"I explained to him that as long as it met the requirements for what we needed, which we figured out that it did, then yes," Hess said.

Trucks started bringing fill July 14 from the fire station dig to the middle school site less than a mile away, he said.

"It's a win-win," Hess said. "The city was needing to take that to a landfill, and it was going to take up a lot of space and extra mileage to take it there and back, versus here they can bring it right over from the city to the school district."

Falls Fun Fest gets preliminary approval

Street festival, car show planned for Aug. 19

An Oconto Falls man is working to bring Falls Fun Fest back to the city next month.

Max Mayer appeared before the city council July 11 and received approval to go ahead with his plans for an Aug. 19 festival including vendors, a car show and live music.

"We're going to ask the city to close down Central (Avenue)," Mayer told the council. "We'll start at Central right at Main Street, we'll ask the city to close the street all the way to Memorial Field. We'll have vendors up and down the street there. We're going to have the car show in the Memorial Field parking lot."

Alderspersion Devin Wertz asked if Mayer would consider moving the closure one block north to Franklin Street, to allow access to businesses including Jones Funeral Home and the Flagstar Bank. Mayer said he had been hoping to locate the stage near Main and Central but was open to the change.

Oconto Falls Fun Fest has just incorporated as a 501(c)(7) social and recreational club, he said.

"It's kind of a mix between a business and a nonprofit," Mayer said. "It's not quite a full nonprofit, but we're still tax exempt."

Details are still being worked out, but Mayer said the group plans to return any proceeds back to the community.

"We're going to find probably some charities in town," he said. "We may donate to the Lions or something like that, maybe something with senior citizens."

With the council's approval in hand, Mayer said the board would be meeting within days to make the arrangements.

"We've got a lot of people ready," he said. "We've got people that have already showed interest, we've got a long list of people we've already reached out to ... Every sponsor I've talked to has immediately said, yeah, I'm in, let me know what you need."

Mayer plans to bring final details and a temporary liquor license application to the council in time for its Aug. 8 meeting.

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Oconto Falls allows residential chickens

Residents of the city of Oconto Falls may now produce their own eggs in their backyard, should they so desire.

After several months of discussion and a public hearing, the city council July 11 unanimously approved an ordinance change allowing city residents to keep up to six laying hens. No roosters are permitted.

The ordinance stipulates that property owners need to obtain a license to keep the chickens and provide a sketch of where the coop and fencing would be located.

Originally, the proposal said the coop can be up to 50 square feet with

adjacent fencing. Alderspersion Devin Wertz moved to amend the language to clarify that the area needs to be completely fenced in.

"We should probably put a limit on that, too, so it's not somebody's entire backyard," Wertz said. "I would say shelter and fencing should not exceed 50 square feet."

Alderspersion Ashley Bahrke agreed that the hens should not take up a lot of room.

"Nobody's prone to want something extravagant if you can only have six chickens," Bahrke said.

Chickens must be in the backyard only, and the installation has to be no closer than 10 feet to any property line.

Bat tests positive for rabies in Shawano County

The Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department reports that a bat in Shawano County has tested positive for the rabies virus, which is transmitted from infected mammals to humans (typically via a bite) and is invariably fatal once symptoms appear.

This is the first confirmed case of rabies in a bat in Shawano County this year, according to a press release. Rabies is contracted by exposure to a rabid animal. The exposure is nearly always through a bite, but rabies can be transmitted if a rabid animal scratches a person or it is

saliva is exposed to broken skin. If a person has had any physical contact with a bat and the possibility of a bite or scratch cannot be ruled out, rabies preventive treatment may be necessary. Early symptoms of rabies may include irritability, headache, fever,

double vision and itching or pain at the exposure site. The disease eventually progresses to spasms of the throat and the muscles used for breathing, convulsions, delirium, paralysis, and death. It is important to note that by the time any symptoms may appear, rabies cannot be successfully treated.

Any time a team enters regional play and have to face the defending state champs in your first game, there is a sense of pressure that comes with it.

That pressure was evident early on as the Appleton Doubledays opened up an 8-2 lead over Shawano after pushing across five runs in the fourth inning July 14.

Beyer before Jerzy Bocker reached on a fielder's choice. In danger of not scoring, Crew Wiesnicht ripped one into deep left center for an RBI triple as Shawano was on the board 2-1. Wiesnicht would eventually come around to score as Hodkiewicz helped his cause with an RBI double to tie things up 2-2.

"We could've done better today, but we played our hearts out," Wiesnicht said. "This was one of our better games when it came to hitting the ball. We just need to clean up some of the errors and costly mistakes that we had early on and we should be fine."

That was about as close as things would get for a while with Appleton adding a run in the third to take a 3-2 before busting things open in the fourth. Three straight singles to begin the fourth didn't help, but neither did two of them coming off of bunt singles as Hodkiewicz couldn't catch a break.

On the verge of working out of

the inning with minimal damage, a costly misplay in right field opened the floodgates as four additional runs came around to score to help give the Doubledays an 8-2 lead. Hodkiewicz was finished after that inning as he allowed eight runs with seven coming as earned runs in four innings.

With Bystol doing his thing on the mound the rest of the way, it was going to be up to the Shawano offense to make something happen. You started to see that with a pair of hits in the fourth inning, but after not being able to do anything with those hits, the Patriots wasted another opportunity. Fortunately those wasted opportunities appeared to awaken the offense as they looked like a completely different team in the later innings.

"Bystol did a nice job of coming into a difficult spot and pitched really well," said Beyer on what he thought of Bystol. "He helped settle down our defense which was shaky at times and

that helped get us going."

A lead off walk to Anderson Schmidt certainly helped as did singles from Warner Beyer and Bocker shortly after to load the bases. Carsen Herm kept the line moving for the Patriots as his single pushed across two runs to make things 8-4, but a costly baserunning mistake saw Bocker nailed at third. We need to come back out here focused the rest of the weekend and play our best baseball of the season."

Shawano had plenty of offense in the game as they mashed 14 hits in the loss. Six players had multi-hit games including Wiesnicht and Hodkiewicz as they played a massive part in the offense. Wiesnicht led the way with two RBIs as did Herm in what was a tough loss for the Patriots.

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Big innings loom large in Pulaski's loss to Denmark

Team prepares for regional action

If you want to be the best, you have to beat the best, and Denmark has been the best for the past three seasons. Despite an overall great effort from the Pulaski Legion team, it was a pair of three-run innings that did them in as Denmark came to town and picked up the 7-1 win July 11.

Any time you face a great team, you know you're going to be in for a challenge. Denmark, however, is not only the three-time WIAA state champions, but they have been to state in each of the last two Legion seasons with their sights set on a third. This is the level that every team wants to get to, and Pulaski is building toward that level.

"I felt we played much better today than what we have shown the past few games," head coach Jack Anderson said. "Denmark is a great team, and there is a reason as to why they have had so much success the past few years. Today, all three of our kids threw the ball well, and they did

enough to keep us in the game."

Zach Brodhagen got the start for Pulaski, and he battled into the fourth inning. Brodhagen gave Pulaski 3 2/3 innings of work, allowing four runs on five hits. He walked one and struck out four as he did his best to keep things close. His biggest problem was facing an extremely talented and dangerous Denmark squad anchored by a strong pitching staff. Josh Pittner took the ball for the Vikings and went the distance allowing one run on four hits. He walked four and struck out eight to earn the win.

As tough as things were for Pulaski most of the night, they were the ones who managed to strike first, scoring in their first at-bat to grab the lead. Caden Rybicki started things with a one-out walk and advanced to third on the Bryce Wotruba double. Two batters later, it was CJ Clauss coming through with a clutch RBI single as Pulaski was in front 1-0.

"We talked about needing to be more aggressive, and we did a much better job getting our bats going early on," Clauss said. "However, we couldn't put many runs across and couldn't string together many hits after the first. We had a chance to pull closer later, but for whatever reason, we can't seem to come through with

the clutch hits we need."

Once the second inning rolled around, the Denmark offense started to kick it into gear, and it was all Vikings after that as they ended the game with seven unanswered runs. Three of those seven runs came off Brodhagen in the second with Pittner helping himself with a game tying RBI double. Throw in an Eric Laforest groundout and the Eli Kapinos double, and the Vikings opened up a 3-1 lead and never looked back.

Things only got worse for Pulaski in the fourth inning with Pittner helping himself for the second straight inning as his RBI double extended the Denmark lead to 4-1. Credit the Pulaski pitching staff after that as they battled hard to keep things close with Hunter Money tossing a scoreless 1 1/3 inning before handing things off to Brett Schott.

Like his counterpart, Schott pitched a scoreless inning, but that came after more damage was done. Holding a 4-1 lead into the sixth, the Denmark offense came back to life in the sixth as they made life difficult for Schott on the mound. A leadoff walk certainly didn't help things; nor did a pair of singles including one from Ethan Ovsak to open a 5-1 lead. That set the stage for Lucas Miller who singled home the

game's sixth run for the Vikings before coming home to score on the Reece Johnson single to push the lead to 7-1.

Looking to battle back in the later innings, Pulaski had a chance to make things interesting late as they tried to break through in the seventh. A one-out walk from Jake Fredrickson put a runner on base before the two out single from Rybicki set the offense up in a good spot. Unfortunately, Pulaski couldn't do anything with it as Pittner recovered to induce the game-ending ground out and lifted the Vikings to a 7-1 win.

Despite the loss, this was a positive showing from Pulaski, and one Anderson hopes will carry over into regional action.

"This was one of our more complete games this season, even if the scoreboard doesn't show it," he said. "Take away those two big innings, and we were right there until the end. Communications needed, but at that price?

They say that those who fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it.

I had a sense of déjà vu as the Shawano School Board voted July 10 to hire Dorreen Dembski to handle the district's communications. Among the things listed in the first year of work includes assisting with the development of key messages for the district and writing up to eight press releases related to those messages to pitch to local media, two on-site photography sessions to develop a library of photos and providing assistance to implement print newsletters.

It's no surprise that the district is wanting someone to bolster its public image at this time, considering it's looking at finally making the step forward on a capital referendum and possibly an operational referendum. Having someone in the know about those issues who can answer questions from inquiring minds seems — at least on the surface — to be a wise investment.

The contract stipulates that Dembski will be paid \$39,785 for about 275 hours of work, equating to about \$145 per hour. In the proposal, however, it's noted that travel costs are not included in the estimate, and that the cost of travel time will be \$75 per hour. Also of note, the cost of printing, postage, video production and/or other production costs are extra.

The reason for my déjà vu is that there have been two other occasions

since I've come to town when the school district has taken steps to have someone handle their public relations, and I'm left wondering what will change to make sure this option sticks. There's no denying that the district's community image is shaky at best, and that some spin is needed to put the schools back in a favorable image, but I question whether paying someone \$145 per hour plus expenses is the solution to the problem.

The first stab at making the district look better came in 2015, when the board approved hiring someone in-house as a communications specialist. That position came with a salary of \$34,000 for work during the entire school year. At the time, the argument was the website and social media were not being utilized very well to tell the school district's "story." The specialist could translate the buzzwords and acronyms that educators like to use in order to be cute and make the information more digestible.

Unfortunately, a year later, a consultant told the school board that the communications special-

ist, along with other positions, was dead weight, and the board members should get rid of it. So they did, surmising that existing staff could handle the public relations.

That didn't work out so well. Need proof? Fast forward to 2020, with a new superintendent and some dark times for the school district as the coronavirus pandemic was hitting its stride.

The first thing the school board did to try and improve its public image was to pay \$10,000 annually for three years to Social School 4 EDU to build its "social capital" by taking photos and posts and turning them into something that engaged people on Facebook, Twitter and all the other sites. The three-year period ended this year, and there's been no scuttlebutt about Social School 4 EDU. Where did they go? Where did the money we paid them go?

That was only one piece of the public relations puzzle in 2020. Then-superintendent Randi Anderson also pushed for a \$20,000 raise for the community education director, with the caveat that the director would "take the lead" for marketing and community engagement. That was a 30% pay raise at a time when other administrators were looking at a 2% bump in money.

To summarize, \$10,000 for a company to energize the district's social media plus \$20,000 for someone to increase its marketing for a total of \$30,000. How did that turn out? Radio silence when parents were

asking when virtual learning would end, rudeness from the school board president when parents questioned why they were not informed the masking mandate was over, and don't get me started about 2022 when the community was broadsided by a potential school closure in less than two months because of a looming \$2 million budget deficit.

Of course, it's not like public relations for a school district is anything new. Menominee Indian School District has contracted for years with a firm that puts out press releases for it and occasionally works with media to finagle stories, and it's smaller than Shawano's district. Pulaski Community School District has a communications specialist who works in-house and also works with the high school's newspaper to provide sunshine on what's happening with that district. Having public relations for Shawano schools wouldn't be the worst thing in the world.

Unfortunately, Shawano also has a bad history of moving forward with makeovers of its public image, only to have the machine that generates the image turn out to be an Edsel instead of a Ferrari. The decision has already been made by the school board, but it would behoove district officials to make sure this effort runs like a well-oiled machine and doesn't end with the engine falling out of it.

Free, fair elections in Wisconsin? Count on it

All those folks — millions of them, we're often told — who believe elections are being stolen in America should experience what I did a few days ago.

Full disclosure: I don't believe those claims. Not just because counts and recounts confirmed the numbers, or that court after court across the country tossed cases because there was no meaningful evidence of cheating. Here's why I didn't believe it. I've been involved in covering elections for half a century. I've known dozens of people, from liberals to conservatives and in-between, who were paid to administer elections. They did so impartially, with fairness and integrity. The idea of a nationwide election scam, pulling a fast one on people like that, is laughably uninformed.

Now, back to my recent experience.

I was asked by two friends and colleagues — George Stanley, recently retired editor of the Milwaukee Journal Sentinel and this year's president of the Wisconsin Newspaper Association, and Beth Bennett, the Wisconsin Newspaper Association's executive director — to fill a media slot on an advisory committee to the Wisconsin Elections Commission. The committee was formed to help the WEC update rules governing observers at polling places.

Full disclosure, again: My (unpaid) role was strictly to represent the state's newspapers. Not the elections commission or any other organization.

There was one other media representative, Sean Dwyer, a longtime radio newsmen, there on behalf of Wisconsin broadcasters. Our role was limited, to provide input related to how media members should interact with election officials and others at polling places. Our two spots were added after the committee's first meeting, because questions had been raised about the media's role.

The real pros were a couple of dozen committee members representing critical interests. As one might expect there were experienced observers linked to the Democratic and Republican parties. Others were also represented, such as the Libertarian Party. Public-interest organizations such as the League of Women Voters and Common Cause were on the committee. And so were multiple representatives of local governments, small and large, involved with running elections. Altogether, more than two dozen people were on the Zoom call.

Pardon a brief sidestep: Zoom meetings suck. This one was seven hours long. Worshiping technology

may be the religion of the day, but it's less effective than dealing with people in person and it takes longer to switch back and forth between speakers (especially when some inevitably forget to unmute).

Here's the overall take, though. These were good people, all. They knew their stuff. Whether it was the local elections officials or the experienced observers or the special-interest representatives, they knew voting procedures inside and out. The detail was amazing, figuring out how to provide maximum opportunity for monitoring to make sure laws and procedures are meticulously followed.

No topic was off the table. No consideration too small or trivial. Every line, every word in the draft rules proposal, thoroughly scrutinized. The universal objective clearly was to make sure citizens could trust the vote.

The discussion was respectful. Yes, even though some of those on the meeting were partisan representatives who likely held broad disagreements about many things. Participants were passionate about their experiences and recommendations — as they should have been — but never crossed a line into angry or vitriolic discourse. Instead, they listened to each other and for the most part pointed the way toward common sense solutions.

Just my thought, but it seems hard to come away from that kind of experience clinging to a belief in some

nationwide election conspiracy. An ongoing conspiracy, by the way, because there are still more recent losing candidates (Kari Lake in Arizona, for example) insisting they won.

Here in Wisconsin — and, I assume, in other American states — there are legions of people just like the folks involved in this meeting, doing their absolute best to give voters a free, fair election experience. Not perfect, perhaps — anytime people are involved, errors happen — but as honest as good people can make it. Trust is fragile, though, and risks being seriously undermined when high-profile operatives continue to make claims they can't back up with facts or evidence.

A special pat on the back goes to WEC staff attorney Brandon Hunzicker, who ran the Zoom call with an even hand and astonishing patience. If Hunzicker had a view on politics, no one could have known. No matter how long the meeting dragged on, or how out in the weeds any speaker roamed, Hunzicker remained the picture of patience and accommodation. Cheers.

Readers, if you're tempted to blast away at elections officials or those who spend long hours at polls monitoring as observers, give these good folks a break. They are pillars and defenders of democracy.

FARM LIFE FROM A FARM WIFE

Goodbye, Bethie, until we meet again

In tears, I bent down and, holding her hand, whispered in my sister's ear how much I loved her, will miss her, that she was always there for me and was my best friend and how I am releasing her into the arms of Jesus. This isn't a goodbye; it's an "until we meet again." Shortly after, close to 7 on the morning of June 10, the angels slipped her away from us.

My sister Beth was my cheerleader, my supporter, my sister-in-blood as well as my sister-in-Christ. She was the only one on the face of this earth who'd been with me my entire 66 years. I'd never known a day without her until June 10, 2023. Countless times since, I've picked up my cell to text or call her.

Despite never being a mother herself, she was our three kids' second mom, and her mamma claws were always out for me, consistently backing me up. If I'd have committed a murder, she'd have provided me with an alibi. Once when my daughter contracted lice in kindergarten, Beth drove over with her vacuum cleaner and helped me tackle the issue. She came with us to so many of our kids' sporting events that a friend dubbed her "Ole Faithful." She and her husband golfed with us, vacationed with us and milked cows for us.

When our daughter was born, my husband called from the hospital and asked about the chores, and my sister grabbed the phone hollering, "Never mind the cows, what'd she have?"

When our oldest son started pre-K, Beth and I were shopping for school supplies. Coming into the crayon aisle, I lost it, crying because my baby was going to school. Beth leaned in and hissed quietly, "Kay. Pinch yourself." We broke into giggles, and I laughed through my tears.

Thinking back, I recall her quick, witty and sometimes sassy sense of humor. My sisters Sherry, Beth and I were standing at the casket of our dear mother, tearfully saying goodbye for one of the last times we'd ever see her this side of heaven.

Beth piped up just then: "Wow. You know ... she's drop-dead gorgeous."

Wide-eyed, Sherry and I snapped our heads toward Beth, and we all three burst into stifled belly laughs. It was so unexpected and so inappropriate and so fitting. Our mother would have laughed, too — and probably was as she was skipping along in glory. Mom's face was serene, so wrinkle-

free that she did look beautiful, but Beth's choice of words were, well, Beth.

Our dad and mom were in the nursing home system the last few years of their lives. Before that, Beth would be the one who would tend to them the most, shopping for them, making sure they were OK. Sticking her head deep into their refrigerator, she'd throw out anything fuzzy and also would bring them meals. Dad told her, "Thanks for lessening the load, Beth." They appreciated her so much.

Beth lived her faith. As she'd pay bills, she'd tuck Christian tracts inside. At her medical appointments, she'd pray for her doctor and/or nurses right in the examining room.

Among many Christian charities, she and her husband supported Com-

passion International. One Sunday, she stood before the congregation (with knees knocking; she was scared to death) and, explaining the charity, asked others to join. Supporting my missionary daughter, she explained, "I can't go out to the nations, but Jess can." She taught Sunday school, was a prayer warrior, encourager and faith-strengtheners to countless others.

My sister-in-law lost her husband, and every day for one year, Beth would call her, leaving a voicemail message. When my sister-in-law would come home to an empty house after work, her answering machine would welcome her with a blinking red light, letting her know there was a message from Beth. It would contain a sweet greeting and a Bible verse. My sister-in-law said she wouldn't have made it through that first year without Beth.

In 2009, my folks passed. After that, Beth's health declined, first being diagnosed with Lyme disease and then Parkinson's. Losing much of her independence, she relied exclusively on her husband, Bob, to care for her.

He told me, as I thanked him many times for tending to our Beth, "I made

a promise to God when I married her that I'd take care of her, and I don't intend to break that promise."

His solemn vow brought tears to my eyes because he did; he cooked, cleaned, did laundry, tended to their cats, kept a big garden, canned vegetables, grocery shopped and paid the bills, all the while caring for his Beth.

Beth believed with her heart that Jesus died and rose again and proclaimed unashamedly with her mouth that Jesus was her Lord and Savior. Because of that sure hope, she is in heaven now — running, laughing, joking, more alive than you and me. My same belief makes certain that I will see her again.

June 10 wasn't goodbye. It was "until we meet again."

I love you, Bethie.

Ripon College enlists Mosconi for research

Angela Mosconi, of Gillett, is participating this summer in Ripon College's Summer Opportunities for Advanced Research. SOAR allows students to work with professors on summer research pertaining to their areas of study.

Mosconi is majoring in chemistry and mathematics and with a minor in physics. She is working with professor Bryan Nell to research inorganic synthesis of a chiral center metal complex using demented phosphine ligands.

Mosconi is looking within those ligands different bonded groups and changing the size of the groups that are bonded to them and then seeing the difference between each bonded group.

This topic is relatively new to researchers. SOAR's research is using the air-sensitive glove box within this research.

CMN receives food grant from U.S. ag department

The College of Menominee Nation received a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture-National Institute of Food and Agriculture, in partnership with Lac Courte Oreilles Ojibwe University, American Indian Higher Education, the University of Wisconsin Division of Extension, UW-Madison, the Native American Center for Health Professionals and Menominee Tribal Enterprises.

The grant, From Learning to Leading: Cultivating the Next Generation of Diverse Food, is a representation of a series of efforts from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to achieve equitable participation of farmers, ranchers and forest landowners. This program will include efforts to target technical assistance and outreach activities about programs and support students for careers in agriculture.

"This is an amazing opportunity provided to the college and the community to build our capacity in programs that will not only benefit the Menominee community, but also surrounding tribal communities and rural northern Wisconsin," said Chief Academic Officer Geraldine Sanapaw, who will be leading the project. "We are embarking on a new chapter of workforce development that will hopefully fill many of the needed skilled positions for our tribal communities in food, agriculture, natural resources and human services."

New barn quilt boasts evening star

Shawano County's 404th barn quilt, named Bohm's Evening Star, is now on display on a barn owned by Walter and Janet Bohm at W1211 Nichols Drive, Krakow.

The quilt was sponsored by Walter and Janet's children, Christy, Jenny, Debby and Jeremy. The barn on which the quilt is mounted is the second barn on the farm. When Walter A. Bohm purchased the farm in 1935, a smaller building stood where the barn is now.

Walter married Irene Strupp in 1936 and they made their home on the farm, milking a herd of 16 dairy cows by hand. In addition to the cows, the barn also housed horses and chickens. Walter and Irene raised three sons, Roger, Floyd and Walter Gene. In 1973, Walter married Janet from Gillett, and they moved to the 100-acre farm.

After the original barn was lost, friends and neighbors helped build the present barn, which took four weeks. The new barn had more room, so the dairy herd was increased to 24 cows. When the first tractor was purchased, the horses left and the chickens were moved to a coop. With more room in the barn, five more cows were added. In 1980, an addition was put on the barn, so the dairy herd was increased to 42 milk cows.

"The barn became a great place for the kids to play hide and seek and to ride their pedal tractors in the barn alley," Janet Bohm said. "And the cows and calves became pets."

As each of the Bohms' children grew, so did their interest in farming. All four were active in 4-H and FFA, and Janet served as a 4-H leader for 25 years. Christy and her husband, Joe Tomandl, now farm in the Medford area and have three children. Jeremy lives in the area and owns JR's Welding in Pulaski. He married Layne Treankler, and they live on a farm just west of Janet and Walter with their two children. Jenny lives in Krakow with her husband, Cory Klopotic, and works as a librarian at Fairview

Bubble tea, coffee shop opens in Lena

Café serves coffee brewed from high-quality coffee beans sourced from a private roaster

A coffee shop featuring hot and cold specialty coffee, bubble tea, and novelty drinks is now open in Lena.

Lyllu's Café (pronounced LEE-Lu's) is open from 5 a.m. to 2 p.m. seven days a week in the former bakery at 110 E. Main St., Lena.

The café serves coffee brewed from high-quality coffee beans sourced from a private roaster who roasts the beans to order. On the menu is Ethiopian regular and Peru roast decaf brewed coffee, espresso drinks, chai and matcha lattes, hot cocoa, lemonade, iced teas, Jarritos soda, botanical sparkling teas, tea in sachets, and bubble tea. Donuts, muffins, and macarons complement the drinks. Additionally, guests can purchase coffee beans to grind and brew at home.

Café owner Jamie Thomae has fond memories of running a coffee shop when she was a teenager. As an adult, she wanted to create a place where kids, teens, and adults can come together to socialize over a delicious beverage.

"If you are new to the coffee and bubble tea experience, do not fret," Thomae said. "We will walk you through all your choices to ensure you order what you are looking for."

For those unfamiliar with bubble tea, it is a milky tea base or ice tea base drink, served with the variety of sweeteners and enhanced with bursting pearls or chewy brown sugar pearls. Pearls are small, flavorful beads that pop in your mouth.

"We shake our bubble teas in martini shakers, place the pearls in the cup, then ice, then we pour your shaken tea over the ice," Thomae said. "Grab that big straw, and enjoy the bubble tea fun."

In addition to owning the coffee shop, Thomae is a technical project manager for an entertainment and theme park company.

"I adapt to the pressures of exceeding the guest experience, and I enjoy bringing those traits to my coffee shop. We are more than a great cup of coffee, we are community," she said. Guests can make puzzles or play board games, chess, or checkers or participate in a book club. Lyllu's Café promotes social interaction, so it doesn't offer Wi-Fi.

"I know that is strange for being a coffee shop, but I really want to see human interaction with humans," Thomae said. Guests who want to use a laptop are encouraged to bring a hot spot, too.

In the future, Lyllu's Café plans to sponsor community events, fundraisers, and outreach programs. For example, the café hosted an Operation Christmas Child box packing event last fall. Whatever is happening at the café, community is the main focus.

"Our goal is to make you a drink you will truly enjoy," Thomae said. "Take that fist sip and say, yum."
