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Pulaski schools seek injunction over online video

Gays Against Groomers chapter head denies threatening violence

The Pulaski School District is scheduled to be in Brown County Circuit Court on Oct. 13, seeking a permanent injunction against an Appleton man who posted what it describes as threatening videos intended to harass or intimidate a staff member, the district and its board of education.

Court Commissioner Phoebe Mix granted a temporary restraining order against Jose “Rocky” Rodriguez on Sept. 29 after the district filed a petition and three affidavits alleging safety concerns.

A brief in support of the petition quotes Rodriguez as posting a TikTok and Instagram video in which he says, in part, “Pulaski High School

and Pulaski School Board. We’re coming for ya. This is not going to end very well for you. Trust me.”

Rodriguez is the Wisconsin chapter leader for a group called Gays Against Groomers, whose website describes itself as “a 501(c)(4) nonprofit organization of gay people and others within the community who oppose the recent trend of indoctrinating, sexualizing and medicalizing children under the guise of ‘LGBTQIA+.’”

According to the school district’s brief, in the description of a second video, Rodriguez identifies a Pulaski teacher as a “drag queen who ... was ‘allegedly’ encouraging his students to visit his sexual explicit insta and tiktok pages. He was also a performer for an all-age drag show that also featured minors doing drag for adults.”

In an interview with WBAY-TV Channel 2 in Green Bay, Rodriguez said the “We’re coming for ya” statement was not intended as a threat of violence.

“I’m a gay man and I love drag, but I believe drag has a place and an audience. Children are not it,” he told the television reporter.

“I wanted to put pressure on the school board to come out and let everybody know what’s going on.”

The statement is cited in the restraining order brief and all three affidavits, signed by Superintendent Allison Space, School Board President Heidi Melzer and Pulaski Police Chief Kurt Kitzman.

“As the president of the district’s board of education, I fear for the safety of the district, its students and staff members, and its board of education,” Melzer said in her affidavit. “I am also fearful for my own safety as the board president, due to the Respondent’s threatening statements directed at the Pulaski School Board.”

“Based on my review of the videos and description, the respondent has no legitimate purpose and appears to be inciting others to engage in similar conduct,” Kitzman said.

“We are in the process of considering possible criminal charges.”

The brief, filed by school district attorney Jenna R. Rousseau of Running, Lewis and Lacy, argues that Rodriguez does not live or have children in the Pulaski School District and therefore has no standing or a legitimate purpose for his actions.

“To be sure, if the Respondent has a concern related to educational or other matters, there are various existing methods for him to bring his concerns forward,” the brief said. “However, the Respondent has gone far beyond advocating his concern and engaged in harassing, threatening and intimidating conduct, that directly threatens the safety of the district, its staff and students, and its board of education.”

Mix is scheduled to consider a permanent injunction in a hearing scheduled for 10:45 a.m. Oct. 13 at the Brown County Courthouse in Green Bay.

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County budget hearing scheduled for October 26

Spending to increase 5.6%, property tax levy up 1.4%

A \$50.2 million county budget for 2024 is heading toward a public hearing scheduled for 9 a.m. Oct. 26 at the Oconto County Courthouse, 301 Washington St., Oconto.

The budget resolution was on the agenda for the county board’s Administration Committee meeting on Oct. 12, so some tweaking may be completed before the budget reaches the full board later this month.

County Administrator Erik Pritzl says the budget was hammered out over a series of about 30 meetings over 2½ weeks in September, as he and Finance Director Lisa Sherman met with department heads and outside agencies that receive county funding.

“I will say the department heads did an excellent job of preparing their budgets,” Pritzl said. “I think in particular they really looked for ways to support their operations and their staff increases with any revenue they have access to or looking at expenses they could make changes to.”

County revenues got a boost when the state Department of Revenue boosted equalized values by double digits for the second year in a row.

The equalized value of property in Oconto County increased 18%, according to a DOR report last month.

An increase in net new construction of 1.56% translates to \$309,182 in new money, and the Legislature approved a supplemental shared revenue increase of \$477,412, Pritzl said.

The bottom line is that the county has up to \$786,594 in additional funding available for its 2024 budget, he said.

The budget includes 2% across-the-board wage increases for most county employees, along with step increases and merit pay, plus a 1% retention incentive to be paid for employees who stay with the county through 2024.

Pritzl said the county got good news from its health insurance

provider, which came in with a 5% premium increase. County officials prepared their original budget estimates based on a 9% increase, he said.

To maintain services, the county will have to apply about \$713,000 of its fund balance – or savings account – but that is less than the \$1.2 million that was applied a year ago, Pritzl said.

“We’re getting closer to — I don’t know if we’ll ever get to zero, but I don’t want to apply general fund unless we have to,” he said.

The proposed budget spends \$50,254,566, a 5.6% increase over 2023, but because of increases in other revenues, the proposed property tax levy of \$22.06 million represents only a 1.4% increase.

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Oconto County to buy new armored vehicle

Bearcat considered more nimble than existing truck

The Oconto County Sheriff's Department will be adding a Bearcat armored vehicle to its tool set, replacing a mine-resistant ambush protected truck that has proved to be unwieldy and unreliable.

While the county board approved the purchase Sept. 21, delivery is expected to take about a year, Investigator Jim Pecha told supervisors during a presentation.

Pecha said the Bearcat can protect deputies and victims from an active shooter or in other volatile situations.

"Traditionally what law enforcement look to do was find large rocks, trees, other structures to act as cover in order to respond to these incidents and properly contain them," he said. "The armored vehicle is a piece of equipment that can

be positioned wherever it's needed to provide cover where cover does not actually exist."

The vehicle has off-road capability and can be used in disaster rescue; further, it is able to drive through deep snow or water that other vehicles can't traverse, Pecha said.

The MRAP, a surplus vehicle on loan from the U.S. Department of Defense, is a large commercial vehicle that is hard to get into tight spaces or areas with low tree canopy, he said.

Sheriff Todd Skarban said Brown County has a Bearcat, and it's clearly more versatile than the MRAP.

"This vehicle can be used in an urban or rural environment. It's bulletproof – we can get up close and personal with the people that are inside. Its primary function, in addition to trying to coax somebody out of a residence and give themselves up, is also as a life-saving tool," Skarban said. "You can go in and you can evacuate people rapidly, even if you're taking fire. It renders it a little bit safer for you in that aspect. It's half the weight; we can maintain it locally. This absolutely meets our needs, and it is the industry standards."

The board approved the purchase using \$327,000 in federal American Rescue Plan Act Funds, including an add-on device that allows distribution of tear gas from inside the vehicle. The vote was 27-1, with Supervisor Gary Frank the only dissenter.

"I just don't like the idea of having military vehicles in the hands of people in my town," Frank said.

Skarban said the vehicle represents the difference between three or four officers going in with a handheld

battering ram or inside an armored conveyance, pushing the door open with a ram extension on the vehicle.

"We need to be able to effect arrest and do it safely," Skarban said. "If we have to pump gas into a house to make it uncomfortable for somebody, and that will make them come out alive, that's what we want. We want people to live. We don't want to have a gunfight."

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County eyes purchase of former ranger station

Oconto County is in the process of acquiring the former Department of Natural Resources ranger station in Oconto Falls.

The DNR notified the county in July that the 1.03-acre site is no longer needed as a ranger station. Since the parcel has limited potential for recreational use, agency planners recommended putting it up for sale. It was offered first to local units of government and tribes, with an asking price of \$150,000.

One condition is that the DNR would like to maintain the Smokey Bear fire prevention sign at the corner of Highland Drive and Cherry Avenue, so the agency can continue

to provide fire danger status information to the public.

The property consists of a 2,500-square-foot building with an unheated secondary building that is 24-by-24 feet, or 576 square feet. Oconto County is already using the facility for storage of emergency vehicles and expects to have a continued need for that purpose.

The county board would purchase the land using part of its \$7.367 million allocation from the federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The Property and Technology Committee recommended the purchase in August on the condition that only the ARPA funds be used. The \$150,000 is available in the "capital projects to be determined" portion of a plan previously approved by the board.

The board's Administration Committee was scheduled to review the proposal Oct. 12 before sending it to the full county board Oct. 19.

SCHS getting video board, new scoreboards

School board OKs up-front money to purchase, which will be repaid by business sponsors

The Shawano School Board unanimously approved fronting the money for two new scoreboards and a video board Oct. 9 with the knowledge that local businesses had committed to putting that funding back in the district's coffers through sponsorships.

Activities director Joel Wondra told the board the two current scoreboards in Shawano Community High School's field house would be relocated but still used as the new boards would be installed where the school holds basketball and volleyball games and wrestling matches. The athletic teams only use one part of the field house for games, so the old scoreboards could be used if the whole field house was used for tournaments.

"Last spring, we had a community member that came forward and was passionate about a project that he would particularly like to see happen. Particularly, they wanted to see new upgraded scoreboards and a video board be installed in our high school field house," Wondra said, later revealing that the community member was Shawano resident Dave Passehl. "In working with that individual, the individual pitched the idea that he could go out and secure sponsorships for that project. We gave him the green light to do that."

The boards are expected to cost over \$137,000, and they're being paid through sponsorships where businesses commit to paying \$1,500 (premiere sponsorship) or \$5,000 (anchor sponsorship) per year for the next five years to have their name on the scoreboards and the option of having advertising on the large video board during games. Wondra said the businesses, at the end of the five years, have the option of continuing their sponsorships for another \$500 annually.

"To date, there have been five anchor sponsors secured, and three premiere sponsors secured," Wondra said. "We're continuing to work to secure the rest of the premiere sponsors and find one last anchor sponsor."

Even though there are still more sponsorships being secured, Wondra said the district has \$147,500 signed off on for the next five years to repay the earnest money being fronted by the board now. He added that Passehl has some meetings planned next week to get more companies on board.

"Essentially, the project is paid for through private sponsorship at this point," Wondra said. "What we're asking from the board is, to put in the order, we have to put the money up front."

He added that there will be costs in the future, including making sure electrical components are installed so the board can be operated, as well as stipends for the people who run the boards during games.

"We're looking for this project to be self-sufficient," Wondra said.

Board member Karen Smith noted that the video board was a good addition to give the businesses that paid for it additional exposure, but she wanted to know if the board could also broadcast replays. Wondra said that he didn't know if that would be possible with the proposed video board.

Board member John Arens said he wanted to be certain there would be written agreements with the donors to ensure the district would not be out any money at the end, to which Wondra

said there would be.

"We will not place the order for the boards until we have signed agreements from them," Wondra said. "First payments are due, I believe, Dec. 1."

Arens said his concern stemmed from how expensive the video board out in front of the high school is and wanting to be sure the boards for the field house would be functional for years to come.

"I think we need to hold funds always for future maintenance, as well," Arens said.

Board member Christine McKinnies expressed concern about having the same sponsors on the scoreboards indefinitely once the five years are up and wondered if other businesses, if interested, could be involved.

"There are 12 premiere partners (total). Does that open up for the community businesses to say, 'Hey, this is something I would like to do. I like this?'" McKinnies said.

Wondra said it wasn't a matter of privilege in regards to the sponsor-

ships and that Passehl has been beating the pavement to find out which businesses in the area would be interested.

Board member Bobbi Lemerond said she has seen similar projects succeed in the Oconto Falls and Pulaski school districts, noting the football stadium in Oconto Falls is named after ST Paper and the one in Pulaski is named after Saputo.

"Those big corporations in those small communities have done wonderful things in those districts," Lemerond said. "We can have that here, as we do have a generous community. This is a start."

Wondra said the new scoreboards and video board are expected to be installed by Christmas, and the school plans to have a ribbon-cutting ceremony to thank the companies that will furnish the funding.

Civic education secures Wisconsin's future

Right now, there are children being born in America who will live to see the 22nd century. What kind of nation will they inherit? Under what form of government will they live?

In a recent Pew study, 51% of Americans said they are dissatisfied with how democracy is working and 46% said they are open to other forms of government, including rule by an individual leader. Less than one third of millennials consider it essential to live in a democracy.

This crisis of faith in America's system of government isn't a coincidence. It coincides with decades of disinvestment and the deprioritization of civic learning and engagement in schools. While other important subjects like STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) receive over \$50 in federal dollars per student per year, less than 50 cents per student is devoted to civics education.

That unequal level of support for civic learning stands in stark opposition to what most Americans

want. Over 70% of likely voters in America think civics education needs to be emphasized more in schools, signaling that they are accurately aware of its importance.

According to a 2022 Annenberg study 25% of Americans cannot name one branch of government or any of the rights protected by the First Amendment. Only 22% of eighth grade students scored "proficient" in civics on the most recent National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP).

In the 2022 election cycle, turnout among voters under age 30 was less than 25%. This lack of knowledge and engagement has

real impacts for every community, where the local government relies on citizens running for office. The Wisconsin Policy Forum found that 78% of county board races in the state were uncontested in 2018.

We believe that the waning commitment to democracy, the lack of basic civic knowledge and civic disengagement can all be addressed by enhancing our commitment to civic education in schools.

Wisconsin is one of just a handful of states that don't require a high school civics class for graduation, and more than a quarter of students never take a dedicated civics or government class. This

is why the Wisconsin Civic Learning Coalition (WCLC) is bringing together stakeholders from across the state to strengthen nonpartisan civics and government education in schools.

The WCLC aims to support schools and teachers in preparing students to be committed and effective participants in civic life. Civic organizations, educators and community members from across the political spectrum have joined our coalition. This fall, we'll be writing a series that focuses on making the case for civic education, and explores what we can do together to build a strong foundation for a thriving democracy. not be impartial in any case regarding abortion.

The code requires her to recuse herself from any case regarding abortion.

Friends, family remember Ada Deer

Tribal leader's accomplishments paved the way for future generations

Tributes to Ada Deer flowed with tears and laughter at a memorial service at the Menominee Casino and Resort in Keshena on Oct. 4.

The shining example of Menominee tribal culture died Aug. 15 at age 88.

Joey Awonohopay, who offered the opening prayer, described Deer as a colleague, mentor and friend.

"She said, 'Let your actions speak for the things you believe in. ... When your journey comes to an end, the next generation behind you will have something beautiful that they inherit,'" he said of Deer.

Gena Kakkak, chairwoman of the Menominee Tribe of Wisconsin, said the best way to celebrate Deer's legacy would be to continue her work.

"Her spirit, resilience and determination serve as an inspiration to us all," Kakkak said.

Deer was the first member of the Menominee Tribe to graduate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She went on to become the first Native American to earn a master's degree in social work from Columbia University.

In the early 1970s, Deer organized grassroots political movements that fought against policies that had rolled

back Native American rights. The nation's termination policies ended recognition of the tribe in 1961, but Deer's efforts led President Richard Nixon in 1973 to restore the tribe's rights and repeal termination policies.

Soon after, she was elected head of the Menominee Restoration Committee and began working as a lecturer in American Indian studies and social work at the University of Wisconsin.

Ben Wikler, Deer's godson and chairman of the Democratic Party of Wisconsin, said Deer and others of the Restoration Committee organized, fought for and created a world today that would not have been possible without those changes.

"(We are gathered) in a space that wouldn't exist if Ada and the other members of the Menominee Restoration Committee hadn't looked at a fed-

eral law that had abrogated the treaty obligations of the United States to the Menominee Nation and refused to accept and demanded change," he said.

Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers and Attorney General Josh Kaul also shared memories of Deer.

"Ada was an advocate for change," Evers said. "The impact of Ada's work is not necessarily identified by items. The true force of her work will be the generational impact she made in her efforts to return federal recognition back to the Menominee Tribe. Her work is felt through the lives of the leaders here today.

"We are forever grateful for having lived and worked with Ada."

Kaul said he first encountered Deer when he was 11, and Deer and his mother, Peg Lautenschlager, both ran for U.S. House seats from Wisconsin.

“Ada Deer became the first Native American woman ever to win a Democratic nomination for federal office,” he said. “What I didn’t know then was that Ada already had a lifetime of accomplishments at that point in time, and Ada had a lifetime of accomplishments ahead of her.”

Like others who spoke, Kaul described Deer as funny, full of advice for friends and family, a woman who shared for passion for making change, an easy person to talk to, someone who helped everyone and a woman with a determined spirit.

“Ada was resilient,” he said. “She was committed to making a difference, and she was passionate — passionate about standing up for everybody but also passionate about the world we live in, passionate about moving us in the right direction.”

Deer lost that congressional election but was noticed by Bill Clinton, who won the presidency that year.

He appointed her assistant secretary of the U.S. Department of Interior of the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

She was publicly sworn in at the annual Menominee Contest Powwow by the late Menominee Tribal Supreme Court Associate Justice Sarah Skubitz.

She served for four years and helped strengthen federal protections and rights for hundreds of tribes.

Wikler recounted some of her first days in Washington.

Her office included a large desk for her and small table for guests. She wanted a small desk for herself and a large round table for guests so they would all feel included and equal.

Also, for years, the congressional delegation of Alaska had blocked federal recognition of Alaska native villages. Every year, the federal government publishes a list of the recognized tribes.

“When that list came to Ada, she decided not to call the great powerful Alaskan congressional delegation,” Wikler said. “She would just sign recognition for all of those 226 Alaskan native village as sovereign tribes. She signed that piece of paper. The number of federally recognized tribes doubled in that moment. It took Washington, D.C., by storm, and it changed the lives of people in Alaska to this day.”

After left the nation’s capital, Deer remained active in academia and Democratic politics and was inducted into the National Native American Hall of Fame in 2019.

Also that year, Deer authored a memoir, “Making a Difference: My Fight for Native Rights and Social Justice.”

“America needs people like Ada

Deer,” said Shannon Holsey, president of the Stockbridge-Munsee Band of Mohican Indians and president of the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council.

She described Deer as a champion for the underrepresented, the Menominee Tribe and all Native Americans.

“What she did was nothing less than remarkable,” Holsey said. “We are reminded today how one determined Native American woman can really make a difference.”

She also referred to Deer’s actions with the Alaskan native villages.

“In the swipe of a pen, she made them whole. She made them recognized; she made them seen, heard and sovereign,” Holsey said. “She was always about, ‘I speak up. I speak out. It’s not like I plotted and planned. I just had this gentle goal. I wanted to do, and I wanted to be and I wanted to help.’”

“Whatever your politics, Ada believed that you could make a difference to make a world a better place,” Wikler added.

Deer’s nephew, Joe Deer, also shared memories of her.

“She always encouraged us. We had a lot of fun,” he said. “Love you, Aunt Ada. Miss you, and we’ll see you again.”

Flu, COVID-19 vaccines available at Prevea Health

Everyone 6 months and older is now eligible and recommended to receive the updated COVID-19 vaccine. Doses of the updated vaccine, manu-

factured by Moderna and Pfizer, have been approved, authorized and recommended by national health experts for the following groups:

- Individuals 5 years of age and older, regardless of previous vaccination, are eligible to receive a single dose of the updated Pfizer or Moderna vaccine at least 2 months after the last dose of any COVID-19 vaccine.

- Individuals 6 months through 4 years of age who have previously been vaccinated against COVID-19 are eligible to receive one or two doses of the updated Pfizer or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine (timing and number of doses to administer depends on the previous COVID-19 vaccine received).

- Unvaccinated individuals 6 months through 4 years of age are eligible to receive three doses of the updated Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine or two doses of the updated Moderna vaccine.

- Additional doses are also authorized for certain immunocompromised individuals.

People may receive either of the vaccines regardless of which vaccine was received in the past.

Appointments for the updated COVID-19 vaccine at Prevea locations will be available as soon as vaccine supply arrives. Prevea will keep communities informed of updated COVID-19 vaccine availability on its social media pages and website.

It's Friday the 13th — better 'Check the Locks'

Thanks to Washington Irving's "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow," October is best known for leaves, pumpkins and horror. Irving masterfully wove the three together in an iconic short story that introduced Ichabod Crane, one of the most recognizable characters in American literature. Ichabod's tale of woe still raises goosebumps, especially when a reader first encounters the doomed sad-sack schoolteacher with extraordinarily bad luck.

Speaking of bad luck, there are few superstitions as pervasive in our culture as Friday the 13th, a day which far outweighs breaking a mirror or crossing paths with a black cat. There's even a name for the irrational fear engendered by it — triskaidekaphobia, fear of the number 13. However, to filmmakers, Friday the 13th is a perennial goldmine as horror movies play on millions of screens, all because viewers inexplicably love being scared out of their socks.

Consider the classics — Freddy Krueger creating mayhem in "A Nightmare on Elm Street," Michael Myers on yet another murderous rampage in some iteration of "Halloween," and Jason Voorhees maniacally wielding his machete in the never-ending "Friday the 13th" series.

Few remember it was Jason's mother who set about murdering camp counselors to avenge her son's drowning. Producers hit the jackpot

when Jason emerges from the grave to carry on her legacy by brutally murdering cute, clueless teenagers. To keep the ka-ching thing going in an endless cavalcade of copycat films, these monsters cannot be slain.

Truth be told, I've never been a fan of horror movies. I was 12 when I screamed my way through my first, "The Mummy's Hand," a black and white film originally released in 1940. That was more than enough for me. I had nightmares for months and never again felt safe going into our dank and dark farmhouse basement. I had planned to go to my grave without ever watching another one.

Then I received an email which made me smile and shudder at the same time:

"This is Eric Larson — I was in your seventh grade English class at River View Middle School in 2001. I hope you've been doing well! I wrote and directed a short horror film last year that's going to be screening next month — Saturday, October 14th — at the Green Bay

International Film Festival.

"If you're close to Green Bay, and you're free that weekend, I'd love for you to come to the screening! It's been doing pretty well on the festival circuit. It's so far screened in NYC, LA, London, Berlin, Paris — and, in a neat way, it's ending its festival run in Green Bay. Please let me know what you think. Hope all is well with you. Thanks, as always, for being such an inspiring teacher."

Eric was one of my best students ever, already an exceptional writer at age 12. We've kept in touch over the years; I'm proud and happy that he's living his dream.

Despite my lack of enthusiasm for his chosen genre, I was honored by Eric's invitation to "Check the Locks": "a short psychological horror film starring Angela Wong Carbone as Anna, a woman with an obsessive need to photograph every door she closes and locks. Following a nervous breakdown, she retreats to a friend's cabin in the woods, only to be faced with her greatest fear — the photos on her phone inexplicably change and she discovers her coping mechanisms are turning against her."

Eric was being modest when he said the film was doing pretty well. Among many other awards, "Check the Locks" was named Best Picture at the New York Film Awards; Eric won Best Director at the Oregon Screams Film Festival, and Angela took Best

Lead Performance at the Nightmares Film Festival. Wow.

According to the promo, Eric says he got the idea for "Check the Locks" from his personal struggles with anxiety, made worse during the pandemic. Driven by the fear he had not turned off his stove, he began taking photos to quell his anxiety. He'd check his phone and tell himself, "See, the stove is turned off — you have nothing to worry about."

He says this was a helpful antidote for his anxiety attacks, but he could not escape the thought that he'd open his photos app only to see his empty apartment going up in flames.

"I wanted to explore what would happen when a reliable comfort, like photographic proof, is ripped apart from the inside out — and why that ultimately might be the best path toward healing."

Mursau named to human trafficking task force

Rep. Jeff Mursau, R-Crivitz, has been appointed to the newly created 15-member state bipartisan Task Force on Human Trafficking.

"I am thankful to have been chosen to serve on this important committee because human trafficking impacts every community," said Mursau in a press release. "While human traffickers will prey on any person they determine is vulnerable, it's our children and teens who are the most susceptible."

Currently, Mursau serves on the Wisconsin Department of Justice's Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women Task Force. The task force has been working to identify the factors that contribute to missing

and murdered indigenous women and the response from social service organizations in the state of Wisconsin.

"It's imperative that we prevent vulnerable people from being exploited,

and we need to protect victims and get them the services they need," said Mursau. "I look forward to working with my legislative colleagues to identify policies and resources to help address this horrific reality."

Native languages accessible by online means

If you've recently spent time on the College of Menominee Nation's Facebook page, you've likely seen the Menominee word, koceqtah. In English, the term translates to "try it."

In partnership with Menominyou, CMN is posting a new video in its "Let's All Speak the Language" series biweekly throughout its fall semester. The goal is for every viewer to watch the language instructions and try speaking Menominee aloud.

The series offers an accessible model for first-time speakers. It shares classroom conversation words and phrases in both Menominee and English, thereby offering educators and students a chance to learn practical language they can use in an educational setting. Beginning with demonstrations on how to greet one's classmates and moving through lessons on volunteering answers, posing questions, and sharing compliments, the first five videos in the series are live at the time of this publication.

Piloted in both communication and theater courses this past summer, the eight-video series offered students a chance to hear and speak phrases that complimented their classroom instruction. In the oral communication course, students were asked to review one video and then demonstrate their own self-introduction using the language the video modeled. In theater production, learners were asked to use another video to describe their compliments and critiques of various actors' performances.

The 23 students in the summer pilot courses anonymously shared their thoughts on the series. One wrote:

"The people who are in the video do a great job pronouncing the words and sentences. They also show you how to spell them. The language in all the videos can be used just about anywhere and not just in the classroom."

Another stated: "I personally think it was a great idea ... Since we are on the Menominee Reservation, it means a lot to learn our language while attending college classes. It makes me excited to take a Menominee language course in the future."

The summer students' responses also offered some rich data. Of those surveyed, 65% admitted to rewatching the videos after class and 78% responded that they plan to use the language they learned beyond the classroom setting. Additionally, 15 out of the 23 students expressed that they would "be interested in taking a course that shared a similar video series using a tribal language other than Menominee."

This fall, CMN is piloting the same video series in one of its history courses through a partnership with Speak Mahican. Students enrolled in American History from 1865 to Present review the laments of William Dick, the last first-language speaker the Mohican nation has produced. In 1931, Dick spoke to The

Rhineland Daily News about his native tongue, sharing: "I am very proud of it, very, very proud. Nobody knows it now, nobody except me. All the others are dead."

CMN students are also told about how Speak Mahican has worked with a linguist to turn century-old anthropologists' documentations into spoken words. Every other week, students in the CMN course view a new video in the Mahican "Let's All Speak the Language" series, thereby allowing them to sprinkle the language William Dick prided himself on when engaging in their course discussions.

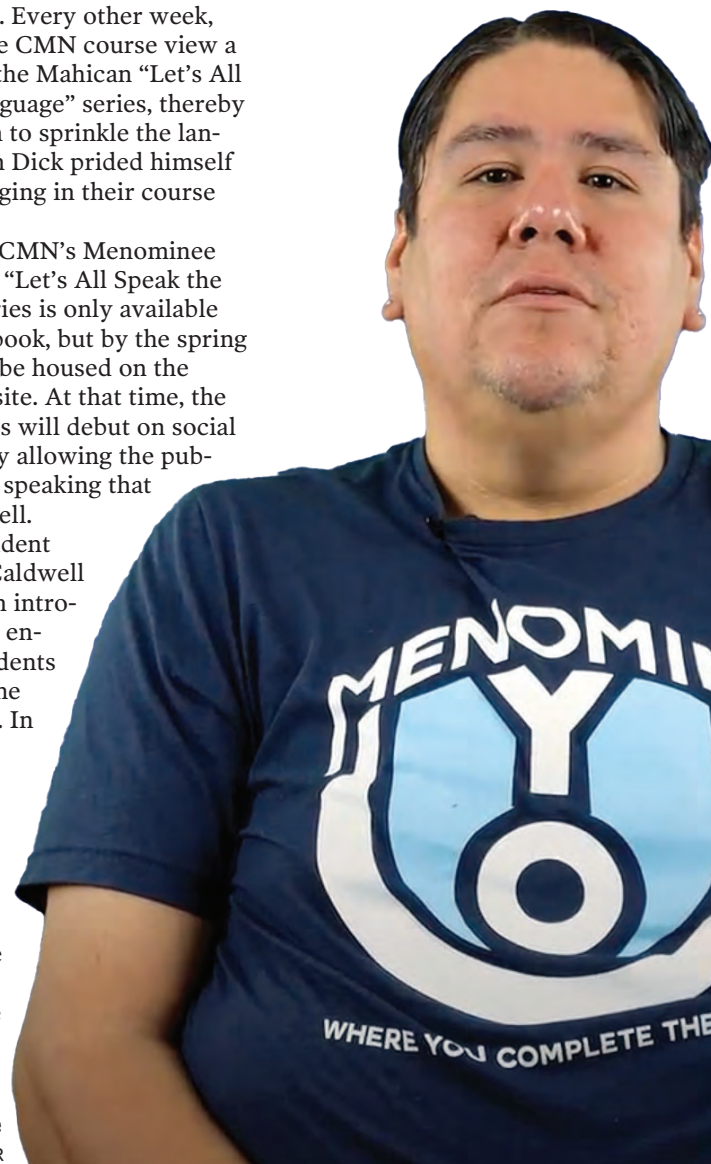
Currently, CMN's Menominee version of the "Let's All Speak the Language" series is only available through Facebook, but by the spring they will also be housed on the college's website. At that time, the Mahican series will debut on social media, thereby allowing the public to practice speaking that language as well.

CMN President Christopher Caldwell took part in an introductory video encouraging students who viewed the various series. In the recording, the enrolled Menominee tribal member said: "I am glad that people are on their language journeys. I wish them the best of luck

on that journey, and let's continue to work together to bring our languages back to prominence."

In other words, koceqtah.

Richard Oshkeshequoam from Menominyou teaches a lesson for the College of Menominee Nation's "Let's All Speak the Language" video series.

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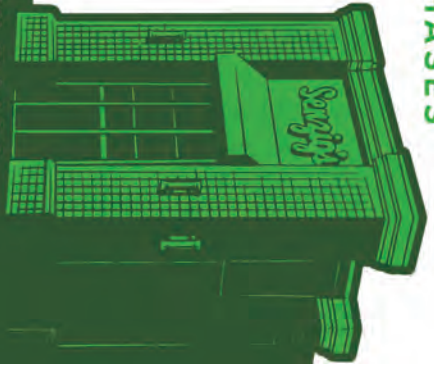

Wausaukee 50, Suring 0

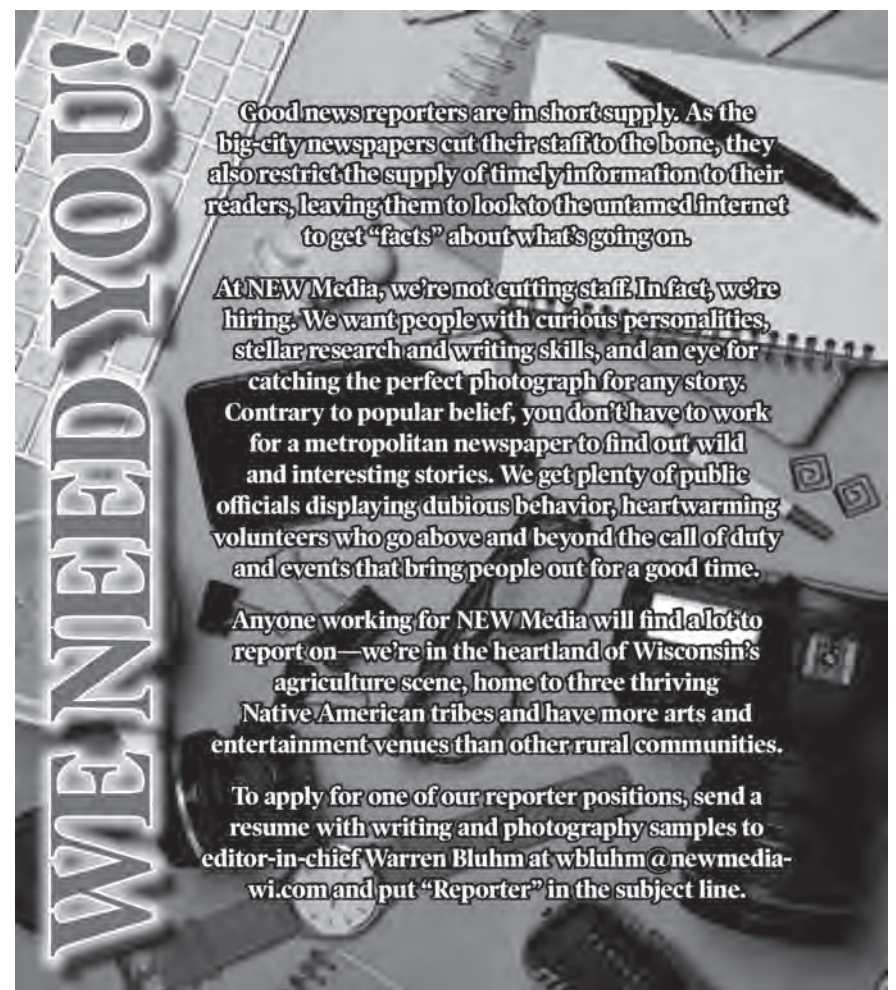

Testing vintage recurve bows for bowhunting

Most bowhunters have a dozen things to do before deer season, but choosing which bow to use isn't one of them. Of course, I have to be different.

I have always loved vintage recurve bows as well as longbows, and if you are a regular reader, you know my goal is to drop a deer with one of these wood-and-fiberglass classics. I have a modest collection of Bear, Wing, Ben Pearson and other traditional bows, as well as one modern takedown recurve.

On a recent trip to my in-laws' lakefront cabin on Lily Lake near Pickerel, I brought three recurves along for a little testing. This is the latest I've begun the bowhunting season, probably because the unseasonably warm temperatures require quick animal recovery to avoid tainted meat, and because the summer insects are still plentiful. I also prefer hunting in crisp fall air, not T-shirt weather.

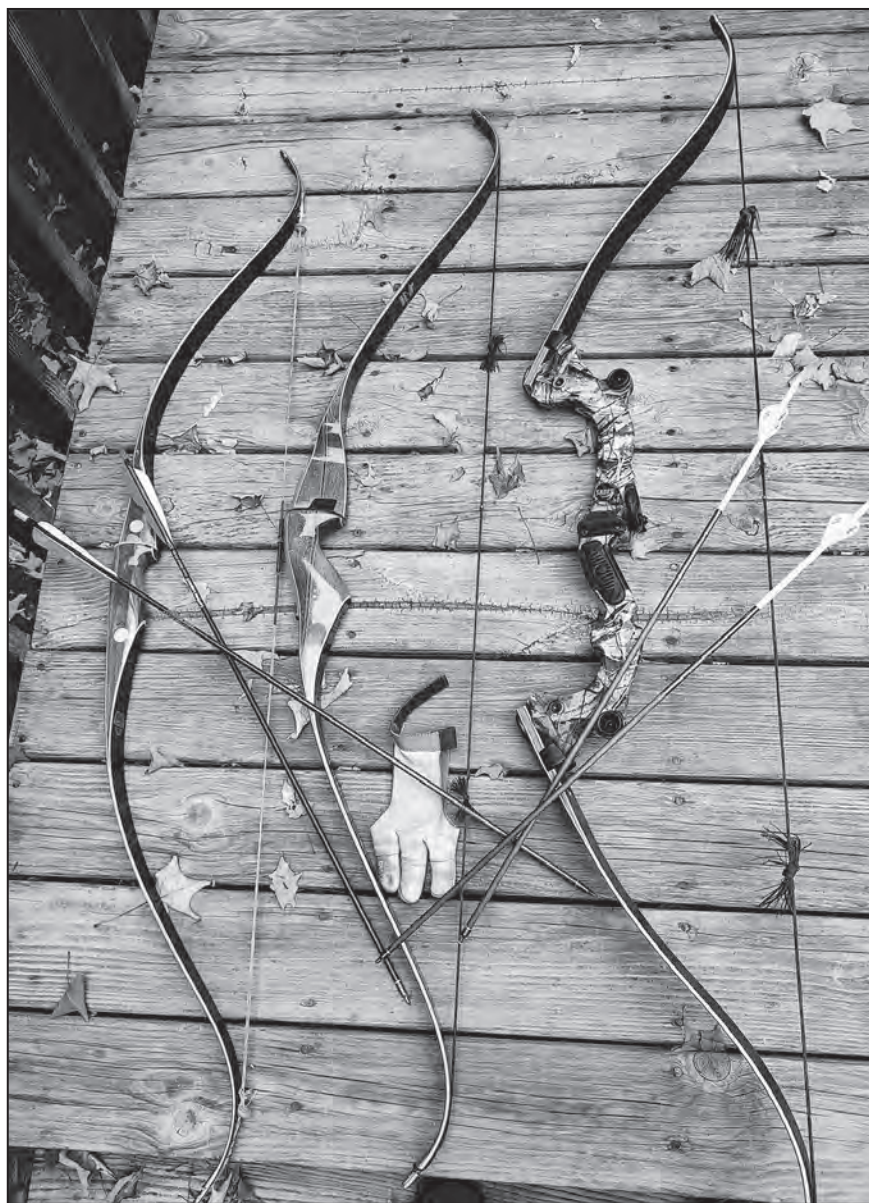
The three bows tested were a 50-pound Bear Kodiak Hunter, a beautiful green classic dating to about 1973; an Eddings Super Cast Spartan recurve, also green (manufacture date unknown); and a more modern 40-pound Martin Sabre recurve takedown with an aluminum riser (handle) and fiberglass limbs.

The only wood on the Martin is in the laminated fiberglass limbs, which makes it less beautiful than the other two. Here is a more detailed review of this bow online: www.bestrecurvebowguide.com/martin-saber-review-recurve-bow-inspection.

Martin went out of business many years ago, and Damon Howatt bought out their traditional bow manufacturing.

I brought an assortment of aluminum and carbon arrows, most fletched with feathers as required when shooting a recurve bow off the riser shelf (as the Bear and Eddings are set up), but I also brought a few of my vane-fletched carbon arrows from my compound bow days.

The Martin is fitted with a Whisker Biscuit, a unique arrow rest that is simple and holds the arrow in any position for shots at awkward angles. It's the first Whisker Biscuit I ever shot, and I love it. They are still used on modern compound bows, although drop-away arrow rests now dominate the market. I've never been a fan of any mechanical gadgets that can fail in the field, as they are apt to do, so

never used a drop-away rest and probably never will.

There has been more written about Bear Archery Co. and its founder, Fred Bear, than probably any other traditional bows in history. Fred Bear killed almost every big game animal, from tigers and polar bears to elephants, and you could see some of them at the Fred Bear Museum in Gainesville, Florida, as

my wife and I did to celebrate our first anniversary back in 1999 (she says she would never go back — funny how they change, right?) The museum closed in 2003, and the items were sold to Bass Pro Shops. Their flagship store in Springfield, Missouri, now displays some of his bow kills.

I use Jorge L. Coppen's book "Bear Archery Traditional Bows: A Chronological History, 1949-2015," to date my Bear bows. It is well illustrated and will get you within a year or two of manufacture on most models. Here's a link to the book: www.barnesandnoble.com/w/bear-archery-traditional-bows-jorge-l-coppen/1123186336.

My wife, Michelle, assisted me in my unscientific bow testing. She

stood facing away from me as I shot each one to determine which was the quietest. I felt the Sabre won that category, in part because of the built-in vibration dampening. The bow was very stable in my hand, compared to the other two. She described the sound as lower in pitch, but she felt the other two bows were quieter. It would be easy to add a stabilizer to the threaded hole on the lower riser.

The Kodiak Hunter also has a stabilizer port.

Although none of these bows had the same draw weight, they all shot surprisingly fast at 15 and 20 yards. I was amazed at how fast the Martin threw arrows, although marked at 40 pounds. I normally try to keep my draw weight to 45 pounds, but the Bear was very easy to draw and shot with authority. I lowered my anchor point to my chin and looked right over the top of the shaft and saw my groups tighten.

The Eddings was a dream to hold, because of its featherlight riser and thin limbs. It shot fast for its 42-pound weight. Maybe there was something to his "Super Cast" claim. It did seem a bit more "buzzy" than the other two, which could spook a deer. Both the Bear and Eddings are 58 inches long, which is nice in a ground blind. The 64-inch Martin likely would be too long in all but the largest ground blinds.

Lloyd Eddings was a cabinet maker from Marquette, Iowa, who began building bows in his McGregor, Iowa, in 1945 (I used to cover this area as a regional reporter in Dubuque). His bows became so popular that he launched Eddings Archery Co. in 1950 and eventually employed 26 people, according to this link: www.vintagearchery.org/eddings.html.

Eddings' death in a plane crash in 1961 brought an end to the business, so I know that my Eddings Spartan is at least 73 years old. This history is what makes traditional archery so much fun.

So what recurve's going hunting with me? I really love the Eddings, but am always partial to Bear. Did I mention I have many others at home that haven't been shot? Maybe I'll turn this bow testing into a new sport.

Packers lose 17-13 to Raiders, drop to 2-3

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Packers fall to 2-3 after loss to Raiders

Love throws three interceptions, five in last two games

Three interceptions from Jordan Love were the catalyst to Green Bay dropping its Week 5 game against the Las Vegas Raiders in Las Vegas on Oct. 9.

Bad play calling, combined with squandered opportunities and a poor offensive performance, allowed the Raiders to defeat the Packers for the first time since 1987, when Randy Wright was the starting quarterback for the Packers.

Love finished the game throwing 16-for-30 for 183 yards and three interceptions for a passer rating of just 32.2. While Love struggled mightily, it was Packers running back A.J. Dillon who was able to garner some success on offense, turning in his best performance of the season with 20 carries for 76 yards and one touchdown.

"I think that the run game started off good tonight," said Love. "I had the turnover early. We just have to find a way to get going faster and get a rhythm going. I just need to find a way to be better and get some completions going and move the ball."

Christian Watson recorded three receptions for 91 yards, while Luke Musgrave saw one of his busiest nights of the year, catching six balls for 34 yards.

For the Raiders, quarterback Jimmy Garoppolo finished his day completing 22-of-31 for 208 yards and one touchdown. He also added one interception. Raiders All-Pro running back Josh Jacobs was held to 69 yards on 20 carries, but he did find the end zone.

The story leading up to the game was Davante Adams facing his former team. The former Packers legend was held to 45 yards on four catches, with teammate Jakobi Meyers doing most of the damage through the air. Meyers caught seven balls for 75 yards and one touchdown.

The game started out with an exchange of punts from both teams, setting Green Bay up on its own 7-yard line on the team's second drive of the game. An unnecessary

roughness penalty on Raiders defensive end Maxx Crosby helped move Green Bay down the field quickly. Later that drive, Love scrambled for a career-high 26-yard gain to set up a first-and-10 from the Raiders 43-yard line. Love followed that up with a 19-yard completion to Josiah Deguara. The drive eventually stalled, and Green Bay was forced to settle for an Anders Carlson 37-yard field goal.

The teams then exchanged punts again and Las Vegas found itself with the ball midway through the second quarter. After a converted third-and-11 and an offsides penalty, the Raiders were set up with a first-and-10 from Green Bay's 25-yard line. That drive culminated in Meyers' touchdown to give the Raiders a 10-3 lead going into halftime.

"We have to look at everything," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur. "It seemed like when we dialed up some passes, they had some timely calls defensively. They did a better job than we did."

On Green Bay's ensuing drive,

Love threw an interception to Raiders linebacker Robert Spillane to set up a 26-yard field goal. After Green Bay went three-and-out, the Raiders were set up with a field goal before the half. Backup tackle Yosh Nijman was able to get his hand on the ball though, blocking the kick to hold the Raiders at 10 points going into halftime.

To open the second half, Packers safety Rudy Ford intercepted Garoppolo to set up the Packers with great field position. Riding on the back of Dillon, the Packers marched down the field and scored a 5-yard touchdown from the Boston College alum.

Green Bay's defense once again stifled the Raiders offense, forcing them to punt. With the ball back, Love rolled to the left side of the field and found a wide-open Watson for a 77-yard completion. The pass would have been a touchdown, if not for a horse collar tackle by Raiders defensive back Marcus Peters. That horse collar tackle proved to be the saving grace for Las Vegas though,

as Green Bay was held to just a field goal.

Up 13-10, the Raiders started to get Adams involved in the game. Adams totaled 39 yards on a drive that finished with a Jacobs rushing touchdown. That touchdown ultimately proved to be the dagger, as Love threw interceptions on two of Green Bay's last three drives.

"It is tough," said Love, on the fourth-quarter struggles. "We had a lot of opportunities, definitely. The defense did a great job getting us those opportunities, and we didn't do enough. I didn't do enough. There is a lot of good stuff to learn from, but it is tough, because we had opportunities to go win, it and we couldn't do it."

Green Bay now holds a 2-3 record as the team enters its Week 6 bye. With the Lions looking like one of the better teams in the NFL, Green Bay may have to do some upward climbing, as it now sits two games behind Detroit for the No. 1 spot in the NFC North.

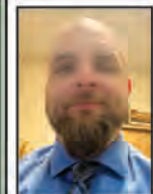

Packers underwhelming after 5 games

Bright spot may be performance of special teams, minus the penalties

The fifth game of the 2022 season marked a turning point for the Packers. They traveled to London and blew a double-digit lead in a loss to the Giants.

On the final play of the game, Aaron Rodgers broke his thumb and was clearly limited for the next several weeks. The Packers would see their losing streak balloon to five games before finally snapping it against Mike McCarthy's Dallas Cowboys.

This year, they're behind that pace after a dismal performance on Monday Night Football against the Las Vegas Raiders, losing 17-13.

Packers offense

Prior to Monday night's game against the Las Vegas Raiders, the argument could be made that Jordan Love had more highs than lows in the early portion of his time as a starting quarterback.

That is no longer the case.

Love is coming off his worst game of the season. The Packers were only able to muster 182 yards passing. For the first time all season, Love looked rattled in the pocket and turned the ball over at an alarming rate.

Love threw three interceptions, including one that sealed the team's fate. Christian Watson looked to have separation early in the route, but Love had to escape the pocket, then underthrew Watson, making an easy interception for Amik Robertson.

After not turning the ball over in his first two starts, Love is now second in the league in interceptions. He's thrown six of them in the team's last three games, including three against the Raiders.

Love was off to a solid start early in the year, but things have gotten worse instead of better over the last three games.

Through five games, the Packers have topped 250 yards passing once.

They have yet to have a receiver top 100 yards receiving in a single

game.

They currently rank in the bottom half of the league in passing offense.

Their rushing offense has struggled to gain any traction as well.

Aaron Jones has essentially missed every game since the season opener. The offense has missed him.

A.J. Dillon is in the midst of a tough season. He is averaging 3.0 yards per carry and did not find the end zone until Monday night's loss to the Raiders.

Emanuel Wilson and Patrick Taylor had nice stories in the preseason, but that has not carried over to games that count.

Perhaps the biggest disappointment early in the season is the offensive line.

After a new regimen was implemented in the preseason, David Bakhtiari was ready to play in the team's season opener.

He looked like David Bakhtiari. Bakhtiari when he is healthy, was a future Hall of Fame type of player.

Unfortunately, the injury bug continues to bite him. Bakhtiari only

played in the season opener.

He was placed on injured reserve before the team's Sept. 28 game against the Detroit Lions. The injury puts his future in the short term into focus. Bakhtiari won't return this season.

His long term future is unclear. Bakhtiari says he wants to continue playing. It remains to be seen if his body will allow him to.

Apart from him, the Packers' offensive line has struggled with injuries. Elgton Jenkins missed two games. His replacement, Royce Newman, struggled immensely in his absence.

Zach Tom and Jon Runyan Jr. both played injured against Detroit earlier in the season and are mending from those injuries now.

Rasheed Walker has stepped in for Bakhtiari. He's been solid if unspectacular, but it's clear the team misses its All-Pro left tackle.

The offense is young and still finding its way, but the lack of progress to this point, is disappointing.

Packers defense

Joe Barry might be public enemy

number one in the eyes of the Packers' fan base. Coordinators typically make for easy fall guys, but in Barry's case, it's hard to argue that his team has played up to its potential during his tenure as the Packers' defensive coordinator.

Barry was hired in 2021 to help the team get over the top and back into the Super Bowl.

Instead, they've regressed from the units that Mike Pettine helped put together.

Early returns this season, have been a mixed bag. The Packers have allowed more than 200 yards rushing in two of their five games.

That's dreadful.

The pass rush has been excellent, powered by Rashan Gary who looks to be all the way back from an ACL injury that ended his 2022 season.

Through five games, Gary leads the team with 4.5 sacks.

The Packers have 10 sacks as a team, and they've gotten them from a wide range of players.

Kenny Clark, Karl Brooks, and Devonte Wyatt each have at least one sack this season. Lukas Van

Ness and Preston Smith have each gotten on the board as well.

When the team has been able to get opposing offenses into obvious passing situations, their pass rush has been able to create havoc.

The issue is the same as it has been since Brian Gutekunst took over as general manager. They've been gashed by Detroit and Atlanta,

two teams that are not shy about their desire to run the ball.

Opposing offenses are still averaging 155.3 yards per game on the ground. That would rank last in the NFL if not for a truly abysmal Denver defense giving up 187 yards per game.

Conversely – their pass defense ranks 10th in the NFL.

If the Packers could ever find some middle ground in the run game, their defense might have a chance to live up to its billing.

Packers special teams

One of the biggest storylines coming out of training camp was the struggles of rookie kicker Anders Carlson.

Carlson missed a kick in practice, usually needing to miss before finding his rhythm. There are no mulligans, however, once the games are real.

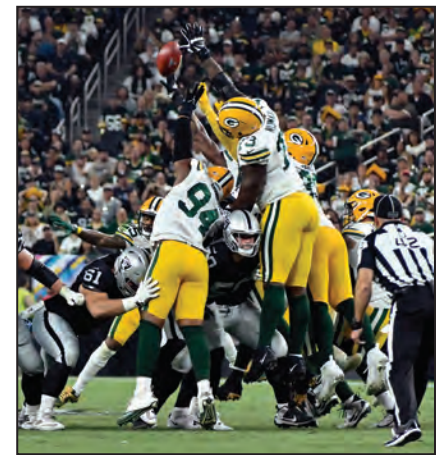
Carlson has not needed a mulligan.

He's yet to miss a kick in a game. He's one of the few bright spots on a special teams unit that has struggled to find its way in 2023.

Keisean Nixon, one of the team's most exciting players in 2022, has yet to find a crease in the return game. It's tough to make an impact as a kickoff returner in today's NFL, with most kickers able to boom the ball out of the back of the end zone.

Nixon has still struggled to capture the magic that made him a first team All-Pro a season ago. His longest return of the season was 36 yards. Not bad, but certainly not as exciting as he was a season ago.

Daniel Whelan has been solid as a punter after the team cut Pat

Stokes happy to be back on the field

Injuries kept cornerback sidelined for past 11 months

Green Bay Packers cornerback Eric Stokes, who opened the season on the physically unable to perform list, is back on the field.

He is practicing again, after sustaining foot and knee injuries at the Detroit Lions on Nov. 6, 2022. He started practice Oct. 3.

When did you find out you'd start practicing?

I found out sometime last week, I wasn't 100% sure I was going to go until yesterday or the day before yesterday. That's when I found out I was full go.

Why did everyone wait this long?

We were just waiting until the four weeks were over with, and then we'd take it off from there. I tweaked my hamstring and then some other little stuff happened.

When can you play?

We're just going to take it day to day, so who knows?

What do you need to get on the field?

Just get more practice reps, just get more comfortable with everything. Just seeing how my footwork

is at and seeing how everything will be. Finally when I get comfortable with that, I'm like I'm back, I'm back. I'm back for sure.

Are you worried about being rusty?

It's a little jitters. I'm not gonna lie. It's a little feel. It was funny because when I went in the training room to go get tape this morning, I was like, 'Damn my stomach hurt.' It was real deal hurting for some reason, but the moment I got back out there, it was all good.

Worried about how your body will hold up?

Just haven't played. Just haven't played. I knew mentally everything already was at the point of all right, this is the day. It's actually time to go out there and this is what I do. It's just a little jitters from missing it.

Can you run at full speed?

Oh yeah. I hit full speed. I know I ain't worried about that. I ain't worried about the speed.

Are you as fast as before?

I guess you gotta see.

How can you help the team?

I'm fitting in wherever they need me at. I know we already got a little thing going with Sul, Ja and Kei and

all that stuff. Wherever they need me, I'm gonna fit in. Special teams, get my role in on dime, whatever. Wherever y'all need me, I'm fitting in and I'm just happy to be back.

Did you struggle mentally being out so long?

Oh yeah, it was struggles at points. You already know, especially from last year. This is my first time missing this amount of time. Being away from the game for this long, just missing the team, missing all this little stuff. This is my first time battling mentals and battling everything, being cheerful, being grateful. All that stuff, it just kept being roadblocks after roadblocks. No, I'm getting closer back, it's just great. I feel better.

How long you been able to run full speed?

I've been able to run full speed since camp started. I just any little thing – I would have little knockback or something, a little setback or whatever. I've been running full tilt. There were always setbacks.

When did you hurt the hamstring?

A couple times during camp. It happened a couple times during camp. I was like, all right, it's time to

sit back and chill.

On the same side?

On that same side.

How was it overcoming that after knee and foot injuries?

Man, it was tough, man. Ain't gonna lie. It was very tough because any little thing, I kept feeling like I got closer and closer to making it back and boom something else would happen. It's just like dang. Throughout this whole thing, I feel like it taught me patience more than anything to where I feel like I'm ready. I feel like I'm here and boom something else that keep on recurring and all that stuff.

Did the hamstring come from running?

Man, it was either running. I know one time it was from running. Another time I'm just braking. It was just random events.

Have you had hamstring problems before?

Nah. I've had hamstrings, but I haven't had them since my senior year of high school or freshman year of college was the last time I had hamstring issues. They were just like a little annoying.

Was it related to your rehab?

Nah, I just feel like it was some-

thing to do with my whole – because it was all going on in the same leg. It was something was going on there that I had to refocus on, go look at and all that stuff and find different people. It's been a blessing in disguise because I've met a lot of good people.

Will you start again?

Oh yeah, that was always the case, especially like last year because last year they hit it off towards the end. They went on a big run towards the end, and they were flying around doing great, so I really knew coming back like man, it don't matter where I'm at. I just want to be back out there with y'all. I miss y'all so much. I don't care where I'm at, where I fill in. I know for a fact when I'm back out there you're going to get 110% of me though. I'm gonna go ahead and show any little impact I can, any little thing I can to show that I'm valuable.

Have a chance to watch game closer?

Oh heck yeah. There's a lot of little things that I sit back and start noticing games and see how everybody else plays and how I can play with this person, how I can do with this person. OK, then, this is how we do it. Just break down more scheme, break down more things and get more comfortable with a lot more

stuff. It was a lot of little things and this injury taught me a lot different little things, and I just can't wait. Can't wait.

Are you going to play anywhere on the field?

Yeah, I know what I can do but it's only a matter of time. I gotta go ahead and get that trust back into the football, get back into practicing and getting back into guarding people and finding the tempo of doing all the little stuff. I just can't wait to find that. When I find that, everything else will just solve itself.

How did you stay positive?

Man, I just kept looking at the bigger picture. I know for a fact this happened for a reason. It wasn't an accident. It wasn't nothing that I did. My injury happened for a reason. It sat me down for something. I was just taking the good with the bad. Yeah, there would be days where I'm down and all that stuff. It is what it is. I know for a fact there's multiple things going on. My worst day is somebody's great day. You just gotta look at that and keep on pushing through and keep moving. Once I changed my mindset on everything, then everything else just came easy.

Did you have any low moments?

Of course. Of course. You don't

feel like doing this. You don't feel like doing that. But those are the days that you really have to push through, that you really gotta grind, that you really gotta get through. Because those days are gonna make you better.

When was that for you?

The hardest point would easily be – God, there was multiple. I can easily say the wheelchair days were hard. I was down bad. The days I thought I was coming back or thought I was coming closer, then boom something else would happen, and it would set me back again. Those days were real deal tough. Another day, when I finally saw RG. Me and RG got hurt literally the same day and big proud of him and all that stuff. But it was another little setback for me. It's like dang, I'm not where I wanted to be. I thought me and you were pretty much on the same pace and everything and I see you moving forward and me still staying back. It was another little rough day for me, too. It was just like another little slap in the face that I was back there. It just felt like hey I can't compare my injuries to his. It's two different injuries.

What goes through your mind when you're in a wheelchair?

Oh man, you just gotta stay positive any little type of way that you

can. Just have positive people around you, positive people that keep you up and all that stuff. Because you already know on those dark days, it gets dark. It gets dark, especially being in Green Bay – snowing. It's dark already. Even on your dark days like hey man, you don't see too much sunlight. All you see is snow. It's a lot going on. You just gotta keep positive people around you and keep the positive energy. That's something I try to hone in on. Having Quay around, having my Georgia people around, it was unbelievable.

Who told you that you could practice?

Actually, it was Flea. I was in the training room, getting treatment or whatever. Then Flea came up to me, and he was like, 'I think we're gonna actually let you go this week.' That changed my whole mood. I got super happy, dumb happy. I couldn't stop smiling since.

No tears like Rashan Gary?

Nah, nah, nah, nah. It wasn't one of them because I already had in my mindset – after these four weeks, I knew what I was working forward to. It was already something that was in the back of my mind and all this stuff. It's just day by day, just marking it off on the calendar. It was a matter of time.



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Bakhtiari won't play again this season as he prepares for fifth knee surgery

Green Bay Packers offensive tackle David Bakhtiari's season is over. He hopes his NFL career isn't.

He's set to undergo his fifth knee surgery to give himself a chance at playing again, Bakhtiari said Friday when he spoke with reporters for nearly 40 minutes in the team's Lambeau Field locker room trying to explain what he's endured since suffering a catastrophic left knee injury during a Dec. 31, 2020, practice, as well as what needs to be done to allow him to continue his career.

"We know what we need to do for me to be back," said Bakhtiari, who last played in the Packers' Sept. 10 season-opening victory at Chicago. "It's not ideal, but that is pretty much my plan now. Now that we have a plan in place, it's the road I have to go down."

That new road, which began with

a recent arthroscopic procedure, will next include surgery aimed at resolving a cartilage issue performed by Chicago-based orthopedic surgeon Brian J. Cole.

Bakhtiari wouldn't say when that surgery would happen.

"My goal is to be ready for training camp next year," he said.

His issue is with the femoral condyles, which are the ball-shaped ends to the femur at the knee joint. Although the initial surgery, performed on Jan. 7, 2021, repaired Bakhtiari's anterior cruciate ligament and the meniscus damage he sustained when he first got hurt, Bakhtiari said his doctors knew that he had an issue with that portion of his femur.

The issue was, they couldn't predict whether the abnormality in his knee would cause him issues moving forward. As it turned out, as Bakhtiari worked his way back from the initial injury, he did further

damage to the cartilage at the end of his femur and began experiencing irritation and fluid buildup in his knee as a result.

"In my knee, it's basically like sandpaper where it rubs, it's just not smooth, which is creating a lot of fluid," Bakhtiari said. "It's just the defect I have."

He added: "I would've loved if on January 7th of 2021, to have been like, 'Yeah, do (this surgery). Because this is clearly what it is.' But no one knew. You don't want to do more than you have to."

Bakhtiari, who turned 32 last week, has one year remaining on his contract with the Packers, who could opt to move on from him after this season. His salary-cap number for 2024 is \$40.5 million, so if he were to return, he would have to do so on an altered contract.

"I hate the situation Dave's in. I feel for him," said head coach Matt LaFleur. "He's been battling and battling and battling to try to make it back. He had a bad injury, unfortunately, and I think we're seeing the effects of that. I knew that when it happened."

"He's tried everything. He wants

to be out there, he wants to play ball. He's tried anything and everything to make it back, and his knee's not responding in the right way."

A 2013 fourth-round pick out of Colorado, Bakhtiari has played in 131 career games with the Packers, but just 13 over the past two-plus seasons.

He saw action in one game in 2021 — the regular-season finale at Detroit — before being unable to play in the team's NFC divisional playoff game two weeks later. He only played in 11 of 17 games last season, when he not only had issues with his knee but also underwent an emergency appendectomy late in the year.

He acknowledged on Friday that he may have played his final down with the only NFL team he's ever known.

"I'm not ignoring that (possibility)," said Bakhtiari, who had started 118 of a possible 127 games in his first eight seasons before the injury. "I would love to play here until I decide that I'm done."

"Regardless of whatever happens, that's just life. If it does, great. If not, I can only control what I can control. If I can keep playing here, great."

Packers sign running back Patrick Taylor to their active roster and release linebacker Justin Hollins

The Green Bay Packers have signed running back Patrick Taylor to their active roster and released outside linebacker Justin Hollins in advance of its Monday night game at Las Vegas.

Taylor already had been promoted from Green Bay's practice squad for gameday in three of the Packers' previous four games. He's now part of their regular 53-man roster.

The 25-year-old Taylor has nine carries for 29 yards and three catches for 23 yards this season.

Hollins, 27, had nine tackles

through Green Bay's first four games. He played 25 snaps on defense in the season opener at Chicago, 26 at Atlanta, 20 against New Orleans and 13 in the Packers' most recent game against the Detroit Lions.

He had 2 1/2 sacks in six games for the Packers last season after they claimed him off waivers from the Los Angeles Rams. He played for the Rams from 2020-22 after spending the 2019 season with the Denver Broncos.

In another move, the Packers promoted cornerback Corey Ballentine from their practice squad for Monday's game.

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Welch excited to play for the Packers

The Green Bay Packers signed linebacker Kristian Welch to the practice squad on Aug. 31. He played in the games against the Lions and Raiders.

Welch (6-3, 240), a fourth-year player out of the University of Iowa, was originally signed by the Baltimore Ravens as an undrafted free agent in 2020. In three seasons, he played in 43 regular-season games and three postseason contests for the Ravens. Welch has posted five tackles (four solo) on defense and 16 tackles on special teams during the regular season and two tackles on special teams during the postseason. In 2021, he tied for No. 2 on the team with a career-best nine special teams tackles and helped Baltimore's unit rank No. 1 in Football Outsiders' DVOA rating.

Welch took time to answer a few questions before his first game with the Packers.

How far was the commute from home to here?

About an hour and 15 minutes.

So what was it like? I'm assuming these guys were your team growing up?

Yeah, I grew up a fan.

So what was it like on Thursday night?

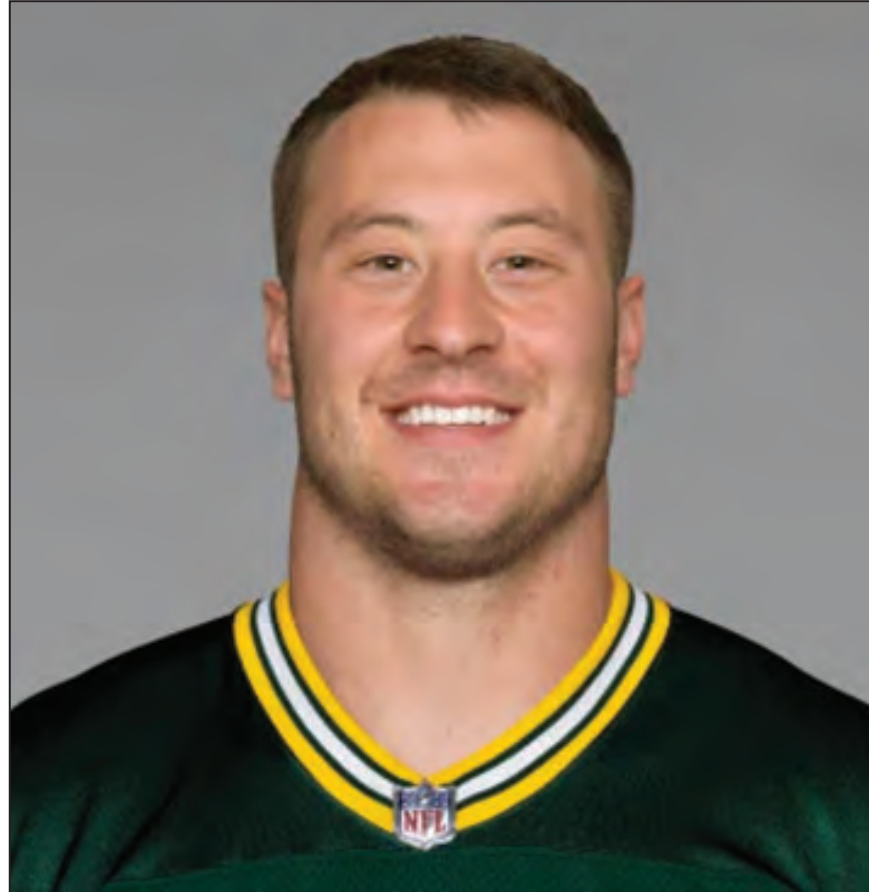
It was a very surreal feeling. Definitely a dream come true. Really, just to have the opportunity to be here – came here at the end of training camp, just kind of a whirlwind. Didn't know where I was going to end up. I knew that there was interest here from the get-go, and it ended up working out where I was able to get the opportunity here to be on the practice squad. I just kind of put my head down and worked. It's kind of been the motto of my entire life and my NFL career. To get the opportunity to play, it just kind of all fell into place. It's an awesome feeling.

So we found out on Thursday. When did you find out?

Thursday.

What's the reaction like on Thursday, A, that you're up, but B, it's also with your team?

Yeah, I mean, it happens quickly. Early in the week, obviously, I'm preparing to play, so I kind of knew that there was a good chance that I'm playing. But then on Thursday after our meetings, around noon, they pulled me in and were like, hey,

we're going to sign you in 53. So that was pretty surprising, just based off how I haven't even played a game yet. I don't think a lot of guys get signed right away.

That's a good point. I didn't think about that.

Yeah, because I was still on the practice squad at that point. For not even having played a game, for them to sign me was a little bit surprising. But I'm obviously glad that now I'm going to be playing for, hopefully, the rest of the year.

So when was this your dream? Think about when you were a kid.

Man, probably when I was 4 or 5. There's pictures of me in my Halloween costume when I was a kid and I was a Packer player.

So obviously you're a good high school player, which is how you get to Iowa, but at what point in this path does it go from your dream to, you know what, maybe I'm good enough, or I certainly am good enough?

I think my first year in the NFL. The first or second year in the NFL, you start to get more comfortable.

You start realizing that, OK, I can play in the NFL, and I am. There's 32 teams, right? It's crazy to end up back home. There's a lot of guys that don't ever get that chance. Look across the league, right? Like, you pick any player and you say, OK, he's from Atlanta. What are the chances that he plays for the Atlanta Falcons? Very small chance. There's a lot of guys that don't get that opportunity, so I'm very fortunate. I don't take anything for granted to be this close to home. It's a dream come true. I just take every day as it comes, and I'm enjoying it.

Who's the first person you told?

I told my wife. And then I called my parents, my grandparents, my sister. Everybody was super emotional and happy for me.

To the football stuff, for a guy who was on a practice squad, you've got a pretty extensive track record, right? You've played a lot of games. You had a lot of tackles one year, as I recall.

In Baltimore, my rookie year, I played 12 games. And then I was on

the roster the next two years. So, I played three years in Baltimore. In '21, we were the best special teams unit in the league, and I think I led the team in tackles. If it was that year or whatever, I mean, I'm not looking at my individual stats. It just matters to me. It's how we go out and play as a unit and that we're winning games. So, yeah, I played, I don't know what the exact number is but 800-something snaps.

We were pretty solid in the units that I was on, so I'm pretty proud of that. I respect the heck out of the Ravens organization and all the coaches there. I have nothing but great things to say about them. So, yeah, I have some experience.

What does it take to be a really good special teams player? What are the traits that requires?

You have to be versatile. I think the great ones know that and they are able to play a bunch of different positions. You look at each phase, there's kick return or kickoff. Each phase has its own element to it. There's so many little technique things that it's very unique in a sense. A lot of people don't grow up to want to be special teams players. They want to play on offense, they want to play tight end, they want to play quarterback.

So, I found out early in my career, starting at Iowa, I didn't redshirt when I was a freshman. The reason was because they wanted me on special teams. I adopted that role. Whatever this team asks me to do, whatever my role is that will allow us to win games, that's what I was going to do. Early in my career in college, I learned how to play special teams. Shoutout to Coach LeVar Woods, who's still there, still doing a great job. And there's a lot of great special teams players that come out of there – guys that have cut their teeth, they've made their role – and that's kind of what I've done.

It happened early in my college career and it happened early in my NFL career and it's still the reason I'm in the NFL. Let's be honest. I can play special teams, I'm a solid player, I have a ton of experience. I think being versatile, I think being a tough dude. You've got to be able to run. You have to be able to play fast, you have to be quick, you have to be strong. All the things that make you an NFL player, right? That's what's on display when it comes to special teams. You have to be a tough guy.

Green Bay has a lot to correct on offense

Packers have scored three points in last three first halves

The Green Bay Packers enter the Week 6 bye with a 2-3 record, a multitude of injuries and a lot of questions that need to be answered on offense — sooner rather than later.

In Green Bay's 17-13 loss to the Las Vegas Raiders on Oct. 9, linebacker Quay Walker and defensive back Darnell Savage both left the game with injuries. Those two injuries are in addition to Aaron Jones, David Bakhtiari and De'Vondre Campbell, all of whom have missed time this year. While it is never encouraging to see injuries, the Packers now have 12 days off for players to rest up and try to get back onto the field when the team travels to Denver on Oct. 22.

Injuries may not be the biggest issue for the team right now though, as the lack of production on offense over the past three weeks has severely limited Green Bay. The Pack-

ers have mustered just three points in the team's last three first halves of football.

"We have to find something to get us going — to jump start us," said Packers head coach Matt LaFleur, on the first half struggles in this game and throughout the season.

While the first half offense has been a problem this year, a silver lining from Green Bay's matchup with the Raiders was that A.J. Dillon cashed in his best performance of the year. Given the uncertainty regarding Jordan Love's completion ability and the injury to Jones, it seems likely that Dillon will shoulder a little bit more of the load early in games moving forward. With an early established run game, it makes sense that Love should be able to settle into the game with quick-hitting underneath passes and play-action shots.

Establishing that run game and setting up those short passes is going to be key for this Packers team, as it has become obvious that Love does



not have the ability yet to carry this offense on his back. With five interceptions in the last two games, finding ways for Love to succeed needs to be at the forefront of LaFleur's mind, heading into the bye week.

"I am sure there are some things that we can look at and do better," said LaFleur. "I am sure there are some things that I need to do a better job in terms of what we are asking (Love) to do and try not to put him in a position where he is susceptible to maybe throwing those picks."

While struggling on offense is a byproduct of having no veteran experience, at what point does the

excuse of "It is just a young team" and "growing pains" end? At some point, LaFleur is going to need Love to make the play, and through six NFL starts, that just has not happened yet.

"We have to do a better job offensively," said LaFleur. "It just seems like we are putting ourselves in those situations quite a bit over the course of the first five games of the season, and that is tough to overcome in this league, especially when you have a lot of youth on that side of the ball. I am not trying to make excuses for it. We have to do a better job to avoid those situations."

As for Love, he is looking forward to correcting the mistakes that have reared their ugly head over the last three first halves.

"It is a good break, and I think we will just all come together and bounce back," said Love. "That is how it goes — it is week-to-week, and we just have to find a way to bounce back."



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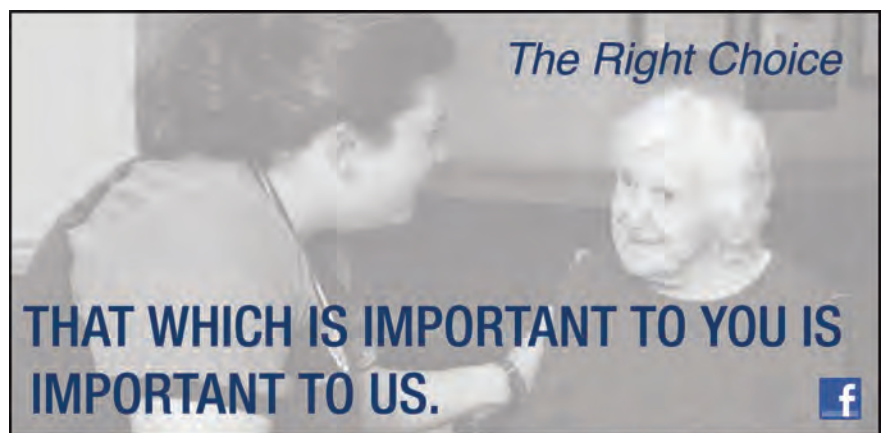
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
