FOUR INJURED IN EXPLOSION, FIRE

Four people were injured on Monday in an explosion at about 4 p.m. in the town of Grant. Numerous fire department and emergency services personnel and three medical helicopters were dispatched to N4011 Verg Road in the town of Grant just west of Caroline after reports of an explosion and fire. Eagle III, Spirit, and Theda Star, pictured above, were at the scene. A fourth victim was taken by helicopter from ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano, according to a Shawano County Sheriff's Department deputy at the scene. ThedaCare providers prescribing books

APPLETON — Books build better brains, especially when parents understand the power that comes from sharing books with their children.

Reading daily with children starting at birth has a lasting effect on language and literacy development, caregiver-child relationships and social and emotional health.

"The best time to influence a child's future is in the first five years, a critical window of rapid brain development that does not occur at any other time," said Dr. Eileen Jekot, a pediatrician with ThedaCare Physicians Pediatrics-Neenah. "Children who hear fewer words during early childhood start school developmentally behind their peers. Sadly, they may never catch up."

Because early reading is important, ThedaCare participates in the Reach Out and Read program. Through the program, each child starts kindergarten with a home library of up to eight books.

"The number of words a child knows can predict their third-grade reading scores, which predicts graduation rates, which often predicts how productive you're going to be as a community member," said Tracey Ratzburg, coordinator with Community Health Improvement for ThedaCare. "So that learning all ladders up to the health of somebody by the time they're an adult."

The program begins at the 6-month checkup and continues through age 5. At the end of each

visit, the child will get a book that is appropriate for his or her age, language and culture.

"The Reach Out and Read program is an evidence-based early literacy program," said Jekot. "What we know is that parents are 2½ times more likely to read to their children if a provider prescribes it; that's part of the Reach Out and Read program. Also, children's language development is improved by three to six months, and their language ability improves with increased exposure."

In this program, medical providers use the Well Child visits to talk with families about the importance of talking, singing and reading aloud with babies from birth on.

"The provider will be using this as an opportunity to do some developmental surveillance. So, when they hand the child the book, they can see how the child interacts with it and how the parent or caregiver interacts with the child and the book," Jekot said. "They look for developmentally appropriate things and can then have a conversation with the parent or caregiver about what they can expect at the age the child is at, and how to incorporate reading."

As of June, all ThedaCare clinics had completed their applications to be part of Reach Out and Read.

"The goal is that all that training and the full implementation of the program will be done by the end of 2019, so everyone is up and running by 2020," Ratzburg said.

Kohl Foundation seeks nominees for educator awards

MILWAUKEE — Nominations of Wisconsin teachers and principals are being accepted for the 2020 Herb Kohl Educational Foundation teacher fellowship and principal leadership awards.

Awards are \$6,000, with an additional \$6,000 grant going to the school of each selected teacher and principal. The deadline for submissions is Oct. 8, and nominations can be submitted online at www.kohleducation.org.

Established in 1990, the Herb Kohl Educational Foundation awards 100 fellowships and 16 leadership awards annually from among all applicants throughout the state.

For teachers or principals to be eligible, they must be nominated by a parent, student, other teacher, community member or school administrator. Wisconsin teachers and principals in grades pre-K through 12 who plan to continue in their current capacity for at least one year are eligible.

The Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellowship rewards teachers who have demonstrated superior ability to inspire love of learning in their students, have motivated others and have provided meritorious service both in and outside the classroom. It also recognizes and supports principals who demonstrate administrative leadership and positively influence school culture.

Selection of recipients will be made by a state-level panel composed of representatives from the Wisconsin Newspaper Association, cooperative educational service agencies, Wisconsin Council of Religious and Independent Schools, several education-related associations and community representatives. Since the program was established in 1990, the foundation has awarded more than 6,000 total grants to Wisconsin teachers, principals and their schools for a total of \$10.6 million.

WITTENBERG — The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School volleyball team put on a show for its fans in the team's first home match of the season, coming away with a Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division win over Bonduel on Thursday.

"I had so much fun just because with it being my senior year, seeing the crowd just made me keep wanting to push even though I was so tired," said Witt-Birn's Kaitlyn Clark. "I just

wanted to finish off the win and I'm so glad that I have the team that I do to support me and the crowd that we had just means a lot.

Several Chargers had big performances in the win, led by the trio of Clark, senior Marissa Groshek and junior Abi Fraaza, who combined for 46 total kills.

Fraaza had 12 attack kills and eight block kills, while Clark had 13 attack kills, helping the Chargers take control early on. Groshek finished with eight attack kills and five block kills.

"Marissa, our outside (hitter), had a lot of good cross-court hits, especially in the first few sets. Then they (Bonduel) kind of collapsed on her, but then we had somebody else step up," said Witt-Birn coach Becky Rew. "We had Abi, playing middle, step up. Kaitlyn started really strong. So it just was a huge team effort and it's nice to have so many different options instead of one person dominating."

Junior McKenna Metropulos set up Witt-Birn's attackers all night, posting 40 assists. Senior libero Elizabeth Muscha contributed 16 digs in the win.

The Chargers opened the contest on a 4-0 run, with Clark and junior Emma Herb scoring early on. The hosts increased the lead to 7-1 to force Bonduel's first timeout and then to 18-3 to force the Bears' final timeout in the set.

The timeouts didn't stop Witt-Birn's strong start, as the hosts continued to be aggressive at the net to ease to the set one win.

"We were definitely ready to win," said Fraaza of the team's fast start. "Against Shiocton (on Tuesday), we went to four sets, which we were all not happy about. So tonight we came out and we wanted to beat them right away and come out with a strong start."

Witt-Birn's strong start carried into the second set, with the hosts jumping out to another 7-1 lead to force a Bonduel timeout. This time, the Bears were able to turn things around, winning six of the next eight points to force a Witt-Birn timeout.

The teams battled back and forth for the remainder of the set, with Bonduel going ahead 16-15 after back-to-back kills by freshman Josie Hoffman.

Deadlocked at 19, Witt-Birn scored four straight points, with two coming on kills from Fraaza. Bonduel closed to within three points on a kill from sophomore Brenna Hertzfeldt, but a serving error allowed Witt-Birn to take the set.

The third set was a continuation of the second, with the teams trading momentum and the lead often.

Tied at 22, Witt-Birn got back-to-

back kills from Herb, but Bonduel scored the next four points to take the set. Sophomore Kylie Hoffman registered the set-winning kill.

"We've had some injuries in the last couple days here and we didn't really have a chance to practice with some new rotations, so I think that kind of threw them off a little bit. We had some girls playing that hadn't played with the varsity at all yet," said Bonduel coach Abby Reinke on the team's slow start.

Witt-Birn jumped out to an early lead in the fourth set, but Bonduel went on a run to tighten things back up.

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The quarterback was thrilled with the balance the Hawks had on offense again, with he and Dickelman leading the ground game and setting up some long passes to Lowney. Timm said he is still confused as to how team's have tried to defend Lowney this season.

"I don't know why they haven't double-covered our man yet," said Timm with a chuckle.

After Shawano's defense stopped a fourth-down attempt inside their own 10, the offense was able to run out the clock to seal the victory.

Shawano can lock up a postseason spot next Friday, but will have to knock off Xavier on the road to do so. Last year, Xavier handed Shawano a 41-28 homecoming loss.

Shawano overpowers Seymour for Bay win

Hawks take advantage of Thunder mistakes

SHAWANO — The Shawano Community High School football team moved a step closer to locking up a postseason spot with a convincing 36-7 Bay Conference win over Seymour on Saturday.

The homecoming game win moved Shawano to 3-2 on the season, meaning the team must win one of its three remaining conference games to snag a spot in the playoffs.

Shawano's offense took advantage of several Seymour miscues to pull away. Senior Brayden Dickelman finished with three rushing touchdowns to power the Hawks, while junior Gage Timm rushed for a score and also connected on a long touchdown pass with sophomore Elliott Lowney.

The Hawks' defense honed in on Seymour's running game, and aside from one touchdown drive near the end of the first half, made life miserable for the visiting Thunder. Senior Ben Carroll recorded a tackle for loss that resulted in a safety, while sophomore Andrew Popp made a couple of big plays to swing the game in Shawano's favor.

"Seymour is a team that we have a ton of respect for," said Shawano coach Al Tomow. "We respect their tradition and how well coached they are and how tough they compete every single year. That's kind of the model of stability that we wanted to be, so to come in and beat these guys as convincingly as we did shows how hard our kids have worked and hopefully how far our program has come."

The game got off to a wild start, as Timm hit Lowney for a long pass on the first play of the game to put the Hawks' inside the Thunder 15-yard line. But Seymour's defense held up, forcing a third-down incompleteness that made Shawano settle for a field goal, which the visitors blocked. Seymour tried to recover the loose ball,

and after failing to pick it up cleanly, Lowney fell on top of the ball to give Shawano new life.

Two plays later, Timm scored on a run to put Shawano up.

Both teams settled in, and the first quarter ended with the teams trading several punts.

The Hawks found their rhythm on their first drive of the second quarter despite several penalties along the way. Shawano was also helped out when Seymour was flagged for a late hit after making a stop on fourth down.

After a holding call pushed the ball back to the Seymour 15, Timm hit senior Chase Huntington with a pass to put the Hawks at the 2-yard line. Dickelman scored on the next play.

After Shawano's defense forced a three-and-out, the snap went over the punter's head, and Popp fell on top of the loose ball at the Seymour 5-yard line. Dickelman powered his way into the end zone on the next play.

"We lost two of our best offensive linemen coming into this game so we were a little wary, but I had all the

faith in the world in those guys and I'm really happy we got things done in the red zone with those guys," said Dickelman. "We just came out and took care of business, took advantage of Seymour's mistakes and I'm really proud of the team today."

On the ensuing drive, Seymour started to get things rolling a bit, but Popp came up with a big tackle for loss on a fourth-and-one play to snuff out the scoring threat.

A penalty put the Hawks in a tough position on the next drive and they were eventually forced to punt. Seymour got a big return, and two plays later scored its lone touchdown.

The Hawks' defense bounced back in the second half, forcing a pair of punts, stopping a pair of fourth-down attempts and getting a safety on the tackle for loss by Carroll.

"The reason we are in the position we are (for the season) is because of the improvement of our defense, especially against the run" said Tomow. "Those guys brought it today. We had a great gameplan (stopping Seymour's running game) by our defensive staff and the kids bought

in. We knew if we could get them in pass mode that things were going to favor us."

After the Hawks' defense stuffed Seymour on fourth down, the offense took advantage of strong starting field position. Timm picked up a big third-down attempt with his legs before hitting Lowney to get the team inside the 10. Dickelman scored his third rushing touchdown to cap the drive.

While Shawano's next offensive possession ended in a punt, Timm's punt pinned Seymour at its own 1-yard line. On the next play, Carroll made a great defensive play to get the safety and give the ball back to the offense.

On third-and-11, Timm threw a perfect pass up to right sideline to Lowney, who made the grab and scored the game's final points.

"Yeah, that's really big," said Timm of the offense taking advantage of the great positions the defense set them up in. "Especially when the defense creates turnovers for us and we can score right away on that drive. Those are big momentum shifters."

Are commercial stem cell clinics legitimate or a scam?

Scientists discovered ways to extract stem cells from early mouse tissues nearly 40 years ago. The initial study of mouse stem cells led to the discovery of a method to derive stem cells from human tissues and grow the cells in the laboratory.

The exciting theory that research scientists are working on is that stem cells can be guided into becoming specific cells that can be used to regenerate and repair diseased or damaged tissues in humans.

Currently, researchers are investigating the use of adult, fetal and embryonic stem cells as sources for specialized cell types — such as nerve cells, muscle cells, blood cells and skin cells that can be used to treat various diseases.

In theory, any condition in which there is tissue degeneration can be a potential candidate for stem cell therapies. Examples in-

clude spinal cord injury, blindness, stroke, burns, heart disease, type 1 diabetes, osteoarthritis, rheumatoid arthritis, muscular dystrophy and liver diseases. However, to date, we do not have good scientific evidence that this can occur in humans.

Although stem cells offer a compelling promise for future therapies, they currently face significant technical hurdles that can only be overcome through years of intensive medical research.

Unfortunately, because the promise for benefit is so large and for so many serious conditions, numerous desperate patients are seeking help at almost any cost. As a result, the number of commercial cell clinics is expanding rapidly. According to the University of Minnesota, there were 12 such clinics in 2009; in 2017, there were more than 700. Unproven cellular therapies are big business — generating about \$2 billion annually.

Commercial cell clinics often make claims of benefit and safety that are not supported by scientific medical research. Technically,

these clinics are required by federal regulations to submit stem cell therapies for review as “drugs” and to provide evidence of their safety and efficacy. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has not enforced these rules. So, these businesses are essentially unregulated.

Additionally, stem cell clinics operate under less robust oversight of infection-control measures, including injection safety and medication preparation and testing, which potentially amplifies the risk to patients. In December, the CDC received reports of blood infections in 12 patients from various commercial cellular clinics in three states: Texas, seven; Florida, four; and Arizona, one.

Currently, we do not know whether these treatments are even effective. Reports are rampant that many patients do not benefit from these treatments, and there are numerous lawsuits against commercial cell clinics.

The gold standard for evaluating any new treatment is an adequately sized, randomized controlled trial in which the new treatment is com-

pared against a placebo. To date, there have been no such human trials, despite the fact that many thousands of people are lining up to get these treatments.

The commercial cell clinics are charging very high fees that are not reflective of benefit and safety. A procedure such as an injection into a joint might take about 10 minutes and cost between \$5,000 and \$20,000. For systemic diseases such as lupus, some clinics also administer cells intravenously, which can cost more than \$10,000 per session.

Patients should beware. Before paying any clinic thousands of dollars, go to the FDA website for information. Demand that the commercial cell clinic provide you with published medical human research that specifically lists their cellular product by name and demonstrates that product's safety and effectiveness.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF BONDUÉL, SHAWANO COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN that CHAPTER 26, Streets, Sidewalks, and Other Public Places, §26-9, DRIVEWAYS, is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

Sec. 26-9. – Driveways.

(c) *Number of Driveways.* Only one driveway shall be permitted for a residential lot. A typical commercial and industrial property shall be allowed a maximum of two driveways, located at least 50 ft apart. Additional driveways may be permitted for residential, commercial and industrial lot with written justification of the need and approval from the Municipal Operations Committee. The minimum distance between a driveway and nearest public road or street shall be 50ft.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and posting as provided by law.

THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF BONDUER, SHAWANO COUNTY, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN that CHAPTER 26, Streets, Sidewalks, and Other Public Places, §26-14, TERRACE AREAS, is hereby created as follows:

Sec. 26-14. – Terrace Areas.

- (a.) **Definition.** The definition of "terrace" is the right-of-way abutting owner's property.
- (b.) **Noxious Weeds; Paving.** All that part of the terrace not covered by a sidewalk shall be kept free and clear of all noxious weeds and shall not be paved, surfaced or covered with any material which shall prevent the growth of plants, and shall be maintained as a lawn, except in areas specifically approved by the Village Board or its designee.
- (c.) **Responsibility to Maintain.** Every owner of land in the Village whose land abuts a terrace is required to maintain, or have maintained by his tenant, the terrace directly abutting such land as provided in this Section and elsewhere in this Code.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and posting as provided by law.

ship that we need. I just think the younger people have other things that they would rather be doing."

The local Legion has veterans from World War II, Korea and Vietnam, but those members didn't have the conveniences people have today, Barkow said. The Legion served as a place to come for fellowship and fun.

"They didn't have the video games, and they had a wife that could stay at home so they could come out and do things like this," Barkow said. "The younger people today — the Iraq and Afghanistan people — they're probably having a multiple-income family and just aren't able to come down to our meetings, and I wish that would change."

Besides the meetings and fun activities, the Legion also has a number of support groups that can help those dealing with post-traumatic stress disorder or other issues that have arisen due to their time in the military, according to Barkow.

"I see the Legion dying because we're got World War II, Korea and Vietnam veterans," Barkow said. "I'm 52 years old and probably the youngest active member we have. The younger people are not joining, and in 20 years, I honestly don't see this post being around anymore. One hundred years could be right down the tubes if we don't get some younger members."

The post has tried multiple ways to recruit new members but to no avail. Barkow noted that the national American Legion commander was even in Shawano two years ago to try and drum up more members.

"Right now, we're offering a free membership, which is usually \$35," Barkow said. "But if they come down here before the end of the year, they can get a free membership for a year."

Jerry Erdmann, chairman of the Shawano County Board and a Vietnam War veteran, spoke about the importance of the American Legion and also the importance of the sacrifices the members of the Legion made in serving the United States.

"One of the things that I have always been the most proud of is that I am a veteran of the United States of America," Erdmann said. "There is no greater country that we live in, and no greater country that has so many veterans that step forward and fight to give us the freedom that we have."

Erdmann said there has never been a day that he regrets doing what he did to defend the country, even 50 years later.

"Oct. 8, 1969 — that was the day we lost a lot of brave Americans," Erdmann

said. "That was a day that changed my life forever. I am who I am, an American soldier. Freedom is what we fight for. Freedom is what we hand down to our younger generations."

Erdmann noted that the nation's military is something to be proud of, not ignored. He said he calls every County

Board meeting to order with a request to keep the men and women who serve in thoughts and prayers, as well as their families.

"They have gone through a lot, too, the families of those who have not returned," Erdmann said. "I will continue to do that to remember, and those who

have not served to remember that it's because of the servicemen of this great nation that we stand and meet and laugh."

Shawano Mayor Ed Whealon was also scheduled to speak at the Legion birthday party, but he was noticeably absent.

"I'm hoping he got kidnapped or something because he's not here," Barkow said to the more than 80 members and guests present.

As it turned out, Whealon had a family emergency in Fond du Lac at the last minute and had to leave town Saturday afternoon. Whealon said Monday that he realized he should have contacted the Legion to let them know he would not be able to attend.

Whealon was not the only politician who did not attend. Barkow said he had sent out invitations to Gov. Tony Evers, state Rep. Gary Tauchen, state Sen. Rob Cowles, U.S. Rep. Mike Gallagher and U.S. Sens. Tammy Baldwin and Ron Johnson, but none opted to pay the Legion a visit.

It was a sad commentary for Barkow, who sees the proud organization he heads slowly deteriorating.

SHAWANO — One hundred years of pride and service gave the American Legion Post 117 plenty to celebrate about Saturday.

The post celebrated its 100th birthday a little early with dinner, cake and awards for members and friends who have gone above and beyond to make the American Legion the proud organization it is today. The original charter from 1919 hung on the wall in the legion's clubhouse, along with framed photos of

Edwin Elefson and Wilmer Zueske, after whom the post is named.

Shawano's Legion was one of the charter members of the national American Legion organization.

However, mixed in with the celebration was concern that the local post might not have many more birthdays to celebrate. The members are getting older and passing on, and there are few younger veterans coming in to continue the Legion tradition.

Kevin Barkow, the post's commander, said he fears Post 117 might not be in the community in 20 years unless more can be done to encourage those who have served in Iraq and Afghanistan to come forward and serve their country again in a more benevolent capacity.

Menominee artist's exhibit to open in Oshkosh

OSHKOSH — A small gallery on the second floor of the Oshkosh Public Museum, referred to as the Winnebago Room, will be home to The Menominee Clans Story exhibit when it opens Oct. 12.

The Menominee Clans Story displays wooden figures carved by Menominee traditional artist James F. Frechette Jr., who was born and raised on the Menominee reservation. He learned many of the traditional crafts in his tribe, as well as the stories, legends and ancient lore of the Menominee people. At the same time, he observed the craft life of the elders and acquired principles and techniques from them.

The 26 intricately carved and painted figures stand between 12 and 20 inches high. Frechette's characteristic quality is authenticity found in the minute details of the figures he carved from Menominee white pine.

"The Oshkosh Public Museum is honored to have been chosen as the holder of these important clans figures," said Brad Larson, museum director. "Each figure and its associated

implements were done with authenticity and imbued with meaning and spiritual power. Once completed, visitors will not only admire the beauty and spirituality of the figures, but they will also learn about their responsibility to the Menominee people and the natural world they are intimately tied to."

Frechette's work has been purchased and commissioned by museums and collectors, including the National Indian Collection of the Department of Interior, Washington, D.C. He was one of the few Menominee who practiced the traditional methods and who also had knowledge of the Menominee clans.

On the opening day of the exhibit, Dr. Ray Reser of the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point will present a program on the Menominee clans and their oral histories at 1 p.m. Regular hours for the Oshkosh Public Museum, located at 1331 Algoma Blvd., are Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Sunday from 1-4:30 p.m.

tors also utilize these late blooming perennials for a precious source of pollen and nectar.

Many other species of asters bloom this time of year, also. Smooth aster blooms in a beautiful pale blue and is quite versatile, growing in sun or shade, as well as wet or dry soil.

There are a number of varieties of aster that bloom in shimmering white. Flat topped aster is named for its flattened clusters of yellow and white blossoms that are found mostly in shady locations at the forest edge.

Frost aster and heath aster also bloom in white and are found in open fields and roadside edges. Each plant may produce hundreds of tiny white blossoms that look as though the tips were frosted in delicate white. These are among the latest blooming of the asters and may still be around

on Thanksgiving if weather remains relatively mild.

Asters make wonderful companion plants in the garden to many perennial varieties. Sedum, black eyed Susan, Joe pye weed, purple coneflowers, wild sunflowers of many kinds, as well as elegant ornamental grasses all make wonderful companion plants for blooming asters in September, October and into November.

There are a number of garden-variety hybrid asters that are equally beautiful. Many of these are bred to be dwarf in size, maybe growing 1-2 feet in height rather than the much larger height of native New England aster and others. These hybrid asters bloom in many shades of blue, pink and purple.

Enjoy the magic and beauty of aster season over the next few months.

As leaves fall, asters bloom

Dozens of native species bring amazing color

With explosive plumes of gorgeous late summer and fall color, the asters are now beginning to bloom across our area. In shades of pink, purple, lavender, blue and white, our native asters put on a spectacular show to close out the wildflower year.

Dozens of native species of asters can be found in our area, most blooming now in September into October. Some will last up until Halloween or beyond if the weather stays relatively mild. Asters can handle quite a bit of frost, meaning they will continue to bloom even after a few frosty nights.

The most popular asters for native landscaping and gardening are the big purple New England asters. The beautiful, daisy-like flowers with the golden centers are attractive to butterflies, especially

migrating monarchs that are moving through about the time the aster season begins.

New England asters are also attractive to hummingbirds, drawn to their brightly colored blossoms. Honeybees, bumblebees and other pollina-

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Agricultural producers can now enroll in the Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage programs, two popular safety net programs, for the 2019 crop year. Interested producers must sign up for either program by March 15.

The 2018 Farm Bill reauthorized

and made updates to these two USDA Farm Service Agency programs. Agricultural Risk Coverage provides income support payments on historical base acres when actual crop revenue declines below a specified guarantee level. Price Loss Coverage provides income support payments on historical base acres

when the price for a covered commodity falls below its effective reference price.

"The ARC and PLC programs, in combination with crop insurance, are the bedrock of the farm safety net for crop farmers and something I hear about frequently on the road," said U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue. "This exciting opportunity for enrollment in these programs marks the first time folks will have

the opportunity to switch their elections since the 2014 Farm Bill was implemented."

Covered commodities include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain rice), safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.

Later, Sid built large kilns to make all-natural, hardwood charcoal after learning the process from the Dutch living near Cedar Grove. Sid planted

hundreds of thousands of seedling pines for the DNR and private landowners every spring with a tractor and pull-behind planter while establishing his own Christmas tree plantation.

During the last 30 years of Sid's active working life, he operated a small sawmill on his property near Tilleda, cutting millions of board feet of lumber for the pallet mill industry always working with his family especially his son, Tom.

During those final 30 years of his career, Sid continued his logging business to help many local landowners manage their woods, and he took special pride in managing and harvesting timber from his own woods. Sid worked well into his later years until illness took his ability to do physical work.

During his life, Sid was a charter member of the Great Lakes Timber Professionals Association. In 1984, Sid was recognized by the Wisconsin Society of American Foresters (Fox Valley Chapter) for his work in the timber industry winning the Outstanding Performance Award in the Logging/Contractor category.

Sidney and Bonnie raised two sons and lived for over 55 years at their home in the town of Seneca. Sidney hunted deer on his property and shared his woods with multitudes of other family members and friends for many decades.

Sidney loved trout fishing throughout his life and Canadian fishing trips, snowmobiling, playing cards and attending high school basketball games and stock car races at Shawano Speedway. at all three sites

WITTENBERG — About 50 people attended the groundbreaking ceremony Sept. 18 celebrating the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District's second and more expansive phase of improvements, approved in November's referendum.

On hand for the ceremony, held on the east side of the high school, were several school board members, representatives from Hoffman Planning, Design and Construction, Inc., students and community members.

In his opening remarks, Superintendent Garrett Rogowski reminisced about the work that has already been done in phase one. He hopes next phase will go as smoothly.

"With a 57% voter approval rate, it's great to have that kind of support from the community," said Rogowski.

In November, taxpayers voted to approve the \$13.1 million referendum. The first phase addressed security and entrance issues in all three properties. Phase two will add classrooms to both Wittenberg and Birnamwood schools. An ag building will be built next to the high school, and major

internal upgrades will be made to the high school building. The construction project will wrap up by the end of summer 2020.

"We're really excited this is coming to fruition. It will be a busy and noisy school year, but everyone is willing to be flexible," said Rogowski.

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If it's broken, don't fix it — grow it

Speaker shows advantages of growth mindset

BONDUEL — Blake Brandes visited the Bonduel School District on Thursday and Friday to talk with students, staff and parents about adopting a growth mindset in everything that they do.

In order to do this, it requires not only being passionate about some things but also realizing that improvement is a process and not a plateau.

Brandes, a motivational speaker and music producer, said he was convinced at a young age that he wasn't born to be a singer when others felt he didn't have the talent. Today, he uses music, especially hip-hop, to talk about the concept of the growth mindset after receiving his doctorate in hip-hop and global youth cultures from the University of Kent. Brandes just released a motivational hip-hop album called "Remix Your Reality."

The ability to have perfect pitch in music, the ability to hear a note once and be able to sing it, is something that commonly impacts one in 10,000 people, he said. Using the growth mindset, a team of Japanese researchers worked with a group of students with no musical training, and all of them had perfect pitch by the end of the project, Brandes said.

"The implication of this is huge, because most of us get intellectually that you can get better at learning a language. You can better at math. But there are some things where you think, 'I'm good at it,' or 'I'm not good at it,'" he said. "This study was so good at blowing this idea off its hinges."

People's brains commonly seek the comfortable situation in what they do, but Brandes suggested that the way to constantly seek improvement is to find new ways to be in those scenarios. The growth mindset is based on 40 years of neuroscience research from Stanford University, according to Brandes.

"What it shows that was so revolutionary is that how good students are when they started something is

no indication of how good they can eventually get at it through hard work, persistence and asking for help," Brandes said. "This was so powerful because many of us, I suspect, including myself, grew up with the opposite idea, something called

the 'fixed mindset.'"

The fixed mindset, he said, is where people who try something and are good at it right away believe those skills are something they are "born with" and the only areas in which they can thrive. Brandes said

the mindset tends to lead students to limit themselves in what they're willing to try.

He suggested four things for developing a growth mindset — praising the process and not the person, realizing it's OK if you can't do it yet, turning "I can't" into "How can I?" and connecting with passions in order to help growth and learning.

Joe Dawidziak, the district's superintendent, said Thursday night that Brandes' ability to keep students focused, no matter the grade, was impressive. Brandes had four sessions, each with a different age group, and he was able to captivate them all.

"I've been doing this a long time, and it's very rare that you can find somebody who is able to relate to a first-grader and to a 12th-grader, someone who is able to change the message up on their audience and someone who was able to read their audience in the heat of the moment while it's happening," Dawidziak said. "You would have seen students super engaged, and it didn't matter if they were in second grade or juniors in high school."

Woman charged with trying to kill self, children

PELLA — A New London woman is accused trying to kill herself and her two children in an apparently intentional ATV crash in the town of Pella.

Samantha A. Demeter, 27, has been charged in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court with two counts of first-degree recklessly endangering safety in connection with the Aug. 28 crash.

She could face a maximum 12½ years in prison and a \$25,000 fine on each count if convicted.

Shawano County authorities were called to the crash site on Evergreen Road near County Road D shortly after 11 p.m.

Deputies found an ATV in a ditch and a woman later identified as Demeter laying on the ground crying and yelling with a baby in her arms. Another child was also on the scene.

According to the criminal complaint, Demeter exclaimed, "How could I do this to the kids?"

Authorities later learned that while being transported to the hospital, Demeter told the ambulance crew she had done this on purpose and was trying to kill herself and her children

to be with her mother, the complaint states.

Demeter's grandmother told authorities it was the two-year anniversary of Demeter's mother's death.

Demeter later denied to authorities she had crashed the ATV intentionally. She also admitted to having been drinking that day, according to the complaint.

The children, ages 2 and 4, sustained minor injuries in the crash, including scrapes and bruises.

Demeter is due in court for an initial appearance on Oct. 14.

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School district approves \$13.2 million tax levy

Tax rate still expected to drop for current school year

SHAWANO — The tax levy for the 2019-20 budget year for the Shawano School District will be \$13,241,572 after a small group of district residents approved it at Monday's annual meeting.

The meeting took less than a half hour as district officials unrolled a budget that indicated declining enrollment, an uptick in property values, lower taxes and more funding from the state. With the levy now approved, a final budget will go before the Shawano School Board on Oct. 28.

The district's budget is increasing by \$465,264, about 1.6%, to bring it to about \$30 million.

Louise Fischer, the district's business manager, said that she is expecting to see a 2% increase in property values, which will bring tax rates down to \$9.62 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation. This will be a 7-cent drop from the current rate of \$9.69.

If property values are found to be 3% higher, the tax rate would drop even more to \$9.53. The district will

get final numbers on Oct. 15.

Fischer reported that she is expecting a decline of 25 students for the current school year, which would bring the total population to 2,305. Because this is the third year in a row that enrollment has dropped, there is concern that the state could come in next year and reduce the amount of money the district can utilize.

"The state controls about 85% of a school district's revenue," Fischer said, explaining that there is a cap to how much of a local levy a district can request, along with state equalization aid, which is more than half of the district's income for 2019-20.

The district is receiving over \$15.3 million from the state in equalization aid, according to Fischer. The state budget included a \$175 per pupil increase in aid going toward the budget limit, totaling about \$192,000, and another \$211,000 in categorical aid.

The district has seen increases in aid every year since 2011, when the state's budget crisis required taking

more than \$3.5 million in aid from the school district. The projected amount of state aid is right around what the district received prior to 2011, about \$15.4 million.

Fischer reported that health care costs for district employees are going up 13%, and dental costs are increasing 3%. About 60% of the district's total budget is for employee salaries and benefits, she noted.

Fischer said that the district will be paying more for the school voucher programs, which allows students within the public school system to attend private schools. There are three parochial schools within the district's boundaries, two K-8 schools and a high school, which will maximize the available vouchers this year, she said, noting the cost will be about \$728,000.

There is currently about \$21.9 million in debt for the district, which officials expect will be paid off in 11 years. There are six more years' worth of payments for the building of Hillcrest Primary School and the remodeling of Olga Brener Intermediate School, and then there is the debt for renovating Shawano Community Middle School, which will be paid off in 2031.

This would not include the proposed referendum in April 2020 to build a joint recreation center.

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Bonduel man accused of theft from radio advertising account

SHAWANO — A Bonduel man is facing a felony count of theft for allegedly taking money from an advertising account while working for Results Broadcasting.

Eric M. Hoskins, 34, is accused of taking \$5,698 from the account by misrepresenting what was being done with money paid to him by Modern Hair Designers in Clintonville.

According to the criminal com-

plaint, Modern Hair Designers wrote 20 checks to Hoskins between February 2018 and January of this year that were supposed to pay off an outstanding radio bill and pay for continued radio advertising.

According to the complaint, Hoskins cashed the checks, kept the money for himself and radio ads that Modern Hair Designers recorded never aired.

The complaint also alleges Hoskins intercepted bills that were supposed to go to Modern Hair Designers.

Hoskins told authorities he was working as a consultant for Modern Hair Designers and that the money he was paid was for consulting work and not for radio broadcasting.

Hoskins has been charged with a felony count of theft-false representation, which carries a maximum possible penalty of six years in prison and a \$10,000 fine if convicted.

He is due in court for an initial appearance on Oct. 14.

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
