Waterfront property owners told to prepare for the worst

No relief in sight for flooding, erosion from high lake levels

OCONTO — The winter-like temperatures of the past few days are another harbinger of potential trouble for residents of the bay shore and local rivers, based on the explanations from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and state and local officials at an informational meeting Nov. 6.

Several hundred people packed John B. LeMay Auditorium at Oconto High School to hear a forecast of continued record high water levels on the Great Lakes and hear how the various agencies can help property owners cope with the situation.

Lauren Fry of the Corps explained that the levels routinely rise and fall in a predictable seasonal cycle: Winter brings an accumulation of snow; in spring, water rises with snow melt, rainfall and runoff; during the summer, increased sunshine warms the surface of the lake; and as cold air returns in the fall, it encounters the relatively warm surface of the lake and much of the water evaporates.

“Evaporation is really important this time of year for the water balance,” Fry told the group.

She noted that the Great Lakes

water levels reached record lows in 2012-13, but that was followed by a record two-year rise in 2012-13 and 2013-14, and the water has continued rising since then.

All of the Great Lakes except Michigan-Huron set records this summer, with levels even higher than the previous highs set in the mid-1980s, and Michigan-Huron, which is actually considered one lake, was within an inch of those records.

“The past five years were the wettest five years of the last 120 years of record-keeping in the Great Lakes region,” Fry said. Very cold conditions have also reduced the amount of evaporation.

The Corps believes record highs can be expected over the next six months for Lake Michigan-Huron water levels, which are about 11

inches higher than they were in January, she said.

Krystle Walker, a public information officer with the Corps, said the challenges facing landowners along the bay and its tributaries are not going to improve soon.

"We've seen flooding. We've seen unprecedented erosion, and going into ice season, we don't have some great warm and fuzzies about what we're going to be seeing in the next coming months," Walker said.

Available services range from immediate emergency assistance to longer-term solutions, Walker said. Under Public Law 84-99, federal assistance is meant to supplement local resources with technical support.

For the past six months, five Wisconsin counties have been receiving technical assistance from the Corps. Oconto is one of them, along with Marinette, Brown, Kewaunee and Portage, she said.

"We're in those communities, answering questions, seeing what we can do for them," Walker said.

The Corps of Engineers cannot provide direct help to individual homeowners or businesses; that's administered by local and state agencies.

"In order for us to do that, all of those local jurisdictions have to

confirm that they've exhausted all of their resources – they're aware of the problem, they've spent what they have, and they still need additional support. That is when they're able

to request support from us," Walker said. Any request for federal help must come from the state government.

The Oconto County Land Conser-

vation Office can help landowners fill out applications to install temporary emergency riprap to protect against erosion; permanent riprap requires a \$604 permit, said Brady Stodola, of the office in Lena.

Oconto Fire Chief John Reed said local officials plan to meet in December to plan for potential flooding in the spring. They had a plan in place last winter that was implemented for one especially troubling night in the spring, which brought out county Emergency Management Director Tim Magnin, Sheriff Todd Skarban and a number of city officials, he said.

"What it boiled down to was a 24-hour watch on the river by the police department, the fire department, myself, Tim Magnin — there were a lot of entities out there to watch the river," Reed said. "It worked quite well, and fortunately we did not have to evacuate everybody."

Most of the question-answer section was devoted to the nuts and bolts of individual property owners' concerns about existing conditions and the forecast of even higher levels to come.

"I've watched sandbags – the bay just laughs at them," one landowner said with a grim smile.

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Veterans monument dedicated under cool, sunny skies

More than 400 attend opening ceremony

OCONTO FALLS — Saturday was a day of remembering, of sharing and of telling stories.

Fulfilling a vision that the late Marie Magnin first voiced eight years ago, a new Oconto Falls Area Veterans Monument was dedicated during an hourlong ceremony at the high school and a short program at the monument next to the school district offices.

The main event was moved indoors because of unseasonably cold temperatures, although bright sun and clear skies reigned this day.

"This was a community partnership effort," said organizer Bob Maloney in his opening remarks. "The project was and is a partnership between our community, local veterans, the American Legion Post 302, the American Legion Auxiliary Unit 302 and the Oconto Falls School District. Working together, we accomplished our goals on building what Marie Magnin started."

Post 302 Commander Terris Umentum said Magnin came to him with the idea of a monument for veterans in memory of her husband, "Chub," who died in 2010. She lived to see the revival of the project after several years' pause, but she died April 24 before it was completed.

Five local veterans provided reflections about military and community service, and the Oconto Falls High School choir and band — directed by Amy Thiel and Danny Smith, respectively — performed

musical selections for the occasion.

Superintendent Dean Hess, a retired U.S. Army Reserves major, said the monument will serve to remind the community how much can be accomplished through teamwork to honor the veterans of yesterday, today and tomorrow.

"I hope that its physical presence will help us to remember this nation was founded on this teamwork, the teamwork of all citizens coming together in servanthood," Hess said. "It's important for future generations to be able to reflect on the past, so that they can make decisions today for the ever improvement of tomorrow."

Paula Gardipee, a retired Army master sergeant, spoke of how her service enabled her to travel the world, teaching Russian in California and Finland, among other locales.

"The memorial serves as a continuing reminder of the dedication to service by me and my comrades with whom I served," said Gardipee, a retired Oconto Falls teacher. "Thank you again for being here to dedicate this wonderful project, and I thank all those who spent so much time and effort to make this a reality."

The Rev. Gary Olson shared the biblical story of how, when Joshua led his people into the Promised Land, he had them set up a ring of boulders as a monument so that future generations would ask, "What's that," and elders could tell the story of their exodus.

"It's my hope my prayer for us here today that this is just a starting point, this veterans memorial, that it reminds us on a regular basis or better yet a daily basis the service, the sacrifice offered by our men and women in uniform," Olson said, "and most important, it offers an opportunity for us to teach the next generation when they point to it and say, 'What do those words mean?'"

Steve Magnin, a retired Army sergeant major, said the power of the monument hit home when he saw a family looking at the names on the various bronze panels and one of them said, "Oh! There's Daddy."

This monument will bring family, friends and past and future veterans together to say thank you, Magnin said. "Every brick, every name on those bricks, will be in itself a history lesson to those who know that soldier, that sailor, that airman, that Marine and that Coast Guardsman," he said. "This monument will be the Oconto Falls area's own reflection wall."

At the close, Monica Skarban, retired U.S. Air Force, read the names of Oconto Falls area service members who died while serving, as Gerald Linzmeyer, Post 302 adjutant, sounded a bell.

"Now it's up to all of us to come here to this memorial that is beautiful, sit, reflect, tell stories, let the stories live and share what we've got," Skarban said. "Because our country is free because what people have given."

Most in the crowd of more than 400 then retired to the monument itself for a flag raising, unveiling of a plaque in memory of "Marie's Vision" and the sealing of a time capsule filled with mementos of 2019, to be opened Nov. 9, 2044 — the 25th anniversary of the dedication.

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Gillett City Council defends actions in mayor's resignation

Aldermen deny violating law

GILLETT — Members of the Gillett City Council on Thursday emphatically defended their actions in the run-up to former Mayor James Beaton's resignation last month, saying they did not force him to resign and would have worked with him had he indicated any interest in finding a new home in the city.

But they skirted questions about the process with regard to the state open meetings law that were raised in earlier news coverage and a Nov. 6 editorial by the Oconto County Times Herald.

Beaton lost his home when his Legacy Funeral Chapels partner sold the business and its adjoining apart-

ment in September. On Sept. 30, the council presented Beaton with a letter stating that by law, he had vacated his position as mayor when he moved out of the city and asking for his resignation.

The letter quoted state statute 17.03(4), which states unequivocally, "a public office is vacant when ... the incumbent ceases to be a resident of ... the county, city, village, town, district or area from which elected."

Three days later, on Oct. 3, Beaton and the council met in closed session to finalize a "separation agreement" under which Beaton resigned in exchange for a lump-sum payment for the \$2,762.50 in salary he would have received had he finished the last six months of his part-time term.

During the public input portion of Thursday's regular monthly meeting, the council heard from Jonathan Carlson, who called the developments a "travesty to democracy" that overturned the results of the April 2018 election — which Beaton won as a write-in candidate — without involving the public.

"Maybe you didn't like him, but he's who the people wanted," Carlson said. "You should have given more deference to the will of the people. I think it would be only right if this council issues a formal apology to the mayor for how it treated him ... and that should include an apology to the people of Gillett for keeping them in the dark about what was going on."

"To say we forced him out is absolutely wrong," Alderman Matt Stroik said.

Alderman Debbie Rudie said Beaton had several opportunities to tell

the council he was looking for another home in the city.

"That night at that meeting, if he would have told us, 'Guys, I'm working on this. Give me a little leeway here; give me a month,' we would have been all about that. It would have been on record, and we could have done that, according to the towns association," Rudie said. "But he didn't; he would not. We had no choice."

The separation agreement was Beaton's idea, Rudie said.

Stroik expressed frustration at what he said was only one side of the story getting out.

"I think I speak for everybody here at the council that it's very frustrating when we see Facebook posts, we see newspaper postings and things like that, that only give one side," Stroik said.

The Times Herald editorial said the council was within its rights to ask for Beaton's resignation but questioned the secrecy of the process, specifically the Sept. 30 letter.

There is no evidence that the council ever met to discuss Beaton's status or voted to approve sending the letter. The column suggested the letter could only have been generated and signed by an illegal "walking quorum," when elected public officials discuss and decide how they're going to vote on an issue in a series of conversations without a formal quorum or proper public notice.

The council members flatly denied the walking-quorum allegation, although Rudie at one point said the letter "was discussed one-on-one, prior to it being sent. And the night that I signed the letter, after the person who

brought me left, I called James."

City attorney Katie Sloma acknowledged the public notice of the closed meeting where Beaton resigned probably cited the wrong statute, but she said holding the session behind closed doors was proper under another provision of the open meetings law involving negotiations and the potential for litigation.

But Sloma distanced herself from the original letter and said she didn't see the document until Beaton showed it to her.

"You should talk to Josh (interim Mayor Josh McCarthy) about that, because I got my copy of that letter from James," Sloma said. "I had nothing to do with that beforehand, so I'm not going to comment on that any further."

After the meeting, council members also referred all questions about the letter to McCarthy, who was unable to attend Thursday's session because of responsibilities at his day job.

The Times Herald left a phone message with McCarthy, asking him to elaborate on who wrote the letter to Beaton and how the council approved and signed it, but he had not responded before the Times Herald went to press Monday.

Beaton said in an email Monday that council members never asked him if he was going to find another home in Gillett.

"I communicated to them that I was in a state of flux and had to figure out a few things," he said, but he acknowledged, "having recently lost my home and income, I did not feel seeking housing at that time was appropriate."

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The facility that helps local families in need is seeking donations of personal items, such as shampoo, conditioner, deodorant, bath soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste.

The bank branch at 225 E. Central Ave., Oconto Falls, will be collecting until Thanksgiving and then delivering the items to the pantry.

Flagstar Bank will also have a

Mitten Tree in the branch lobby to collect hats, mittens and scarves for children who may need these items to keep warm this winter. The collection will be hung on the tree from Thanksgiving to Christmas, and then Flagstar employees will bring all of the items donated to the schools in Oconto Falls for children who have lost their hats and mittens or don't have any. Items may simply be hung on the tree.

For the months of November and December, Flagstar will be collecting toys, books and games for the Oconto

Cry Baby Club. Founded in 2003, the club's goal is to take less fortunate children Christmas shopping. With all the donations, they are able to assist 100 families who shop, wrap the gifts at Oconto City Hall, meet with Santa and enjoy a meal.

The toys Flagstar collects are donated to the families over the 100 that weren't selected; last year, they had approximately 200 more children in need. All donations stay in Oconto

County. A donation barrel will be located at the bank; the cutoff date for drop-offs is Dec. 10 to give them time to disperse toys for families at Christmas.

From mid-January to mid-March, the bank will be collecting food and supplies for the Oconto County Humane Society.

2-car crash injures drivers, passengers in town of Underhill

Gillett and Underhill fire departments responded together

UNDERHILL — The first practical application of a cooperative agreement between the city of Gillett and town of Underhill fire departments actually took place two days before it officially took effect.

Gillett and Underhill were simultaneously called to a crash that injured four people on County Road VV east of County Road HHH just after 7:30 a.m. Nov. 5.

"We're seeing somewhat how the auto aid works; it was not enacted yet, but the town of Underhill ... called for aid right away, and we

actually ended up following the firetrucks into the scene," Gillett Fire Chief Kurt Hicks told the City Council during its regular monthly meeting Thursday. "We can already see how good this is going to be as far as response time."

According to the traffic report from the Oconto County Sheriff's Department, Jasmine Skye Williams, 27, of Keshena, started to pass an eastbound pickup truck and didn't see Karen Ann Zahn's vehicle coming in the opposite direction, resulting in a near head-on collision.

Zahn, of Gillett, was taken from the scene by ambulance with what were described as suspected serious injuries. Williams needed to be extricated by the fire and rescue crews from her car and was also transported with serious injuries, along with a passenger, Susan K. Askenette. A child identified only as "E.W." was also taken by ambulance, although the report says the child sustained no

apparent injury.

Williams received citations for passing into oncoming traffic and operating without a valid license causing injury.

Under the auto aid system, whenever either the city of Gillett or town of Underhill receives an emergency

call, both departments will be simultaneously paged via the Mutual Aid Box Alarm System.

"With the car accident, we're already seeing how effective that can be," Hicks said.

NOTICE**Highway Obstructions in Oconto County**

PUSHING SNOW OR OTHER MATERIALS ONTO OR ACROSS HIGHWAYS FROM PRIVATE DRIVEWAYS CAN CAUSE ACCIDENT AND DEATH, AND IS PROHIBITED BY WISCONSIN STATUTES 86.01, AND/OR 346.94 (5).

Obstruction of vision clearance triangles at intersections is prohibited by 86.022 of State Statutes and by Sections 14.410 of the County Zoning Ordinance. Placing mailboxes away from driveways and intersections helps to avoid vision-restricting snowbanks in late winter, and helps to avoid damage to your mailbox. The nearest part of your mailbox should not be closer to traffic than the shoulder line, with box and base strong enough to withstand wind, flying snow and slush from traffic and snowplows.

Avoid penalty and liability, and cooperate towards safer highways. The life you save may be your own. Oconto County Highway Department cooperates with the County Sheriff's Office, and the County Highway Safety Commission to enforce these laws.

**MAILBOX (Roadside Receptacles)
REPLACEMENT POLICY**

This policy addresses the Oconto County Highway Department's policy regarding mailboxes and roadside receptacles damaged as a result of Highway Department Operations.

Mailboxes and roadside receptacles are defined as any container used for the delivery of mail, newspapers, advertising circulars, or other printed material, along any County Trunk Highway right-of-way in Oconto County.

The mailbox or receptacle base shall be placed two feet from the back of the shoulder of the road; the box shall be 46 inches above the grade of the shoulder, and the front of the box shall not extend beyond the back of the shoulder of the road. The mailbox or receptacle base should be able to withstand flying snow and slush from traffic and snowplows.

According to the Division of Highways and Transportation Department there are several alternative methods for installing single mailboxes: An acceptable support for a mailbox includes wood posts 4" x 4" square or 4.5" in diameter. Soft metal conduits which are 1.5" to 2.5" in diameter are also acceptable. These supports should be embedded no more than 24" into the ground. There are additional support systems which allow the mailbox to swing if struck. On either of these two types of supports a mailbox may be mounted.

If a mailbox or receptacle base is damaged by flying snow or slush, **it will not** be replaced by the Highway Department. Any mailbox or base damaged by slush or heavy snow will be investigated by Highway Department staff.

If a mailbox is physically hit and damaged by a snowplow or other piece of equipment, it will be replaced with a metal or plastic box acceptable to the U.S. Postal Service. Decorative or other types of ornamental mailboxes will not be replaced in kind.

Hunters advised to scout for storm damage

ANTIGO — The Department of Natural Resources encourages hunters to scout ahead this gun deer season as summer storm damage could still impede access to favorite hunting locations this fall. Though significant cleanup has occurred, damage from the July wind storm was extensive. As a result, hunters' favorite hunting spots may be unrecognizable and inaccessible, and hunters might need to scout for a new location.

In Langlade County, straight-line winds had a significant impact on approximately 1,800 acres of state-owned land, including portions of Peters Marsh Wildlife Area and the Upper Wolf River Fishery Area. The Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest also sustained significant damage, as did other properties in the greater White Lake and Mountain areas. Salvage timber sale establishment is in progress on both state properties.

The Langlade County Forest reported 30,000 acres of public land

affected by this storm. The county Forest Department cleared trails to make them safe for users with help from the DNR, area clubs and other agencies, but access into the forest remains challenging in some areas.

The county has set up numerous salvage timber harvests to clean up where possible, recover value from downed timber and prevent the spread of tree disease and parasites. The county's ATV/UTV trails are open, but visitors should be aware of numerous ongoing logging operations throughout the trail system. The public is advised to use caution and stay on the designated trail system.

The DNR encourages the public to keep in mind that with continued rain, access roads may be too wet to travel. Additional caution is advised as saturated ground may cause weakened trees to fall. The county, state and federal forestry departments ask for the public's patience as work continues to remove damaged wood from the forest.

OPINION: YOUR RIGHT TO KNOW

Protect your right to open government

Wisconsin's tradition of government transparency rests on the state's open records and open meetings laws. They declare that nearly every government document is open to

public inspection, and nearly every meeting of groups formed to do governmental work must be open to the public.

Unfortunately, those laws are woefully under-enforced. District attorneys and the state's Attorney

General are empowered to enforce them, but rarely do so. That leaves individuals and watchful organizations to carry the load.

But too many people are unaware of their rights under the records and meetings laws. That enables government officials to put unnecessary roadblocks in their way. People are

told things that aren't true, given evasive or incomplete answers, or just ignored in hopes that they'll go away.

Recently, I launched a new law firm, the Wisconsin Transparency Project, dedicated solely to litigating open government cases. Part of its mission is to educate the public about the questionable tactics they may encounter, such as the following:

Open records

Delay. There is no strict deadline for producing records, but responding to requests is supposed to be a priority. Many simple requests can be completed the same day. The Attorney General recommends no longer than 10 days for most requests. Very few requests should ever take more than a month.

Illegal copy fees. Copy fees should be calculated based on the cost of paper and a per-page charge for use of a copier in a copier lease or similar formula (the DOJ calculates its cost at about a penny per page). Challenge custodians to show you that calculation

if they ask for, say, 25 cents per page.

Illegal location fees. Custodians can charge the actual cost of locating records if it exceeds \$50. These costs are often inflated to discourage requests. The search should be done by the lowest-paid employee capable of doing it. And it is not proper for records custodians to charge for reviewing records to determine what to black out or otherwise not release.

Illegal demands. Custodians cannot demand that you identify yourself, explain why you want the records, come in to view the records instead of having them copied and mailed to you, or provide copies in paper format if you want them electronically.

Open meetings

Vague notices. Before a meeting, public bodies must put out a public notice explaining what they're going to discuss or do. If you can't tell from the wording what this will be, that's a problem.

Illegal closed sessions. Closed sessions are permissible only in

very limited circumstances. Officials must explain why they are going into closed session (merely quoting a statutory exception isn't good enough) and are not allowed to discuss other topics when they do.

Walking quorums. Officials sometimes try to get around public meeting requirements by holding a series of smaller meetings, each less than a quorum, to reach agreement before a meeting. They can't do that, even via email or phone.

If you run into any of these problems, consider reaching out for legal advice. Our laws are only as good as the people willing to enforce them. You can contact my law firm, or other law firms that do transparency work, including Pines Bach, Schott, Publitz & Engel, Godfrey & Kahn, and the Wisconsin Institute for Law & Liberty.

During probation Chartrand must maintain absolute sobriety and undergo any assessments and treatment required by the Department of Corrections, including alcohol and other drug abuse, mental health and moral reconnection therapy.

Cole Brian Nowinski, 24, Little Suamico, was placed on two years probation after a 3 1/2-year sentence was imposed and stayed for fleeing an officer in his vehicle, in connection with an incident that occurred March 30. A misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer was dismissed but read into the record. Judge Michael T. Judge ordered that Nowinski spend 80 days in the county jail and, during probation, that he maintain absolute sobriety and undergo alcohol and other

drug abuse assessments and follow through with recommended treatment and/or counseling.

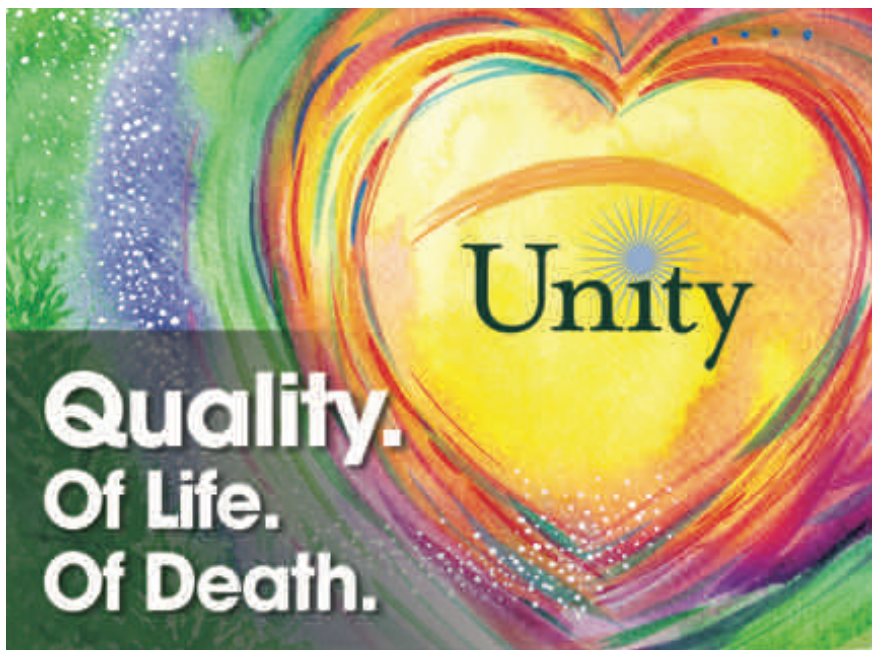

Leave the leaves for the winter

The leaves are still coming down. With our early season snowfalls over the past few weeks and below-normal temperatures that have dipped into the single digits, many trees in our area still have not let go of their fall leaves.

I have seen and heard over the past few weeks from many area residents who are convinced that they “need to rake.”

Let’s help relieve some of your stress over this perceived gardening myth. You do not “need” to rake. You may choose to rake. You may “want” to rake, but it’s not an absolute necessity.

Does Mother Nature rake her landscapes during the fall season? No. Every one of those fallen leaves serves a valuable purpose in nature and in your own yard and garden.

Leaves are the ideal natural insulation for garden plants. Leaves are also a wonderful and rich natural soil amendment as they break down over the winter season. They provide a natural fertilizer in the garden bed and border. Leaves make a rich, organic natural compost, providing a wealth of nutrients so much better for your plants and soil than any manufactured chemical product.

In addition to these practical and useful garden benefits, fallen leaves and standing garden perennials provide shelter for wildlife, overwintering luna moths, cecropia moths, mourning cloaks, tortoiseshells, black swallowtails, native bees and so much more.

Tree frogs, American toads, wood frogs, salamanders and other forest creatures overwinter beneath the protective layer of leaves and debris.

The “I need to rake” myth is as outdated as the “I need to have a perfectly manicured, green lawn” myth.

At some point, many decades ago, a genius marketing ploy brainwashed the general masses into believing these things were necessary, and it worked. For decades, these traditions of manicured lawns and raking away nature’s treasures have been passed down from one generation to the next as simply “that’s what we have always done.”

Bravo to all the individuals or or-

ganizations out there trying to reverse these old ways of thinking. There are entire books, even businesses passionately dedicated to spreading the knowledge and importance of leaving

the leaves and allowing perennials to remain standing all winter for the benefits they provide.

There has been volumes of research released the past two years by many of the largest and most important environmental and wildlife organizations from many sources about the importance of “leaving the leaves” and allowing your garden plants to remain standing throughout the winter.

Do some quick online research. Discover the benefits. Read the articles and social media posts. You’ll discover a whole new way of thinking and gardening.

There are many great uses for leaves and ways to take care of leaves other than raking. Some are as simple as mulching repeatedly for a wonderful and easy natural fertilizer and compost. Search out other options online.

Start exploring those options and take all of that unnecessary pressure and stress off yourself. So many people I’ve listened to and read comments from over the past few weeks are unnecessarily stressing themselves

out because the snow and cold will not allow them to rake.

Of course, as with anything, there are exceptions to this. There are things that should always be completely removed from the garden. That includes any diseased leaves such as maple tar spot, powdery and downy mildew, as well as any and all types of nightshade waste in your garden, including every part of all tomatoes, potatoes, peppers and eggplants. Nightshades must always be removed in order to prevent diseases from spreading the following season.

If you find that you truly must rake, do yourself a favor and think of it as a gardening pleasure, not as “work.” Once you make it work, the joy disappears. I, personally find peace and joy in raking. I love the sound and the feel of the leaves and the crunch beneath my feet and, of course, the crisp autumn air.

Suring's Stuart named offensive, defensive player of year in MONLPC-8

Suring's McVeigh and Taylor, Gillett's Block also make first team

SURING — The Suring High School football team came into the season hoping to make a smooth transition to 8-man football. The Eagles did just that, tying for the MONLPC-8 title and earning a post-season berth behind a monster year from senior Logan Stuart.

Stuart was named the offensive and defensive player of the year in the conference. He won the offensive award as a running back and the defensive honor as a linebacker.

"It's truly an honor, and I couldn't be happier. I'm so glad that my last football season in high school went as well as it did, and I got to enjoy it with the best team I could've asked for," said Stuart.

Stuart averaged 247.5 rushing yards per contest for a season total of 2,475 yards. He scored 32 touchdowns on the ground.

On defense, Stuart racked up a team-leading 162 total tackles. He was credited with 12 tackles for loss, six forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Stuart made sure to thank his coaches and especially teammates for earning the awards he did.

"My teammates deserve just as much credit, if not more," said Stuart. "They were the engine of the team and most of all, they never quit. They came through over and over again. These (awards) are definitely team wins."

Joining Stuart on the first team were teammates Leo Taylor and Chad McVeigh.

Taylor, a junior, made the list as an offensive lineman, helping

lead the way for several big rushing games from Stuart.

Taylor also was an honorable mention as a defensive lineman, accumulating 49 total tackles, eight tackles for loss, three sacks and two fumble recoveries.

The junior said he was a bit surprised to be recognized, but he is ready to get back to work and have an even better senior season next fall.

"I know these honors will motivate me to become better," Taylor said. "Also, with this year's experience, I believe I will make myself better in the future."

McVeigh made the first team as a defensive lineman and honorable mention list as an offensive lineman.

On defense, McVeigh totaled 65 tackles, nine sacks and one fumble recovery.

"Football is the sport I've been doing my whole life, and I love it. I've spent a lot of time and hard work on it, and it means the world for me to be recognized for it," said McVeigh, who also said the memories he made with the team were more special to him than the honors.

Senior Jayden Geniesse was the only Eagle to land on the second team, making it as a defensive back.

Geniesse led the team with four interceptions while also chipping in 33 total tackles.

Seniors Duncan Breed and Dequez Sepulveda (offensive ends) and sophomore Breyden Taylor (offensive lineman, defensive lineman) joined Leo Taylor and McVeigh as honorable mentions.

Breed rushed for a pair of touchdowns on the season, while also hauling in two receiving touchdowns.

Sepulveda finished with five total touchdowns, with two coming as a receiver, one as a kick returner, one as a punt returner and the other on a rush.

On defense, Breyden Taylor posted 40 total tackles, 11 tackles for loss and three sacks.

Suring finished the season 8-2 overall, being eliminated by Gibraltar

in the first round of the postseason. Gibraltar also handed the Eagles their only regular season loss.

Gillett

Gillett hoped to compete for the MONLPC-8 title this fall but instead was bitten by the injury bug, finishing with a 3-6 overall record.

Senior Logan Block was one of four Tigers to earn all-conference nods, making the first team as a linebacker and second team as an offensive lineman.

With all the injuries the team dealt with, Block was asked to serve several roles, and he produced wherever he played.

The senior led the team with 98

tackles, including seven for losses. He also tallied three sacks and was voted the team's MVP and top defensive player by his teammates.

Being an all-conference selection means a lot to him, he said. "I have worked hard over my high school career to get to this point, and with it being my senior year, it was a great feeling to accomplish this," said Block, who also rushed for 508 yards and four touchdowns while catching 10 passes.

Gillett's other three players honored all made the honorable mention list.

Freshman Derek Block served as the team's quarterback this fall, accumulating 853 yards and 10 touchdowns through the air. He also rushed for 302 yards and three touchdowns.

Senior Anthony Carroll was a dual-threat player out of the backfield, while senior Wyatt Herzog was the team's most productive wideout.

Carroll finished the season with 438 yards and seven touchdowns on the ground, plus 347 yards and three touchdowns as a receiver.

Herzog averaged 23.9 yards per catch during the season, finishing with 454 receiving yards and five touchdowns. He was tabbed the team's Top Offensive Player.

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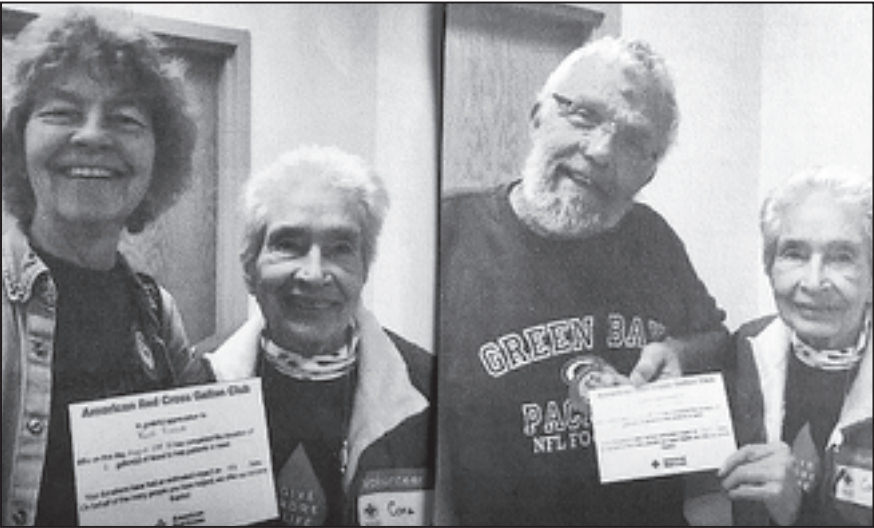
