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Tribal address points to new construction plans

Family center, bank, convenience store among 2020 projects

KESHENA — A budget shortfall due to lagging casino profits and a partial government shutdown hit the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin hard in 2019, but the tribe still intends to move forward on several key building plans in the new year, according to tribal chairman Douglas Cox.

Cox gave his annual State of the Menominee Nation address Saturday at the Menominee Casino Resort during the Menominee Indian Tribe Annual General Council. He said that 2019 was a year with both advancements and setbacks. Among the setbacks were the revenues that came in from the casino itself, he said.

“We have been severely impacted in our finances,” Cox said, without giving specific numbers on how short anticipated revenues from the casino were. “The tribal government, which depends heavily on those revenues from our gaming operations, felt sudden fiscal pressures by tapping into reserve funds

and cutting spending.”

However, the tribe also found itself having to act on budget contingency plans when the federal government was shut down right before Christmas and stayed closed until Jan. 25, 2019, one year to the day of Cox’s tribal address. The 35-day shutdown was the longest in United States history.

“The partial government shutdown from the federal government impacted federal requirements that provide services to our tribe,” Cox said. “Each of the tribe’s departments created budget and operational contingency plans.”

One of the tribal departments not impacted as badly was health,

according to Cox, as the tribe's clinic was able to remain financially solvent. He credited the clinic's leadership with coming up with revenue sources that allowed it to continue to tend to the reservation's medical needs, including treatment for opioid addiction.

The tribe is utilizing federal grants to train its police department and health officials to handle mental illness. The clinic saw an increase of 3,000 visits to the clinic in 2019, with a total of 20,569 for the year, Cox claimed, and in the process decreased the number of narcotics prescribed by over 40%.

"That's a huge accomplishment," Cox said.

The tribal chairman then reported that plans for a 60,000-square-foot family and community engagement center would contribute further to his culture's good health. The center is expected to break ground this summer.

"We're making the health of our youth a visible priority in our community," Cox said.

The center will include two NCAA-sized basketball courts, he said, along with a fitness center, fitness studios to accommodate the tribe's boxing club, program areas

for the tribe's youth services and an indoor walking track.

The tribe is also looking to expand its tribal business enterprises through its Wolf River Development Company. Construction is expected to begin in spring on Bay Bank, the reservation's first bank. A new convenience store and car wash is expected to break ground in the summer.

Cox continued to tout efforts to file a new application with the state to approve a Menominee casino in Kenosha. He said he believes such an application would succeed under Gov. Tony Evers' administration. The tribe attempted an application under former Gov. Scott Walker's administration, but Walker rejected it in 2015.

"We believe Gov. Evers would be receptive to a Menominee Kenosha gaming project," Cox said.

The tribe is also working to bring back its language and culture, according to Cox. The tribe has only four fluent Menominee language speakers, but through its efforts and immersion programs, there are 17 tribal members certified to teach the language.

"Learning the language from our grandparents, parents and elders

is the ideal situation," Cox said.

"At this time, this is a struggle for us because of the loss of our first language elders and speakers."

Cox also reported some negatives in race relations, pointing out the controversy in October when four Clintonville High School students performed a mocking Native American dance that was posted to social media and caused outrage among many area tribes. He noted that since the incident, there have been some positive dialogues to promote better understanding of the Menominee and other unique cultures.

Another negative that turned into a positive came from the Menomonee Falls School District's decision regarding its native mascot. After two months of contentious debate, the district's board voted in December to end its affiliation as the Indians and plans to utilize high school students to consider a new nickname.

There have also been positive race relations, according to Cox, including Menominee recognition ceremonies in Green Bay and Oshkosh. Also, a statue portraying an ancestral bear has been erected in Marinette at the mouth of the

Menominee River, expected to be followed by plans for a future monument paying tribute to all five of the Menominee's primary clans.

The Menominee Tribal Legislature has also had to contend with controversy in its law enforcement. After voting in 2018 to remove its elected police chief, Mark Waukau, from office, it has debated whether appointing a police chief would be a better decision. The legislature decided against that measure, according to Cox, but it created a commission to oversee the police department.

"We will be moving forward with the election of the tribal police chief in the very near future," he said.

Despite the tumultuous year, Cox believes that every decision has advanced the tribe in some way.

"Every decision we've made has been in the best interest of our Menominee Nation," Cox said. "We have our own judicial system. We operate our own police force. We run our own school, administer our own clinic, and we operate a number of business enterprises. We have much to be proud of."

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2 teens charged in extortion plot

Girls threatened to file rape charge unless money was paid

Two teenagers have been charged in Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court with extorting nearly \$6,000 in cash from a 27-year-old Gresham man by threatening to accuse him of rape.

Taniesha L. Tucker, 17, of Gresham, is facing 10 felony counts of making threats to injure or accuse of a crime.

Anyssa C. M. Ellwart, 17, of Bowler, is charged with four counts of the same crime.

They could each face a maximum six years in prison and \$10,000 fine on each of the counts if found guilty.

Both are also facing misdemeanor bail jumping charges.

The alleged victim in the case contacted reported to authorities on Oct. 31 that he was being extorted.

He said he had met Tucker online in August through the dating website Tinder and that Tucker told him she was 19 years old.

The two met and “made out,” according to the man, who said there was sexual contact but no intercourse.

Tucker then contacted the man through Snapchat, he said, at which point she told him she was 17 years old and wanted \$200 or she would report him to law enforcement.

The criminal complaint alleges

Tucker continued asking for money, at one point demanding \$3,000, which the man paid.

On Oct. 27, the man was contacted through Snapchat by Ellwart, who said she was a friend of Tucker’s and that Tucker was in jail, according to the complaint.

The complaint alleges Ellwart then began demanding money from the man on Tucker’s behalf.

According to the criminal complaint, Tucker personally extorted \$4,900 from the man, and was a party to the crime when Ellwart took \$900 from him.

The last payment, on Nov. 4, was carried out under the watch of Stockbridge-Munsee police and Shawano County Sheriff’s Department detectives with law enforcement funds.

Ellwart was pulled over after leaving the scene of the transaction and questioned. The money she was given was seized.

Ellwart told authorities she was getting the money for Tucker, but admitted to keeping about half of it, according to the complaint.

Tucker and Ellwart were both ordered held on \$500 cash bonds set by Judge James Habeck. They are scheduled for adjourned initial court appearances on Feb. 10.

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Power outage hits 1,000 SMU customers

SHAWANO — A power outage Monday morning that shut down Shawano Municipal Utilities service to an estimated 1,000 customers was caused by an underground fault that opened a breaker at the utility’s Wescott substation, according to General Manager Brian Knapp.

The roughly 45-minute outage shut down power to a wide swath of the city starting north of Division Street and from Main Street west to the area of Woodlawn Cemetery, Knapp said. Some spots south of Division Street were also affected.

Knapp said the underground fault was probably due to a bad

splice on the underground line.

“Fortunately, it was easy to switch around, at least on a temporary basis,” he said. “Temporarily, it’s switched but the permanent fix is going to take a little more work.”

There was no official count yet Monday afternoon of the number of customers affected, but Knapp estimated it was around 1,000, which would comprise about one-fifth of the SMU system.

“It’s a big area because north of here goes all the way up to the reservation, but there aren’t very many customers once you get north of the channel,” Knapp said.

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Tribe awaiting appeal decision on Back Forty

Menominee anticipating ruling sometime in 2020

KESHENA — The Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin has the goal of stopping the Back Forty Mine effort completely, but one of the individuals spearheading the effort said Saturday that might not be realistic anymore.

During the tribe's annual conference held at the Menominee Casino Resort, Tribal Legislator Joan Delabreau, who is also a member of the No Back Forty Environmental Task Force, told a crowd of 150 that it was more likely that opposition would need to be similar to efforts to stop the Crandon Mine in the 1990s.

"The ultimate goal is to stop the Back Forty Mine; that is the ultimate goal started from way back when," Delabreau said. "The realistic goal is to delay. Delay it and delay it and delay it until almost what happened

with the Crandon Mine, where it became not financially feasible for them to do open pit mining."

Delabreau said Aquila Resources, Inc. is the exploratory company obtaining the permits for the mine which is expected to go close to the Menominee River in Michigan's

Menominee County, but the tribe expects those permits to be sold to a company who would do the actual excavating and mining.

Delabreau said that much of 2019 was spent filing motions and litigating in court.

"It seems like it's been pretty quiet

with the No Back Forty," Delabreau said. "Most of the public hearings have been completed. When you do litigation, we file, they file, and there are all of these lengthy times in between for the different types of court that we're in."

Among the suits is an appeal by the tribe of Judge William Griesbach of the U.S. District Court in Green Bay, that dismissed the tribe's lawsuit against Aquila and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in 2018.

"We are waiting for their decision," Delabreau said on Saturday. "It should be coming out relatively soon, but the results from the hearings in Michigan took two years, so I don't know how long it will take for the federal Appeals Court."

The tribe paid almost \$750,000 in legal expenses in 2018, but now the tribe has the help of Earthjustice, which is doing much of the work pro bono. Delabreau said that \$137,000 was approved by the Menominee Tribal Legislature for 2019, but only \$72,000 has been spent from tribal coffers.

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ORDINANCE NO.: 1981

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAWANO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN THAT CHAPTER 1, GENERAL GOVERNMENT, SECTION 1.09 is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

§ 1.09 City-County Transportation Commission

(1) Membership. The City-County Transportation Committee shall consist of 10 members; three city appointed representatives, including one Alderperson, three county appointed representatives, one Department of Human Services representative, one Department of Community Programs representative, one Tribal Council appointed representative, and one non-voting city cab representative. The two at-large city appointments shall be made by the Mayor and the Alderperson appointment shall be made by the Council President, all subject to confirmation by the Council.

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ORDINANCE NO.: 1980

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAWANO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN THAT CHAPTER 10, ZONING CODE, ARTICLE IX SIGNAGE, SECTION 10-143 Definitions and rules related to sign configurations, (2) On building signs; FIGURE 10-144a; and SECTION 10-152 Removal where business no longer in operation (2) are hereby amended as follows:

Add sub-section to Municipal Code Section 10-143(2)(f) Painted Wall Sign to read as follows:

- (f) Painted wall sign: a wall sign painted directly on a building façade.
- 1) Painted wall signs shall be professional painted. Professional hand painting is permitted.
 - 2) No part of the painted wall sign shall wrap around the corner of the building onto another façade, unless that façade, is also eligible for a painted wall sign.
 - 3) Painted wall signs shall use a durable and long-lasting paint designed to withstand the elements. Acrylic or mineral-based paint products are recommended.
 - 4) Painted wall signs shall not diminish a building's architectural integrity.
 - 5) Painted wall signs shall be regularly maintained or touched up to maintain legibility and avoid the appearance of peeling paint, per Section 10-150(7).
 - 6) Murals or works of art which in no way identify a product shall not be regulated under this Chapter.
 - 7) A painted wall sign would count towards a business's permitted business signs.

Amend Figure 10-144a to allow painted wall signs in the Downtown Mixed Use (DMU) and by conditional use in the Urban Mixed Use (UMU) zoning districts:

(a) Removal of abandoned painted wall signs shall either involve complete physical removal of the abandoned sign from the wall or repainting of the entire wall containing the abandoned sign, so that the said wall matches the building's other facades and the abandoned signs is no longer visible.

She named the business Emma Kait's Coffeehaus after her grandmother, Emma Gast, of whom she had fond memories, and Kait, her daughter who helped design the concept, the interior and managed it in the beginning. She also started a grocery store, Cedar Street Market in Tigerton.

After her husband fully retired, Hegewald decided it was time for her to do the same. The trick for her would

Glapinski lives in Bevent but had been stopping in at Emma Kait's during her visits to relatives in Birnamwood. She loved the décor and even took a picture of the window seat so she could show her husband what she wanted him to build for her in their new home.

Glapinski met Hegewald in May when she was shopping at Cedar Street Market. The smell of fresh baked goods caught her attention, and she asked Hegewald if she supplied the baked goods at Emma Kait's.

"I said I did and that I owned Emma Kait's, and it was for sale at a

good price," said Hegewald.

Glapinski had been a medical receptionist for 30 years when she retired last year and was looking for something to do. Little did she know, that chance meeting would bring her

to her next adventure in life.

"I'm only here because Judi and I had a conversation," said Glapinski.

With no experience in owning a business, Glapinski might not have appeared to be the right choice, but Hegewald knew she could teach her everything she would need to know — from making the coffee and the sandwiches to baking desserts, even the accounting. Together they have formed a true friendship. After purchasing the business in August, Glapinski knows she can call on Hegewald for advice.

It's been a family adventure for Glapinski, who has her daughter, Alisha Glapinski-Reynolds, help out on Saturdays and whenever special events are booked.

Glapinski's stepson, Justin Bargas, graduated from the Minnesota Culinary Arts School in Minneapolis and is currently a chef at Tine and Cellar in Weston. He helped show Glapinski how to use fresh herbs and work a variety of ingredients. Bargas knew Glapinski had a passion for baking and encouraged her to pursue that dream.

"My husband, Bob, is my cheerleader. He wanted me to start a cake-decorating business years ago," said Glapinski, who now specializes in miniature cupcakes and desserts.

Glapinski has stayed true to most of the original menu and has added themed baskets featuring her baked goods. The concept was tested over Thanksgiving and Christmas, and she is hoping to take special orders for Valentine's Day. Eventually, she would like to expand her hours until 5 p.m. to feature take-and-bake pizzas.

City adopts 5-year outdoor recreation plan

Plan sets goals and priorities, allows city to seek grant funding

SHAWANO — The city of Shawano has adopted a new five-year outdoor recreation plan with priorities set largely by public input, but which projects come to fruition and when will be a question of whether money is available.

The Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, which sets the parks and recreation department's goals through 2024, was adopted by the Shawano Common Council on Jan. 15.

At an earlier plan commission meeting, Parks and Recreation Director Matt Hendricks said the plan would serve as a guideline.

"This provides direction but by no means approves all of these projects in here," he said.

Hendricks said the plan is important in helping determine where the department spends its time, money and human resources, but is also vital to securing grant money that could help make some of the projects a reality.

"If there's one single key component that is the largest reason why we do an outdoor rec plan, it's the possibility to pursue grants and outside funding," he said.

The plan incorporates public comments from 371 respondents to a parks and recreation survey.

It was put together with assistance

from the East Central Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission.

Any projects that move forward would have to go before the Common Council for approval.

Hendricks noted that the public's priorities have shifted since the last five-year recreation plan, when improving playgrounds in the city's park system topped the public's wish list.

The new survey shows that playgrounds now have a high rate of satisfaction and public desires have shifted to such things as a dog park, more exercise space at the recreation center, more public restrooms and parking, basketball courts, an outdoor swimming pool and volleyball courts.

Other items on the public wish list, according to the survey, included vandal-proofing of fixtures at all parks; fishing piers and canoe/kayak launches; additional benches; hiking and biking trails; rollerblading and inline skating paths; and security lighting and cameras.

The plan outlines priorities for each of the city's parks, but also includes general improvement plans over the next five years for all parks and trails:

- Evaluate additional restrooms facilities for popular parks
- Additional picnic tables; possibly change to aluminum
- Change trash receptacles from "blue barrels" to punched steel/metal equipment
- Continue to update playground equipment
- Add Wi-Fi to park system
- Athletic field turf reconditioning
- Dog park
- Create a city bicycle and pedestrian plan
- Consider trail linkages through Murray Creek Conservancy
- Create low maintenance paths through the industrial park
- Consider lighting along all pedestrian trails

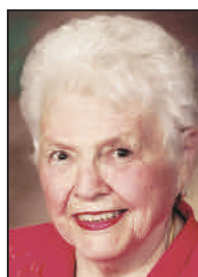

The bulb encased in a colorful wax coating has everything it needs to grow and bloom inside the home. Simply place in a bright sunny location and let Mother Nature do the rest.

Indoor azaleas are another beautiful bloomer that lasts throughout most of the winter season. These small, woody shrubs are available in pink, red, lavender and white. These are different than our outdoor, perennial azalea shrubs and are not hardy over winter outdoors.

Indoor azalea shrubs are easy to take care for, provided they are not allowed to dry out. Keep moisture levels consistent — moist, but not wet — as well as medium to high light. Fertilize with Miracid or other acidic plant fertilizer accord

ing to the package directions.

Anthuriums, sometimes known as flamingo plants, are another wonderful source of indoor color to brighten the home during the winter season. Their beautiful, spathe-like blooms come in a variety of colors such as white, pink, red and purple.

Anthuriums are tolerant of lower light levels and can be allowed to go quite dry in between deep waterings. Their long-lasting flowers may bloom for weeks, and new flower buds are constantly emerging from below.

Many varieties of succulents provide stunning blooms in the indoor garden during the winter season. Kalanchoe is especially attractive with clusters of colorful blooms that adorn these small to medium-sized plants for many weeks over their long bloom season.

These plants bloom in many colors, such as yellow, orange, pink, red, white, coral and others. Be-

cause these are succulents, be careful not to overwater and be sure to provide plenty of bright light.

Of course, no indoor garden should be without colorful, ornate and elegant blooming orchids throughout the year. Especially in winter, many orchids put on a fantastic display. They come in a variety of shapes, colors and sizes. Some orchids are easier to care for than others, so be sure to purchase from a reputable dealer and ask plenty of questions.

African violets are another traditional indoor gardening favorite for the winter season. While they have a reputation of being touchy, they are quite easy to grow, especially under growing lights, provided they are not allowed to dry out. Plant in a violet-specific potting mix and fertilize regularly.

Clintonville girls unable to secure home win against Oconto Falls

CLINTONVILLE — The Clintonville High School girls basketball team was unable to finish off a North Eastern Conference clash against Oconto Falls on Thursday.

The Truckers never got the ball back, as Oconto Falls made the front end of a pair of 1-and-1 opportunities at the free-throw line before grabbing the offensive rebounds after

"He has persevered through a tough season-ending injury while being ranked No. 1 in the state at the time. All of his accolades are well deserved with all the hard work he has put into wrestling. Every coach would love to have a Chad Moegenburg on their team."

Q: You dealt with an injury for a good portion of your junior season. What was the recovery process like?

A: I spent three months in an elbow

brace to reattach the stuff in my arm naturally. If it wouldn't have healed properly, I would've needed Tommy John surgery, which would've ended my wrestling career. After the brace, I spent another two months going to physical therapy three days a week.

A: After the season I had as a sophomore and then being ranked No. 1 at 120 at the time of my injury, it was extremely hard to know that I couldn't do anything about it and to have to sit the rest of the season.

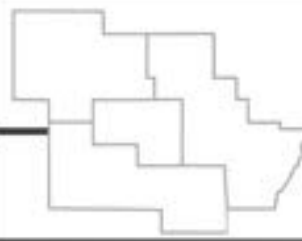

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Rural Wisconsin doctor seeking ways to manage use of opioids

Overdose deaths more common in rural areas

MILWAUKEE — Dr. Angela Gatzke-Plamann didn't fully grasp her community's opioid crisis until one desperate patient called on a Friday afternoon in 2016.

"He was in complete crisis because he was admitting to me that he had lost control of his use of opioids," recalled Gatzke-Plamann, 40,

the only full-time family physician in the central Wisconsin village of Necedah, population 916.

The patient had used opioids for several years for what Gatzke-Plamann called "a very painful condition." But a urine screening one week earlier had revealed heroin and morphine in his system. He denied any misuse that day. Now he was not only admitting it but asking for help.

But Gatzke-Plamann had no resources to offer. She and the patient searched the internet while still on the phone, trying to find somewhere nearby that could help. No luck.

Here was a patient with a family and job who spiraled into addiction due to doctor-prescribed pain pills, yet the community's barebones health system left him on his own to find treatment — which he later did, 65 miles away. If that situation was going to change in Necedah, it was up to Gatzke-Plamann.

"That weekend I went home and I said, 'I've got to do something different,'" she recalled.

In many ways, rural communities like Necedah have become the face of the nation's opioid epidemic. Drug overdose deaths are more common in rural areas than in urban ones. And rural doctors prescribe opioids more often by far, despite a nationwide decline in prescribing rates since 2012. Meanwhile, rural Americans have fewer alternatives to treat their very real pain, and they disproportionately lack access to effective addiction medication such as buprenorphine.

For rural physicians like Gatzke-Plamann, the burden of responding to the opioid epidemic falls on their already-loaded shoulders.

One reason there are more opioid prescriptions in the rural United States: Those residents report more chronic pain. Rural communities skew older, meaning they disproportionately deal with painful conditions related to aging, such as arthritis. Injuries also appear to be more common among communities more dependent on physically demanding jobs, such as mining and logging.

For 62-year-old Necedah resident Michael Kruchten, the chronic pain stems from chemotherapy and radiation therapy treatments he received for lung cancer in 2011.

Kruchten is cancer free now, but the treatments left him with permanent and severe nerve damage in his hands and feet.

"Sometimes it's a burning — a continuous burning," Kruchten said. "Sometimes it's just like a sharp jolt of pain. And then sometimes it's just pain, pain, pain."

The pain forced him to stop working at the ethanol plant in Necedah. Daily chores became challenging. The pain would keep him awake at night, leaving him pounding his pillow in frustration.

Gatzke-Plamann tries to avoid prescribing opioids when she can, but alternatives are limited. The nearest physical therapy is in Mauston, a 17-mile drive south. Treatments such as cognitive therapy for pain require drives to Madison,

Marshfield or La Crosse, each at least an hour away.

She first tried prescribing Kruchten gabapentin and then duloxetine, two non-opioid medicines. Neither helped enough. Eventually she prescribed the opioid hydrocodone, finally allowing him to sleep.

"Without the sleep, I was a couch potato," Kruchten said. "Once I started to get to sleep (at night), I got rid of my TV and the couch and started becoming more active."

Necedah is not exactly at the center of the opioid epidemic, but it is not far from it either. The overdose death rate in Juneau County — home to Necedah — tracks with the state average, which itself is about average in the United States. But Juneau County shares a border with Adams County, home to one of the state's highest overdose death rates.

When Gatzke-Plamann came to Necedah in 2010, U.S. opioid prescriptions were peaking. She estimates she inherited 25 to 30 patients with monthly opioid prescriptions. Soon she, like many peers around the country, noticed a rise in overdose and misuse.

Today, Gatzke-Plamann's affiliated hospital sends her a monthly report of how many of her patients have opioid prescriptions. It varies each month, she said, but usually ranges from seven to 10. That is due to her efforts.

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Foresters fear winter, wood market might hamper storm cleanup

Salvaging timber from July storms might be difficult with snow, wood glut

After severe storms in July, efforts are ongoing to clean up damage to forests across northern and central Wisconsin. Some foresters are concerned that a glut of wood on the market and winter weather may hamper efforts to remove damaged timber.

More than 286,000 acres spanning seven counties — including Langlade, Oconto and Barron — were damaged by storms that produced straight-line winds and tornadoes last summer, according to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. The damage was spread across county, state, national and private forest land with private lands accounting for nearly half the dam-

age, according to figures provided by Ryan Severson, the agency's north-east district forestry leader.

Severson said the cleanup has faced several challenges, including market and weather conditions.

"The market can only take so much wood at a time. Some of it's access," said Severson. "We've had an incredibly wet year, and our early start to winter and heavy snow cover has limited our ability to drive frost into the ground and freeze down some of our wetter sites."

Langlade County experienced some of the worst effects of last summer's storms with around 81,000 acres of forest land across a mix of ownership that was damaged, according to the DNR.

Erik Rantala, the county's forestry

administrator, said the county has at least 70 salvage sales that have been awarded spanning more than 8,000 acres of timber. Rantala said the acreage amounts to 2½ years of timber that they would have set up for sale.

"We're still setting stuff up and selling. Certainly through 2020, we'll be very busy or timber sales will be very busy on the county forest," said Rantala. "(It will) primarily be salvage sales — getting these things cleaned up."

The county has typically brought in more than \$2 million in revenues from timber sales in recent years. Rantala said he expects to see an initial spike in revenues due to the volume of wood damaged in the storms despite a decline in prices with a glut of wood on the market. Yet, it's raising concerns for future years when that timber and revenue

may not be there.

He acknowledged winter weather could bring further challenges for salvaging timber.

"The deeper the snow gets — this stuff is just laying on the ground, and it's buried in the snow," he said. "Trying to make sure you get everything and utilize it as much as you can, it's difficult. These machines are pulling stuff out of the snow. It's hard on equipment. It's just much slower going."

Rebekah Luedtke, executive director of the Wisconsin County Forests Association, said an extremely wet fall might have prevented the ground from freezing in time before snow fell, further insulating the ground. She said that makes it difficult for loggers and equipment to access roads and timber stands without doing any damage.
