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New city park ready to go to the dogs

\$15,000 donation unleashes Animal Recreation Facility project

SHAWANO — The park dog owners in Shawano have long been panting for looks like it will finally be a reality with a donation to the city last month that will pay about a third of the expected cost.

The city last month received a \$15,000 donation toward the project from the Nora Jende Charitable Fund.

Jende is an area resident who has made donations to other animal-related causes, including the K9 program, according to Parks and Recreation Director Matt Hendricks.

"It's a very generous donation," he said.

Shawano officials as part of the budgeting process last year set aside \$30,000 for the project as a capital improvement expense provided there was outside funding to supplement that.

The dog park will be located just west of the Shawano County Humane Society at Industrial Drive and Jaycee Court.

Construction of what has been

dubbed the Animal Recreation Facility (ARF) is scheduled to kick off this summer with an opening anticipated in the fall, according to the city.

The \$45,000 now available will cover the basic necessities needed to build the park, including elements like fencing, gates, and waste stations.

"The single biggest piece will be fencing and gates," Hendricks said.

The park will be fenced in and separated into a large dog area and a small dog area.

Signage will be made by the parks department staff as it has done for other city parks, but additional work could also be done in-house to save some money.

Hendricks said it was still being determined what staff will have time to do and what will have to be contracted out.

"I feel very comfortable that that \$45,000 will get us everything that's on the primary needs list and potentially some more, or it could potentially come in under," he said.

Though the city has already approved the allocation, individual purchases of more than \$5,000 will have

to come back to the Common Council for additional approval.

The city is continuing to seek additional donations to add other amenities.

"There's a campaign that people can donate if they want more add-ons and then we can add those and if not then we don't and we'll put up the basics," Hendricks said.

Additional elements could include shade structures, potable water stations, animal agility elements, trees and landscaping that are not part of the current plan.

"It depends on what people want," Hendricks said.

Leuenberger earns prestigious award

Local photographer captured iconic image at the 2019 Kentucky Derby

SHAWANO — Jim Leuenberger has been a fan of horse racing and photography for nearly his entire life. So when he got the opportunity to combine a pair of his passions in 2018, he jumped at the opportunity.

Then, in just his second year of professionally shooting photos at the Kentucky Derby, Leuenberger captured the image of a lifetime.

Leuenberger snapped a photo of race leader, Maximum Security, veering into the path of War of Will — an event that eventually had Maximum Security disqualified. It was the first disqualification of a winning horse in the 145-year history of the race. Leuenberger was honored with the Eclipse Award for the photo at the 49th Annual Eclipse Awards on Jan. 23 at Gulfstream Park in Hallandale Beach, Florida.

Eclipse Awards are given out annually to media members for “outstanding coverage of thoroughbred racing,” according to the National Thoroughbred Racing Association. The winners are chosen by voting representatives of the Daily Racing Form, the NTRA and the National Turf Writers and Broadcasters.

“It’s a once in a lifetime opportunity,” Leuenberger said of attending the ceremony and winning the Eclipse Award. He also called the award the highlight of his photography career. “The chances of me getting another picture that I would even consider nominating are slim. I know photographers who I’ve known a long time who I met at the Derby, and they’ve never won one of these awards. I’m one of the lucky ones.”

Leuenberger was using a Canon 5D Mark III camera with a 100-400 millimeter lens to capture the fast-paced action.

“When that incident happened where the horse was disqualified, I didn’t even know what had happened. I was just shooting pictures; that’s my job,” said Leuenberger, who was the only photographer working at that turn.

“I was in the right place at the right time. I was very fortunate to have that opportunity.”

Leuenberger’s first event he watched on television was the 1956 Kentucky Derby. “For some reason, it kind of piqued my interest. I don’t

wano, originally never thought he’d be able to attend the Kentucky Derby in person. But he and his wife, Irene, started making the race an annual event, and he has only missed the race once since 1995.

A photography buff, Leuenberger said he enjoyed photographing the horse race as a fan. But a rule change a couple years back stated that fans would no longer be able to bring “so-called professional cameras into the grounds.” He even started debating whether to attend the event again if taking photos wasn’t an option.

Luckily, the Daily Racing Form was short a photographer for the 2018 Derby, opening the opportunity for Leuenberger to shoot photos in an official capacity. That year, Justify won the race and went on to win the Triple Crown.

While photographing Justify was a cool moment for Leuenberger, it paled in comparison to the shot he captured at the 2019 Derby.

Leuenberger had to nominate his photo for the award. Because it had appeared on drf.com, it qualified for the Eclipse Award.

He got a phone call on Christmas Eve saying he had won the award. “I about fell off the couch.”

Leuenberger said the Jan. 23 ceremony was a humbling experience as he got to meet many of the big names in the horse-racing industry, with many people coming up to him to congratulate him on the Eclipse-winning photo.

Leuenberger thanked Barbara Livingston, the chief photographer at DRF, for allowing him to shoot photos at the Derby the past two years. Leuenberger plans to shoot the Derby again this year, along with the Breeder’s Cup in November.

He remembered being a big-time fan of horse racing in 1973 when Secretariat won the Kentucky Derby, Preakness Stakes and Belmont Stakes to claim the Triple Crown.

Public feedback sought on proposed riverwalk

CLINTONVILLE — Local residents will have an opportunity to voice their opinions and concerns on a proposed Pigeon Riverwalk Development plan, which is being developed by a University of Wisconsin-Madison senior as his capstone project.

The city of Clintonville will hold an informational meeting at 6 p.m. Feb. 24 at the Clintonville Community Center, 30 S. Main St., Clintonville.

Last fall, Sharon Eveland, city administrator, submitted a request to the university's Department of Planning and Landscape Architecture to participate in the senior capstone project. Since the 1980s, UW-Madison has paired local governments with senior students who are required to complete a major project as part of their graduation requirements.

The capstones provide students with the opportunity to demonstrate their technical knowledge and ability to address real world problems. Eveland said the city needs assistance in developing a riverwalk plan to showcase the Pigeon River as a resource and local attraction.

Michael Walsh, the UW-senior, selected the Clintonville project for his senior capstone. He met with city staff members last fall, visited the site and completed an inventory and area analysis.

Community involvement, however, is a key part of Walsh's research. At the upcoming meeting, Walsh will present his findings, and then he'll meet in small groups with members of the community to discuss any concerns and hear recommendations.

Walsh will be looking for suggestions for the Pigeon Riverwalk, Olen Park and the Main Street shopping area that will influence his final design proposal.

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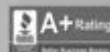

Crash hotspots in Shawano County, peak accident times cited in state report

Report reinforces preventative steps already underway, local law enforcement says

SHAWANO — The end of the work week would seem to be the most dangerous time to be out on the road in Shawano County, according to a recent state study, with the hour of 3-4 p.m. on Fridays being the peak time for injury and fatal crashes.

A traffic safety study created by the Division of State Patrol Bureau of Transportation Safety and Technical Services found that over an average year in Shawano County, injury and fatal crashes occur somewhat consistently over the weekday, while Friday has the most crashes.

In addition, according to the study, injury and fatal crashes occur most frequently between 3-4 p.m., peaking at 17 crashes in total

throughout the year.

The data is based on a five-year trend from 2014 through 2018.

The study also looked at suspected drug or alcohol impairment and distracted driving based on a two-year trend covering 2017-2018.

According to the study, an average of 1,652 drivers are involved in a crash over the course of a year in Shawano County, including 279 people who are injured and nine people who are killed.

For every 32 people injured in Shawano County, one person is killed, according to the study. Statewide, the ratio is 74 to one.

Most of the information in the report was already known or at least suspected by local law enforcement based on the trends they've been seeing over the past few years, according to Shawano County Sheriff's Department Cap-

tain Ty Raddant.

Raddant is a member of the county highway safety commission, where the report was presented last week.

"Our busy times are when we've got high crash times," he said. "Obviously, Fridays and Saturdays are when they typically occur, the majority of them."

Fridays had the highest number of crashes, over the course of an average year, at 41. Saturdays were only marginally safer at 39 crashes.

The rest of the week was fairly consistent, ranging from a low of 23 crashes on Tuesdays to 28 on Thursdays.

Six out of 10 fatal and injury crashes occur on a county or state road, the study found and the majority of those involved in those crashes are Shawano County residents.

Locals are more likely to be involved in a crash in the county as opposed to visitors, according to the study, which found that 64% of occupants injured or killed in a crash in Shawano County also live in Shawano County and 32% live in Wisconsin, but somewhere other than Shawano County.

November has highest number of crashes, according to the study, while July has highest number of injury and fatal crashes.

Highway Commissioner Grant Bystol said the November numbers were likely due to the number of deer-related crashes that take place that time of year, while the July figures could probably be attributed to heavier-than-usual holiday travel.

The study found that, over the course of an average year in Shawano County, 59 people are injured or killed in a crash involving a driver believed to be impaired by drugs or alcohol.

That represents 25% of all persons killed in a crash in the county. Statewide, the figure is 33% of all persons killed in a crash, according to the study.

and west of the town of Richmond; state Highway 22 in the Shawano area and Lake Drive in the town of Wescott.

Raddant said he wasn't surprised to see where the state had identified hotspots.

"Richmond is one of our busier areas," he said, "so it doesn't surprise me that we've had that many crashes in that area. Usually our busiest (area) is Wescott and then Richmond, Waukechon. Belle Plaine is another one. So the number of crashes there doesn't really surprise me. There's more people there compared to the rest of the county, and there's a lot more traffic there, too."

Raddant said the study won't change any patrolling or enforcement efforts already underway in the county, which is focused on the heavy traffic areas.

"The major roads, that's where everybody is traveling, the majority of the traffic," Raddant said. "We try to conduct extra patrols in those areas where the traffic is, slow people down, hopefully prevent the

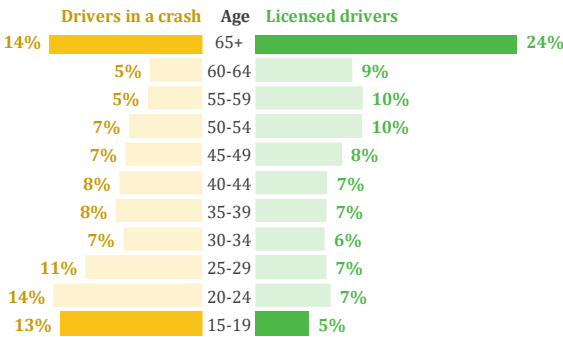

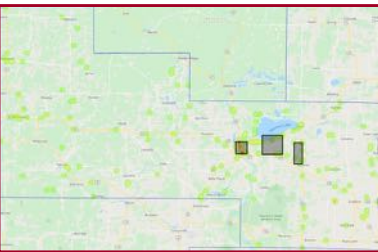

 3. Bonduel (S.R. 117/Oakcrest Dr.)

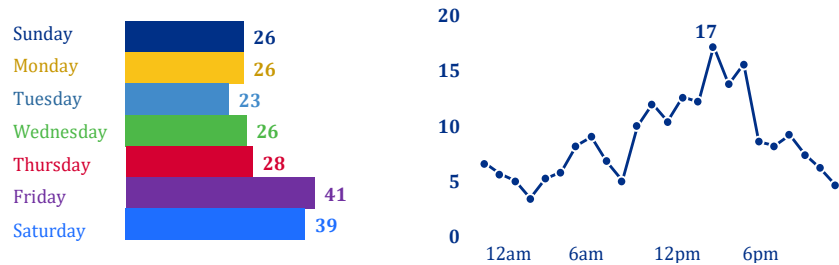
Hotspots of injury and fatal crashes involving an older driver

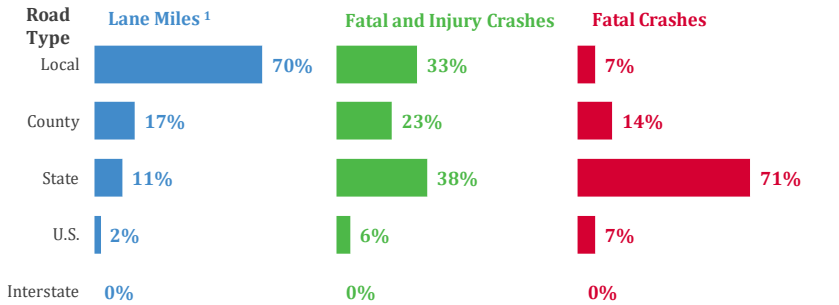
On an average year in Shawano County, injury and fatal crashes occur somewhat consistently over the weekday while **Friday** has the **most crashes**.

crashes. (The study) just reinforces what we're already doing."

The county, as well as city police, also participate in a number of preventative programs subsidized by state grants such as Click It or Ticket and Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over that generally take place during the holidays and allow for extra patrols.

"We've been doing that for a number of years now," Raddant said.

Shawano Police Chief Dan Mauel, who is also a member of the highway safety commission, said it wasn't surprising to find some city locations identified as crash hotspots, given how heavily traveled they are.

"We use these types of reports to help direct our traffic patrols to areas that need attention," Mauel said. "We, along with Shawano County, received state traffic grants that allow us to deploy overtime officers for traffic enforcement throughout the year. This gives us the opportunity to be visible, and take enforcement action, in the hotspot areas."

Mauel noted that even though the report lists several city loca-

tions as hotspots, only 25 out of 364 city crashes in 2019 involved injuries. There were no fatalities in the city last year.

Bystol said one of the things that stood out for him in the report was the distracted driving numbers.

In Shawano County, a driver being distracted is listed as a contributing factor in 17% of injury and fatal crashes.

"We would like to remind motorists to put down their phones and pay attention to the roadway," he said. "Not only for your own safety but for the safety of the workers in the work zones and the rest of the traveling public."

Bystol said there was nothing in the report that directly affects the highway department in terms of any engineering or structural problems on the roads identified in the report.

"Each time there's a fatality or a severe injury, the highway safety committee reviews all these incidents and accidents," Bystol said. "If there is anything from an engineering standpoint that we can address, we definitely take that into consideration or if there's a trend that is developing or continuing, we look to

address those on an individual basis."

Teens and drivers over the age of 65 accounted for the highest percentage of fatal or injury crashes in the county, according to the study, making up 28% of all such crashes.

That's higher than the statewide figure of 21%.

The study identified four hotspots for injury and fatal crashes involving a teenager: Main and East Green Bay streets and Main and County Road B in Shawano; state Highway 29 and South Shore Drive in Shawano and state Highway 117 and Oakcrest Drive in Bonduel.

The three top areas for injury or fatal crashes involving drivers 65 and older included state Highway 29 and U.S. Highway 45 in Wittenberg; Main and Lincoln streets and Green Bay Street and County Road B in Shawano; and Green Bay Street and Airport Road in Shawano.

Speeding was a factor in 29% of all fatal and injury crashes, according to the study, which is higher than the statewide figure of 19%.

One out of four crashes where

speed is a factor involved a young driver, according to the study.

The study also found that seven cyclists, 21 pedestrians and 102 motorcyclists were either injured or killed in the county during the five-year period.

Of the motorcyclists, 50% were not wearing a helmet.

A bike or pedestrian crash is more likely to happen in an urban area, however, a fatal or serious injury crash is more likely to occur in a rural area due to higher speeds, according to the study.

The study included some positive trends.

Statewide seatbelt usage has been increasing over the past two decades. This past year experienced a usage rate of 90.2%, based on an annual seatbelt survey.

Occupants not wearing a seatbelt are more likely to suffer a serious injury or fatality. Of the total statewide occupant fatalities, one out of three were not wearing a seatbelt.

CECIL — Don Radloff had to pause when he was asked about the personal benefits of organizing and leading 50 years of ice fishing derbies on White Clay Lake.

"I guess it's being satisfied we had another successful fishing derby," he said.

The 2020 edition of the derby, hosted by the White Clay Lake Sportsmen's Club, was held this past weekend at the 234-acre lake about a five-mile drive east of Cecil.

Pressed for more detail, he added, "It's spending time with the kids and other members of the club. I'm already looking forward to 2021 and a bigger and better derby."

A bigger and better 2021 derby requires besting \$8,600, this year's total income from the derby weekend, according to Kim Schneider, sportsmen's club secretary.

Radloff, a retired Cecil farmer, accused by other — younger — members around him of being older than the invention of the fishing pole, is one of the charter members of the sportsmen's Club. He pledged to keep working with the derby as long as he's able.

Other charter members still active include Gary Wolf and Shirley Wagner. Kent Heller, club president, said the charter members have been "the backbone of the club."

"There was no way we thought this would last 50 years," Radloff said.

There have been other events during the years that served as fundraisers for the club that annually stocks 3,000 walleyes in White Clay and Pensaukee Lakes as well as raises and releases upwards of 1,000 pheasants each fall.

Radloff, as he sat in the warmth of the White Clay Lake Lodge, recalled coming up with the idea of a parade that ended at the Lodge that went for about five years along with a summer festival. He also remembered some tug-of-war contests where the losers were dragged into a water hazard. Radloff said with some satisfaction that he always was at the end of the rope

and avoided a watery fate.

These events have also helped to pay for the docks around White Clay Lake.

None of them have equaled the ice fishing derby, held on the same weekend every year, in longevity or success, Radloff added, crediting the membership and a lot of volunteers with keeping the event alive.

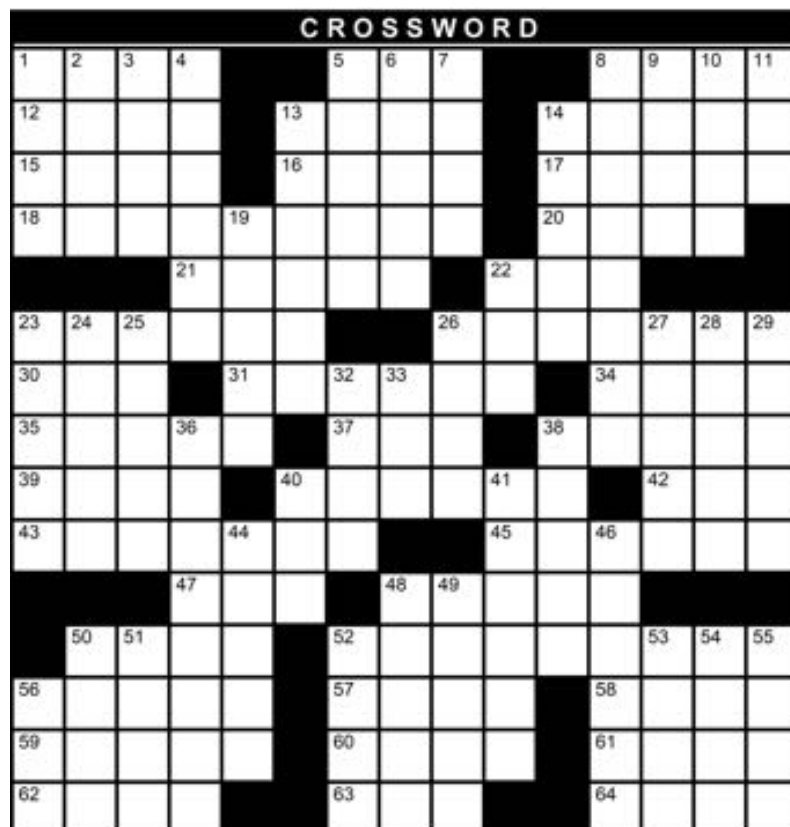

Club entering second season

TIGERTON — The Embarrass River Rugby Club, operating out of Marion and Tigerton, is recruiting for its second season.

Rugby as a sport has similarities to American football and soccer. It is a tackle-oriented sport and most players get hooked by the physicality of the sport after their first in-game experiences. Safety and fair play are fundamental to the sport that requires speed, endurance and strength.

When asked about fears of injury, certified coach and referee Brian Gleason said, “My kids have played rugby since they were in early grade school and I played for 13-plus seasons. I feel the game is safer than many alternatives and I have been around the game long enough to have plenty of anecdotal evidence.”

Gleason also pointed out that many NFL and NCAA football programs are looking to rugby for safer and more effective tackling techniques, includ-

ing the Seattle Seahawks and Ohio State University.

Gleason, who also teaches at Marion Junior/Senior High School, has shared his knowledge of the game with physical education classes at the school, the Bowler/Gresham Thundercatz football program, and spent time introducing rugby to summer school students in Tigerton last summer.

“The game of rugby is for everyone ... there is an idea that you need to be a big brute to be successful in rugby and that could not be farther from the truth,” said Gleason. “The sport relies a great deal on speed and being able to create and utilize space which is not apparent in highlight films of big tackles.”

Mahomes leads Chiefs to Super Bowl win with late surge

Kansas City scores 21 fourth-quarter points

MIAMI GARDENS, FLA. — Uncomfortable and under duress for much of the game, Patrick Mahomes suddenly recaptured his mojo and lifted Andy Reid and the Chiefs to a Super Bowl victory, the team's first NFL championship in a half-century.

All it took was falling behind by double digits in the postseason again. Then Mahomes, selected MVP, hit two long passes on touchdown drives for a 31-20 victory Sunday over the San Francisco 49ers.

“We never lost faith,” Mahomes said. “That’s the biggest thing. Every-

body on this team, no one had their head down. We believed in each other. That’s what we preached all year long.”

The vaunted 49ers defense wilted late, particularly on passes of 44 yards to Tyreek Hill and 38 to Sammy Watkins. The touchdowns came on short throws to Travis Kelce to cut the deficit to three and to Damien Williams for the lead. The first NFL title in Chiefs coach Reid’s two-decade career was clinched by Williams’ 38-yard TD run, sending red-clad Chiefs fan into chants of “Andy!” “Andy!”

Reid, 61, won a Super Bowl ring with the 1996 Packers while in charge of tight ends. He’s been seeking one as a head coach since being hired by Philadelphia in 1999. The Eagles lost in their only trip to the big game after the 2004 season.

“This is what it’s all about,” Reid

said. “What a great team, great coaches. Appreciate every bit of it.”

The Chiefs trailed 24-0 and 17-7 in their previous playoff games. This time, the Chiefs nearly didn’t have the time for a comeback.

Kansas City’s fans in the crowd of 62,417 at Hard Rock Stadium got little opportunity to chant and do the tomahawk chop as KC fell behind 20-10 with 17½ minutes remaining.

Mahomes even threw his second interception of the night after that. But then came the kind of Mahomes magic that makes him special.

He found Hill, whose bobble led to the second San Francisco pick, for 44 yards on a third-and-15 — the first long pass completed by Kansas City. A 20-yard pass interference call on Tarvarius Moore, who had that earlier pick, put the ball at the 1 and Kelce was wide open for the score.

The Chiefs defense confounded by the Niners’ misdirection much of the game got stingy and forced a three-and-out. Mahomes soon hit Watkins down the right sideline behind Richard Sherman for a 38-yard gain, leading to Williams’ first score.

San Francisco had nothing left in the fourth quarter, and its coach, Kyle Shanahan saw yet another late-game meltdown by his team. Three years ago, as offensive coordinator in Atlanta, he was part of the Falcons’ collapse and loss in overtime to New England.

Kansas City, an original AFL franchise, won the final Super Bowl before the full merger, beating Minnesota in 1970. Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt even coined the phrase Super Bowl.

Now the Hunt family can add a Vince Lombardi Trophy to the Lamar Hunt Trophy earned with the AFC crown.
