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ECRE maintains water at permitted levels, records show

Personal accounts find Shawano Lake, channel, Wolf River pool low

Water in Shawano Lake, the channel and the Wolf River pool above the paper mill dam is being maintained at the height required by the Federal Energy Resources Commission, countering recent complaints of low levels.

A chart provided by Eagle Creek Renewable Energy (ECRE), the dam's operator, shows "the level is at 802.5 (feet) above mean sea level (msl) just as its permit requires," according to Bill Monfre, a Shawano Area Waterways Management board member working on a long-term solution to the ongoing water level controversy, on Monday.

Some reports of damage to watercraft have also been made.

"Eagle Creek is doing what it's supposed to do and has been since Nov. 15, 2020," Monfre said. FERC in June 2020 accepted the ECRE proposal to keep the level at a "target normal elevation" of 802.9 feet or 0.4 foot above the authorized normal impoundment elevation of 802.5 feet between May 15 and Nov. 15. The lower water level in winter months was supposed to reduce high water and ice damage to properties.

Monfre found out the hard way as both of his personal watercraft are being repaired after sucking rocks into their intakes from water too shallow for launching. He said he had chosen a commercial boat landing as the water at his home was too shallow to launch the craft.

The SAWM board member said he didn't know if his experience was common because it's early in the season and there aren't a lot of boaters out.

David Korth, Washington town chairman, said on May 10, "The water is low, how much low, I don't know."

He added, based on the township putting in the Swan Acres boat landing dock on Shawano Lake, the level is as much as 12 inches low.

Brian Moesch, Wescott town chairman, said his personal observation, as well as talking to residents, is that

water levels have been too low but he hadn't heard of any damage to boats or other problems so far this year.

Moesch added the township supports the 802.9 year-round level.

"That's the historical level, and it seems to work out well," he said.

SAWM is working with ECRE, local governments, fishing groups, and other stakeholders is to restore the lake to its historic level, Monfre said. The towns of Wescott and Washington have provided letters of support for the 802.9 level, according to the town chairs. Additional letters of support have also been received by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services, and SAWM is soliciting other expressions of support.

SAWM continues to pursue two goals — a temporary amendment for this year as has been done in the previous five years and a permanent solution, setting the water level at its historic level of 802.9 feet year-round. The group expects to send preliminary documents to the USFWS and DNR this week, Monfre said.

Monfre said he was hopeful that FERC would act on the higher water

levels by June and expressed confidence the water levels will be restored for the Fourth of July weekend, traditionally one of the most popular times in the summer attracting boaters into the area.

David Fox, an ECRE employee charged with seeing the change through the regulatory process, said, "It's certainly possible for FERC to order a higher water level by the Fourth of July weekend."

Because ECRE has requested a temporary exemption for a period of years, Fox said he expected the regulatory review to be fairly routine and move through the process fairly promptly.

Fox said he wanted to pursue a two-year temporary amendment before addressing the permanent amendment. An additional year "will buy us adequate time to get permitting process done" for the permanent change," he added.

Fox said the dam operator is "interested in balancing all of the interest of all stakeholders" and has not seen any negative impact from the higher water level to ECRE and its operation of the dam.

Kaquatosh sentenced for burglarizing uncle

Keshena man gets 2 years in prison, 3 years supervised release in 2020 crime

A Keshena man with a lengthy criminal history was sentenced Thursday in federal court to two years in prison plus three years supervised release for burglary of a relative's residence and unlawful possession of firearms.

Austin A. Kaquatosh, 28, faced a statutory maximum sentence of 19½ years in prison after a June 8, 2020, burglary of an uncle's home. He entered the unoccupied residence, stole valuables, including firearms, and sold some in an attempt to obtain drugs, his attorney, Eric Maciolek, wrote the court.

He committed the burglary while on supervised release for another offense.

Kaquatosh's prior convictions, dating to 2010, made it unlawful for him to possess firearms.

Even under the less severe advisory sentencing guidelines, Kaquatosh faced 14½ years in prison, which Maciolek wrote overstates the seriousness of his conduct as some offenses occurred when he was still a juvenile.

"(H)e has a significant number of criminal convictions, but he is not one of America's worst criminal offenders," Maciolek wrote.

Kaquatosh was only 14 years old when he committed a burglary. He was 17 when he was convicted of fleeing an officer and would have been under juvenile jurisdiction in any other

state except Wisconsin, according to Maciolek.

Deciding that case in adult court, instead of juvenile court, added to the potential prison time he faced under the guideline range.

"This is a harsh sentencing range (120 to 150 months in prison) considering his age, (and) potential for rehabilitation," Maciolek wrote, who asked for an 18-month sentence.

In pleading guilty to burglary and felon in possession of firearm on Feb. 1, Kaquatosh took responsibility for his crimes and realizes that "his actions were destructive to himself, his family and the community," Maciolek wrote.

Kaquatosh is the father of four children, ages 10 and under, with three currently in foster care and his grandmother caring for the youngest.

Drug addiction has been a problem for Kaquatosh, who has overdosed on synthetic marijuana and methamphetamine and hasn't completed outpatient treatment programs.

Kaquatosh has never held a verifiable job, according to Maciolek, and has relied on the charity of family members before stealing from one of them.

His client doesn't pose a threat to the community as Kaquatosh likely knew that his uncle's home would be unoccupied when he chose to enter it, and he did return most of the stolen items, Maciolek wrote.

Completion of drug treatment while incarcerated and steady employment after his release are the keys to his client's successful future, Maciolek wrote. Kaquatosh is motivated to stay sober and employed as it would help him to regain custody of his children and to be a good father.

Bonduel, Shawano schools lift mask mandates

Both districts still suggest masking, even though it's no longer required

Masks are no longer required in the Bonduel and Shawano school districts.

At the May 3 Bonduel School Board meeting, the board voted to overturn the mask mandate, requiring masks to be worn in the school district. The change to the mandate went through on a 5-2 vote, with Dale Bergsbaken and Nina Rouse voting against.

Around 50 people were in attendance at the meeting to voice their opinion on what they think should happen with the masks, as well as hear the board's discussion around it.

According to Superintendent Joe Dawidziak audience members came prepared with information regarding masks.

"There were people in the audience who brought articles about health and vaccinations," said Dawidziak. "One person did a demonstration with a mannequin."

Dawidziak said that he had a recommendation in writing to keep the mask mandate in place, but the school board voted to end it.

He also said that he thought that the change in the mask mandate from schools around Bonduel played a factor in the board's decision to remove the mandate.

"We had a representative from Coleman at the meeting talking about the mandate in Coleman," said Dawidziak.

The change in the mandate went into place on the morning of May 5. Dawidziak said that because there was so much discussion at the board meeting that he would not have been able to effectively communicate the change to families by the morning of May 4, so he held off until May 5.

He noted that the audience was split on their opinions on keeping the mask mandate in place or not.

According to Dawidziak, there

are still contingency plans in place if someone were to contract COVID-19.

"If someone were to contract COVID-19 in the school district, that person would be sent home," said Dawidziak. "If the infected person had siblings, they would be sent home as well. We will request testing and we will contact trace."

Dawidziak said that he has concerns for large gatherings towards the end of the year.

"I do have a little bit of a concern for school gatherings, whether it be games, events or graduation," said Dawidziak.

He also said that the student's school experience was kept in his mind during the school board's vote.

"This is good for students who want to have a better high school experience," said Dawidziak.

Dawidziak noticed that he is seeing less masks in the school after the mandate was changed.

In the Shawano School District, masks are not required to be worn within the school district buildings. Superintendent Randi Anderson said that a question was brought up about the mask mandate in the school district.

According to Anderson, she directed the parent toward the plan that the school district had in place in regards to COVID-19.

"We had a plan in place to use a mask mandate in conjunction with the state's mask mandate," said Anderson.

Anderson said that they never implemented their own mask mandate and the only mandate that was in place was with the state. When Gov. Tony Evers' mask mandate for the state had expired, the district followed suit, as outlined in their plan.

Anderson also said that Shawano School District still encourages the use of masks in the school district as well as practicing other COVID-19 measures.

"We will continue to maintain mitigation measures including physical distancing, cohorting, frequent hand-washing, daily full-cleaning protocols and contact tracing in coordination with our local health department within our facilities," said Anderson.

Paiser Family Dairy announces expansion

County accepting public comments through May 17

The Paiser Family Dairy, a Shawano County farm, is planning to expand its herd in the near future, it was announced on May 7.

The dairy submitted an application with Shawano County for a live-stock expansion license that would allow it to have up to 1,264 animal units. Such applications are required for any agricultural operation when there are more than 500 animal units on the land, according to county conservationist Scott Frank.

According to Frank, the last application that the Paisers submitted was on April 3, 2013, when it applied to have up to 999 animal units. The 1,900-acre farm is located at W9388 Butternut Road in the Town of Richmond.

A final decision from the county is expected no later than July 28, but Frank said it was likely the decision would come much sooner. The county has up to 90 days to make its decision to grant or deny the license.

Erik Lietz with Oakridge Engineering, based in Chippewa Falls, spoke on behalf of the dairy and has been working with owner Trevor Paiser. He said that the term “animal units” does not specifically mean the number of animals. A milking cow is considered to be 1.4 animal units, and Lietz said the dairy plans to have 650 milking cows plus replacement stock.

“There’s dairy cattle, and then there’s other animals — beef, swine,

poultry,” Lietz said.

The expansion includes a new barn, which will be to the west of existing facilities, and there will be a new round, concrete storage tank that will be used to house animal waste, according to Lietz. The tank will be able to hold up to 189 days worth of waste; the minimum requirement from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is 180 days.

“If you’re driving along the road, you’re not even going to be able to see the new waste storage facility,” Lietz said.

Naomi Schroeder and her husband, Gene, own property east of the Paiser Family Dairy, and she had nothing but good things to say about the dairy at a county meeting to gather public input.

“We go there quite often, especially in the summertime, because we

have a cabin there,” Schroeder said. “We have never had any issues with odor or manure or runoff or complaints. We both feel they’ve been doing everything they’re supposed to be doing in the past, and we don’t see any reason they wouldn’t do it in the future.”

The county is accepting public comments through May 17.

Ho-Chunk tribe reports progress in coronavirus vaccinations

The Ho-Chunk Nation is seeing some progress in its coronavirus vaccinations, a member of the Ho-Chunk Tribal Legislature reported to the Shawano County Tribal Affairs Committee on May 6.

Rep. Larry Walker Jr. told the committee that efforts to vaccinate tribal members spread across the state, including Wittenberg, have so far been successful. The tribe has

work for the tribe.

“We’re pretty spread out throughout the state, being non-

distributed almost 13,000 vaccinations across the reservation, he said, including 270 in Shawano County. Most of the 270 shots include tribal members and employees who

contiguous, but we have our primary sites where we hand out the vaccinations — one in Black River Falls and one in Wisconsin Dells,” Walker said. “We also do some mobile areas, as well, with the inclusion of Wittenberg, Madison, Milwaukee and La Crosse.”

Most of the mobile vaccinations have been done through pre-registration, and the appointments have quickly been filled, according to Walker. However, the tribe is also opening up for surrounding com-

munities whenever they have extra shots not being used.

“When we do not have enough people, or some people do not show up for their appointments, we can also register onsite at the Siga Fun-maker Community Center and be able to start with their first or their second dose,” Walker said. “This is not only for tribal members and employees but for the surrounding communities, as well.”

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WEDC grant to help expand Gresham fab lab

Additional laptops, other equipment will help school be on cutting edge of career learning

Gresham Community School will be able to get more equipment for its new fabrication lab with the help of a grant from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation.

WEDC gave the school a \$19,500 grant to purchase equipment such as laptops and printers to add to what was already provided to the school via a \$100,000 gift from the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribal Council. With the required matching funding from the Gresham School District, the school will have almost \$30,000 to purchase the items.

Tim Bosman, lab director, had dealt with WEDC funding when he was a teacher in Antigo, and he felt Gresham could benefit from the funding, as well.

Twelve laptops will be purchased with state-of-the-art video editing software and other programs to enable the creation of wood and metal items, according to Bosman. Three-dimensional printers will help to make plastic items, and large-format printers will allow students and staff to print banners for the community.

"That will allow us to do more with art, with canvas prints, the graphics end of things," Bosman said.

The grant will also help purchase updated equipment for the shop room, including tools for the wood computerized numerical control machine, sanders and a "decent" drill press, Bosman said.

"We've got a good start from Stockbridge, who really helped us out and got us some nice equipment in here," Bosman said. "Our shop, we still need to update everything in there."

The school will be able to apply for additional WEDC funding two more times in future years, according to Bosman, up to \$25,000 with each attempt. If successful, it could make Gresham a state-of-the-art location for community printing and development needs, as the school could get an additional laser engraver and other equipment to test metals.

"We're looking at how to make everything more efficient and uti-

lize this equipment that we have, to take it a step farther," Bosman said. "We can apply for it again next year, and I think we probably will."

Gresham has its one-to-one learning program with Chromebooks to help individual students in class, but those computers are not designed to handle complex programs for CNC and three-dimensional printing, which is why the school is purchasing other laptops to assist middle and high school students in their technology

education classes. There are currently only 16 laptops for the whole school that can be used for fab lab projects, according to Bosman, and if the two teachers in the fab lab have classes at the same time, that presents a problem.

"(Chromebooks) are not what the industry is using," Bosman said. "We want to get (students) into college and career-ready end of it. As we're looking at the classes that are coming about next year and going away from the exploratory classes,

we're going to be treating it like an apprenticeship program in a sense. They have to get the experience, not just developing the skills but the interpersonal stuff like being in the class on time and getting jobs done on time, working together — all those readiness skills."

The school hopes to expand opportunities to work with businesses in Gresham and Shawano and provide some of their needs while teaching students trades that would prepare them to find jobs and careers after high school. Bosman hopes to get more community involvement in the summer and fall to give students projects to test their skills.

Bosman added that not to have the WEDC grant would limit the small school at a time when technology is growing by leaps and bounds and make it more difficult for students to compete in the world.

"Life would go on. That's the one thing about a rural school is you make do with what you have," Bosman said. "With not getting it, it would have made things quite difficult with trading out who gets the laptops, who gets to use things. For making good use of the CNC and other equipment, it would minimize the extent we could go."

WEDC's Fab Labs Grant Program is designed to support hands-on learning in the subjects of science, technology, engineering, art and mathematics by assisting public school districts with equipment purchases for instructional and educational purposes, according to a state press release.

"WEDC has invested over \$3.4 million for the past six years to provide 95 school districts across the state with the equipment necessary to help students learn high-demand skills, including technology, manufacturing and engineering," said Missy Hughes, secretary and CEO of WEDC. "Fab labs benefit not only the students themselves with important technology and career skills, but they also benefit Wisconsin employers, who will be able to find workers with the right skills to allow their companies to grow and thrive."

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Transgender woman's case goes to Supreme Court

'Ella' seeks to find sex offender registry unconstitutional

A transgendered Shawano woman wants the Wisconsin Supreme Court to find the state's juvenile sex offender registry unconstitutional as it allegedly violates her right to free expression and constitutes cruel and unusual punishment.

Ella is a pseudonym used by a 20-year transgendered woman who was convicted as a boy, identified only as C.G., in a 2016 sexual assault of a boy. Ella is challenging the state law that requires the Wisconsin Department of Corrections to maintain a registry of sex offenders by name and alias. The statute prohibits the offender from changing his or her name or identifying him or herself by a name not recognized by the DOC.

After serving a sentence of detention in juvenile facilities, Ella asked Shawano County Circuit Judge William Kussel Jr. to stay the order to register as a juvenile sex offender. Kussel denied the request

in 2017, and earlier this year, after several extensions, a state appeals court upheld Kussel.

In affirming Kussel, the District III Court of Appeals concluded that the sex offender registry law prohibiting Ella's changing her legal name doesn't restrict her First Amendment right to free expression. Even if it did, it is permissible because the restriction is gender or content neutral.

The court also found that the registry law is constitutional because "it furthers an important government interest in an incidentally restrictive manner," Judge Mark Seidl wrote.

The government's interest is law enforcement's effective use of the registry and that outweighs any harm to Ella caused by her requiring to register her legal name, according to the appeals opinion.

The appeals court also rejected Ella's claim that having her legal name on the registry not matching the gender she presents "outs" her as a male without her consent each

time she has to supply her legal name. That constitutes cruel and unusual punishment in violation of the Eighth Amendment, she had argued.

In a 2000 ruling, the state Supreme Court found that the sex offender registration requirement doesn't constitute punishment because it doesn't intend to punish sex offenders but protects the public and assists police.

The appeals court said it is bound by the higher court's ruling and requires it to conclude that the registry isn't a form of cruel and unusual punishment.

The state Supreme Court announced May 7 that it was accepting the case but has not set the case for oral argument and gave Ella's attorneys until May 27 to file the first brief in the case.

Ella's attorneys and attorneys for Juvenile Law Center, National Center for Lesbian Rights, and Trans Law Help Wisconsin did not return calls for comment.

Ella's conviction stemmed from when she was 15 and, with the help of a girl, held down a 15-year-old

boy with disabilities so Ella could perform oral sex on him. The boy was 5 feet, 10 inches and 110 pounds; Ella was 6 feet, 5 inches and 345 pounds.

The boy's parents learned of the offense when they searched his cellphone and found Facebook messages of the incident.

Ella was sentenced from six to 10 months juvenile detention and required that she be listed on the state's sex offender registry. After a second unprovoked attack, which required hospital treatment, Ella was transferred from Lincoln Hills to Mendota Juvenile Treatment Center partly because she was transitioning as a youth from a male to a female identity.

After being released from Mendota, Ella requested Kussel to stay her registration on the sex offender list. A psychologist, specializing in sex offender treatment, said that the public wouldn't be protected by Ella's registration as a sex offender but there was a possibility that registration would harm her. Kussel denied the request, and the appeal began.

ThedaCare doc discusses symptoms and care for pink eye

It happens: You notice your eye turning red, and maybe it's itchy or watering.

Maybe it feels like you've have sand stuck in it, and you wonder what's going on. Is this pink eye, and how can you make it go away?

Pink eye, or acute conjunctivitis, is an infection or inflammation affecting the conjunctiva, the thin membrane that covers the white part of the eye. It's a common eye problem that can impact both adults and children.

Patients experiencing pink eye normally have one of three types: bacterial, viral or allergic, according to Dr. Felix Odathil, family medicine physician at ThedaCare Physicians-New London. Viral and bacterial conjunctivitis are both highly contagious and are spread through directly or indirect contact with someone else who is infected.

"Bacterial conjunctivitis usually has thick green or yellow discharge from one eye," he said. "That infection can spread to the second eye later, with no other systemic signs."

Viral conjunctivitis, on the other hand, usually manifests in watery, thin strands of mucous coming from both eyes. Patients may feel like their eyes are gritty

or burning, and often report feeling like sand is in their eyes. Viral conjunctivitis may be a symptom of the onset of other diseases, including COVID-19. People can also experience pink eye along with colds and respiratory infections.

"Both bacterial and viral conjunctivitis are contagious," said Odathil. "Washing your hands frequently and avoiding contact with others can help reduce the risk of contracting conjunctivitis."

Other ways to reduce your risk of contracting pink eye include the following:

- Avoid touching your eyes with your hands.

- Don't share eye cosmetics such as mascara or eyeliner, and don't share towels and washcloths.

- Regularly change your pillowcases and use clean washcloths and towels each day.

- Do not wear contact lenses longer than recommended and clean them properly.

A third type, allergic conjunctivitis, is associated with congestion, sneezing, thin watery discharge from both eyes, and "allergic shiners," Odathil said.

"It can be activated when the body produces histamines in reaction to irritants such as pollen, medicines or pet dander," he said. "The inflammation from allergic conjunctivitis can cause itching, tearing, nasal discharge and sneezing as well. Allergy eye drops might provide some relief of the issues."

According to Odathil, antibiotics can help speed healing from bacterial conjunctivitis, but other types of pink eye don't benefit. Most cases of pink eye will heal within a week or two. Over-the-counter eye

drops, or artificial tears, can help with symptoms. Cold compresses also can help reduce redness and swelling.

"If you do notice symptoms of pink eye, call your provider to determine whether you should be seen," he said. "Symptoms that indicate you may need medical attention include pain, a very red eye, discharge, crusty eyes upon waking, blurry or foggy vision, or sensitivity to light. If you were exposed to an irritant, such as a chemical splash, or your eye was recently scratched, you also should visit your provider."

Newborns could experience pink eye because of a blocked tear duct and require a visit to their provider. Pink eye can lead to inflammation in the cornea in both adults and children that can adversely affect vision.

"People who have weakened immune systems should also see their provider if they have symptoms of pink eye," Odathil said. "It's important to receive proper treatment to avoid more serious eye problems."

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Panel looks at how to spend compact funds

County eyes spending \$82K from Ho-Chunk on park improvements in Wittenberg, Tigerton

The Shawano County Tribal Affairs Committee could get a chance to have a say in what capital projects get funded with gaming compact money the county gets from the Ho-Chunk Nation.

Annually, the county gets \$82,500 from the tribe as part of its compact with the state, accounting for the amount of land the tribe occupies within the county's borders. The money has gone toward capital improvement projects, but the committee, which is responsible for maintaining relations between the county and the area tribes, has not had a voice in determining which projects get funded with the compact money.

"In the past, we've never had a say with the Ho-Chunk's money," said Supervisor Kathy Luebke at the committee's May 6 meeting.

The committee is looking at asking for some of the funds to be applied toward projects at the parks on the western portion of the county, including Hayman Falls County Park near Tigerton and Wilson Lake County Park in Wittenberg. According to Keith Marquardt, county parks director, the county has already been making strides with setting up campsites at the two parks — six at Hayman Falls and four at Wilson

Lake. Self-registration posts are being added this month, and the sites include fire pits and picnic tables.

"There's some leveling we have to do with our tractors at Wilson Lake," Marquardt said, noting that a county conservation grant was used to pay for constructing the campsites. "They should be up and running by next week at the latest."

The committee asked Rep. Larry Walker Jr. of the Ho-Chunk Tribal Legislature if the tribe had any preferences for where the money went, but Walker said it was something the legislature hadn't really discussed.

"The concentration of our Ho-Chunks (for Shawano County) are in the Wittenberg area, so any projects would be appropriate in that vicinity," Walker said.

Marquardt said some projects that the parks department is considering putting in a walking trail at Wilson Lake, and in order to make a full-mile loop, a boardwalk would need to be constructed to get over wetland areas. Also, there are plans to clean up the beach area around the lake, with Marquardt noting the area has become "overgrown" with weeds.

"The lake level has gone up, so there's not really a beach area," Marquardt said.

There are also preliminary plans to bring electricity to the campsites, according to Marquardt.

"Campsites are a little more popular when there's electricity available," he said.

Other suggestions included cross-country ski trails on the west side of the county and improving Wi-Fi at the libraries in Wittenberg, Birnamwood, Tigerton and Mattoon.

Marquardt noted he has not done any official number crunching or filled out a capital project request. Any capital project requests for 2022 need to be completed by mid-June.

Supervisor William Switalla, who lives in Wittenberg, suggested an extension of the existing fishing dock as a potential improvement at Wilson Lake.

"Because of the way things are overgrown, it's hard to shore fish out there," Switalla said. "If we could maybe extend that further."

Administrative Coordinator James Davel suggested that it might be possible to fund some of the suggested projects with money coming in from the American Recovery Act. The only problem, he said, is that the federal government has not provided any guidance or boundaries on what can and cannot be paid for with the funding.

"We have to use those funds by 2024," Davel said. "They've got to be gone. They can't go into a bank account."

Davel said he'd spoken with state Sen. Robert Cowles and Rep. Gary Tauchen when they were in Shawano a week earlier, and they both told him that the state has not received any input from the federal government, either.

"It's stuck in the bureaucracy in D.C. right now, because they said, 'We're going to give this money, blah, blah, blah,' and they passed it, but the people who execute that, the workers, they're like, 'Wait a minute. We've got to put the rules on it,'" Davel said. "It's really nuts."

Regardless of the status of the American Recovery Act funds, Luebke made it clear she wanted the committee to weigh in on projects using tribal compact funds.

"I don't want another year to go by and the tribal (affairs) committee not being able to submit something (to the capital improvement projects committee)," Luebke said.

Supervisor Deb Noffke recommended that the committee look at consulting the tribes more on capital projects that utilize their compact money and see if they have any needs that the county could fulfill.

"There are real community needs, and it would be nice to take the money and apply it to something more meaningful," Noffke said.

Cost to replace jail windows causes sticker shock

Price tag goes from \$12K to \$42K due to having to replace metal frames

A project to replace windows at the Shawano County Jail has jumped up in price more than three-fold, and members of the county's public safety committee are not happy about it.

Greg Nelson, the jail administrator, told the committee May 5 that plans to replace the windows in the shower area have gone from a \$12,000 price tag to about \$42,000 due to the discovery of decaying

frames around the windows. Nelson said the project was approved several years ago.

"We agreed to fund that out of the inmate welfare account," Nelson said. "It has become a much bigger problem than just replacing the glass."

Nelson said the \$42,000 quote came from Felts Construction.

"This is one of those things where they dig into it and we hope that the frames and the windows are the only issues," Nelson said.

Nelson recommended using the jail assessment fund, noting that when defendants appear in court for a hearing, they are assessed a fee that goes to the jail for maintenance and operations. The fund is under the purview of the county's maintenance

department, according to Nelson.

He also suggested using the sheriff's department carryover fund, which is a portion of unused money left from the previous budget year that can be used when issues like the jail windows arise.

"There's money available in there," Nelson said.

Supervisor Theresa Serrano expressed frustration with the project's bottom line going up more than \$30,000.

"I know things have increased, but \$30,000? It's crazy," Serrano said. "I think we need to do our homework and get a second opinion. You always want to go shopping around locally, but I think these guys are gouging us, and I would respectfully request a second bid before we move on, and then

you'll know what your numbers are."

Nelson pointed out that the increase in price is due to having to fabricate new frames, remove the old ones, put the new ones in and fortify them with concrete. He said the county could solicit additional quotes, if the committee felt it was best to so. The issue came up during the jail report and was not specifically on the agenda, so the committee couldn't vote on the matter.

Still, Serrano said, getting additional bids would be a good idea.

"I would feel more comfortable with a second opinion on the costs, and then we'll want to know where the funds are going to come from," Serrano said.

Understanding supply chain will help to lower drug costs

Even before the COVID-19 pandemic hit, one of the most significant issues facing Wisconsinites was the high cost of prescription medications. With routine health care and medication being vital to a patient's well-being, increases in medication costs can create untenable, unsustainable situations for our most vulnerable — including deciding between medications and other daily necessities. This is completely unacceptable.

The good news is that recently our state lawmakers reached across party lines to find a solution for all Wisconsinites to have better access to affordable quality health care, especially in the face of a global pandemic. Lawmakers passed and Gov. Tony Evers signed into law a bipartisan bill that will benefit all Wisconsinites and lower prescription medication costs for patients at the pharmacy counter.

The new law is an important step to improving patients' ability to access affordable care, increasing transparency in the prescription drug pricing process and reining in the power of pharmacy benefit managers (PBMs).

For too long, we have witnessed pharmacies and patients struggle with medication costs resulting from the one-sided nature of PBMs. It will help the health care system greatly now that lawmakers are finally beginning to hold them accountable.

Few people outside of the health care industry understand the role of PBMs. Until a recent Supreme Court ruling, PBMs flew under the radar of state and federal regulation, abdicating government oversight. Unfortunately, it has led to PBMs gaining significant influence in the prescription drug market, with PBMs deciding which medications are covered by insurance plans, where patients can pick up prescriptions and how much pharmacy providers will be reimbursed. Making matters worse, as the

predatory practices of PBMs become exposed and they receive more scrutiny, like here in Wisconsin, they are trying to divert attention. Unfortunately for pharmacists, PBMs have begun attacking and mischaracterizing the only advocates we have to try and level the playing field — pharmacy services administrative organizations (PSAOs).

With PBMs having so much influence, their contracts are often take it or leave it. How can a Wisconsin small business owner take on corporations worth billions of dollars? Whether they want to or not, pharmacies are often forced into contractual relationships with PBMs so we are able to serve patients. PSAOs help give pharmacies an amplified voice during PBM contract negotiations and ease time-consuming administrative burdens.

PSAOs certainly do not solve all of the problems, but they help independent pharmacies navigate the complex market PBMs have created and give us a seat at the table that we would not otherwise have. It is crucial to our businesses that PSAOs do not become collateral damage to increased PBM scrutiny.

Understanding the prescription drug supply chain is the only way we will lower the cost of medication meaningfully and permanently for patients. Yes, it is complex, but Band-Aids on the health care system are no longer acceptable. Our new PBM law in Wisconsin is a step in the right direction, and I hope lawmakers continue to hold PBMs accountable without buying into their diversion tactics.

5 Shawano teens earn Eagle Scout honors

Boys complete various service projects to better community

Five Shawano Boy Scouts were recently honored with achieving their goal of being an Eagle Scout.

The five scouts, Will Crawford, Damon Montour, Chris Teeter, Owen Krueger and Gabe Bohm, were honored May 2 at Camp Joseph north of Shawano.

Unlike a typical celebration, those who were allowed to attend were limited to four guests per scout. A typical celebration would consist of family members of the scout being honored as well as extended family.

According to Troop 32 Scoutmaster Bob Smits, the five boys who were honored rose the ranks within the Boy Scout organization. The ranks are tenderfoot, second class, first class, star, life and finally eagle.

"Becoming an Eagle Scout is a lengthy process," said Smits. "There are no guarantees to becoming an eagle."

Smits said that it was a unique situation having five boys honored together, rather than one or two.

Troop 32 has seen close to 25 boys become Eagle Scouts in the last 10 years, with 53 total in the troop's existence.

Smits said that only 4% of all scouts end up becoming Eagle Scouts.

In order to become an Eagle Scout, Boy Scouts must finish several steps along the way. These steps include earning the 12 required merit badges and nine elective merit badges, serving in a leadership role within the troop for a total of 16 months, and serving at least 13 hours on a service project. In addition to these steps, the Boy Scouts also create a proposal for a service project, they draw up the plan and they lead a team of scouts to bring the project to fruition.

The process of becoming an Eagle Scout ends with the Boy Scouts speaking to the board of review from the Bay Lakes Council, based in Appleton.

Crawford completed a project that revolved around building beds for dogs at the Shawano County Humane Society. Montour moved and refurbished a playground set for Bridge the Gap Inc. Teeter cleaned and restored

paths, as well as built benches for St. James retreat. Krueger built a pergola and rest area along the Mountain Bay Trail for Shawano Pathways. Bohm added landscaping around the flag poles at the Veterans of Foreign Wars post in Shawano. In total, scouts and volunteers put in a combined 430 hours of time.

"The projects are not about the length of time," said Smits. "They are about the process — the scouts learn how to create a proposal, how to draw up a plan, they figure out who to get into communication with, and they serve as the leader of the project."

According to Smits, the projects are meant to give back to the community.

"The community supports the Boy Scouts by donating money or items, giving us a place to hold meetings, supporting fundraisers and giving their time to share talents and places of business," said Smits. "These projects give back to the community."

Smits said that through the process of becoming an Eagle Scout and leading these projects, the boys learn lessons that can be used for the rest of their lives.

"These lessons do not end at 18 years old," said Smits. "This process teaches them leadership and builds character — things they will use for the rest of their lives."

He said perseverance is taught in the Boy Scouts as they rise the ranks to Eagle Scout.

"The final steps of this journey were not easy in the year of a pandemic, but each persevered and reached their goal," said Smits.

According to Smits, Troop 32 has 37 scouts and he hopes that the number continues to grow.

"The Boy Scouts are a phenomenal organization," said Smits. "It is a great foundation for the youth to become great adults."

MIHS teachers causing wisdom to sprout with plants

The Menominee name for the month of May is Pahkwan-kesoq — The Budding Moon. While many Wisconsinites will spend the month cultivating their own gardens in anticipation of a fruitful crop, Menominee Indian High School students will mark Pahkwan-kesoq through culturally grounded cross-curricular activities centered on planting and gardening.

Although the pandemic has halted some educational opportunities due to COVID-19 restrictions, MIHS has used its school's shutdown as a catalyst for monthly collaborative teaching

initiatives that span their course offerings. Yet, this is more than a theme for MIHS — it's demonstrative evidence of how the school uses a restorative practices based approach to teach the whole student body about their culture.

The school begins each month with Menominee Language and Culture Coordinator John Teller Jr. and Menominee Language, Culture, and History Teacher Dawn Wilber presenting the wisdom embedded in that month's teachings, thereby enabling the entire staff to gain an appreciation of the tribe's seasonal practices.

"The goal is for our teachers to gain insight on our tribe's culture and then recognize how they can infuse it into their classroom teachings," Wilber said.

MIHS's mission states that it strives to "provide a safe learning environment that allows every child an opportunity to succeed culturally, intellectually, academically, emotionally, socially, and physically." The connectivity of this teaching strategy is evidenced in how the school instructs its students through hands-on learning.

April was Supomahkwan-kesoq — Sugar Making Moon, and so the students and staff donned masks and held a sugar camp to tap the maple trees near MIHS. While the work was completed, those gath-

ered recognized how each subject area offered opportunities for critical reflection.

"The health classes compared the nutritional value of real maple syrup with those sold in stores, math and science classes delivered lessons on the equations involved in the process, the English classes wrote poetry about it all, and the physical education courses even talked about the best ways to traipse through the snow," Wilber said.

While the appreciative gains for the teachings are evident, MIHS is also ensuring that lessons are

taught using the pedagogy of their ancestors — namely, the oral tradition.

"We're storytellers," Wilber said about the Menominee people. "We tell stories to teach students how to listen because that's how our culture has always been taught."

To help facilitate students' access to tribal stories within their culture courses, Wilber began recording herself performing Menominee stories. Like all schools, MIHS has students of varying abilities, and Wilber's recordings level the playing field by enabling them to engage with the teachings in ways

reading alone cannot replicate.

Wilber also capitalized upon the opportunity to use Menominee language, incorporating both the words and their pronunciation. Still, the most important lesson is that the stories themselves model the Seven Grandfather Teachings — wisdom, love, respect, bravery, honesty, humility, and truth.

"Our class begins with an explanation on why oral stories are so important and why learning them as they were passed down is equally important." Throughout the teachings, be it inside or outside the classroom, Wilber specified, "Students realize that our ancestors weren't just sitting around and making up stories. The stories all have meanings. They all teach us about life."

Associate Principal Kate Mikle noted that while the 2020-21 academic year has featured faculty members' sharing how their specific discipline connects to each month's traditional meaning for Menominee people, next year the focus will shift to the students, asking them to consider how what they're learning is reflected in ancient Menominee wisdom.

The outside enthusiasm for their culturally grounded pedagogical approach is palpable, as was evidenced by Teller's much-lauded presentation about the initiative at the April Wisconsin Indian Education Association's virtual conference. He was praised for noting that MIHS was not asking for non-Native teachers to become experts, but rather to be conduits for Menominee teachings.

MIHS is thinking beyond the next two years, as Wilber added, "Our goal is for our students to get a better view of their identity and who they are as Menominee people. That means having respect, love, kindness, and trust surround our hearts."

If the proceeding months are any indication, Pahkwan-kesoq's teachings at MIHS will germinate literal and metaphorical seeds that yield a rich cultural harvest.
