



HUNTING SEASON OPENS

Construction projects at Shawano schools on 'pause'

Search for buildings director continues

The summer months are usually very busy for construction crews at area schools as reduced student counts allow for maintenance and construction capital projects to commence.

This summer, however, the hammers and saws in Shawano schools are silent as many of the planned projects are on hold, according to Shawano School District Superintendent Randi Anderson. She announced the news last week during a meeting with the district's buildings and grounds committee.

"All major projects have been put on pause," Anderson said.

Those projects include plans to replace the carpet in the Shawano Community High School library and install sound panels in the cafeteria

at Olga Brener Intermediate School.

A parking lot renovation at the high school is still taking place, expected to be completed next month. Anderson said doing it splits the cost of the project between two fiscal years.

Also still planned is a project to put more equipment on a playground at Hillcrest Primary School.

There was no mention of when or if the district planned to start up efforts to improve the high school's athletics and arts facilities. Prior to the coronavirus pandemic shutting down all schools in March, officials had been planning to use the district's ample fund balance to pay for at least \$3 million in expanding and improving facilities like the auditorium, weight room and other facilities.

The district is currently without a buildings director after the departure

of Jeff Easter, who had been in the position for 5½ years. Anderson said the district is searching for a new person, and one round of interviews indicates it needs to go "back to the drawing board" after additional candidates have recently expressed interest.

"I want to hire the best," Anderson said.

The district is also looking at the possibility of someone filling in temporarily while the search for a permanent replacement takes place. Anderson said this would ensure that basic grounds projects could go on in the fall. Right now, she is sitting in on all buildings and grounds conversations involving COVID-19, while Nick Curran, human resources director, is overseeing other issues within the department.

A full-time groundskeeper has been hired after the position had been vacant, Anderson said.

Two missing person cases under investigation

Individuals missing from Menominee and Stockbridge communities

Law enforcement agencies are investigating two cases of missing persons.

Menominee tribal police are seeking the public's help in locating a missing woman last seen June 16 on the reservation. Katelyn L. Kelley, 22, has been missing for a significant amount of time, which police and her family said is unusual for her.

She is described as a Native American, around 5 feet, 2 inches tall and weighing 140 pounds, with brown eyes and brown hair.

Kelley was reportedly last seen June 16 at approximately 10:30 p.m. in the area of County Road VV East and Silver Canoe Road.

She was reported to be walking eastbound on County Road VV toward Keshena wearing a gray T-shirt, black swimsuit-type top, blue jean shorts and black flip-flops.

Kelley was reported missing June 18.

The Menominee Tribal Police Department has followed up on numerous tips involving her possible

whereabouts, but have not been able to substantiate her location, police said in a news release.

Extensive searches were conducted from June 18-20 in the area in which she was last observed.

Personnel from the Menominee Tribal Police Department, Menominee Tribal Conservation Department, Menominee Tribal Enterprises, Menominee Tribal Emergency Management and Great Lakes Search and Rescue K-9, Inc. assisted in the searches.

Anyone with information about Kelley's whereabouts is asked to call the Menominee Tribal Police at 715-799-3881. Information received will be kept anonymous upon request.

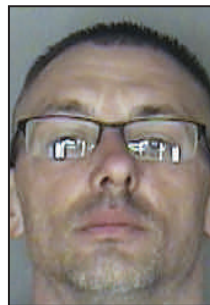

Prevea Health expands access to free COVID testing

Prevea Health has expanded access to free COVID-19 testing.

As of Tuesday, the number of cases reported by the state Department of Health was 70 in Shawano County; 49 in Oconto County and four in Menominee County.

Free COVID-19 testing is now available in 10 communities including sites in Oconto Falls and Shawano. Testing is available to anyone in Wisconsin experiencing: Cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fever, chills, repeated shaking with chills, muscle pain, headache, sore

throat, new loss of taste or smell.

Local Prevea testing locations are: Prevea Shawano Health Center, 1300 East Green Bay St., Shawano; HSHS St. Clare Memorial Hospital Prevea Oconto Falls Health Center, 853 S. Main St., Oconto Falls.

Those with any of the above symptoms and who wish to be tested must sign up on MyPrevea, which can be accessed at www.myprevea.com, or downloaded as an app on Apple or Google Play. Those wanting a test do not have to be an established Prevea patient.

There are ways to avoid ticks, related illnesses this summer

With summer beginning, Prevea Health is offering tips and reminders to help everyone recognize and treat tick-related incidents.

Ticks live in wooded areas and areas with high grass, and crawl on to people and animals as they brush against leaves or grass. According to the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, there are two common types of ticks that spread disease to animals and humans — deer (black-legged) ticks and wood (dog) ticks. Wood ticks have whitish markings on the body, while deer ticks are reddish to dark brown in appearance without white markings. Deer ticks are also usually smaller.

Deer ticks are a known carrier of Lyme disease. Wisconsin had 3,105 estimated cases of Lyme disease

in 2018, and the average number of reported cases has more than doubled over the last 10 years. With Lyme disease, illness usually occurs within three to 30 days after being exposed to an infected deer tick. Symptoms may include rash, flu-like symptoms (headache, fever, muscle aches and joint pain) and enlarged lymph nodes.

The most common illnesses, other than Lyme disease, are anaplasmosis and ehrlichiosis. Anaplasmosis and ehrlichiosis are also transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected deer tick. Illness usually occurs within one to three weeks after being exposed to an infected tick. Symptoms may include fever, chills, muscle pain, severe headache and fatigue.

If you are experiencing the

above symptoms and think you've been exposed to an infected tick, call your primary care provider to determine if you should schedule an appointment or seek medical treatment. You can also seek care from home with Prevea Virtual Care at www.prevea.com/virtualcare.

To reduce the risk of getting a tick bite, dress appropriately. Wear light-colored clothing, long pants and sleeves. Tuck in shirts, tuck pants into socks and wear closed-toed shoes.

Use insect repellents on skin that contain at least 20% DEET. Do not use insect repellent on children younger than 2 months old or on a child's hands, eyes or mouth.

Use permethrin-treated clothing and gear, or treat your gear and clothing with permethrin before

departure.

Stay out of tall grass, brush or heavily wooded areas.

To properly remove a tick, use tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin as possible. Pull backwards gently but firmly, using an even pressure, do not twist or jerk. Do not squeeze, crush, or puncture the body of the tick. This can cause the tick to inject body fluids and increase the risk for infection. After removing the tick, wash hands thoroughly with soap and water.

If any part of the mouth of the tick remains in the skin, it's recommended to leave it alone as it will come out on its own. Attempting to remove these parts may result in skin trauma and increase your risk of infection not associated with Lyme disease.

Immunization important to protect people from disease

Disbelief in the value of immunization is allowing once defeated diseases to reemerge. In 2004, the United States documented the elimination of endemic measles. Yet, we still experience outbreaks: 667 cases in 2014, 791 cases in 2018 and over 1,000 in 2019.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has tracked the measles outbreaks and has found that the majority of the Americans afflicted were unvaccinated. Low vaccination rates have led to measles epidemics, which can be deadly. Unvaccinated people who develop measles can pass the infection to babies who have not yet been vaccinated. This same pattern is seen with mumps and whooping cough.

A lot of misinformation exists regarding vaccines, but the resurgence of these diseases is directly tied to a medical researcher who committed a hoax on the world.

Dr. Andrew Wakefield, the principal investigator of a study published in "The Lancet," distorted numerous patient records so that data would support a connection between measles-mumps-rubella vaccine and autism. This is not a case where scientists reached different conclusions after reviewing the same data, but rather a deliber-

ate falsification of the research data for money. Wakefield was paid more than \$675,000 by a lawyer hoping to sue vaccine makers. Moreover, clear and convincing evidence proves the falsification of data. "The Lancet" formally and publicly retracted the paper and repudiated its conclusions, and Wakefield lost his medical license, but the fraudulent information had already been disseminated to the public.

It is difficult to estimate the harm caused by this fraudulent 1998 study linking vaccines to autism and the ensuing decline in vaccination rates, but according to the CDC, vaccination rates have declined in the last 10 years. It is very hard to un-scare people. Regrettably, many parents have made fear-based decisions based on these false claims and have lost a child.

Over the last decade, numerous research teams have investigated the relationship between immunization and autism. Fifteen independent research studies have failed to find any link between vaccines

and autism. Thus, the scientific community dismissed Wakefield's findings based upon the best data even before it was discovered that his findings were a deception.

Vaccination has made enormous contributions to public health, including the eradication of smallpox and polio from all but a handful of countries. It is estimated that between 2 million and 3 million child deaths are averted annually through vaccination against diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (whooping cough) and measles, and many more future deaths are averted in older groups.

Some parents forego vaccines for their children because of concerns about autism and other complications, typically fueled by misinformation. Rather than being worried about the diseases the vaccines aim to prevent, parents are more worried about vaccine safety. Immunizations have become a victim of their own success. Yet, according to the scientific literature, the benefits of immunization outweigh the rare risks.

Children of parents who refuse whooping cough immunizations

are at high risk for whooping cough infection relative to vaccinated children. A recent study found that the risk of whooping cough infection in children for vaccine refusers increased 22.8-fold when compared with vaccine acceptors. This result dispels one of the commonly held beliefs among vaccine-refusing parents that their children are not at risk for vaccine-preventable diseases.

Parents wrongly rely on "herd immunity," assuming that others will vaccinate their children, so they do not have to. The risk of an outbreak increases as more parents refuse to immunize.

The federal government thoroughly studies vaccines to ensure they are not risky or harmful. The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians and the CDC all urge parents to have their children vaccinated.

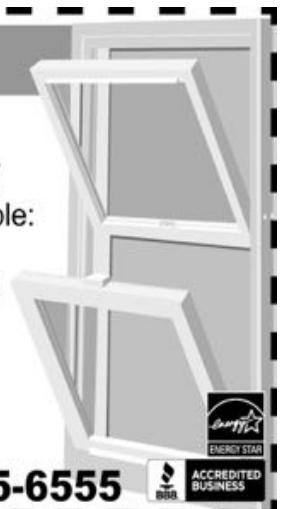

UW-Madison study shows 41% of customers cover face

Fewer than half of Wisconsin shoppers mask up

An observational study of grocery store customers in 20 Wisconsin counties last month shows less than half the shoppers wore masks.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has recommended that people wear face coverings in public places to reduce spread of the new coronavirus. There is concern among health officials about whether people are taking this precaution.

"We think of masking as this seemingly simple intervention, but it's rather complex," said Dr. Nasia Safdar, associate professor of infec-

tious diseases at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health.

"Just like anything else, there's habit and memory. You have to remember to take a mask, get into the habit of that — and this is not a country that has ever done that before so it's a new thing for people to learn," she said.

Safdar oversaw a study by students in the University of Wisconsin-Madison Medical Scientist Training Program that found 41% of 3,271 grocery shoppers observed between May 16 and June 1 had their face covered as they exited the store.

A Gallup poll conducted in April showed 68% of Americans claimed to "always" or "sometimes" wear a face mask in public.

Student researchers went to 26 grocery stores around the state and found women were more likely than men to wear a mask and younger

individuals were less likely to do so. There was a wide range in how many customers wore masks. In Adams County, 6.8% of shoppers wore face coverings, the lowest of the 20 counties studied. Dane County was the highest at 69%. Brown County was nearly 38%. Milwaukee was 41%.

Public health officials around Wisconsin have urged people to wear masks, especially when they may have difficulty staying 6 feet from others in a confined space. Some private businesses require customers to do so, and Milwaukee County requires it for most county-owned facilities and recommends it for Milwaukee Mitchell International Airport.

But there has been pushback against such policies across the nation as individual rights and public responsibility clash. In Wisconsin, Stevens Point police say a man harassed Asian Americans at a grocery store in May. According to a statement from the

Stevens Point Police Department, "customers were called names and harassed for wearing masks because of their race."

Public health officials around the state have encouraged people to wear face masks, although it is not required in Wisconsin.

"We encourage everyone who is able to wear a face covering when it's not possible to physically distance. Wearing a face covering and practicing social distancing is just another way we take care of each other and take responsibility for the health of our community," Christy Vogt, health educator for Public Health Madison and Dane County, said in a statement.

The agency was more pointed in remarks posted on social media: It tweeted "We can do much better! Don't leave home without your masks, folks!" in reference to the unpublished UW study showing 41% of grocery shoppers wore face coverings.

June 30 deadline to sign up for FSA coverage programs

Agricultural producers who have not yet enrolled in the Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) or Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for 2020 must do so by June 30.

Although program elections for the 2020 crop year remain the same as elections made for 2019, all producers need to contact their local U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) office to sign a 2020 enrollment contract.

"The Agriculture Risk Coverage and Price Loss Coverage programs are critical safety-net programs for farmers, helping producers weather market distortions resulting from natural disasters, trade disruptions and, this year, a pandemic," said FSA Administrator Richard Fordyce.

"This can be done in concert with filing your acreage report and applying for other FSA programs."

To date, more than 1.4 million ARC and PLC contracts have been signed for the 2020 crop year. This represents 89% of expected enrollment. FSA will send reminder postcards to producers who, according to agency records, have not yet submitted signed contracts for ARC or PLC for the 2020 crop year.

Producers who do not complete enrollment by close of business local time on June 30 will not be enrolled in ARC or PLC for the 2020 crop year and will be ineligible to receive a payment should one trigger for an eligible crop.

ARC and PLC contracts can be

mailed or emailed to producers for signature depending on producer preference. Signed contracts can be mailed or emailed back to FSA, or arrangements can be made in advance with FSA to drop off signed contracts at the FSA county office.

Producers are eligible to enroll on farms with base acres for the following commodities: barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn, crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed, oats, peanuts, dry peas, rapeseed, long grain rice, medium- and short-grain rice, safflower seed, seed cotton, sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat.

For information on ARC and PLC including web-based decision tools, visit farmers.gov/arc-plc.

USDA Service Centers, including FSA county offices, are open for business by phone only, and field work will continue with appropriate social distancing. While program delivery staff will continue to come into the office, they will be working with producers by phone and using online tools whenever possible. All service center visitors wishing to conduct business with the FSA, Natural Resources Conservation Service or any other service center agency are required to call their service center to schedule a phone appointment. More information can be found at farmers.gov/coronavirus.

Wisconsin DOT offers tips to help senior drivers with roundabouts

They are one of the few places where you can be coming and going at the same time.

Roundabouts, a relatively new passageway on Wisconsin highways, pose challenges for some senior citizens, says the American Automobile Association.

A roundabout is a small traffic circle that allows vehicles to make turns without stop signs or lights. Roundabouts move traffic by allowing the car or truck in the circle to have the right of way.

Roundabouts are found at less than one percent of the intersections on the state highway system, according to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation.

As of 2016, 3% of state-controlled intersections have traffic signals. Of the state's 383 roundabouts, 220 are on the state highway system and 163 are on local highways.

Roundabouts may be considered as an alternative when building

new intersections or when doing a complete reconstruction to correct safety or reduce congestion, the DOT says.

They credit roundabouts with reducing the number of severe injury crashes and deaths; providing good economic value; reducing delay and improving traffic flow and providing a greener alternative with less vehicle idling, lower fuel emissions and less wasted fuel.

Even with these advantages, roundabouts can be the intersections most avoided by some drivers.

However, the DOT offers some driving tips to make it possible go through roundabouts without going around the bend:

- Slow down.
- Watch for and obey traffic signs.
- Move into the correct lane the direction you want to travel as you approach the roundabout.
- Yield to pedestrians and bicyclists as you enter and exit the roundabout.
- Yield to all lanes of traffic on

your left before entering.

- Keep your speed low and stay in your lane within the roundabout (do not change lanes within the roundabout).

- Exit carefully to your destination. Use your right-turn signal, in front of the splitter island just prior to your exit, to indicate your intention to exit.

- Watch for large vehicles.
- If there is no oncoming traffic, you do not have to stop.

Navigating with large vehicles

By Wisconsin law, drivers must yield right-of-way to trucks and other large vehicles (and combinations of vehicles, such as trucks towing boats or RVs towing cars) measuring at least 40 feet long or 10 feet wide.

That means, give space to larger vehicles when approaching and driving through roundabouts.

The law was passed in the interest of safety, as commercial trucks can weigh up to 80,000 pounds, and most larger vehicles have an

expanded turning radius.

Drivers are asked to remain mindful that all motorists approaching a roundabout must yield to any traffic already within a roundabout, as signed and per law.

If two large vehicles approach a roundabout at the same time, the vehicle on the right must yield right-of-way to the vehicle on the left.

Driving bicycles in a roundabout If you are riding on the shoulder or bike lane, merge into the traffic lane before the shoulder ends.

- Signal your intent to move into traffic.

- Once inside the roundabout, don't hug the curb.

- Ride close to the middle of the lane to prevent cars from passing and cutting you off.

- Watch for cars waiting to enter the roundabout, as they may not see you.

- If you do not want to ride your bike in the roundabout, use the sidewalk and proceed as a pedestrian.

USDA accepting disaster applications through WHIP+

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has started accepting applications and making payments through the Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus (WHIP+) to agricultural producers who suffered eligible losses because of excessive moisture or drought in 2018 and 2019.

Producers who suffered losses in Wisconsin from excessive moisture, floods, tornadoes, snowstorms, wildfires or drought can apply for assistance through WHIP+.

"Many counties in Wisconsin suffered crop production losses due to record precipitation amounts in the last two years," said Sandy Chalmers, executive director of Wisconsin's Farm Service Agency (FSA). "We want to remind producers that staff in local service centers are available by phone or email to assist in applying for WHIP+. We highly encourage producers to call or email our offices to discuss program requirements and the next steps of the application process."

To be eligible for WHIP+, producers must have suffered certain crop production losses or losses to trees, bushes or vines in counties with a primary Presidential Emergency Disaster Declaration or a primary Secretarial Disaster Designation for qualifying natural disaster events that occurred in calendar years 2018 or 2019.

Producers located in a county without a primary disaster designa-

tion may be eligible if documentation is provided showing the loss was due to a qualifying natural disaster event (producers receiving WHIP+ payments for 2018 and/or 2019 will be required to obtain crop insurance or NAP in 2022 and 2023 at the 60/100 level or higher).

For losses due to drought, a producer is eligible if any area of the county in which the loss occurred was rated D3, or extreme drought, or higher on the U.S. Drought Monitor during calendar years 2018 or 2019. According to the U.S. Drought Monitor, no counties in Wisconsin met this requirement in 2018 or 2019.

In addition to the recently added eligible losses of drought and excess moisture, FSA will implement a WHIP+ provision for crop quality loss that resulted in price deductions or penalties when marketing crops damaged by eligible disaster events. To ensure an effective program for all impacted farmers, the agency is currently gathering information on the extent of quality loss from producers and stakeholder organizations.

USDA Service Centers, including FSA county offices, are open for business by phone only, and field work will continue with appropriate social distancing. More information on service centers can be found at farmers.gov/coronavirus, and more information on WHIP+ can be found at www.farmers.gov/whip-plus.

MADISON — The Department of Natural Resources invites those interested in deer management in Wisconsin to apply for a seat on a County Deer Advisory Council (CDAC).

Council members include representatives from a variety of stakeholder groups interested in whitetail deer management in Wisconsin. The application deadline for all council seats in each county is July 1.

Founded in 2014, CDACs were

established to provide an open venue to develop county-specific deer population objectives and herd management strategies through public involvement. Council members review and consider a variety of metrics on deer herd trends, impacts to habitat and various human-deer interactions.

"All council seats are open to new applicants," said Kevin Walenfang, DNR deer and elk ecologist. "We put a great deal of stock in public involvement, and we hope

folks take extra interest and apply for a seat on their local council. Those selected will serve for three years, and during that time will have a great deal of responsibility in helping manage deer in their county."

Council members meet annually to review deer population numbers and associated data, gather public input and provide recommendations to the Department of Natural Resources and the Natural Resources Board regarding deer management

decisions in their county.

Councils include representatives from agriculture, forestry, tourism, transportation, hunting, Wisconsin's Deer Management Assistance Program and local government. Applicants must have experience or involvement with at least one of these seven stakeholder categories.

Pandemic shouldn't tarnish NBA title

The National Basketball Association is coming back.

The NBA suspended its season indefinitely on March 11 after a player tested positive for the coronavirus, but the league announced June 4 that it was going to try and complete the 2019-20 season.

Instead of wrapping up the regular season, only 22 of the 30 NBA teams

will be in action. All games will be played inside Walt Disney World's ESPN Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando.

The 22 teams will begin arriving in Florida on July 7 before taking part in training

camp from July 9-29. Each team will then play eight seeding games before the playoffs begin Aug. 17.

The 16-team playoff bracket (eight teams in each conference) will be determined by winning percentage, instead of most wins like in past years. The reason that's being implemented is because not all 22 teams have played the same number of games to this point.

The Milwaukee Bucks held the NBA's best record (53-12, .815 winning percentage) when play was suspended. The Bucks also held a 6½-game lead over the Toronto Raptors (46-18,

.719) for the top seed in the Eastern Conference, so it seems likely that Milwaukee will be the No. 1 seed in the East.

In my hours upon hours of breaking down the details of the NBA restart, I've come across plenty of comments on social media. One thought I've seen numerous times and can't get out of my head is that the NBA title will be tarnished and won't carry as much value for whichever team wins it all.

Wait, what?

Sure, the end of this season will be like no other before it and when thinking about the 2019-20 champion, people will immediately think of COVID-19, but that shouldn't tarnish a

championship.

In fact, I'd argue that the team that wins it all this season truly deserved it.

Any momentum teams had back in mid-March was completely wiped out. Teams that were dealing with injuries might get all-star players back. Home-court advantages are out the window, as teams will play on a neutral court in front of no fans.

It's basically back to square one for all 22 teams.

The only remnant of the suspended regular season is that the team's records won't be wiped away. But really, I don't think it'd be crazy for the team with the worst record in the playoffs to win the title.

Could the Bucks and Los Angeles Lakers (the Western Conference's top team) still meet in the NBA Finals, like many people predicted since the start of the season? Sure, but I also think it's more likely that neither of those teams make it now.

The most likely matchup for the Bucks in the first round of the post-season is the Orlando Magic or Brooklyn Nets. If you'd asked me in March how the Bucks would fare against either of those teams, I would have said Milwaukee wins in five games at most. Now, I'm not as confident and think either team could take down the Bucks.

It's often said that the league's hottest team at the end of the year is the one that gets to hoist the championship trophy (think back to the Raptors last season), and that saying will likely play out to be true in the NBA this fall.

Did COVID-19 ruin the Bucks' best chance to claim their first title since 1970-71? Only time will tell.

Just be happy the team has the opportunity to finish what it started and actually gets to play — I'm looking at you Major League Baseball.

The remainder of the NBA season will be a unique and wild ride, but it might also be the most intense few months of basketball you get to watch in your lifetime, so enjoy every second of it.

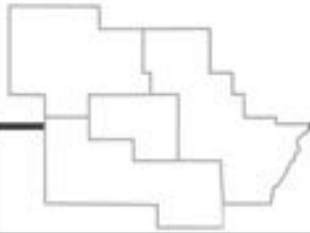
