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ThedaCare CEO concerned about local coronavirus susceptibility

Delta variant can be as transmissible as chicken pox, could impact unvaccinated

COVID-19 is on the rise in Wisconsin again as the Delta variant is causing concerns within the health care community. That is why steps are being taken to make it easier for the public to be tested and to receive the vaccinations.

Dr. Imran Andrabi, ThedaCare chief executive officer, announced Aug. 5 that circumstances have changed from when the pandemic first started. Because the virus has mutated and become something different from when the first coronavirus cases hit in early 2020, transmissibility is higher than ever, he said, which can put those who have not received the vaccines at risk.

"It's a high transmissibility, equal to the chicken pox virus, which is thought to be the most transmissible virus in the world," Andrabi said. "The concern becomes, for every one person infected, whether or not they know it, they could transmit it to nine other people."

Even those who are vaccinated are not immune from getting the virus, as the Pfizer and Moderna vaccines have a 95% protection rate and the Johnson & Johnson vaccine is 72% effective. Breakthrough cases have occurred, according to Andrabi, who noted that many of these cases show no symptoms or mild symptoms.

"The ones who are ending up in the hospital, disproportionately, are those who are not vaccinated, almost 95%," Andrabi said. "The concern becomes, in particular areas like Shawano, where our vaccination rates are not as high, we could have a susceptible population."

He noted that a large number of people were admitted to ThedaCare Medical Center-Shawano last fall, and he fears another surge of patients could be coming this fall, as well.

"Vaccinations, wherever they are possible and however they are possible, are an absolute deterrent to make sure you don't end up in a difficult situation personally and with

your family," Andrabi said.

Masks are also a deterrent, and Andrabi and other health officials have been urging people to wear masks indoors, even if they've gone through full

vaccination protocols. He's urging people not to gather in large numbers, a recommendation that was once policy in the initial months of the pandemic.

The vaccinations are key, though. Andrabi said that ThedaCare has distributed more than 75,000 vaccine doses to community members in Shawano, the Fox Valley and other places that the health care organization serves. Vaccines are now available through primary care providers, according to Andrabi, so getting the shots can be as simple as making an appointment at local clinics.

"When you come in and are seen by your primary care physician, you can get the vaccine right there," he said. "You don't have to go to a clinic or have to get to a special setting. It just becomes part of how we take care of you."

Doing this, Andrabi added, takes the extra step out of people's lives where they have to go somewhere special to get the vaccinations.

For those without regular doctors or health care visits, ThedaCare has also started having clinics at Franklin Park, 235 S. Washington St., Shawano, and providing vaccinations for those who attend the Thursdayz at Franklin concerts. The clinics will continue through Aug. 19.

"We're willing to work with public health and other partners in order to spread, No. 1, the word, and No. 2, the myths that might be there, and No. 3, to get out there to as many people as we can on the vaccination front to help our community out," Andrabi said. "Wherever we can help and partner with the community in any way we can, we are happy to do that."

Andrabi said that parts of Wisconsin, like Shawano County, have similar vaccination rates to Alabama and Louisiana, where hospitalizations due to COVID-19 and subsequent deaths have risen dramatically. That's why ThedaCare is partnering with people on "the front end," he said, to make people more comfortable with getting the vaccine.

One of the fears about getting the vaccine is that they have emergency approval from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, not the full approval that most vaccines and medications get through a lengthy review process. Andrabi said it's possible more people might get immunized once the FDA gives its full authorization, giving a stamp of approval that the vaccines are safe, but that won't help people now.

"It's a logical thought process to feel that way, and there's nothing wrong with thinking in that matter," Andrabi said, referring to people waiting until the full approval. "Having said that, we are in very uncharted territory with the pandemic — happens once in 100 years, and here we are. The fact that we even have a vaccine, and the efficacy we have seen with millions and millions of people across the globe getting the vaccine, gives us a lot more credibility to say, 'This thing actually works.'"

Andrabi said he didn't know when the full authorization would take place, but his fear is that, if people wait too long to get vaccinated, the coronavirus could cause another surge locally. Already, events like the Menominee and Mohican powwows have been canceled due to the surge in the Delta variant.

"If this virus continues to replicate the way it has been replicating, I think we can rest assured there will be another variant that will emerge," Andrabi said. "Our collective jobs as a community is to work together, help each other out and support each other and hopefully make the right decisions."

AG candidates go to bat for police

Owens, Toney say incumbent Kaul has thrown officers 'under the bus'

With the next election for Wisconsin attorney general still 15 months away, two Republican candidates have already stepped forward to challenge incumbent Democrat Josh Kaul.

Ryan Owens and Eric Toney appeared Aug. 9 at the invitation of the Shawano County Republican Party to discuss their views on a series of questions posed by a panel of retired law enforcement officers. The two candidates shared similar views on a number of issues, especially on the question of whether Kaul has been an effective attorney general.

Toney, who has been the Fond du Lac County district attorney since 2013, said he decided to run for attorney general after Kaul failed to support law enforcement time and again.

"I could not sit back and watch as our law enforcement had their backs against the wall like they've never had in their entire professional career, and we had an attorney general who failed to stand with them and turned his back on them," Toney said.

Owens, a political science professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison and director of the Tommy G. Thompson Center on Public Leadership, said the incumbent attorney general has not prioritized criminal law enforcement.

"Josh Kaul has done his utmost to make sure that the resources necessary to enforce the law aren't available," Owens said. While former attorney general Brad Schimel worked with district attorneys in northern Wisconsin who needed assistance on drug prosecutions and other complicated cases, "Josh Kaul gets into office and what does he do? He yanks them. He says we're not going to help you out."

Kaul came to Madison with a liberal agenda that has made the average citizen's life less safe and less free, Owens said.

"I think we need to have an attorney general who will stand with law enforcement and stand against



government overreach," he said.

Toney said Kaul has left vacant a number of positions in the attorney general's office that are supposed to help local law enforcement. The son of a retired police officer, Toney noted that four Capitol police officers committed suicide in the aftermath of the Jan. 6 disruption at the U.S. Capitol and called it an example of the enormous stress on police and resulting mental health issues.

"That is something that I would make sure law enforcement knows: I have their back not just when they're on duty, but when they're off duty," Toney said. "We have to make sure that we restore prosecutors that Josh Kaul has cut from his agency, the key DCI (Division of Criminal Investigation) positions that he's left unfilled," adding that the State Crime Lab is falling behind in testing evidence for local prosecutors.

Both candidates condemned calls to defund police departments.

"This kind of left-wing 'defund the police' stuff, not only does it stagger the mind, it's also stupid," Owens said, noting that the same critics call for more community police officers to interact in neighborhoods. "How in the world are you going to do that if you're not funding law enforcement officers to get on the ground?"

"Defund the police is dangerous. It's reckless, and it's irresponsible," Toney agreed. "Law enforcement needs more resources."

On a question whether there is a trend to overcharge law enforcement officers over the use of force, both candidates again criticized Kaul.

"Police officers have the same right to defend themselves as you or I would if we were attacked or someone threatened us with great bodily harm," Toney said. "Law

enforcement cannot be held to a different standard, and that's what Josh Kaul wants to do."

Owens said categorically that he supports the concept of qualified immunity for law enforcement, which protects officers from personal liability unless they are determined to have violated an individual's statutory or constitutional rights.

"The attorney general has thrown (law enforcement) under the bus, abdicated his responsibility," Owens

said. "They're on their own because he has chosen to side with the left-wing radicals rather than with them."

Richard Kucksdorf, chairman of the Shawano County Republican Party, said both men are outstanding candidates.

"The only winner tonight is going to be the Republican Party," Kucksdorf said to kick off the evening.

County redistricting process begins

Timeline could be tighter than in previous efforts

Shawano County's redistricting efforts are on pause for now, but will likely be on fast forward once the county gets the data from the 2020 U.S. Census.

By law, the counties have to update their county district maps every 10 years and set up districts that are similar in population within 10%. Normally, the counties would have their census data early in the year and be wrapping up the redistricting process by now, according to Dave Poffinbarger, land information officer, but the coronavirus pandemic has significantly delayed the release of the census data, which is now expected to be in the county's hands by the end of the month.

That complicates the county's redistricting timeline, which would normally give it six months to redraw the maps. However, the maps have to be in place by Dec. 1, when the election cycle for county and city offices begin, unless the state decides to allow local governments to use the current maps for the 2022 election cycle. If such a reprieve doesn't materialize, the county will have about 2½ months to get the job done, as the county board meets Nov. 17, a week ahead of time due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

The county will also have to decide if it wants to continue having 27 board members or reduce the number like it did in 2011, when it dropped

from 30. There has been discussion about eliminating or merging some of the existing county committees, including the public property committee, which would mean a reduction in board members might not require the remaining members to be on more committees.

According to Poffinbarger, it's estimated that Shawano County lost about 900 residents since the 2010 census and sits around 41,000 residents, although final numbers might show something different. However, even with that miniscule loss, it is likely that some areas saw drastic growth and others drastic loss in population, requiring boundary lines to shift even if the board

makeup remains at 27.

Administrative coordinator James Davel is recommending the county board look at reducing its ranks to 25 or 23. He is suggesting that the public property committee be eliminated, as many of the requests that go through that committee also get scrutinized by the executive committee. He's also recommending that the land conservation committee merge with the agriculture and extension committee, as the same county board members sit on both but yet have two meetings back to back on the same day.

Davel said he was recommending the cuts as supervisors are urging county departments to look at financial cuts. For him, the redrawing of

the map is secondary to the issue of whether to reduce the board.

"We're asked around here to make cuts all the time," Davel said. "I believe that the board should lead by example. If we're continuing to ask departments to cut, cut, cut, what is the board doing to assist in the overall cut of that? Are we going to cut supervisors or per diem rate? It's food for thought when you set a number."

There is a redistricting committee that will meet in the fall to address the changes in the maps, hold hearings to get public input and ultimately make a recommendation to the county board in November.

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Board to vote on COVID-19 protocols next week

Committee looks over CDC guidelines, discusses how to keep students, staff in schools

The Shawano School District is going to try to keep its schools open full-time for in-person learning and try to avoid the frustrations that families endured last year due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The district's policy and curriculum committee met Aug. 9 with officials to look at the latest recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control and see how they could fit in with schools' mitigation efforts. According to Superintendent Randi Anderson, administrators got together the previous week to come up with a plan that would be presented to the full Shawano School Board on Aug. 16.

"We know that our priority and our ultimate goal is to keep students and staff in our buildings for 190 days this year," Anderson said.

Jessica Wiesman, a nurse with the school district, pointed out there are some changes in the CDC guidelines that came out in July from the protocols the district had in place for the 2020-21 school year. Masking is being recommended

even for those students and staff who are vaccinated, but the district is only going to require staff to mask. Masking will be required for everyone on buses because it's a federal transportation requirement, according to Wiesman.

Physical distancing requirements have been relaxed somewhat, with the 6 feet apart requirement being reduced to a minimum of 3 feet, Wiesman said.

"We can't do 6 feet and get all of the kids back into the building," Wiesman said.

The public schools will not be screening students for the coronavirus on a regular basis, she added, saying that parents need to be aware of their children's health and keep them home if they are ill.

"Some places actively screened students as they walked in the door, but we chose not to do that last year," Wiesman said. "It's better for parents to just be aware of their own children and do that before they get to school."

Quarantine protocols will be different, to the relief of some committee members. Wiesman said that anyone suspected of being in

contact with someone who has the coronavirus will be quarantined for 10 days if they are not wearing a mask and don't show symptoms, but they can return after seven if the person gets a negative COVID-19 test on the fifth day. If both the positive case and the close contact are wearing masks, no quarantine will be required.

Board member James Davel praised the shorter quarantine, noting that parents were frustrated with the 14-day isolation last year, even after the CDC changed it in the middle of the year. He said that the CDC guidelines have been a moving target that the schools should adjust to when they change.

"The school stayed with the 14, and the CDC was recommending 10 and public health would tell people it was 10," Davel said. "My recommendation is that, when we're deciding things, we're very clear about some of these things. Parents were very frustrated."

Davel urged district officials to make sure there's clear communication between the schools and families.

"I didn't like what the school did

last year when the governor's order was lifted, essentially lifting the mask policy at school, but we didn't say that," Davel said. "We've got to be clear with parents about what the expectation is."

Davel said the same should apply when it comes to requiring vaccinations. Anderson said there are no plans to require older students and adults to be vaccinated in order to be in the school, and there are no vaccines approved for children under 12.

Davel urged flexibility in COVID-19 protocols.

"What we saw last year was all one-sided, and it was all gloom and doom — everything's wrong," Davel said. "The intent is to keep these kids in school as long as we can."

Board member Chris Gull said it looked like the coronavirus is never going to completely go away, and maybe it was time to start treating it like the flu.

"It's going to mutate, and it's going to be here for the next 100 years," Gull said. "We have to treat it the way that it is, and it's a virus."

Manipulation better than injections for those with sciatica

Sciatica often starts suddenly with pain in your lower back that radiates down from your buttock to one thigh and into your leg. You may have pain when you sit, sneeze or cough. You may also feel weakness, "pins and needles," numbness or a burning or tingling sensation down your leg.

Sciatica symptoms may result from general wear and tear, plus any sudden pressure on a disc. Most commonly, this occurs when a protruding or herniated disc irritates the sciatic nerve. Sciatica is a major source of disability and impairment of daily living activities. About 20% of those with sciatica experience symptoms for more than six weeks.

How do you know whether your sciatica will respond to self-care or whether it needs professional attention? As a general rule, you should call your doctor if the pain is intense, travels down your leg or prevents

you from moving; your leg, foot, groin or rectal area feels numb; you have fever, nausea, vomiting, weakness or sweating; an injury caused your pain; your pain hasn't decreased after one week;

or you've had past episodes of back pain.

Fortunately, new evidence identifies an effective treatment for this debilitating condition. A team of medical doctors and chiropractors recently published in the "Journal of Manipulative and Physiological Therapeutics" the results of a study involving sciatica treatment. In this study, 102 patients with back pain and sciatica with disc protrusion received either chiropractic spinal

manipulations or nerve root injection.

Both chiropractic care and nerve root injection demonstrated benefit. Improvement was reported in 76.5% of spinal manipulative therapy patients and in 62.7% of the nerve root injections group. Worsening was reported in 2% of spinal manipulative therapy patients and in 5.9% of the nerve root injections group. Improvement in patients' pain scores at one month were similar. Average treatment costs were \$559 for spinal manipulative therapy and \$730 for nerve root injections.

Spinal manipulative therapy was superior to nerve root injections on two clinical measures and equal on another. When considering direct procedure costs, the average cost of spinal manipulative therapy was 23% less expensive.

This is the first study to compare spinal manipulative therapy and

nerve root injections head-to-head for sciatica. When evaluating any therapy, you must assess not only potential benefits, but also the risks. Lumbar spinal manipulations are very safe, but nerve root injections are not.

Mayo Clinic warns patients that repeated steroid injections can weaken spinal bones and nearby muscles and upset natural hormone balance, leading to potentially serious medical conditions. As might be expected, the greater the number of steroid injections, the greater the risk of side effects or serious adverse events.

Practitioners managing patients with back pain and sciatica with protruding discs should consider chiropractic care as a first option.

"Getting the opportunity to play at the next level has been a dream for years now," said Timm. "I'm just happy to be able to keep playing football."

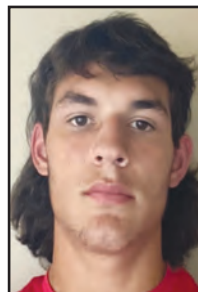
Like other senior athletes this year, the recruiting process changed with the pandemic keeping individuals from visiting schools and getting to meet teams and coaching staffs.

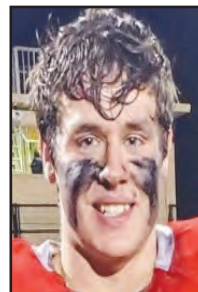

"The community that comes together over prayer in a vibrant and fun event will be strong together," said Kendall. "That is the message that we are hoping to portray to the visitors of the event."

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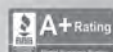
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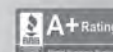

Military convoy rolls along into Oconto

Over 200 come out to watch more than 70 vintage vehicles hit the streets

Oconto residents got to see history come alive Aug. 4 as 70 military vehicles rolled into the city and made a pit stop at the new Tractor Supply Company.

Members of the Military Vehicle Preservation Association are spending part of their summer crossing the United States with military Jeeps, trucks and other assorted vehicles, traveling the Yellowstone Trail, the first transcontinental automobile highway through the upper tier of states. The trail goes from Aberdeen, South Dakota, to eastern Ohio.

Although Oconto isn't part of the Yellowstone Trail, the MVPA was eager to see what kind of hospitality the city offered, and there was no disappointment as veterans organizations, the city of Oconto and the Oconto Area Chamber of Commerce came together to give the drivers, many of them over the age of 60 and a majority of them veterans, a hero's welcome as they served up hamburgers and hot dogs and helped the drivers keep cool with ice cream sandwiches.

Oconto Mayor Lloyd Heier told a crowd of nearly 200 that the city was proud to host a stop for the MVPA, which planned to also stop in Peshtigo

and Marinette before heading into the Upper Peninsula and down through the mainland of Michigan before returning to the Yellowstone Trail in

South Bend, Indiana.

"It means a lot to us to have a group of people want to be here," Heier said. "Everybody's friendly. They've put on tons of miles, so obviously they enjoy what they're doing, because these vehicles are not cheap to run. Gas is at a premium right now."

Heier noted that three local veterans got to ride along as the vehicles entered Oconto, something that he felt was a privilege.

Terry Shelswell, the convoy commander, commented that the reception and hospitality that he and his drivers received was incredible.

"This is day eight of the convoy, and we're traveling along the Yellowstone Trail," Shelswell said. "Some of you might say, 'The Yellowstone What?' and you'd be right because the Yellowstone Trail doesn't exactly go through Oconto."

Shelswell noted that the convoy will be stopping in South Bend, Indiana, for the MVPA's annual convention to help AM General, a manufacturer of humvees, celebrate its 50th

anniversary in the next week. For the time being, though, he was happy to see so many people come to the check out the vehicles and meet some of the veterans who have served this country.

"This is really, really appreciated by our team members to have the people come out the way that you have — the children, the veterans," Shelswell said. "We've said it before, but to each one of the veterans and the current service personnel who say thank you to us, you guys got it wrong. We're saying thank you to you for your service."

The presentation to the MVPA also included some words of tribute from John Maino, a former radio and TV host who is now executive director at Wisconsin Veterans Village, as well as the author of "Fifty Strong," a book featuring interviews with four decades of United States veterans and their families. He noted that some residents in Oconto and the surrounding areas were part of the 32nd Division, also known as Red Arrow, which he described as "the most underrated division in all of World War II."

"A bunch of farm boys and local boys and mill workers joined the National Guard for mainly one reason during the war — because they would get \$1 for every time they showed up for drills, and they had nickel beers at the armory," Maino said, eliciting chuckles from the audience. "They had no idea what would happen to them and how their world would change."

Originally thinking that they would be sent to fight in Europe, the 32nd Division wound up being sent at the last minute to New Guinea to keep the Japanese surge

moving toward Australia, Maino said. He added that, if it was not for the courage of the local boys, the Japanese could have very well conquered the continent and have a much larger presence in the Pacific Ocean.

"Our world as we know it would have been different," Maino said. "The Japanese never advanced again at New Guinea, and that's because the men of Oconto and Oconto County, a bunch of 19-year-old farm boys, went over and did that."

Proceeds from the event are go-

ing into a fund to build a veterans memorial in Oconto County. Clyde Bridger, a retired U.S. Air Force major and one of the driving forces behind the memorial, that a group is working to get donations all over the county to produce it.

"The next time, just throw in a dollar or 100 bucks," Bridger said. "That'd be great, because those things are not cheap by any stretch of the imagination."

Bridger noted that, when he was in high school, efforts to reconstitute the 32nd Division were taking place, and he and many of his class-

mates, mostly under the age of 18 tried to join. He noted that one of the recruits, trying to remember to tell anyone who asked that he was 18, introduced himself as his phony age instead of his name.

"He must have been really shook up because when the colonel asked him, 'What's your name, young man?' he said, '18, sir,'" Bridger said.

The MVPA is the largest international historic military vehicle group with over 8,000 members across the country.

Key dairy issues await Congress after break

It's that time of year for members of Congress to head home to their districts, take tours and talk to constituents. It gives lawmakers a chance to take the pulse of what is happening back home after being in the D.C. bubble nearly every week since January.

While lawmakers will be busy crisscrossing their districts this month — including visits to farms, hopefully — a number of dairy-related items will be waiting for their return to Washington.

First and foremost, Congress must pass an appropriations bill by Sept. 30 to fund the government for the 2022 fiscal year, which begins on Oct. 1. This is always a contentious battle over the price tag and what “policy riders,” or unrelated provisions that change policy, should be included. These funding bills are generally split into 12 smaller subcommittee bills and eventually

packaged together when they go to a full House vote. While the Senate has just begun considering funding bills, the House has finished a package of seven subcommittee bills and passed two others separately, completing the majority of the appropriations bills.

The “Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies” funding bill was part of the package that passed the House. The bill would boost the funding for USDA, FDA and related agencies by around 10 percent from fiscal year 2021.

Also included in the bill report is language directing FDA “to provide clarity around the labeling of plant-

based foods that use traditional meat, dairy, and egg terminology.” Edge supports this language and hopes to see the Biden administration address the issue of rampant mislabeling of dairy imitation products that would never be tolerated in other food sectors.

With workforce top of mind for most of our members, Edge was happy to see a provision included in another House appropriations bill that would allow year-round employees to access H-2A visas. It was included in the bill that funds the Department of Homeland Security. The provision was added as an amendment in committee and was included in the final House version.

Many members of Congress oppose making any changes to the H-2A program without also addressing employment conditions for visa holders. Regardless, it is positive to see movement on the H-2A issue

while the Farm Workforce Modernization Act, a bill Edge strongly supports, is halted for further discussions in the Senate.

To end with some even better news, a recently implemented FDA rule would amend yogurt's standard of identity — something the yogurt industry has been seeking for more than two decades. The new legal definition states that cream, milk, partially skimmed milk, skim milk and the reconstituted versions of these ingredients may be used alone or in combination as the basic dairy ingredients in yogurt.

It goes on to specify which other additives and levels of cultures are acceptable. Edge applauds this move and looks forward to FDA continuing the process of updating the standards of identity of other dairy products.

Many other expenses related to the pandemic are a major part of the bill. There is free testing for COVID-19, and no one has to pay for a vaccination. Health insurance subsidies, state and local aid and money for schools, restaurants and renters are some of those programs affected by this bill, which was passed with only Democratic votes.

Gov. Tony Evers is having a more difficult time promoting his agenda. The Republican-controlled legislature has squashed most of his initiatives to improve the lives of Wisconsinites. He has said: “In many ways, this budget presents a false choice between the priorities the people of this state care about and deserve.” He has, however, acknowledged some successes.

One of Evers' promises when he ran for governor was to cut taxes for middle class families by 10%. He kept his word by providing more than \$2 billion in individual tax relief.

Evers also was able to fund more

than \$465 million in new funding for roads and acquire more funding for health care programs. He also was successful in combating water pollution.

Many times people vote based on what they are hearing again and again, even though the messages may be false. Voters have a responsibility to examine both sides of an argument before they decide to give their support to a candidate.

Redistricting is a nonpartisan issue

To the editor:

In the July 23 edition of the Shawano Leader, there was an article entitled, “Democrats march, rally for fair maps.” Most of the information about the need for nonpartisan redistricting was correct, but some of it was not. For one thing, the event was not initiated by the Democratic Party. A nonpartisan group called the Shawano Fairness Coalition planned and executed the march and rally from Franklin Park to the Shawano County Courthouse. This group believes there should be fairness in

government. They have collected names on petitions calling for fair wages for workers and fair voting maps.

The movement to get the Wisconsin Legislature to pass nonpartisan redistricting legislation has been a nonpartisan issue which is gaining support across the state. Polling that has been done on the topic showed that 83% of Democrats, 63% of Republicans and 76% of Independent voters favored the end to gerrymandering. Shawano County is included in the 76% of Wisconsin counties which have passed resolutions or referendums. In 2019, Shawano County passed its resolution asking for the state to create a fair, nonpartisan procedure for the preparation of legislative and congressional redistricting plans.

Senate Bill 389 and Assembly Bill 395 have been introduced in the legislature. They recommend that a nonpartisan commission be set up to draw the voting districts in the future so there is no advantage to the party in power. You are urged to contact your representatives and tell them to support these bills.

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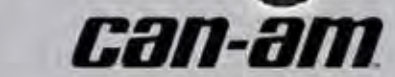

After four decades of growth, the Shawano Folk Music Festival was handed a setback in 2020, like everyone else, in the form of a pandemic that put almost everyone's plans on hold.

With COVID-19 and its variants still on people's minds this year, the venerable festival is coming back with the same level of enthusiasm in a smaller package.

The 2021 festival will be one day only, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Aug. 14, and moving from Mielke County Park to Franklin Park in downtown Shawano, and all outdoors — no indoor evening concerts.

The lineup of performers for the five hours of continuous music includes:

- Matt Watroba, who describes himself as a community singer, song leader and educator. Producer and host of the Folks Like Us program, as well as the nationally syndicated Sing Out Radio Magazine and the streaming service Folk Alley, Watroba has come in contact with many aspects of folk music and culture. 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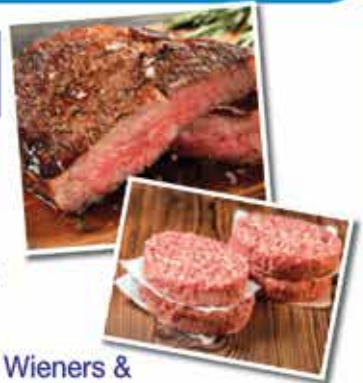
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
