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Stockbridge-Munsee tribal member succumbs to COVID

Shawano County reports first coronavirus death

The Stockbridge-Munsee tribal government has reported that one of its members has died due to complications of COVID-19. No details of the victim were released. If the individual was a Shawano County resident, he or she would be the first in Shawano County to be linked to the disease.

"With heavy hearts, we share that a member of our community has lost their life due to complications from COVID-19. We mourn with their family and friends and send them our deepest sympathy," the tribal government website reports.

While not specifically identifying the deceased person, the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department announced that Shawano County is reporting its first death to COVID-19.

"With this unfortunate news, we

would like to remind everyone to continue to practice precautions against COVID-19," Vicki Dantoin, Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department health officer said in a press release Monday. "Continue to keep 6 feet of distance from others, wash your hands often, clean and disinfect frequently touched areas in your home, wear facial coverings in public areas, avoid gatherings with people outside of your household and stay home when you are sick.

"Keep in mind that certain individuals may be at increased risk for serious illness from COVID-19 due to other health conditions. If you have preexisting health conditions or live with someone who has significant health conditions, please take extra precautions to protect yourself or your household member. Additional information on health conditions that may increase the severity of illness from COVID-19 can be found from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. You may also find information on extra precautions you can take to avoid COVID-19.

"If at any time you experience symptoms of COVID-19, please stay home and contact your health care provider to see if you are eligible for COVID-19 testing. Continue to stay in isolation as directed by your health care provider or public health. If you are identified as a close contact to someone who tests positive for COVID-19, please stay home in quarantine for at least 14 days following your last contact with the individual."

As of Sept. 11, Shawano County reported 377 total cases of COVID-19; Menominee County reported 33.

Free testing will be available to all Wisconsin residents with symptoms or concerns about COVID-19 on Tuesday and Wednesday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Shawano County Fairgrounds, 990 E. Green Bay St., Shawano. Members of the Wisconsin National Guard will provide the in-vehicle testing.

Bonduel schools go virtual Monday due to staff shortage

The Bonduel School District quickly had to go from in-person to virtual Monday when it didn't have enough staff members and substitutes to teach classes.

A notice was posted on Facebook at 9:34 p.m. Sunday by Superintendent Joe Dawidziak announcing the shift. He said staff members are having to quarantine themselves, and the district is having difficulty finding substitutes to fill in for the absent teachers.

"We also will be using tomorrow (Monday) to determine if students or groups of students need to quarantine and to notify those parents if that is the case," Dawidziak wrote. "So we will have one day of virtual learning only tomorrow until we know more."

Dawidziak said he did not have numbers indicating how many staff members were quarantining themselves, but he had to make the decision quickly, as he learned the information on Sunday night.

"There were two factors in play," Dawidziak said. "One, we knew we were going to have an issue covering all of them. The other one was that I got the notification about 7:30 last (Sunday) night, and by the time I saw it on my phone, it was almost 8:30."

Dawidziak said that trying to contact trace students who were in contact with the quarantined staff members on Sunday night would have been impossible, so the decision was made to make school all virtual for Monday at least while the district tried to get a handle on who might be impacted.

Third through 12th grades were

able to return to school Tuesday, while the younger grades have to remain in online learning for the rest of the week, according to Dawidziak. He anticipated that all students would likely be back in school next week.

Bonduel started the year with all of its students in classrooms five days a week with slightly shorter days.

While Dawidziak apologized online for the short notice in this case, he said it was possible he'd have to make snap decisions like that in the future if another surge in positive cases was found.

"Most districts understand that this is a possibility going throughout the school year from time to time," Dawidziak said. "Most people are expecting that."

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School board code of conduct goes for vote Monday

Committee moves policy forward with little fanfare

The Shawano School Board will vote Monday on a policy outlining board members' behavior and establishing a code of conduct.

The policy was first brought before the board on Sept. 8, but members felt it would be best that the new policy go through the Shawano School District's policy and curriculum committee for review, which it did earlier this week.

Superintendent Randi Anderson told the committee that the policy was written by the district's attorney, Geoff Lacy, based on similar policies that other school districts have in place.

The policy outlines general expectations, which includes treating others with respect and communicating in a way that doesn't violate the district's policies on harassment and discrimination. There's also an expectation to avoid implicating the district in unlawful activity or anything that would otherwise harm the district.

There is also a requirement on board communications being true and accurate.

"Board members who fail to adhere to this expectation, or who publicly communicate false or intentionally misleading information pertaining to board action or district policy, will be asked to correct such communication in a way that is likely to reach the same audience as the false or misleading information," the policy reads.

The policy also authorizes the board president to issue public statements on the board's behalf to correct any misinformation released by other board members.

Complaints about individual board members can be brought by anyone to the board president, according to the policy. In the event that the board president is the subject of the complaint, the complaint can be brought to the vice president. Complaints are expected to be investigated, and a briefing to the board would take place if it was determined the incident violated district policies.

Action taken by the board against board members who violate policy includes formal censure by resolution. The board had to take this action earlier this year in response to a Facebook post by board member Mart Grams

that stated: "You know George Floyd has been drug free for 2 months," referencing the Black man who died in Minnesota in May while in police custody, which set off protests and riots nationwide.

Other actions the board can take include removing the board member from committee assignments, restricting board members from requesting that items be placed on board meeting agendas and referring the board member to the police if the misconduct violates local, state and national laws.

Board members on the committee recommended the policy move forward with little discussion.

"It's common sense," board member Chris Gull said.

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Bus ridership down for Shawano public schools

Parents are bringing their children to school more frequently in the Shawano School District, according to data gathered in the first week of school.

Superintendent Randi Anderson said that about 30% of its students rode the bus on the week of Sept. 1, when school first started in Shawano. This is according to data furnished by Kobussen Buses, which Anderson said she has asked the company to furnish weekly as the district tries to get a handle on its transportation budget during the coronavirus pandemic.

"We can kind of look to make sure we are using our dollars and allocating our resources to the best of our

ability," Anderson said during a Sept. 9 meeting of the district's finance committee.

In order for a bus to have the 6 feet of social distancing recommended by health experts during the pandemic, the maximum occupancy is 30 students, 35 if siblings sit together. Buses normally have a capacity of 72-75, according to Anderson. She said that one of the buses had 32 students, but another only had 16, with the average coming between 12 and 18, so it might be necessary to tweak routes if numbers don't increase in subsequent weeks.

"We're going to continue to look at this for the month of September, and then we will go back to Kobussen with some possible suggestions about where we may be able to condense routes but still keep the

social distancing piece," Anderson said.

She added that windows are being kept down on the buses to provide

sufficient ventilation and mitigate the risk of coronavirus spread.

COVID shutters several county offices

Several offices at the Shawano County Courthouse were temporarily closed on Tuesday due to an outbreak of coronavirus.

County officials were not releasing information about the number of offices closed or the number of employees affected.

"We may have some offices that are closed temporarily due to the COVID situation," Public Health Director Vicki Dantoin said.

She said she would have to confer with legal counsel to see whether any more information can be released.

Dantoin also said there were still details about the COVID situation being finalized.

"It's kind of the same as what's been

going on around the county and the numbers are significantly higher than they had been previously," she said. "It's bound to occur in some businesses."

Dantoin added it's not always the workplace where the virus is contracted.

"What people do in their personal lives is their business, and there can be exposure that way," she said. "It's

not always exposure at the workplace, but they do occur and there have been plenty of business in the county that have had COVID as well."

County Clerk Pam Schmidt confirmed that her office is one of those temporarily closed, but would not comment on others. She referred any further questions to Administrative Coordinator Brent Miller, who could not be reached by press time Wednesday.

Hillcrest reports positive coronavirus case

Hillcrest Primary School has a confirmed positive case of coronavirus, Shawano School District Superintendent Randi Anderson confirmed on Tuesday.

A letter was sent home to parents letting them know that a positive case was in the school, but that everything was expected to continue as normal. The district is currently hav-

ing Hillcrest students attend classes five days per week.

Anderson said that she contacted the Shawano-Menominee Counties Health Department upon confirming the case and was informed that the school would not need to be closed at this time.

"We have been able to identify and notify individuals that would need to be quarantined based on close contact, and we're going to

continue the deep cleaning that we do every night," Anderson said. "At this point in time, we're able to stay open."

Anderson said there are no other confirmed cases at the other three schools in the district.

The letter reminded parents of ways to avoid potentially contracting the coronavirus, like washing your hands, social distancing and not attending any large-group event.

America's elections demand integrity

The cornerstone of a democracy is the people's right to elect their leaders. It is vital that our elections are safe and secure.

Today, the majority of people in our country get their news from social media, primarily Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.

They are exposed to a daily dose of hoaxes, rumors, conspiracy theories and misleading news. When it's all mixed in with reliable information from honest sources, the truth can be very hard to discern.

We expect that the government will disclose information and not lie to us. However, according to the Washington Post's fact checker in July, Donald Trump had already told over 20,000 lies.

He has used a combination of methods used to sow deceit. Misinformation is false information which might seem credible on the surface but does not hold up to further scrutiny.

An example is when Trump says that it is safer to early vote than to vote absentee. It is actually the same thing.

What is even more dangerous in an election year, is disinformation. It is very powerful and can be destructive and divisive. This false information is intended to deceive and confuse.

When Trump says that mail-in voting will produce fraud, he is undermining the integrity of our elections and setting the stage for a contested election.

Every eligible voter should have the right to determine how they will exercise their right to vote, be

that by absentee ballot by mail or in person on election day. The false claim of voter fraud reduces confidence in our democracy.

In April 2020, a 20-year voter fraud study by MIT University found the level of fraud "exceedingly rare" since it occurs only in 0.00006% of instances nationally, and, in one state, 0.000004% — about five times less likely than getting hit by lightning in the United States.

Nevertheless, Trump has recently suggested that people in North Carolina stress-test the security of their elections systems by voting twice — an act that constitutes the kind of voter fraud the president has railed against. Voting twice, by the way, is a felony.

In this campaign season, we have to be on the lookout for what could be disinformation. Trump lied when he said that Russia had nothing to do with helping him in the 2016 election.

Now, four years later, the Senate has the proof that the Trump campaign was eager to take Russian help in 2016. In its final review of the situation a Republican-led Senate committee said Russia used Paul Manafort and the WikiLeaks website to try to help Trump win the 2016 election.

The Russian's purpose was to get Trump elected because they

thought that his policies would benefit them if they helped him get elected.

Why does Trump doubt the information from U.S. intelligence agencies but he believes Vladimir Putin without question?

There are already concerns about the integrity of the 2020 election with an intelligence official warning earlier this month that Russia, China and Iran are all seeking to interfere in the presidential contest this fall.

The Trump's administration's recent policy changes intelligence briefings so they will no longer be held in person. This could clearly limit the amount of information that American voters have about election interference.

Trump appears to think that most of the mail-in voting is done by Democrats. According to the Chicago Tribune, Trump has said that if the United States switched to all-mail voting, "you'd never have a Republican elected in this country again." Therefore, he wants to have Democrats believe that their vote won't count.

This is fear propaganda, it is an appeal to a person's fear attempting to increase anxiety towards a perceived danger. Trump has been using this technique when he says that people should vote in person (despite the chance of being exposed to COVID-19) because with absentee ballots, the results won't be known for days, weeks or even years.

By saying this Trump hopes that people won't want our country to

be in turmoil, so they won't vote by mail. Trump himself, however, has voted absentee by mail.

Moreover, members of military have safely voted this way for years.

It's important for us to be vigilant. We should be able to recognize propaganda techniques when we see them.

Lying and deception can include the utterance of half-truths, name-calling, misuse of statistics and many more.

We can't rely on those who manage Facebook or Twitter to weed out misinformation and disinformation. There are some things we can do.

We can think before we share a post on social media. We can read beyond the headlines. We can check more than one source or go to sites like snopes.com and fact-check.org.

We can look carefully to see if a picture was retouched or altered. We can look for grammatical errors which might mean the post came from a foreign source.

According to Thomas Jefferson, "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. Our liberty depends on the freedom of the press and that cannot be limited without being lost." So, because our democracy demands a free press, we need to take the time to sift through the news to determine what is really the truth.

Your vote is your voice. Our elections demand integrity.

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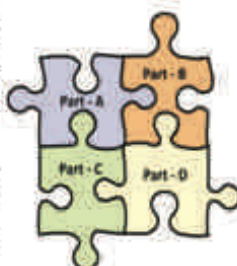

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Mail-in voting getting underway

Clerks expecting heavy absentee voting this election season

A Wisconsin Supreme Court decision Monday cleared the way for the first round of absentee ballots for the Nov. 3 election to go out as planned Thursday to Wisconsin voters who had already requested them.

Clerks statewide were notified Sept. 11 that the mailing of ballots was in limbo while the state court considered a lawsuit seeking to get the Green Party onto the ballot previously approved by the Wisconsin Election Commission.

Noting that the 2020 election season had already essentially begun, the court ruled, “it is too late to grant petitioners any form of relief that would be feasible and that would not cause confusion and undue damage to both the Wisconsin electors who want to vote and the other candidates in all of the various races on the general election ballot.”

Voters for weeks have been inundated with campaign fliers and third-party absentee ballot request forms, including one from the Wisconsin Election Commission.

Municipal clerks have already started getting absentee ballot requests and they expect those requests to keep coming in through October with a much higher-than-normal interest this year in mail-in voting due to the coronavirus pandemic.

“The last day we can mail out an absentee ballot is Oct. 29,” Shawano City Clerk Lesley Nemetz said. “All ballots need to be back at City Hall by 8 p.m. on election day, Nov. 3.”

For those concerned their ballots might not get back in time, there is the drop box located outside City Hall.

“People can mail their ballots back, put them in the drop box or bring them in to City Hall,” Nemetz said. “We will check the drop box periodically throughout the day every day as well as on election day.”

Nemetz said many people might feel more comfortable either mailing in their ballots or doing in-person absentee voting ahead of election day.

from Oct. 20-30.

“People still have COVID concerns,” Nemetz said. “Our space isn’t overly excessive, so if you choose to come in on election day, you’re probably going to be standing in line for longer than you’d like to because we’re only going to allow so many people in the building at a time and it’s going to be cold.”

Shawano County Clerk Pam Schmidt said the county is prepared for the heavy influx of absentee voting.

“We believe we’re prepared,” she said. “We have about 8,000 absentee envelopes here because we supply them to all of the clerks, aside from the city and the Town of Wescott. They have so many, they just order their own.”

Though there has been some political rhetoric at the national level about the security of mail-in voting, voters in Shawano County should be confident their ballots will be secure and will be counted, Schmidt said.

“I think with any of the problems that they’ve been having, with them feeling they’re not secure or bins of them sitting in the post office or getting lost, I am highly confident that does not happen in our county,” she said.

“First of all, we’re quite a bit smaller and we’re in constant contact with our clerks and making sure that things are all set for them and they’re all fully competent,” Schmidt said.

“Not that clerks in other counties aren’t,” she said, “but we’re just a smaller county. I’m confident in the way elections are run and I don’t think that there’s any absentee ballots sitting in closets or anything like that.”

Nemetz said that once the ballots are sent out, everything within the system is tracked.

“If a ballot’s already been sent to an individual, we can’t send duplicate ballots,” she said. “When the ballots come back, there’s no markings on the envelopes that say how a person voted or what candidate they would have voted for. It’s just strictly their name and their address, so when it comes back on election day we know who voted. When the ballots come back, we

keep them in a secure location.”

Nemetz said the system would also flag anyone who voted by mail and then tried voting a second time in person, as has been suggested by President Donald Trump as a way of checking the system.

“That will get caught,” Nemetz said.

“There are watermarks in our poll books that let the poll workers know if an individual has been mailed a ballot and their ballot has already been returned,” she said. “If a person’s ballot has already been returned to the polling location, they cannot vote on Election Day.”

Wittenberg Village Clerk Traci Matsche noted that voters should request and return their ballots early for any election, but especially for the upcoming presidential election.

She noted that of the 1,030 residents in the village, 783 are of voting age. In the August election, 449 were registered to vote. In Wittenberg for the last presidential election, the official record shows 64 people registered to vote on Election Day, and Matsche anticipates more for this election. A total of 504 registered but only 404 people voted.

Matsche noted that anyone who has concerns about COVID-19 but wants to come to the community center to vote should try to do so during the midday hours, as fewer people vote at that time.

The Wittenberg Post Office handles deliveries for the surrounding areas. Supervisor Jamie Kolpack said that if you bring in your ballot and have it hand-stamped at the customer service window, it will be delivered locally. All other mail gets sent to Green Bay for processing, Kolpack said.

The U.S. Postal Service is recommending voters request ballots at the earliest point allowable but no later than 15 days prior to the election date.

Oconto County Clerk Kim Pytleski urged voters who haven’t yet requested an absentee ballot to make their request as soon as possible.

Requests made too close to the deadline can be problematic, she said. Requests can be made at myvote.wi.gov or in writing to the municipal clerk.

Native teachings through harmony

Keshena Primary School teacher's music lesson plans going nationwide

Most teachers hope that the lesson plans they come up with will be sufficient to educate the students in their classroom.

For Natasha Verhulst, her plans are going to educate students nationally and internationally.

Verhulst, music teacher at Keshena Primary School, will help students learn about Native American music through the Native Education for All project being executed by the National Indian Education Association and IllumiNative, a nonprofit initiative that seeks to increase the visibility of tribes. Native Education for All is dedicated to developing lesson plans that are based in Native American teachings and developed by Native American educators for all teachers to use.

"In the last year and a half, I've really been diving into creating lesson plans that include Native American music because it was something that sparked my interest in my master's classes," Verhulst said. "When I saw that they had put a call out for lesson plans, I had already made some and presented them at a state conference in 2019."

Verhulst submitted her plans just to see what NIEA officials thought, and she didn't think they considered her plans to be any good when she didn't hear back from them for a while. However, one day she received an email saying that NIEA was revamping its lesson repository, and that her lesson plans would be an excellent fit.

Verhulst noted that her plans are particularly relevant now in a time when the coronavirus pandemic has many schools, including hers, providing virtual education some or all of the time.

The lesson plans encourage music teachers to do things like round dances, according to Verhulst. They include examples of Native drumming and take a look at the different ways that Native music is set up, she said.

"I think a lot of teachers are afraid to incorporate Native music because they're afraid they'll do it wrong or inappropriately," Verhulst said. "There are parts that we can't use in our lesson plans because they're ceremonial, or they're sacred, but that

doesn't mean we should eliminate it completely from the curriculum."

By not incorporating the cultural music of indigenous tribes, teachers are helping to perpetuate the stereotype that Native Americans no longer exist, in Verhulst's view.

"It's considered old and historical," Verhulst said. "If we don't include that, it feeds the stereotypes or mentalities of those issues."

For Verhulst, an enrolled member of the Bad River Band of the Lake Superior Tribe of Chippewa and a first-degree descendant of the

Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, making sure that all students have an understanding of Native American music is personal. She was raised off-reservation in Kiel, and she experienced the stereotypes firsthand.

"A lot of places you go, Native American culture and history is kind of glazed over and not included as much as it could be in curriculums," Verhulst said. "It made me uncomfortable growing up. My mom and one of my aunties came in and would present in the fourth grade.

Everyone knew I was Native American, but it was one of those things where they were like, 'Well, you're not a real Native American, because you don't live on a reservation or you don't exist anymore.'"

Verhulst lost her Menominee grandparents at an early age, which left it up to her mother, aunts and uncles to teach what they knew about the culture. She plays a Native American flute and was first interested in playing the instrument from regular visits to the reservation.

"I really wanted one, so my parents gifted me one when I was in sixth grade," Verhulst said. "I just kind of self-taught myself and listened to other people online and made my own stuff."

Verhulst also gained knowledge about the flute growing up by attending classes taught by Menominee musician Wade Fernandez. Verhulst has also written lesson plans in the last month for Fernandez to use in future classes.

Verhulst has taught music for six years, although this is her first year at Keshena Primary. Having the chance to educate countless children about Native American music through her lessons plan, she said, is "humbling."

"I originally had felt, growing up off the reservation, like I didn't really belong anywhere," Verhulst said. "I was growing up in a non-Native society, but knowing I was Native, I didn't think I fit there. I didn't feel like I grew up with the culture and stuff, and it was very hard to feel like I belonged to either (society). Now, doing this work, it has helped me to feel reconnected here."

Verhulst will be presenting on Native American music at the Feierabend Association for Music Association biennial conference in July 2021.

Wendell Waukau, superintendent for the Menominee Indian School District, expressed pride in what Verhulst is doing at both the local and national levels. He said it highlights the district's work and that Verhulst serves as "an outstanding example of how our teachers are willing to go the extra mile to connect with and educate our students, while sharing their best practices with others."

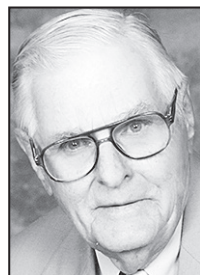

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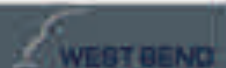

Green Bay's offense chasing consistency after breakout game

Unit could apply similar gameplan against Detroit

After the Green Bay Packers were pretty quiet during the offseason in addressing areas of need on offense, fans, analysts and the rest of the football community expected a similar looking offense this season.

And for nearly the entire first half of Sunday's game against the Minnesota Vikings, people got what they expected — an offense that could move the ball down the field but was lacking when it came to third down and red zone chances.

Things changed in a hurry, as the Packers scored two touchdowns in the last minute of the first half to take control of the contest, then tacked on three more touchdowns in the second half to outscore the Vikings and open up the season with a key division win.

Green Bay converted six of 11 of its third down chances for the game. After kicking two field goals and turning the ball over on downs on its first three trips to the red zone, the Packers scored touchdowns on all three of its red zone trips in the second half.

All training camp, quarterback Aaron Rodgers talked about being more comfortable in the second year of the offense under coach Matt LaFleur, and Rodgers looked it Sunday.

The two-time MVP had one of his best games in recent memory, completing 32 of his 44 attempts for 364 yards and four touchdowns — numbers that could have been even better had his receivers not dropped a couple passes.

Green Bay punted just one time and didn't turn the ball over. Rodgers wasn't sacked.

"I think Matt (LaFleur) had a really good plan this week," said Rodgers after the game. "I think him and his staff came up with some really good ideas, and I think we executed pretty well."

The Packers offense was able to take advantage of some inexperienced players in the Vikings secondary, a

unit the Packers might try and attack again this week as the Detroit Lions come to town.

The Lions have more experience at the cornerback and safety positions than the Vikings, but they allowed three fourth-quarter touchdown passes to Mitch Trubisky and the Chicago Bears on Sunday. Detroit held a 23-6 lead in that game before allowing 21 points in the final five minutes.

The Lions secondary will now try and slow the Packer trio of Davante Adams, Marquez Valdes-Scantling and Allen Lazard. Adams accounted for 14 catches, 156 yards and two scores, with Valdes-Scantling and Lazard each hauling in four passes and scoring a touchdown.

The Packers quietly racked up 158 rushing yards against the Vikings, doing a lot of that damage early in the

game on jet sweeps to Tyler Ervin and Lazard and then leaning on Aaron Jones late to burn some clock and gash a tired defense.

"It's only one week, so I don't think any of us are going to be patting ourselves on the back," said LaFleur after Sunday's win.

Detroit allowed 149 yards (over five yards a carry) against the Bears.

What the Packers did offensively was even more impressive considering the injuries the offensive line had to deal with.

Elgton Jenkins — normally Green Bay's starting left guard — started the game at right tackle because of Billy Turner's knee injury. That moved Lucas Patrick to the left guard position.

Patrick left the game after 32 snaps because of a shoulder injury, which moved Jenkins back to left

guard and inserted offseason acquisition Rick Wagner at right tackle. Lane Taylor — who started at right guard — then suffered a knee injury in the fourth quarter, which brought in rookie Jon Runyan for his first NFL game action.

Taylor has since been ruled out for the year with the injury, but Patrick is probable to play in week two. With Turner still working his way back, the team may need to make a couple moves this week to make sure it can get through its next game.

If last year's games with the Lions are any indication of what's to happen this year, the Packers will need to be ready to battle, regardless of what areas of the game they might hold an advantage or be at a disadvantage.

A new NFL experience

I've got a confession to make.

My favorite NFL stadium was the Minnesota Vikings' old home, the Metrodome.

Now, to be clear, the place was dump. It had all character of cheap white bread. It was as ugly on the outside as it was on the inside. It was devoid of history and charm. There

was one small bathroom in a cramped press box. The pregame meal was terrible.

But, man, what a place to watch a football game. Inexplicably, the media was given some of the best seats in the house. I would be stationed somewhere around the 30-yard line, maybe 20 rows up. And it wasn't a cozy, enclosed press box. Media was right out there with the fans, and then-general manager Ted Thompson and other organizational leaders were a row or two behind me.

I remember in 2009, when Brett Favre was starting for Minnesota, two fans wearing some sort of hand-crafted fur hats came walking up the aisle and started shouting at Thompson, in rather colorful language, telling him he was, well, not very smart for getting rid of Favre.

That's why I liked it, though. It was

so incredibly loud, and so different than the cozy quiet of Lambeau Field's comfy press box. The feeling is similar at the Vikings' four-year-old U.S. Bank Stadium. The packing list is the same. Computer and cord, notebook and pens, audio recorder and bottle of Ibuprofen. Even though we might as well be viewing the game from Pluto we are so far from the action, the noise is deafening. Since it's usually a bipartisan crowd for Packers-Vikings, the noise is unrelenting. Frequently, it's impossible to communicate with the person to my left or right.

Honestly, it's spectacular.

That's what made Sunday's season-opening game at Minnesota so incredibly weird. The stadium was empty, aside from a socially distanced press area at maybe one-third capacity. It was just like watching a Packers training camp practice.

You could hear Aaron Rodgers' cadence, player reactions and the officials' whistles all over the background music. I was always rather dubious of Minnesota's animated decibel meter when it would read 110db, but now I believe it. The NFL is allowing teams to provide 70db of ambient noise. It might as well have been 10.

It seems louder when I coach my kids' flag football games. There was

no "Skol" chant, which is really cool, and no fans singing the "Skol, Vikings, Skol," fight song, which is really lame.

"Weird. Really weird," was Davante Adams' incredibly accurate description after the game.

Even the trip to the game was weird. For those of you who've gone to Lambeau, you know the bottleneck that forms on Wisconsin 29 and U.S. 41 on the drive to and from the stadium. On Sunday, it was an easy trip to parking and an eerie calm outside the stadium. There were no bands playing. No masses of fans swarming near the cool Viking ship and sail located outside the southwest corner of the stadium. No anticipation of the border war that was to come.

That's going to strike me this Sunday when I make my way to Lambeau Field for my 13th season covering the team. There will be no smell of tailgating outside the stadium or brats cooking inside the stadium. No joy from fans young and old fired up to see the Packers. No "Go Pack Go" chants from fans entering and exiting the venerable stadium.

Lambeau Field has been home to a lot of historic moments. Sunday will be another. After 350 consecutive sellouts, the metal bleachers will be empty for the game against the Detroit Lions. It will be football without a game of catch between some lucky fans and Tim Boyle. Football without Lambeau Leaps. Football without

78,000 fans serving as the 12th man on defense. It will be fun. It just will be incredibly different.

"The weirdest thing will be the no fans, for sure," Rodgers said recently. "As a golf fan, hearing Tiger and Phil and some of the longtime players talk about how they've enjoyed feeding off the energy in the crowd (in the past), it's very similar in our sport. Whether you're at home or on the road, there's an energy that's innate to those certain places that you're just not going to have.

"Minnesota is always a place that's tough to play, and it's because that crowd is into it and it's loud. Even when you're on the road, you can feed off that energy. There's a joy in silencing a road crowd. And then when you're playing at home in Lambeau, when things get rolling, it's just like a snowball going downhill. I'll miss 'The Wave' and 'Roll Out the Barrel' and the beer races and the little idiosyncrasies that make our stadium so special."

Someone recently called today's world of masks and social distancing the "new normal." Lord, I hope not. Nothing about this is normal. But at least for three hours on Sunday, there will be football. It will look different, it will sound different, it will smell different. But it's football, which sure as hell beats the alternative.

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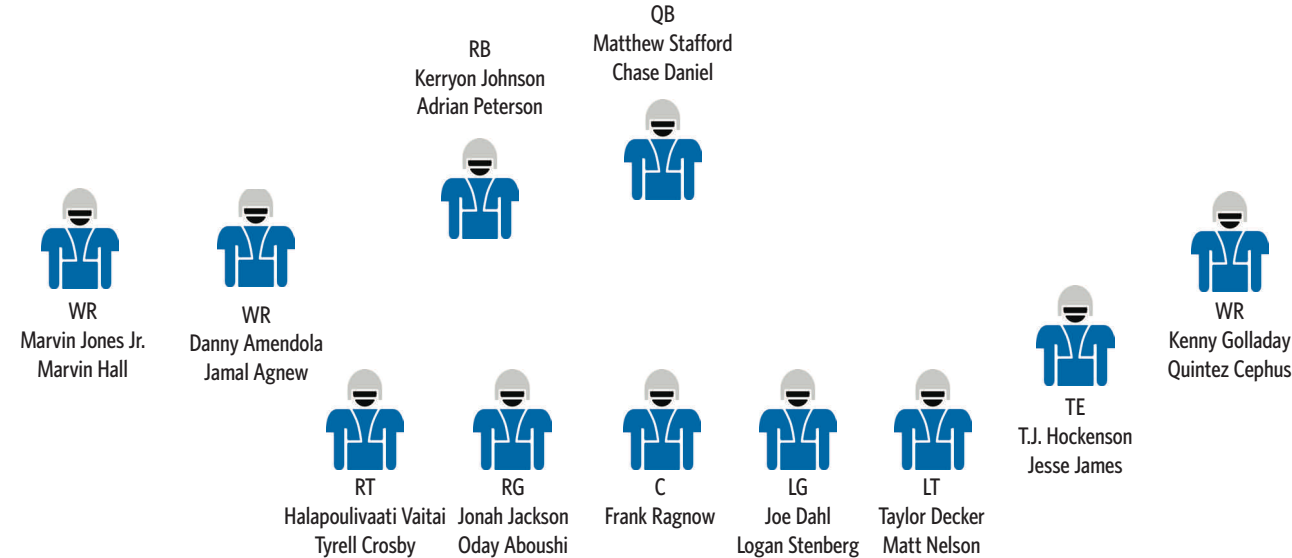
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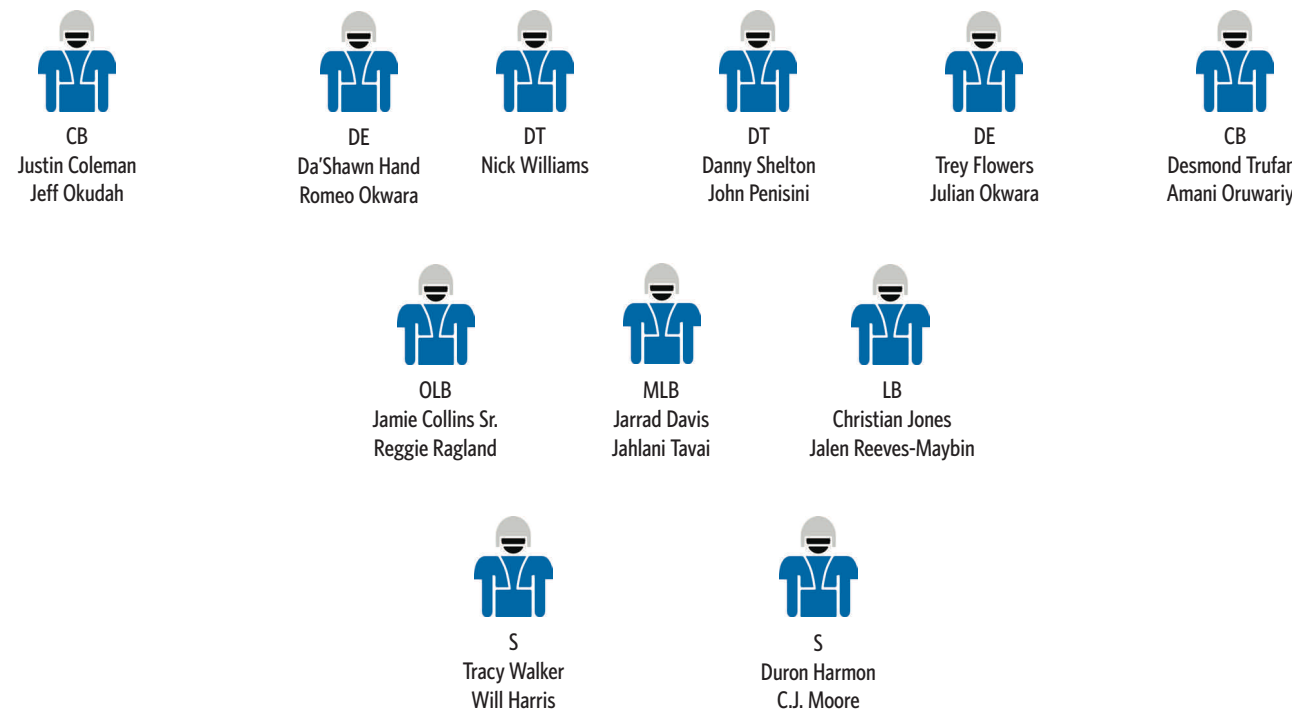

PACKERS NOTEBOOK

LaFleur, Rodgers connection

When the Green Bay Packers hired Matt LaFleur as coach in January 2019, the hope was the bright, young offensive mind with a strong track record with quarterbacks could bring the best out of two-time MVP Aaron Rodgers.

Instead, neither Rodgers individually nor the offense as a whole were any better compared to 2018. While the Packers surged from six wins to 13, Rodgers was the same statistically ho-hum quarterback.

On Sunday at Minnesota, Rodgers looked an awful lot like the Rodgers who demolished the entire NFL during his famous run-the-table tour of 2016. Rodgers, who ended last season with a sub-100 passer rating in seven of his final eight regular-season games, completed 32-of-44 passes for 364 yards and four touchdowns, good for a passer rating of 127.4. It was his best passer rating since back-to-back games of 158.3 vs. Oakland and 129.0 vs. Kansas City at midseason last year.

"I saw that laser focus come since the beginning of the week," receiver Davante Adams said of Rodgers after the game. "Obviously, he's always extremely focused, but there's a certain type of look in his eye he has and he definitely had that going into the week.

"People may not know, but I pay attention to a lot of stuff. When I see my guy having his hood on his head and he's got headphones on. As soon as we leave a meeting, he's popping headphones back on, I don't know what's he's listening to but, whatever it is, I need to listen to that, as well. That's my guy."

Rodgers had a strong training camp. Some of it was the year two comfort level with LaFleur and the offense. It was more than that, though. While some outsiders speculated that Rodgers would arrive to training camp feeling surly about the team's drafting of quarterback Jordan Love in the first round, it's been the opposite.

Rodgers arrived in a good spot mentally and physically, having spent an unusual offseason "finding my center." At one point during camp, he volunteered that he had picked up on something from watching himself in 2010.

"I feel like I can deal the ball as quickly as I want to, and today was a good start for that," Rodgers said

after the game. "I feel like I was on time with my throws. There wasn't the need for a lot of extended plays, and the couple that we had turned into pretty good plays."

It added up to the biggest week one performance by Green Bay since joining the NFL in 1922. In fact, the yardage output of 522 total yards was by far the most in an opener in franchise history, dwarfing the 488 yards piled up against Atlanta in an overtime victory in 2002. The previous record for week one in a game that didn't go to overtime was 424 yards against Detroit in 2001.

On Sunday, Green Bay will host the Lions. By the end of their week one loss to Chicago, they were without their top three corners due to hamstring injuries.

Reset button

LaFleur is 7-0 against the NFC North, including a pair of wins over Detroit last season. Oddly enough, the Packers led for exactly 0 seconds in those games, winning with frantic comebacks and walk-off field goals by Mason Crosby.

That will be LaFleur's battle cry to keep the Packers grounded after an impressive debut.

"We've got to hit that reset button and get to work because we know we've got a tremendous task in front of us," LaFleur said Monday.

His counterpart, Matt Patricia, wants to hit the reset button, too. The Lions had the Bears beaten twice but wound up suffering a bitter 27-23 loss. Detroit blew a 23-6 lead in the fourth quarter but would have won, anyway, had rookie running back D'Andre Swift not dropped a 16-yard touchdown pass on the next-to-last play of the game.

The Lions, having blown two wins against Green Bay last year, need to avoid the here-we-go-again mentality, Patricia acknowledged.

"I think that for us, obviously, last year is last year, and there's some pieces that are different than where we were last year from that aspect of it," he said. "So, we make sure that we're focusing on the guys that are here now. There's a lot of guys here who are in key roles that were not part of last year's team, so they certainly don't have that mentality at all.

"For us, we actually have to make sure it doesn't creep in. Sometimes maybe you hear it too much from the outside world, then you start to think, 'Is that the case?' But it's not the case for us inside. So right now for us, we have to make sure we

understand it was week one and we got to improve week two."

Old nemesis

The Lions signed 35-year-old running back Adrian Peterson on Sept. 7. Even with substantial investments in Kerryon Johnson (second round, 2018) and Swift (second round, 2020), Peterson rushed for a team-high 93 yards against Chicago.

Peterson has played for Minnesota, Arizona, New Orleans and Washington. Coincidentally, he'll face all of those teams this season.

"No, I'm not that salty, you know," Peterson told reporters in Detroit. "It was just a great opportunity, to be honest with you. A great team. I loved what (offensive coordinator Darrell) Bevell had to say and coach Patricia. When I evaluated the team, I felt like I could really contribute and help this team be successful. That was ultimately the main thing, and being able to play in the NFC North was a bonus, for sure."

Peterson has rushed for 1,975 yards and 16 touchdowns in 19 career games against Green Bay. Only Hall of Famers Walter Payton (2,484 yards in 24 games) and Barry Sanders (2,059 yards in 19 games) have rushed for more.

Dead zone

How upset was LaFleur about Green Bay's red-zone troubles to start last week's game?

"I was very, very, very upset," LaFleur said.

Green Bay misfired on its first

three treks inside Minnesota's 20-yard line. The first died after two completions of minus-1 yard apiece. The second ended when Aaron Jones was stuffed on third-and-goal from the 1 and Rodgers misfired on fourth down. The third petered out after three consecutive throwaways by Rodgers.

It was the same lament from Patricia. Yes, his team coughed up a big lead in the fourth quarter. But, in Patricia's mind, the game never should have come down to the final quarter. Detroit settled for a pair of short field goals in the first half after Stafford went 0-for-3 passing and Peterson rushed three times for 4 yards.

"We have to capitalize there," Patricia said. "We're doing some things that weren't really how we practiced or coached it. There were just some plays in there that I think could've really changed the scenarios at the end of the game. Those plays are really important to capitalize on so you don't have to be on those constant back-and-forth situations at the end."

Runyan's debut

Injuries hammered Green Bay's offensive line. Billy Turner was inactive with a knee injury, Lane Taylor suffered a season-ending knee injury and Lucas Patrick exited with an injured shoulder. Just like that, rookie sixth-round pick Jon Runyan was thrust into action for the final 15 snaps. He fared well, playing right guard for two series that ended in touchdowns.

Runyan played at Michigan and is the son of former longtime NFL starter Jon Runyan Sr. Runyan Sr., who is employed by the league, promised a film session with his son. His mom, who has been in Green Bay helping her son settle into his new place, prepared a welcome-home dinner.

"It's insane," Runyan said, of blocking for Rodgers. "I remember being in eighth grade and watching Aaron win the Super Bowl. I was sitting there on my couch. Now I got thrown in my first NFL game I ever dressed, I'm in charge of protecting him. It's kind of crazy how life works sometimes."

"That was my first snaps with the first-team offense, first snaps with Aaron, with all the guys. I think I handled myself pretty well. It was a little nerve-racking at first. There weren't any fans in the stadium, so that helped a little bit too with communication, but it felt good to get out there."

When the Packers have the ball

Green Bay's offense, which mostly sputtered through year one under LaFleur, had a day for the ages against Minnesota. The Packers' 522 yards were the most by any team in week one. In fact, they were first in points (43), first downs (31) and third-down percentage (54.5).

"It's one game," LaFleur cautioned. "We've got to continue. It's a long road ahead. We're going to have a pretty angry team, I think, coming into Lambeau this weekend that gave us everything we could handle and then some last year. Shoot, we didn't lead for a second in either game. We've got to hit that reset button and get to work because we know we've got a tremendous task in front of us."

The Lions' defense showed its fangs for most of its opener against Chicago, only to blow a 23-6 lead in the fourth quarter and lose 27-23. Detroit allowed three touchdown passes to Mitchell Trubisky and 149 rushing yards.

New this season, Patricia handed the play-calling reins to defensive coordinator Cory Undlin. Detroit's base defense is the 4-3, but it runs mostly a 3-3-5 that features three safeties.

Trey Flowers, Danny Shelton and Nick Williams started up front against Chicago. Flowers, who signed a huge free-agent contract in 2019, had a sack and forced fumble against Chicago. The 335-pound Shelton's forte is stopping the run. The depth is strong with Da'Shawn Hand, Romeo Okwara and his rookie brother, Julian.

Middle linebacker Jamal Davis is flanked by Christian Jones and Jamie Collins. Davis packs a punch with two sacks and three forced fumbles last year. Collins was sensational with New England last year. He led the team with 80 tackles, seven sacks, 10 tackles for losses and three forced fumbles and was fourth with seven passes defended. He was kicked out of the opener after

making contact with an official.

Cornerback should be a strength but instead it will be a major question mark headed into a matchup against Aaron Rodgers. In the offseason, the Lions sent Darius Slay to Philadelphia but signed former Pro Bowler Desmond Trufant in free agency and used the No. 3 overall pick on Jeff Okudah. They join Justin Coleman, who is the highest-paid slot corner in the league.

Instead, Okudah was inactive against Chicago with a hamstring injury and Trufant and Coleman suffered hamstring injuries that put them on the sideline for the Bears' comeback. Coleman was put on injured reserve Tuesday.

Tracy Walker, Duron Harmon and Will Harris man the safety positions. Walker led the Lions with 100 tackles last year and seven vs. Chicago.

When the Lions have the ball

Maybe the secondary had fallen asleep at the wheel but the big-play connections from Kirk Cousins to Adam Thielen have to be a reason for concern against Detroit quarterback Matthew Stafford.

Recall the week six game last season, when Stafford hit Kenny Golladay on a bomb for 66 yards on the first play of the game and receiver Marvin Hall for 58 on the first play of the next series.

Golladay was inactive vs. Chicago with a hamstring injury but could be back for Sunday. At 6-foot-4 and with breakaway speed, he's quietly become one of the best receivers in the NFL. He caught 65 passes for 1,190 yards (18.3 average) and a league-leading 11 touchdowns last season.

Ninth-year pro Marvin Jones is no slouch as one of the league's top deep threats, and veteran Danny Amendola is a crafty slot receiver. Former Wisconsin Badgers standout Quintez

Cephus took Golladay's spot and caught 3-of-10 passes for 43 yards in his NFL debut.

Tight end T.J. Hockenson, last year's first-round pick, caught five passes for 56 yards and a touchdown vs. Chicago.

Also of concern for Green Bay is Detroit's running game. The Lions signed 35-year-old Adrian Peterson on Sept. 7, and the Packers' longtime nemesis promptly carried 14 times for 93 yards (6.6 average) in week one.

He's joined by Kerryon Johnson and rookie second-round pick D'Andre Swift. Swift had a superlative career at Georgia but dropped what should have been the game-winning touchdown vs. Chicago. They will test a Packers run defense that was blown off the field by San Francisco in the NFC Championship Game and never really stopped Minnesota's Dalvin Cook.

The line consists of left tackle Taylor Decker, left guard Joe Dahl, center Frank Ragnow, right guard Jonah Jackson and right tackle Halapoulivaati Vaitai. The Lions have spent lavishly in terms of money and resources. Decker signed a five-year, \$59.65 million extension a couple weeks ago, and Vaitai joined the team with a five-

year, \$45 million deal in free agency. Ragnow was a first-round pick and Jackson was a third-rounder this year. It's a good group, but it's a long way from great.

As for Stafford, his value was apparent last year. The Lions were 3-4-1 with him and 0-8 when he missed the second half of the season with a back injury. In those eight games, he threw for 2,499 yards and 19 touchdowns with a career-high 106.0 passer rating.

Special teams

The Lions have a formidable group with the booming leg of kicker Matt Prater, explosive return ability of Jamal Agnew and the promising punting of Jack Fox.

In his first three seasons, Agnew had four return touchdowns (three on kickoffs). He had a 16-yard punt return and kickoff returns of 31 and 35 yards vs. Chicago. Much like Green Bay with returner Tyler Ervin, the Lions are trying to get him involved a bit on offense.

Prater might have the best leg in the game. For his career, he's 75.7% from 50-plus yards. He hit kicks of 51 and 54 yards last year at Lambeau Field. Fox averaged 49.3 yards per punt and didn't allow a single return yard.

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Native plant garden honors Mader family values

Shawano County Historical Society garden celebrates Barb, Mark Mader

A family's wish to honor a love of gardens, native plants and books has come together in the form of a garden at the Shawano County Historical Society's Heritage Park in Shawano.

The garden — on the historical society grounds, 524 N. Franklin St., Shawano — was created with a bequest honoring Barb and Mark Mader. Family members directed that memorial funds be used for the project.

The Mader garden is a partially fenced walkable area near the entrance of the park. The garden space has clumps of colorful native plants, an arched entryway and benches. It was established in 2019 but it was not until this year that the plantings took off. In late August, a memorial stone from Schneider Monument was placed near the entrance.

The new garden is one of the first things a visitor sees at the park, next to the main parking lot.

At one corner is a little free library, a free-standing book exchange.

Wild Ones member Robert Dumke, who helped initiate the project in 2018, said the garden is a fitting tribute to a member who cared deeply for native habitats.

Barb Mader had a lifetime appreciation for the outdoors, beginning with her childhood on a farm. As a teacher, she developed outdoor activities and as a community member in Plymouth, she helped to build access to the outdoor world with gardens and trails from Plymouth to Neopit, Dumke said.

"People think a garden with native plants looks messy," he said.

As Dumke walked around the planted clumps of flowers, he pointed to the careful arrangements of plants and grasses, with an emphasis on colors that changed as the season progressed.

"You can have a formal garden with native plants, or you can combine them," Dumke said.

With the rustic fence, a formal archway, the free library and a bike rack defining the sides of the garden, Dumke said he felt the project captured Barb Mader's many interests.

Heidi Bedwell, Barb Mader's daughter, said in an early email the project was the perfect way to honor her mother.

Tigerton Food Pantry opening in October

Tigerton Food Pantry will be opening in October serving people living in the Tigerton School District who need help feeding their families.

First distribution will be Oct. 13 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and Oct. 15 from 4-6 p.m. Calls must be received in by the second Saturday to sign up each month at 715-326-3750.

Food will be distributed from the back hall at St. Anthony Parish, 430 Swanke St., Tigerton. The entrance is off Date Street at northwest end of building. Each family will receive dry, canned, frozen and fresh food that is available. Each family can receive food once each month, although this may be adjusted in the future depending on need. All people living in the same household are considered a family.

Food will be pre-boxed according to family size. Volunteers must bring the food to people's vehicles due to COVID-19.

Registration forms need to be completed ahead of the initial visit. These forms include demographic information required to keep and

share statistics with Feeding America for their use. This information is kept confidential.

Proof of address and picture ID will be required when registering at the first distribution. These forms will be available at local churches, Tigerton Community Center, Tigerton Post Office, First National Bank or by calling the pantry.

Included with the registration form are guidelines and the schedule for the next three months.

Purchased food is paid for from grants and donations received, but most food is obtained through Feeding America, Hunger Relief Federation, Cedar Street Market or other local sources. Some food is received through food drives or donations of non-perishable foods.

The pantry is run completely by volunteers; no one is paid for their time or reimbursed for gas to pick up food. Tigerton Food Pantry operates under Trinity Family Conference, part of the Green Bay District Council of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.

\$6 million Highway 47 project kicks off next week in Keshena

Improvements to state Highway 47 between Duquaine Road and the north junction of Menominee County

Road VV in Keshena are scheduled to begin Sept. 21.

James Peterson Sons, Inc., is the

prime contractor for the \$6,028,729 project. Crews will resurface the roadway, widen the roadway for bicycle lanes, perform culvert replacements, construct new storm sewer and curb and gutter, reconstruct sidewalk and curb ramps to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act requirements and rehabilitate the

surface on the Wolf River Bridge.

During 2020 construction, Highway 47 will be reduced to a single lane with temporary traffic signals. The south junction of County Road VV will be closed with a detour. Motorists will utilize Go Around Road to Highway 47. The project will be in shut down over winter and resume in spring 2021.

During 2021 construction, Highway 47 northbound will be closed between Dodge Road and the south junction of County Road VV. Highway 47 southbound lanes will remain open. A local detour will use Go Around Road, and a truck detour will utilize Highway 47, U.S. Highway 45 and state Highway 29. Later in 2021, Highway 47 traffic will be reduced to a single lane with flagging operations between County Road VV and Oshkosh Road.

Construction is currently scheduled for completion in November 2021. The schedule is dependent on favorable weather conditions and construction progress.

A CHARTER ORDINANCE ENACTED UNDER SECTION 66.0101, WISCONSIN STATUTES, TO CHANGE THE MANNER OF CHOOSING THE CITY ATTORNEY FROM ELECTED TO APPOINTED

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAWANO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN THAT CHAPTER 1, GENERAL GOVERNMENT, SECTION 1.02 Elected Officials, (4) City Attorney is hereby repealed and SECTION 1.03 Appointed Officials, (15) City Attorney is hereby created as follows:

§ 1.03 Appointed Officials

(15) City Attorney. Appointed by the Mayor, subject to confirmation of the Council and will serve for an indefinite term.

This is a charter ordinance which requires adoption by two-thirds of all the members of the Common Council and which shall take effect sixty (60) days following passage and publication, unless within the 60-day period a petition conforming to the requirements of s. 8.40 and signed by a number of electors of the City equal to not less than 7% of the votes cast in the City for governor at the last general election is filed in the office of the City Clerk demanding that the ordinance be submitted to a vote of the electors, in which case it will not take effect until it is submitted to a referendum and approved by a majority of the electors voting in the referendum. The petition and the proceedings for its submission are governed by s. 9.20 (2) to (6), Wisconsin Statutes.
