School district expanding learning opportunities

College options, workforce development, adult enrichment mapped out

The Shawano School District is looking at strengthening relationships with colleges and other organizations to provide more education options not only to the almost 2,300 students it currently serves but to the community at large.

Robyn Shingler, director for the district's Shawano Community Education program, told the Shawano School Board on Oct. 4 that high school juniors and seniors are able to take college-level courses for credit through the school district, which can save those students as much as \$10,000 in the process, so it behooves the district to form strong ties with institutions like College of Menominee Nation and University of Wisconsin-Green Bay to expand education options.

"Relationships are foundational to all of the work that we do," Shingler said. "All of these colleges that we have within a 40-mile radius, what can we do to expand our partnerships with them?"

The process is expected to take a few years, in accordance with the district's strategic plan, starting with determining the existing relationships and expanding from there, finding out what community needs are for post-secondary offerings, and looking at what course options exist for the district and building upon them.

"We need to make sure to understand the dual-enrollment opportunities that we have," Shingler said. "It's quite impressive what's in place and the work that has already been laid, but we know that things change."

Offering dual-enrollment, where students are taking both high school and college courses, gives them the opportunity to have 12 college credits under their belt by the time they receive their high school diploma. One of the challenges of this pro-

gram is finding ways for students to fit in college courses, according to Shingler, as many are involved in sports, jobs or other extracurricular activities.

"We're starting conversations with the colleges on how we can potentially offer opportunities through community education," Shingler said.

Shingler noted that the colleges are one avenue for building relationships that help students, but a second one is working with the business community to find out what their workforce needs are and trying to help students who aren't on track for college to be ready to enter the workforce once they graduate high school. This will involve working with city, county and tribal governments, along with civic organizations in the community and beyond, she said.

"We've met with Shawano County Economic Progress, as an example, and we've talked about the local economy and business needs," Shingler said. "I've met with and spoken to the city of Shawano, and we will be offering a city series through community education, where our community can learn about what our city does and how to get more involved in city government."

The district is also reaching out to financial institutions to look at teaching students about financial literacy, according to Shingler, and it recently allowed private businesses to use the school facilities to help their employees get through a certification process.

"We hopefully act as a resource center and a liaison between civic organizations, businesses and the community," Shingler said.

Businesses are already reaching out to the district for help in building their future workforces. Superintendent Randi Anderson noted that Aarrowcast, a foundry in Shawano, has already approached officials for assistance.

"Businesses across every entity are having a difficult time hiring people, so we're looking at an opportunity to create pathways for certain positions that they have inside their organizations," Anderson said. "We're continuing the conversations to see where they go for career pathways."

A third effort to improve learning is to expand enrichment options offered through the community education program, according to Shingler. She said the district wants to expand its traditional role and create more connections to homes and students.

The district is working with various organizations to expand its community education offerings. Shingler noted that the Shawano Area Young Professionals have offered to teach life skills classes, as an example.

The district is also working to help parents with classes to learn about Skyward and Skylert, their online programs that connect students and parents with the school. The district is also offering training on the Apple computers that it has switched over to recently for student use.

"We're offering multiple opportunities for families and students to come in and learn more about these devices," Shingler said.

The district has also been looking at improving its communication with the community in general and revived its communication and community engagement committee to develop a comprehensive plan to look at how it gets information out to the public.

"That's going to include crisis communication, internal and external communication, media and community relations and parent engagement," Shingler said. "We're going to look at things like updating our website. We're going to reconvene our Hawk Talks, make sure we do a better job with both external and internal communication strategies."

Powless on supervised release for shooting

Son still in custody, faces sentencing in December

A Keshena woman was placed on supervised release Thursday for one year and sentenced to time already served for interfering with an investigation of a shooting in which she was accidentally shot by her son while he was shooting at another man.

According to her plea agreement filed in federal court, Mary L. Powless, 42, was outside a residence on March 13 in Middle Village when her son, Menom L. Powless-Brown, 19, struck another man on the head with a 9 mm handgun and discharged the weapon several times.

The bullet struck Powless on the left side of her face, injuring her. At the time, Powless told her son that “you shot me.”

Powless-Brown fired the handgun several times also hitting a man, identified in court records only as John Doe, causing him significant injuries.

Powless attempted to conceal her wound and did not report the assault or her injury by refusing medical attention for her gunshot wound.

Powless is a nurse and treated her own wound. She subsequently admitted that this delayed federal and tribal agents who were trying to identify the

victims and witnesses to the shooting incident.

Both mother and son were charged in April with assault with a deadly weapon. Powless-Brown also was charged with assault with intent to murder and discharging a firearm during and in relation to a crime of violence.

Powless was in custody from approximately April 15 to July 13, according to court records.

In exchange for her guilty plea to interfering with an investigation, federal prosecutors agreed to drop the more serious assault charges. District Judge William Griesbach adopted the recommendation of Powless attorney, Lee Schuchart, and Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew Maier that Powless should be sentenced to time served and placed on one year’s supervised release.

She faced maximum penalties of five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Powless-Brown pleaded guilty on Sept. 10 to assault with intent to murder.

His crime stemmed from an ongoing dispute he had with Doe, who had taken a sexual interest in an acquaintance of Powless-Brown’s, identified in the complaint by the initials, A.M.

Verbal disputes on social media escalated into threats from Doe toward A.M. and Powless-Brown as late as Feb. 24. Less than a week before the

March 13 shooting, Doe was seen at a mutual friend’s home, armed with a firearm, looking for A.M. and Powless-Brown to settle the dispute.

According to Powless-Brown’s plea agreement, he and A.M., planned to attend a birthday party in Middle Village on March 13. A.M. was waiting in a car outside Powless-Brown’s residence when A.M. saw Doe slowly drive by brandishing a weapon that A.M. believed to be a .30-.06 caliber rifle.

A.M. then went inside, got Powless-Brown, and they drove toward Middle Village.

Doe and A.M. passed each other while traveling on state Highway 47 before Doe and his crew of three individuals made a U-turn and headed toward Doe’s vehicle on the highway.

However, A.M. turned off the highway onto a road leading toward Middle Village.

When A.M. and Powless-Brown neared the birthday party, Doe passed A.M. and brake-checked him a few times.

Both vehicles arrived at the party on Hickory Street at the same time.

Doe and Powless-Brown exited their cars, and witnesses said that Powless-Brown either punched Doe or attempted to strike him in the head with a 9 mm pistol.

Powless-Brown claimed that Doe was armed with a pistol and after Powless-Brown punched Doe, Doe pulled a pistol from his pocket, aimed it at Powless-Brown and fired it but missed Powless-Brown.

No witness said that they saw Doe with a gun.

Powless-Brown drew his pistol and Doe fled toward the car in which he arrived. Powless-Brown pursued and fired at Doe, striking him in the fifth lumbar vertebrae. Neurosurgeons declined to remove the bullet fragment due to its proximity to the spinal cord.

Powless-Brown conceded that it was likely that a jury would reject his claim of self-defense if the case would have gone to trial.

He faces maximum penalties of 20 years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and three years’ supervised release at his Dec. 13 sentencing before Griesbach.

Powless-Brown remains in custody.

Keshena man dies in Underhill fatal crash

A Gillett man was being held in the Oconto County jail on a charge of homicide by the intoxicated use of a motor vehicle after a crash that killed a 54-year-old Keshena man on Oct. 3.

Christopher Wayne Matchopatow was a passenger in the vehicle and died at the scene, according to an Oconto County traffic report.

Mark A. Martin, 54, was charged in Oconto County Circuit Court on Oct. 4 with the felony homicide by drunken driving count, along with misdemeanor charges of operating while his license was revoked and resisting or obstructing an officer. Judge

Jay N. Conley set bond at \$50,000 cash and adjourned Martin’s initial court appearance to Oct. 14 in Judge Michael T. Judge’s courtroom.

According to a news release from Sheriff Todd Skarban, the emergency dispatch center got a call at 11:11 p.m. regarding a single-vehicle crash at the intersection of County roads V and U in the Town of Underhill. A pickup truck traveling westbound on U failed to stop at the intersection and struck a highway sign post and a tree.

When officers arrived, they found the driver standing on the road outside the vehicle with minor injuries. The sheriff said alcohol and speed are considered factors in the crash.

Public gives input on redistricting

Committee makes one change on proposal involving Town of Angelica

The Shawano County Redistricting Committee has made a change on its proposed redistricting map and rejected two other recommendations.

The change will affect the Town of Angelica.

The law states that counties need to update their district maps every 10 years. In the updates, the district's populations need to be similar within 10%.

Angelica supervisors James and Connie Przybylski proposed a change to the redistricting proposal surrounding the Town of Angelica at the Shawano County redistricting public hearing on Sept. 30.

"We would like some consideration on the maps that we sorted through," said James Przybylski. "The total population works out pretty fine. We have quite a few wards and we would like to keep it at a minimum of at least three."

Connie Przybylski said that the Town of Angelica has talked to

Shawano County GIS coordinator David Poffinbarger about the proposed redistricting map.

"Right now, we have four ballots that we deal with," said Connie Przybylski. "If we condensed to this, we would only have three ballots."

James Przybylski added that a lot of questions come up around election time, with residents asking, "Why should I vote for this person if they are not in my district?"

"When we explained it, there was always a little bit of confusion," he said.

Poffinbarger said that in the Przybylskis' proposal, the population is almost identical, with a -1.55 deviation to a -1.56 deviation. A deviation is how far away a district is compared to the ideal population. The ideal population is taking the total number of people in the county and dividing it by the amount of districts. The proposal must have every district within 5% of the ideal population.

"Statistically, this proposal makes no difference," said Poffinbarger.

Belle Plaine Chair Alvin Bartz spoke on his disappointment in seeing the proposed map.

"For county board elections, we will need to have three ballots," said Bartz. "For the likelihood of us having a person on the county board, with district 16 having 65% of population that is our best chance. In district 17 we have about

30%, so it's very likely we won't have a candidate from there."

He said that as a representative of Belle Plaine, the town wants someone on the county board who will vote in the interest of the town.

Shawano County Supervisor Marvin Klosterman said that he was not very happy with how Bonduel is proposed to being split.

"I think that you took some part of Hartland away just to split of Bonduel to make nice straight lines," said Klosterman.

After the public hearing, the committee reviewed comments made by the public in the public hearing meeting.

Poffinbarger said that he had previously talked with Bartz, who had said that if Belle Plaine has to be split into three districts, then he would prefer going with the committee's proposal.

"You shouldn't look at existing supervisors, but when the seat opened up for Belle Plaine, I had a hard time finding a supervisors from Belle Plaine willing to take the job," County Board Chairman Tom Kautza said.

Poffinbarger said that when he was making the maps, he wanted to kept the Cloverleaf Lake communities in Belle Plaine together.

The committee then turned to the proposed change in Angelica.

"It is almost equal in every statistical category," said Poffinbarger. "There are no sanitary districts to

think of and there are no lakes for common areas."

Poffinbarger said that when he originally made the map, he was trying to try to come as straight across as possible.

He added that James Przybylski noted in a previous meeting that he wanted to preserve the Town of Angelica.

When discussing Klosterman's question of why Bonduel had to be split, Poffinbarger said that, through the previous two censuses, the population has worked out where Bonduel can be its own district.

"However, with the new numbers, if we tried to do that, it would put the deviation at -6.34% — well outside the plus or minus 5%," said Poffinbarger. "Bonduel needs to split up one way or another."

He added that to split it in half would preserve the wards rather than the supervisory districts.

Poffinbarger noted that Klosterman did not propose a change, but rather stated his displeasure.

Due to the limited change in statistics and deviation, the committee passed the change to Angelica. The committee also voted to keep Belle Plaine and Bonduel the same as they have in the proposal.

The committee will make a recommendation to the county board in November with its redistricting proposal.

Newcap closes deal on Lakeland Center

Agency tells city about plans for shelter, health clinic, job programs

Newcap Inc. has purchased the Lakeland Center, taking it off the Shawano County government's hands.

Once the headquarters for the county's community service programs, which are now housed at the new human services complex in the Town of Wescott, Newcap plans to provide short-term housing, mental health counseling, a health clinic and more from the facility, located at 504 Lakeland Road. The deal closed Sept. 30, according to James Davel, the county's administrative coordinator.

Cheryl Dietrich, chief executive officer for Newcap, laid out the plans for the facility on Sept. 29 during a public hearing for the Shawano Plan Commission, which gave its recommendation for a conditional use permit. That permit must still gain final approval from the Shawano Common Council when it meets Oct. 13.

"Community action embodies the spirit of hope, improves the community and makes America a better place to live," Dietrich said. "We care about the entire community, and we are dedicated to helping people help themselves and each other."

She added that has been the promise that Newcap has upheld since its founding 55 years ago. The goal is to help people move out of poverty into a position of economic security.

The short-term housing will be a year-round program, Dietrich said, and there are a number of people who need help any given day of the week. She said the facility will be able to help six families at a time, up to 24 people total in the building.

"What we know is that, for people who are homeless and have children, is that we must get them housed first," Dietrich said. "If we weren't housing first, we can't move people out of poverty if they're living on the street. All they're thinking about is, 'Where am I and my children going to sleep tonight?'"

Once the external needs are taken care of, Newcap then shifts its at-

tention to other needs. Many of the people the agency helps have mental health issues — the most common of them being anxiety, depression and trauma, according to Dietrich.

"We have a mental health counselor who can work with them, and we can provide psychiatric medication, if necessary," she said. "Then we work with them on alcohol and drug addictions, if that is an issue with that family, to help get their internal environment taken care of."

Newcap works with families to gain permanent housing, and then helps in other areas — such as finding employment, helping with

transportation and job skills training, Dietrich said.

"We have a business development program where we work with people who are low- or moderate-income and help them to start a business," she said. "I ran a chamber of commerce for 15 years, and what I know is, if you want to change the trajectory of a family, you need two things: help to buy a house and help to start a business."

Dietrich said that Newcap has a financial coach to help people learn to budget, to maintain their credit and to fix their credit if their rating is in bad shape.

The community health clinic Newcap plans to operate will help folks with everything from reproductive health services to basic care. Dietrich said many of the clients helped are either uninsured or underinsured, which she defined as people who have a high deductible, usually in the \$15,000 range.

"If they get sick, and they're looking at about a \$1,000 bill by the time you go to a doctor and get lab work done and get your medications, that is out of reach for most families," Dietrich said. "We also provide chronic care management, and we are open from Monday through Thursday during daytime hours."

Dietrich estimated that the Shawano facility would have 15 employees to start, but noted Newcap can adapt to grow its program.

There was concern that Newcap would be duplicating services already provided in the community by Shawano Area Matthew 25, which operates a homeless shelter from November through April. However Muffy Culhane, one of SAM25's founders, told the commission that would not be the case at all. She noted that SAM25's shelter is an emergency shelter and is not open year-round.

"We want to make sure that everybody in our community has a meal and a safe place to sleep every night," Culhane said, noting that SAM25 has been partnering with Newcap since opening its shelter. "We want to make sure people in our area have medical care that they can afford."

The program is also not expected to conflict with Safe Haven, which provides emergency housing for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and has a facility on the same road as the new Newcap facility.

Shawano County Supervisor Gene Hoppe expressed his support for Newcap, also serving on the agency's board of directors. He served as the bridge between the county and the agency in bringing the deal to the county board.

"I've been trying for the last few years to get Newcap into Shawano," Hoppe said. "Newcap works great all over. There's a home weatherization program that's just fantastic. For those who can't get to their job, we take care of that by supplying a car. We work for the people."

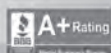

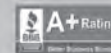

Colors of October still spectacular

Gardening in October doesn't have to be dull and, provided we don't get any unexpected hard freezes, many annuals, perennials and even bulbs continue to look spectacular, even up until Halloween.

In addition to the color explosion that many late season blooms provide, these blossoms also serve an important purpose. Late flying bees, butterflies and other pollinators rely on October blooms for nectar and pollen.

Marigolds are one of my favorite late season annuals, providing a glorious show up until the first hard freeze. Marigolds come in a variety of colors ranging from orange and red to lemon yellow and even white. They also come in different sizes, ranging from 4- to 6-inch dwarf varieties to spectacular, pom-pom forms that may reach 3 feet in height.

Dahlias are wonderful for the fall season, showy and flamboyant in the garden. These will also last through a few light freezes before succumbing to the cold temperatures. Dahlias range in color from white and red to pink, yellow, orange and many other colors. There are even dinner plate dahlias that may reach 8 to 10 inches across.

Traditional fall plants often used in containers and beds for the season are perfect for the October garden. Purple fountain grass, which is fascinating with its deep, richly colored foliage is ideal and holds its color well even after a few freezes. Vertigo grass is a rich, chocolate brown and may reach 6 feet in height and width.

Ornamental kale is another traditional fall plant that provides beauty and texture in the garden. Also known as flowering cabbages, these colorful, textured foliage plants come in shades of purple, pink, white and blue. They are extremely cold tolerant and often still look beautiful in the dead of winter.

Of course, it wouldn't be autumn without spectacular, showpiece mums in the garden bed, and in borders and containers. In all colors of the rainbow, mums provide long lasting color, even after several frosts. They may still look wonderful at Thanksgiving if temperatures

remain warm enough through November.

Zinnias are another excellent choice for fall color, lasting, again, until the first hard freeze.

The many different varieties of sedum are also excellent fall plants. In shades of red, pink and sedum look good well after the first freeze and are an important source of pollen

and nectar for bumblebees, honeybees and many species of butterflies.

Great masses of purple New England asters line our roadsides and gardens this time of year as these incredible native plants burst into fireworks bloom. Asters are also available in white, blue and pink. All are perfect for fall gardens.

Other late blooming perennials are purple coneflowers, black eyed Susans, goldenrod, hostas, turtleheads, monkshood, Japanese anemone, as well as many varieties of roses.

Annuals such as colorful sweet potato vines, coleus, begonias, ageratum, pansies, violas, as well as some salvias are also long lasting, blooming well into October, or at least the first hard frost.

There are many great choices to include in your garden for fall displays. By utilizing many of the best choices, your garden will still look beautiful and colorful well until November.

Bonduel holds off conference foe Clintonville for homecoming win

Bears' defense shuts out Truckers

The Bonduel High School football team shut out Clintonville 8-0 on Oct. 1 in Bonduel to move to within a win of the postseason.

"We have been working hard and trying to get better," said Bonduel head coach James Westrich. "Our defense did a really good job buying in and being on the same page."

Bonduel scored the only points of the game when sophomore quarterback Noah Weier connected with senior Bennett Engel on an 11-yard touchdown. Junior Gaven Vance caught the subsequent two-point conversion.

Engel finished the homecoming game with 105 rushing yards, 23 receiving yards, a receiving touchdown and an interception.

"My offensive line did a great job blocking," said Engel. "We saw their 4-4 defense, and it was just key for our inside trap."

Engel added that the defense was able to pitch the shutout due in part to the defensive scheme.

"We tried a 3-5 defense this week, and our defensive line played fast and hard," said Engel. "We switched up to blitzing one or two guys every time, and that seemed to put pressure on the quarterback, helping our coverage."

The story of the game was the Bears' defense as Clintonville threatened to score numerous times.

After a 24-yard rush by Clintonville senior quarterback Braiden Behnke late in the second quarter, the Truckers were set up with a first-and-10 from the Bonduel 13-yard line. Four penalties and two Bears' sacks pushed the Truckers back to their own 27-yard line, setting up a fourth-and-60.

Penalties were a common theme

for the Truckers as they finished with 12 penalties for 73 yards. Due to the penalties, Clintonville was forced to pass to make up yards, culminating in 162 passing yards from Behnke, junior Drake Lorge and freshman Sam Wegener.

The game came to its climax when Bonduel punted with 1:06 left in the fourth quarter.

Clintonville took over at Bonduel's 48-yard line where Behnke connected with senior Cole Rosenow for 20 yards.

On the next play, Bonduel was called for a defensive pass interference penalty and an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty. This resulted in the Truckers with the ball at the Bonduel 6-yard line. The next play, Behnke ran

in a touchdown, but Clintonville was once again called for a holding penalty.

Clintonville was then called for illegal motion and found itself with a first-and-goal from Bonduel's 25-yard line. Behnke rolled left and threw a pass that was intercepted by Bonduel freshman Cade Johnson on the 1-yard line. The Bears took over with 10 seconds left and ran the clock out with a 1-yard run by Weier.

Westrich said that with a young team, like Bonduel, the team is learning to playing on the same page and building more effective communication.

Senior lineman Jon Sell, one of five seniors on the team, added that he has tried to act like a mentor and put himself into a leadership role.

"I feel like this is a family," said Sell. "Someone has to lead them, but there is a group of us that stepped up. All that matters is that we step up in the big moments."

Bonduel will qualify for the postseason after a forfeit win over Mishicot on Oct. 8.

As the Bears prepare for the final push before playoffs, Westrich said there were a couple of things that the team needed to do to be at their best.

"Offensively, we have to finish drives," said Westrich. "We are doing a good job at executing, but we have to get more points on the board. Defensively, we have to have a relentless effort moving up field and being on the same page."

Sell added to how Bonduel can be at their best.

"I think that we just have to get more intense," said Sell. "We have to execute. We have had trouble finishing drives in the red zone. I feel like if we can finish our drives in the red zone, there isn't a team that can stop us."

USDA updates pandemic assistance program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is updating the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program 2 (CFAP 2) for contract producers of eligible livestock and poultry and producers of specialty crops and other sales-based commodities.

CFAP 2, which assists producers who faced market disruptions in 2020 due to COVID-19, is part of USDA's broader Pandemic Assistance for Producers initiative. USDA's Farm Service Agency has set an Oct. 12 deadline for all eligible producers to apply for or modify applications for CFAP 2.

The Consolidated Appropriations Act 2021 provides up to \$1 billion for payments to contract producers of eligible livestock and poultry for revenue losses from Jan. 1, 2020, through Dec. 27, 2020. Contract producers of broilers, pullets, layers, chicken eggs, turkeys, hogs and pigs, ducks, geese, pheasants and quail may be eligible for assistance. This update includes breeding stock and eggs of all eligible poultry types produced under contract.

Payments for contract producers were to be based on a comparison of eligible revenue for the periods of Jan. 1, 2019, through Dec. 27, 2019, and Jan. 1, 2020, through Dec. 27, 2020. Today's changes mean contract producers can now elect to use eligible revenue from the period of Jan. 1, 2018, through Dec. 27, 2018, instead of that date range in 2019 if it is more representative.

This change is intended to provide flexibility and make things more equitable for contract producers who had reduced revenue in 2019 compared to a normal year. The difference in revenue is then multiplied by 80% to determine a final payment. Payments to contract producers may be factored if total

calculated payments exceed the available funding and will be made after the application period closes.

Additional flexibilities have been added to account for increases to operation size in 2020 and situations where a contract producer did not have a full period of revenue from Jan. 1 to Dec. 27 for either 2018 or 2019. Assistance is also available to new contract producers who began their farming operation in 2020.

USDA is amending the CFAP 2 payment calculation for sales-based commodities, which are primarily comprised of by specialty crops, to allow producers to substitute 2018 sales for 2019 sales. Previously, payments for producers of sales-based commodities were based only on 2019 sales, with 2019 used as an approximation of the amount the producer would have expected to market in 2020.

Giving producers the option to substitute 2018 sales for this approximation, including 2018 crop insurance indemnities and 2018 crop year Non-insured Disaster Assistance Program and Wildfire and Hurricane Indemnity Program Plus payments, provides additional flexibility to producers of sales-based commodities who had reduced sales in 2019.

Sign-up for CFAP 2 was reopened in March and remains open to address inadequate initial outreach efforts to reach underserved producers and particularly those who produce sales commodities. Newly eligible producers who need to submit a CFAP 2 application or producers who need to modify an existing one can do so by contacting their local FSA office. Producers can also obtain one-on-one support with applications by calling 877-508-8364.

Point Beach courts disaster, sirens turned off

A change has been made to the “emergency response” protocol at the old Point Beach nuclear reactors on Lake Michigan, south of Green Bay. The operator, NextEra Energy Point Beach, has replaced the site’s disaster warning sirens.

No more will the familiar wail warn of potentially catastrophic radiation releases or spills from the two reactors, which are 51 and 49 years old, respectively, well past their originally licensed maximum of 40 years.

The siren system has been replaced with an Integrated Public Alert and Warning System (IPAWS). NextEra says on its website that emergency alerts will be broadcast on public radio and through cell phone alerts, but not sirens. They assure us: “If you have functional needs or do not own a cell phone, contact your emergency management agency to be registered for notification and assistance.”

That is, the system will send disaster warnings only to radios and cell phones. Are yours always on all night? The lack of sirens to wake

in 1979 started at 4 a.m.; the 1979 Churchrock, New Mexico, uranium mine waste spill broke at 5:30 a.m.; and the 1986 Chernobyl explosions and meltdown began at 1:23 a.m.

“I sure hope everyone has their TV, radio, computer or cell phone on in the middle of the night when the [IPAWS] alarm is sounded,” Michael Keegan of Don’t Waste Michigan, a watchdog of Point Beach and the 28 other operating reactors on the Great Lakes, wrote in an email.

Paul Gunter, at Beyond Nuclear in Takoma Park Maryland, specializes in reactor hazards and operations. He wrote in an email, “Removing the audible stationary sirens from within the emergency planning zone will

sleeping nearby populations assumes that nuclear accidents only happen in daytime.

In fact, the Three Mile Island, Pennsylvania, partial meltdown

significantly diminish the reactors’ early warning notification system and the radiological defense-in-depth strategy.”

Gunter points to the “bathtub curve” depicting failure rates in every technology from toasters to nuclear reactors.

“At startup, high rates of failures result from design flaws, mis-assembly and defects. A period of stable operations ensues, but over time, the aging of systems, structures and components leads to material degradation and a steeper rate of failures,” Gunter wrote.

In 2005, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission granted NextEra’s request to give Point Beach reactors 20-year license extensions, letting it produce radioactive waste for 60 years. Adding more risk to the reactors’ “golden years,” NRC in 2011 approved a 17% increase in power output from both units. The approval seems like dear old gramps gunning the engine of his jalopy, racing down main street and running red lights with the whole family involuntarily along for the ride.

Germany’s recent deadly flooding event, which killed at least 210 people, provides a tragic example of how retiring the sirens can be catastrophic. As the Los Angeles Times reported on July 24, “Residents of flood-stricken German towns say they got inadequate warning of deluge,” sirens in some towns failed when the electricity grid crashed. Elsewhere, there were no sirens at all. The Associated Press reported July 25 that Germans said warning systems failed and “At least 132 people were killed in the Ahr Valley alone.”

After nuclear waste, emergency and disaster response have always been the bane of nuclear reactors — our only industrial machines required to have evacuation plans before start-up. Taking down warning siren systems only increases the likelihood of catastrophe. It amounts to reckless endangerment.

Elected officials duck out on constituents

To the editor:

We reside in Sen. Robert Cowles’ district. As part of Fair Maps Coalition Legislative Lobby Day, we hoped to virtually meet with Cowles and our three Assembly representatives — Gary Tauchen, David Steffen and Jim Steineke. Our mission, tell personal stories of how gerrymandering has affected us and ask them to pass nonpartisan redistricting, consider the People’s Map Commission’s voting maps and reject a legislative joint resolution filed on Sept. 24 that would perpetuate the existing, highly gerrymandered voting maps.

Our legislators were invited three weeks ago. All but Steineke responded they’d attend. Although Cowles did not attend, he sent a new,

but pleasant, staff person who took notes and listened to our concerns. Unfortunately, he had never discussed with Cowles the senator’s positions on fair, nonpartisan voting districts, and so he was unable to tell us the senator’s positions. Not one of our three Assembly representatives attended or sent a staff person.

We were disappointed by the lack of response. We are their constituents, and we would have liked them to hear how gerrymandering has affected us in the last 10 years:

- How districts are chiseled up to the point that one house on a block is in a different district, and neighbors have to go to multiple polling places.
- How people’s votes don’t count, and they don’t trust government or elected officials.
- How we are more polarized than ever.
- How schools don’t get needed

funding, and young people avoid becoming teachers.

• How the Oneida, Menominee and Stockbridge-Munsee tribes’ districts are divided so their votes are diluted, and they lack voting power to advocate for their needs, such as easy access to higher education, high-speed internet and clean water.

We would have liked to hear our legislators’ positions on a fair and transparent procedure for drawing nonpartisan voting maps (Senate Bill 389 and Assembly Bill 395), on the People’s Fair Maps Commission maps and on rejecting the joint resolution that calls for using the same old, gerrymandered maps as the basis for new maps reflecting 2020 census data. How sad that voters’ concerns are not valued, not heard and not addressed. Unfortunately, gerrymandering has given these representatives safe seats. They focus on the party and

the financial contributors, not their constituents.

Sacred Heart students keep up on current events

New weapons emerging for Green Bay's offense

Cobb, Dillon latest to step up

The players making up the Green Bay Packers offense looks pretty similar to last year's group, with the exception of a player or two. The big names of quarterback Aaron Rodgers, wide receiver Davante Adams and running back Aaron Jones steal most of the headlines, but there are several others who have also had an impact on the field after a month of games.

The offense was pretty lifeless in the team's season-opening 38-3 loss to the New Orleans Saints, managing just 229 total yards and turning the ball over three times.

Since then, the unit has looked more like the Packers' offense everyone is accustomed to seeing with Rodgers running the show.

While coach Matt LaFleur is the one calling the plays, he praised the players on offense for how things actually look on the field.

"It doesn't matter what you call. It's how those guys go out there and execute," said LaFleur.

"Certainly, you're never going to be perfect as a play caller. You just hope that when you're not, those guys just make you look good. Fortunately for

us, we've got a lot of great players that can get that done."

In the 35-17 victory over the Detroit Lions in week two, the offense had 323 total yards and no turnovers.

Jones racked up 115 of those yards and scored four times, with Adams adding 121 receiving yards. Tight end Robert Tonyan was the other big offensive weapon that night, grabbing three passes for 52 yards and a 22-yard touchdown.

The Packers had 353 total yards and no turnovers in the 30-28 last-second win over the San Francisco 49ers in week three.

Adams and Jones again led the way, with Jones rushing for 82 yards and a score and Adams hauling in 12 receptions for 132 yards and a touchdown. Receivers Allen Lazard and Marquez Valdes-Scantling made key grabs in the passing game, finishing with 42 and 59 receiving yards, respectively. Valdes-Scantling also caught a touchdown pass.

Despite an up-and-down performance against the Pittsburgh Steelers in a week four win, it was the team's most balanced performance to date. The Pack rushed for 131 yards and had 236 passing yards while turning the ball over just once.

Second-year running back A.J. Dillon and Jones split 30 carries, with Dillon finishing with 81 yards on the ground and Jones 48. Dillon also had a 16-yard reception, while Jones had

three grabs for 51 yards.

Adams led the team with six receptions, but it was veteran wideout Randall Cobb with a team-high 69 yards and a pair of scores. Cobb, Adams, Jones and Lazard each had a 20-plus yard reception in the game.

The team was playing without Valdes-Scantling, who was put on injured reserve before the game. Much like when Adams or any other key skill players on offense had to miss time during the LaFleur era, the unit still found ways to be productive.

After the win over the Steelers, Rodgers talked about how they tried to take Adams out of the game — something many opposing defenses will try the rest of the season. Adams still got plenty of looks, but when the team can also get the likes of Cobb, Lazard, Tonyan and MVS involved, the chances of having down games on offense decreases greatly.

"Davante's an All Pro, inside or outside receiver," said Rodgers, who then shifted his focus to talk about Cobb. "To have another guy in there who can get open like that and just have the feel that he does, just gives us a lot of flexibility in the offense for sure."

With an expanded role as the new No. 2 running back, the big game from Dillon gives the offense yet another weapon to utilize.

Rodgers called Dillon a "bowling ball" because of his 6-foot, 247-pound build and downhill running style.

"He's just a different type of back," said Rodgers. "He's that cold weather, Green Bay back that we've had over the years. But it's good to see him get some carries in September and October before it gets cold."

Dillon and Jones' running styles compliment each other well, and utilizing both backs throughout the season can help keep them fresh as the season progresses. Add in that both can make an impact in the passing game, and the Packers' offense continues to get tougher and tougher to slow down.

LaFleur said he had confidence in both backs in whatever situation comes up.

"As the game progresses, sometimes you might have to call for a certain guy, but it is a pretty good luxury that regardless of the playcall that you feel confident with either one of those guys in the game."

Another key to the offensive success so far is the offensive line, but that's a story for another day. The group should only improve when left tackle David Bakhtiari and the versatile Elgton Jenkins return from injury.

It's been a promising start to the season for the Pack's offense, which has taken on several strong defenses already and has left yards and points on the field. As the season moves on and the group continues to gel, the play should only continue to improve.

Cobb shines as Packers top Steelers

WR scores twice in team's 3rd win

Randall Cobb scored a pair of touchdowns to help lead the Green Bay Packers to a 27-17 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers on Oct. 3 at Lambeau Field in Green Bay.

The beloved veteran receiver took the field to a big ovation when announced as a starter and made the most of his opportunities in the absence of fellow receiver Marquez Valdes-Scantling — who was placed on injured reserve earlier in the week.

Cobb finished the night with five catches for 69 yards and the two scores. Four of his catches came on third-down plays.

"I pride myself in being a third-down guy," said Cobb after the team's third-straight win.

Pittsburgh scored on its first possession of the game before Cobb had two third-down receptions on the Packers' first scoring drive. Quarterback Aaron

Rodgers capped off the 13-play, 64-yard drive with a 4-yard touchdown run to tie the game at seven.

The Packers' defense kept the momentum on its side when defensive lineman Kingsley Keke sacked and forced a fumble of Pittsburgh quarterback Ben Roethlisberger. Defensive lineman Kenny Clark came away with the loose ball to set the Packers' offense up at the Pittsburgh 23-yard line.

Four plays later, on a third-and-10, Rodgers hit Cobb for a 23-yard touchdown.

"It's been awhile; it's been awhile," said Cobb of being able to do a Lambeau Leap after the score. "It was a lot of fun just to be out there with the fans again. The atmosphere was unbelievable tonight."

"He's still a really good player," said Rodgers, who requested the team trade for Cobb before the season started.

The teams traded field goals to end the first half, and Green Bay added another field goal on its first drive of the second half to make it 20-10.

After another defensive stop, a short punt from the Steelers allowed the Packers' offense to take over at

the Pittsburgh 40-yard line. Again, the Packers took advantage.

Running back A.J. Dillon broke off a 25-yard run to get Green Bay down to the 1-yard line, and on the next play, Rodgers found Cobb again for a score after rolling out of the pocket.

The Packers' offense had several chances to seal the win, but weren't able to get the job done. Green Bay's defense allowed a score with just over four minutes to play in the fourth quarter, but made a couple key stops and then had rookie cornerback Eric Stokes intercept a pass to lock up the win.

"I was really proud of our defense," said Packers coach Matt LaFleur. "A team (Pittsburgh) has the ball 11 times, and they scored on three possessions. That is a pretty good night."

Rodgers finished the night with 248 passing yards after completing 20 of his 36 attempts.

The Packers rushed for a season-high 131 yards on 33 carries. Dillon led the charge with 81 yards on 15 attempts. Aaron Jones had 48 yards on 15 attempts but also had a costly fumble in the third quarter.

Jones also had 51 receiving yards

on three catches. Receiver Davante Adams led the team with six grabs for 64 yards. Adams, Cobb, Jones and Allen Lazard all had 20-plus yard receptions in the victory.

A week after kicking the game-winning field goal, Mason Crosby converted field goals of 26 and 29 yards. He's up to 24 straight made field goals, which breaks his own team record he established in 2010-11.

Crosby had a 31-yard attempt blocked and returned for a touchdown, but the play was negated by an offside call on the Steelers.

Linebacker De'Vondre Campbell again led the Packers' defense with nine combined tackles, with Stokes tallying eight.

Across the Steelers' 11 drives, the Packers' defense only surrendered 282 yards, 140 of which came on the two touchdown drives.

One of the lone low spots for the defense was an injury to star cornerback Jaire Alexander. He left the game after attempting a tackle late in the third quarter.

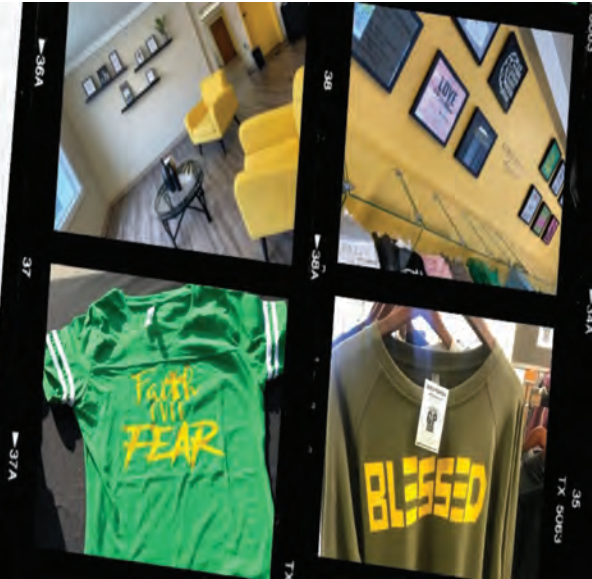

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers (3-1) travel to take on the Cincinnati Bengals (3-1) at noon Oct. 10 at Paul Brown Stadium. FOX will televise the game.

History

The Bengals lead 7-6. Green Bay won the last matchup, 27-24 in overtime, on Sept. 24, 2017, to break a three-game losing streak. William Jackson's pick-six of Aaron Rodgers gave the Bengals a 21-7 lead in the second quarter, but Rodgers threw two touchdown passes to Jordy Nelson, including one with 17 seconds remaining in regulation that tied the game. In overtime, Rodgers' 72-yard completion to Geronimo Allison set up Mason Crosby's winning field goal.

Coaches

Green Bay – Matt LaFleur, 29-7, third season. Cincinnati — Zac Taylor, 9-26, third season.

When the Packers have the ball

This will be strength vs. strength. After a week one dud, the Packers have averaged 30.7 points the last three games, including 30 points against San Francisco and 27 against Pittsburgh — two high-quality defenses. Rodgers and Co. will be tested for a third consecutive week.

Cincinnati is eighth in points allowed (18.8), fifth in yards allowed per play (4.82), fifth in passing yards allowed per play (5.88) and eighth in rushing yards allowed per play (3.70).

"I think we're legit, but we have to go out there and prove that every day. We have to go out there every single practice every day and prove that," defensive tackle D.J. Reader said. "All those things sound good. But we still have to take it one week at a time and prove it. We've got to go out there this week, right now, get it done and get ready for a contest on Sunday to prove that we are contenders."

Cincinnati operates a 4-3 defense under third-year coordinator Lou Anarumo. It's a unit without a household name but with quality players throughout the lineup.

Up front, the ends are Trey Hendrickson and Sam Hubbard and the tackles are Reader and Larry Ogunjobi. Hendrickson and Ogunjobi were key additions in free agency. Hendrickson has 2½ sacks after recording 13½ sacks last year for New Orleans. He rushes exclusively from the right side, which means a matchup against Yosh Nijman or, if healthy, Elgton Jenkins. Ogunjobi has four tackles for losses

after having only five last year for Cleveland. Reader is a superb run defender. Tackle B.J. Hill has three sacks off the bench.

Logan Wilson, Germaine Pratt and Austin Davis-Gaither are the linebackers. Wilson and Pratt are the every-down defenders. Wilson is one of the league's underrated standouts. Not only does he lead the team with 40 tackles, but he's tied for second in the league with three interceptions. Wilson has all three of the team's interceptions.

The cornerbacks are Chidobe Awuzie and Trae Waynes, with Mike Hilton manning the slot. All three were acquired in free agency this offseason, with Waynes — a native of Kenosha — spending his first five seasons with the Vikings. They are key reasons why the Bengals are fifth in opponent passer rating. Jessie Bates and Vonn Bell are the

safeties. Like Wilson, Bates is a hidden gem. A fourth-year player, he had three interceptions and 100-plus tackles in each of his first three seasons. Last year, he added 15 passes defended. Bell is a hitter; he had 114 tackles and three forced fumbles last year. Bates (neck) and Awuzie (knee) missed last week's game but are expected back this week.

When the Bengals have the ball

The Bengals are only 20th in the NFL in scoring with 23 points per game, but this will be a step up in competition for a Packers defense that is without Pro Bowl pass rusher Za'Darius Smith and could be without All-Pro cornerback Jaire Alexander.

Last year's No. 1 overall pick, quarterback Joe Burrow has taken enormous strides forward. In 10 games as a rookie, he completed 65.3% of his passes with 13 touchdowns. In four

games this year, he's completed 72.9% with nine touchdown passes. He's third in completion percentage and yards per attempt (9.23).

If Alexander is out, the Packers will face a huge challenge in dealing with Bengals receivers Ja'Marr Chase, Tyler Boyd and Tee Higgins.

The game-breaker is Chase, the fifth overall pick in this year's draft. He has 17 receptions for 297 yards (17.5 average) and four touchdowns. He's got a catch of at least 34 yards in each of his four games. Chase leads all rookie receivers in yards; no other rookie receiver has more than one touchdown.

"I'm just trying to be myself. I'm not in competition with anybody," Chase said of the Rookie of the Year race. "If anything, I feel people are in competition with me."

The go-to player is Boyd, who has a team-high 23 receptions after posting seasons of 76, 90 and 79 catches the

previous three years. The wild card is Higgins, who missed the last two games due to injury but could return this week. He caught 10 passes for 118 yards and two touchdowns in the first two games.

Tight end C.J. Uzomah caught five passes for 95 yards and two scores last week vs. Jacksonville.

Running back Joe Mixon suffered an ankle injury against the Jaguars. Taylor called him "day to day."

He is one of the top all-around backs in the NFL. In 2018 and 2019, he rushed for 2,305 yards, caught 78 passes and scored 17 touchdowns. He missed most of last season with a foot injury.

In four games this season, he's rushed for 353 yards (4.3 average) and caught seven passes. If Mixon can't play, the next man up is Samaje Perine. He rushed for 603 yards and caught 22 passes as a rookie with Washington in 2017 and had 301 yards and 11 receptions for Cincinnati last year.

The offensive line is better than what Pittsburgh fielded last week but perhaps not by much. Jonah Williams is the left tackle, Quinton Spain the left guard, Trey Hopkins the center, Jackson Carman the right guard and Riley Reiff the right tackle.

Carman, a second-round pick this

year, has struggled in place of veteran starter Xavier Su'a-Filo (groin). Easily the best player is Williams, a first-round pick in 2019 who sat out his rookie season with a shoulder injury. He has allowed one sack and two pressures in four games.

Special teams

Rookie Evan McPherson is 5-of-6 on field goals, including 2-for-2 on attempts from 53 yards. He's got a strong leg; 14 of his 18 kickoffs have resulted in touchbacks. Touchbacks would be good news for the Packers, whose kickoff return unit has done little beyond Kylin Hill's 41-yard return against Detroit in week two.

On the opposite end of the experience spectrum are punter Kevin Huber and long snapper Clark Harris. This is Huber's 13th year as the Bengals' punter. Of his 17 punts, only two have been returned. He is ninth in the league with a net average of 42.6 yards, just behind Green Bay's Corey Bojorquez, who is eighth at 42.9.

This is Harris' 12th year as the snapper. He was drafted as a tight end by the Packers in the seventh round in 2007.

Darius Phillips handles both phases of returns, with averages of 8.6 yards on punt returns and 21.5 yards on kickoff returns.

Packers bitten by injury bug

No matter how many cotton balls are wrapped around the cardboard carton, at least a few eggs are going to break if dropped from the top of a 10-story building.

It's the same in professional football. No matter how cautious a coach is during training camp, the preseason and the regular season workweek, players are going to get injured on Sundays.

In any preseason list of the Green Bay Packers' most valuable players, left tackle David Bakhtiari, guard Elgton Jenkins, cornerback Jaire Alexander and outside linebacker Za'Darius Smith would rank among the top six or eight. They were four of the team's seven Pro Bowlers last year.

By the end of Sunday's victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers, all four were out of commission. Bakhtiari is on the physically unable to perform list with the ACL tear sustained during a New Year's eve practice last season.

Jenkins, who moved from guard to tackle to replace Bakhtiari for the start of this season, has missed the last two games with an ankle injury.

Smith, who missed all but one practice during training camp because of a back injury, played 18 snaps off the bench in week one, was placed on injured reserve and had back surgery; there's no guarantee he will return this season.

And Alexander suffered a shoulder injury on a key fourth-down stop on Sunday. The team spent Monday gathering opinions from specialists. "Being smart" was how one source put it. The good news is he didn't suffer a broken collarbone.

"He's a Pro Bowler. He's a captain," coach Matt LaFleur said Monday. "You can never have enough great players out there. Right now, we've got a few of our stud players on the bench due to injury."

From 2009 through 2018, the Packers were one of the most-injured teams in the NFL fairly regularly, according to ManGames-Lost, a website that tracks injury data for the major professional sports leagues. In terms of number of games missed, Green Bay ranked eighth during that span under former coach Mike McCarthy.

The arrival of LaFleur changed that dynamic. In 2019, the Pack-

ers had the eighth-fewest injuries en route to a surprise trip to the NFC Championship Game. In 2020, the Packers had the 10th-most injuries but, really, none were of dire long-term consequence until Bakhtiari was injured late in the season. Green Bay got back to the NFC Championship Game and might have won it with a healthy Bakhtiari.

From an injury perspective, this season could hardly have started worse. But the Packers have persevered, going 2-0 in the games without both Bakhtiari and Jenkins and 3-0 without Za'Darius Smith.

"If you would've told me early in the season we'd be without arguably two of our best linemen for a couple of games and play those two fronts (San Francisco and Pittsburgh), I would've been ecstatic with two wins and here we are at 3-1," quarterback Aaron Rodgers said after accounting for three touchdowns vs. Pittsburgh.

How much more can one team take, though? Can the Packers con-

tinue to protect Rodgers at a high level with such a young offensive line? Can they possibly stop a team like Cincinnati – with an ascending young quarterback in Joe Burrow and three excellent receivers – without their top pass rusher and top cover man?

"Just next man up, next man up," outside linebacker Rashan Gary said of his mindset after Alexander went down. "It sucks at the moment, but we're in the middle of the game and we can't harp on that. Now everybody, at the end of the game, we're checking on him and making sure his spirits are up and see what's happening. It's just that next-man-up mentality and trying to get this win for Ja' because if he was out there then he'd be wanting the same."

No missing Mason

Against San Francisco, Mason Crosby tied his franchise record by making his 22nd consecutive field-goal attempt. The kick that did it, the 51-yard game-winner as time

expired, was almost blocked.

The kick that established a new record, a 26-yarder in the final seconds of the first half against Pittsburgh, came after his 31-yarder was blocked by Minkah Fitzpatrick and returned for what would have been a game-changing touchdown. However, Pittsburgh's Joe Haden was called offside and Crosby hit a 26-yarder after the penalty.

So, while the Packers officially haven't had a kick blocked, they have a huge problem to solve before they face Cincinnati. Any show of weakness is sure to be tested by upcoming opponents. It's also bound to get inside the head of Crosby, who added another chip-shot field goal without incident in the third quarter to extend his streak to 24.

"There's a lot to clean up there," LaFleur said. "They got a really good jump, jumping off the hand of our holder, so we have to do a better job of varying our snap counts. But also we can clean up some stuff in terms of just our alignments up

front and how we go about that. We'll have a plan for that this week."

On the block, Haden went around tight end Robert Tonyan and Fitzpatrick went inside of Tonyan before Tonyan and the rest of the protection unit even moved. If Haden was offside, it wasn't by much.

"They timed it up pretty well," LaFleur said.

Rodgers moving up the charts

Rodgers' second touchdown pass against Pittsburgh gave him 420 for his career. That tied Hall of Famer Dan Marino for No. 6 on the NFL's all-time list. If he throws one at Cincinnati, he'd tie Philip Rivers for No. 5.

At quarterback, there's aging. And then there's aging gracefully. With Rodgers, who will turn 38 on Dec. 2, the Packers are one of the NFL's elite teams.

With Ben Roethlisberger, who will turn 40 on March 2, the Steelers appear to be going nowhere fast.

"The way that we train gets me ready for the season, for sure. But then when you pair that with the diet and the regimen and the habits, that's really important," Rodgers

said. "Mike (McCarthy) used to always say this, and I've said it many times, but once the legs go, the rest goes. I started squatting after the '18 season, and that's been the biggest change for me.

"Now, I'm not running around like I used to. Obviously, that's changed. I'm not playing the way I played in '11 from a physical standpoint. But I'm smarter, and I want to keep being able to run bootlegs and extend plays when I can."

Better against the run

With defensive tackle Kenny Clark returning to his 2019 form and linebacker De'Vondre Campbell making an enormous impact in his first year with the team, the Packers are a lot stronger against the run than they have been.

Green Bay has yielded 4.29 yards per carry this season compared to 4.55 in 2020 and 4.67 in 2019. That's still only 17th in the league, but it's put Green Bay in better third-down situations.

On Sunday, the Steelers moved the chains on only four of their 11 third-down opportunities.

"Across the board, our team is playing with really good effort, really good urgency," LaFleur said.

"We're playing tough and physical and, quite frankly, I think sometimes that allows you to cover up some areas where you may have made a mistake if you got everybody hustling.

"Our guys have taken that to heart, and I still think there's room for improvement there as well. So by no means are we a finished product."

Campbell turned in his third consecutive excellent performance.

After 13 tackles against Detroit in week two and 11 tackles against San Francisco in week three, he recorded nine tackles, one quarterback hit (to help thwart a third-and-5) and one pass breakup (to stop a third-and-5) vs. Pittsburgh.

One play after defending a pass to receiver JuJu Smith-Schuster, Campbell gave up a catch to Smith-Schuster but stopped him well short of the first down.

After a Pro Bowl season in 2019, Clark — who turned 26 on Monday — never really got rolling after an early-season groin injury. He's been dominant to start this season, though. With 17 tackles, he's almost halfway to last year's total of 42. His 15 quarterback pressures, according to Pro Football Focus, are

also almost half of last year's total of 32.

"Kenny's Kenny. Kenny is a problem back there. He's a disruptive force," said Kingsley Keke, who had his first sack of the season against Pittsburgh. "When he comes out of his hips playing the run and being active into the passer, Kenny is a Pro Bowl-type talent, type player. He's earned everything that he's gotten so far, and he works tremendously hard. He's definitely helped me improve as a player — mentally, physically, everything. It's helping me watching him, yeah, for sure."

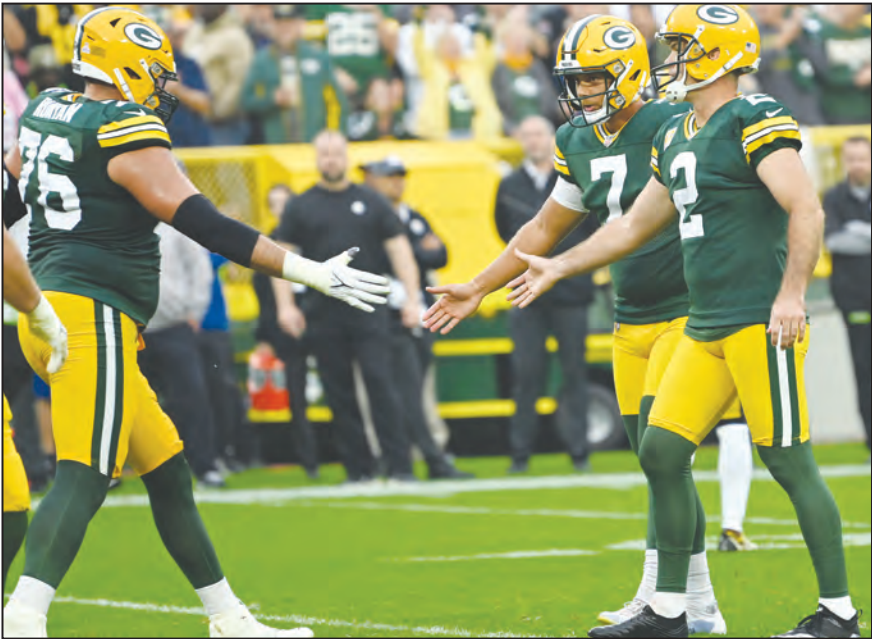

The story of a family and a community

Bryce Iverson plans to maintain Witts' principles as new owner of grocery store

Witt's Piggly Wiggly in Oconto Falls has recently changed ownership with the acquisition by Bryce Iverson — a former general manager of the store.

With the recent acquisition, David Witt, who was part owner of the Piggly Wiggly, looked back on his time with the store.

Witt's family originally lived in Crivitz. His father, Jerry Witt, moved down to Joliet, Illinois. When word was spread that Wally Spiegel had put the local IGA Supermarket up for sale, Witt said his father moved the family up to Oconto Falls.

Witt's father, Jerry, purchased the grocery store in 1957; with the help of his family, the IGA outlasted three other grocery stores in the area. Originally located in the building on Main Street that now houses Oconto Falls Insurance Center, it moved down the street in 1963 and Witt's IGA Foodliner took up residence in the building that today is a Una's Unique Resale Mall.

The Witts switched to the Piggly Wiggly brand in 1983 and built their current building on Highland Drive in 1985.

"My father purchased the store in 1957," Dave Witt said. "My brothers and I worked there through college, and we bought the store in the mid-'90s."

Throughout his time working at and owning the store, Witt said that the most important thing to him was building and maintaining relationships with the community.

"We appreciate all of the relationships that were built," he said. "We always want to help the community in any way."

Witt called the Oconto Falls community a family and cited this as a reason why it is tough to sell the store.

"The one thing that I will miss is the relationships," said Witt.

Throughout his and his family's time working at the store, Witt said they worked to keep up with innovations in the industry.

"We were the first store to implement a scanning device," he said. "We tried to stay on top of what was going on to accommodate customers."

Other things that Witt and his family developed at Piggly Wiggly were self checkouts, gas pumps and loyalty "Pig Points" discounts for gas.

"We felt that with the innovation and the overall connection to the community, our customers enjoyed coming in, and we got a good reception," said Witt.

Customer service was a point that Witt said was very important to his family in the six decades that they owned the store.

"Nothing was important to us unless the customer had a positive experience," said Witt. "We wanted customers to have the same shopping experience here than if they went to a big chain grocery store."

Over the years the family made numerous donations to Oconto Falls and the surrounding area.

"We never turned away an organization or person who was in need," Witt said.

New owner Iverson said when the Witts hired him in 2014, they made it very clear that community ties were their No. 1 priority.

"The Witts were very involved with different organizations and community events," Iverson said. "They gave donations to those who needed it. They would often donate to Kingdom Come Food Pantry, Sno Jokers and the Oconto County Sportsman Club."

Iverson added that the Witts also sponsored scholarships, gave money for cancer benefits and donated to the Lions Club and the VFW. He said

that their reach extended outside of Oconto Falls, and they would also help organizations in Gillett and Suring.

Iverson said that he wants to continue the store's tradition of being heavily invested in the community.

"The grocery store is an important part of a community," said Iverson. "This is the social hub of the community. I want to keep that going and make sure that we can maintain and build more relationships with community members."

A graduate of Oconto Falls High School, Iverson said that he has firsthand experience of how the Witts helped the community, as well as firsthand experience of the changes that were made.

"What I remember growing up is seeing the new gas pumps at the store," said Iverson. "I also remember when they added on to the front of the store."

He said the Witts would also help the schools.

"My father was an agriculture teacher," Iverson said. "He would special order products from the store to be used in the class. He would order stuff for making beef jerky and root beer."

Iverson called the Witts mentors

and family. After hiring him when he graduated from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, they promoted him to general manager, taught him about the industry and helped to make a successful ownership transi-

tion.

Just like the Witts did before him, Iverson said he will continue to improve the store — including updating the refrigeration system and remodeling the store to include the ever-

changing technology in the industry.

"I do have plans to continue innovating," said Iverson. "Our No. 1 goal will continue being customer service, though. That can be a challenge, but we are solely focused on our guests."

Witt family grocery still on the grow

4th generation running store in Oconto Falls

OCONTO FALLS — After four generations, the Witt family continues in the retail grocery business by growing with its customers.

The first Witt store began when Peter Witt, a meat cutter, emigrated from Europe and started a butcher shop in Beaver in Marinette County.

In 1917, his son, Patsy, opened a general merchandise store in Crivitz. Patsy's son, Gerald, worked there until 1949, when he became a meat cutter for A&P in Milwaukee.

In 1958, Gerald returned to Northwestern Wisconsin and began the third generation Witt grocery store on Main Street in Oconto Falls. The store later moved into the Chevrolet garage on Main Street and was increased in size to 7,800 square feet.

Today, Witt's Piggly Wiggly is co-managed by sons Steve, 38, and David, 36. Son, Tom, 33, is assistant manager. The bookkeepers are Gerald's wife, Leona, daughter, Suzanne and daughters-in-law Terri and Christine.

Witt's became affiliated with Piggly Wiggly in 1982. In 1986, the Witts built their existing store at 409 E. Highland Drive in Oconto Falls.

Witt's Piggly Wiggly now consists of 18,500 square feet and includes groceries, liquor, a bakery, deli and Nintendo/video rental. A 7,000 square foot building expansion is planned.

All in the family

The Witts said their customers want a shopping experience that includes the variety and services offered by larger, metropolitan markets with additional "home-town personal touches."

Dave said their customers are known by name.

Steve agrees. "Our customers are real people, our neighbors. We

go to church with them. Our kids go to school with their kids. They're not a customer account."

Gerald said that in the early 1960s, his father's store in Crivitz was stocked with coal, dry goods, hardware and clothing. Oranges were packed in wooden crates and bananas were cut off the stem.

Grocery bags also served as the customer's receipt because the cost of the items was tallied up on the bag.

In 1987, Witt's Piggly Wiggly was nominated in Progressive Gro-

cery by Schultz Say-G-Stores as one of the top 304 independent grocery stores in the category of technology.

Witts has a PC-based scanning system that consists of an active computer at each cash register. The store also has an energy management system monitored by computer.

Gerald's brother, Ernie, and his sons, Nick and Jack, also have carried on the Witt tradition with Witt's Piggly Wiggly stores in Crivitz and Coleman.
