Dantoin has been
teaching for 31 years

Gillett Elementary School teacher Tammy Dantoin has been selected as a 2025 Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellow.

The fellowship program recognizes and supports teaching excellence and innovation in Wisconsin, supporting teachers in the pursuit of their unrealized goals for their classrooms or professional development.

The 100 Herb Kohl Fellowship recipients and the 100 schools where they teach will each receive a \$6,000 grant.

Dantoin's career spans 31 years, with two stints at Gillett Elementary School — first from 2002 to 2012, and then returning to Gillett in 2018.

Principal Curt Angeli said Dantoin has served on several interview panels and can be counted on to tell prospective teachers, "I've taught in other schools. I came back to Gillett and will retire here, because it took me those years to realize that

Gillett is 'home.'"

Angeli told the Gillett School Board at its April 17 meeting that at one time, the Gillett School District had a teaching roster full of Kohl Fellowship winners. Most of them have since retired, except for Dean of Students Bryan Brown and Special Education Director Wendy Simonis.

"Tammy, with her tremendous gifts and her tremendous leadership, I'm hoping this will be the first of many," Angeli said.

Angeli said Dantoin has grown immensely as a leader over the years.

"She takes on student teachers, and she has cultivated staff members that we have now — that is who she is. She takes them

Oconto County jail OT way down

Effort results in improved morale, cost savings, sheriff says

The Oconto County Jail has seen a dramatic decrease in corrections officers' overtime over the past seven years, Sheriff Todd Skarban reported to the county board during its annual meeting April 15.

In 2018, the jail reported 632 12-hour overtime shifts, and it was still at 467 OT shifts in 2019 when the department started to focus more attention on the issue, Skarban said.

They got it down to 151 in 2022, 142 in 2022, 132 in 2023 and 131 in 2024, and it appears they will level out around 130 per year, he said.

"Why would you guys care? Well, if you go back to the 2018 numbers, that's \$303,360 in overtime expenses," Skarban

There's also an advantage in human terms when the overtime numbers are reduced, the sheriff said.

"People aren't coming to work every single day of their life. They're actually able to take the time off when they need it, and they get a little rest," Skarban said. "So they come in with some good energy to serve the people and to help make sure that we can provide appropriate care for our inmate population."

said. "Now, if you look at today, you're at \$62,880, a difference of \$240,480 — that's only 2018. So '19 there was a savings, '20 there was a savings, '21, '22 — what we're saving in money is what I'm saying."

The numbers came during Skarban's annual report, one of several reports the board heard at its annual meeting. Among other highlights in 2024:

- The county saw "arguably one of the safest on record," with violent crime and traffic fatalities down significantly.
- The new substation in the Town of Riverview opened, improving the department's ability to serve the northern part of the county.
- Two new K-9 officers are about to join the force, with the retirements of Turbo and Raven.
- For the fifth time in the last six years, the jail got a perfect rating during its annual state inspection.

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Gerbers, Young complete their service to Gillett

Ondik, Beyer will fill their spots on school board

The Gillett School Board said goodbye April 17 to two members with a combined 54 years of service.

Board treasurer Cliff Gerbers and president Jamie Young each decided not to run for reelection. Gerbers served 42 years on the board — 14 three-year terms — and Young served for 12 years, or four terms.

Superintendent Nathan Hansen said board members give up a portion of themselves.

“You give up time with your family. You give up time in your community.

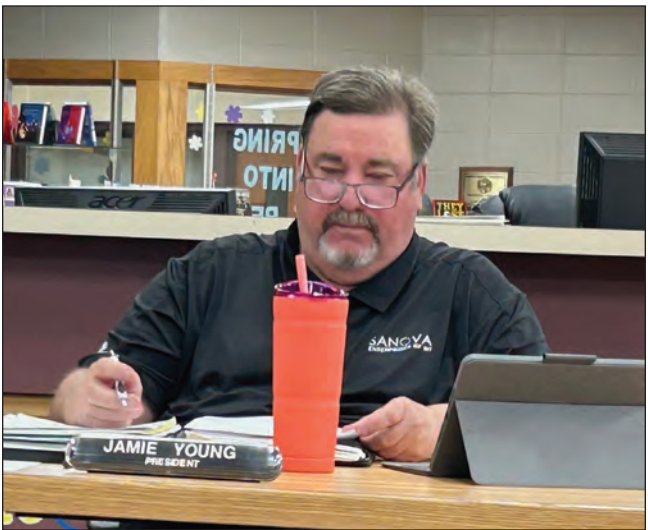


Cliff Gerbers reviews the bills April 17 during his last meeting on the Gillett School Board after 42 years, most of them as board treasurer.

You give up time going fishing, whatever it is you want to do, and you tackle controversial issues, and really you’re a representative of the community,” Hansen said. “You’re here to help our kids and help our community grow and prosper.”

He said he appreciates Young’s empathy and commitment to the job.

“I’ve never worked with a board president who called me to check and see how I was doing personally. Usually your interactions are business, agenda, whatever it is. But to actually check in with me and say, like, ‘You doing OK? You feeling OK? How are you settling in?’” Hansen said. “Jamie’s talked about re-

sponding in the course of 12 years every phone call, email that he’s responded to, I really believe that about Jamie, and I think again that’s the commitment and the time that it takes.”

Hansen got a laugh when he said Gerbers has been on the board “almost as long as I’ve been alive.” “I don’t know if we

can let him leave without having a couple of laughs, because you see Cliff and the way he handles things, he’s always got a way to make you smile. He’s always got a way to try to not make it personal and miserable,” Hansen said.

The superintendent quoted a CESA 8 director as saying Gerbers always found a way to enjoy

what he was doing. “That spirit can be infectious, and I think it’s something we’re really going to miss,” Hansen said.

Trisha Ondik and Lorie Beyer were elected April 1 to succeed Gerbers and Young on the board. Hansen said they missed the April 17 board meeting because they were in Green Bay attending a Wisconsin Association of School Boards regional orientation for new board members.

“It was the only option they had to attend in person regionally,” Hansen said. “We talked about it, and I talked with board members and really felt like it was probably better for them to attend that session than attend here. They regret not being able to attend both, but I think they’re doing good work for us right now by attending that session.”

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County board passes sheriff's wellness program

‘It’s got to be above and beyond what we’re offering right now,’ Skarban says

The Oconto County Board approved a resolution April 15 to create an expanded wellness program in the sheriff’s department.

Supervisors approved a \$48,000 transfer from the county’s general fund to support a contract with an Oconto Falls company called Wellness Command Post, which provides 28 counselors trained in military and law enforcement counseling.

Sheriff Todd Skarban said the idea is to offer staff more comprehensive

support than the wellness program for general employees can provide.

“If something traumatic happens, such as a fatal crash, we got a place for you to go now that’s a little bit more enhanced and a little bit more — to handle what’s going on inside,” Skarban said. “We ask our jail staff to bring in hundreds of more inmates from other counties; that weighs on them.”

Other events that staff has to deal with include dispatchers who must handle more than 30,000 emergency calls every year or the administration team members who process open records

requests for things like photos from fatal crashes or other deaths, he said.

“We gotta get back to our team and make sure that they’re OK physically and mentally, so they can lead that quality life at home,” Skarban said. “When they can go home and be home, that’s important. It’s important for their rest, but then where are they in their mind?”

According to the resolution, the Sheriff’s Office Employee Wellness Program will provide:

- Trauma-Informed Training: Implement training for all employees on recognizing signs of trauma and stress

in themselves and colleagues, and strategies for coping and resilience.

- Mental Health Resources: Partner with local mental health professionals to provide confidential counseling services and workshops aimed at stress management and trauma recovery.

- Peer Support Programs: Work in concert with the team to develop a peer support system where trained officers can provide emotional support to their colleagues who may be experiencing job-related stress or trauma.

- Wellness Initiatives:

Create wellness initiatives, such as fitness programs, stress-reduction workshops and team-building activities, that promote physical health and team cohesion.

- Regular Check-Ins: Encourage regular mental health check-ins among the team, fostering an environment where discussing mental health is normalized and supported.

- Feedback: Establish a feedback mechanism where employees can voice concerns or suggestions related to their wellness without fear of stigma or retribution.

- Continuous Improvement: Regularly assess

and improve the Wellness Program based on feedback and evolving best practices related to mental health and wellness in law enforcement.

“This is really a platform for a foundational approach for conflict resolution, to get those traumas out of there or put them in a small package and put them where they need to put them,” Skarban said. “That’s what this is about, and it’s got to be above and beyond what we’re offering right now.”

The board passed the resolution unanimously.

County goes back to full-time 4-H educator

Oconto County will again have a full-time 4-H educator in its University of Wisconsin extension office, after the county board had its annual meeting April 15.

The county has shared a 4-H coordinator with Marinette County since 2019, requiring the person to cover an area from Niagara south to Little Suamico, County Administrator Richard Heath told supervisors.

After the recent retirement of community

development educator Dale Mohr, the county is able to review its priorities, Heath said.

“With Mr. Mohr leaving, that frees up money for this position without any disruption in the budget,” Heath said. “I think it’s a worthwhile investment.”

Supervisor Tracy Ondik called the move an excellent idea.

“My experience is that the last four years at the Oconto County Youth Fair has seen huge participation from the various 4-H organizations,” Ondik said, adding that he would like

to see the person work cooperatively with other groups to allow greater participation.

“There’s a large amount of competition for the fair week among other organizations in this county, and youth have to make decisions about what they’re going to participate in,” he said.

Mohr was active in facilitating the county’s teen court, and the new 4-H educator will be asked to take on those duties as well, Heath said.

and she nurtures them,” he said, and used one first-year teacher as an example. “She has absolutely raised the level of this teacher in her first year to where I don’t even feel like she’s a first-year teacher. That’s really because of Tammy and everything that she does.”

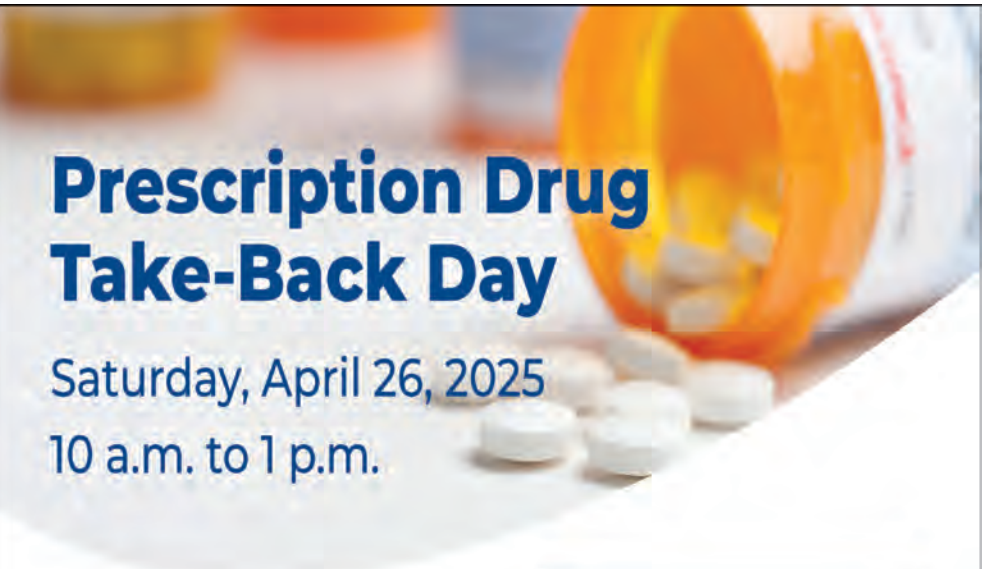

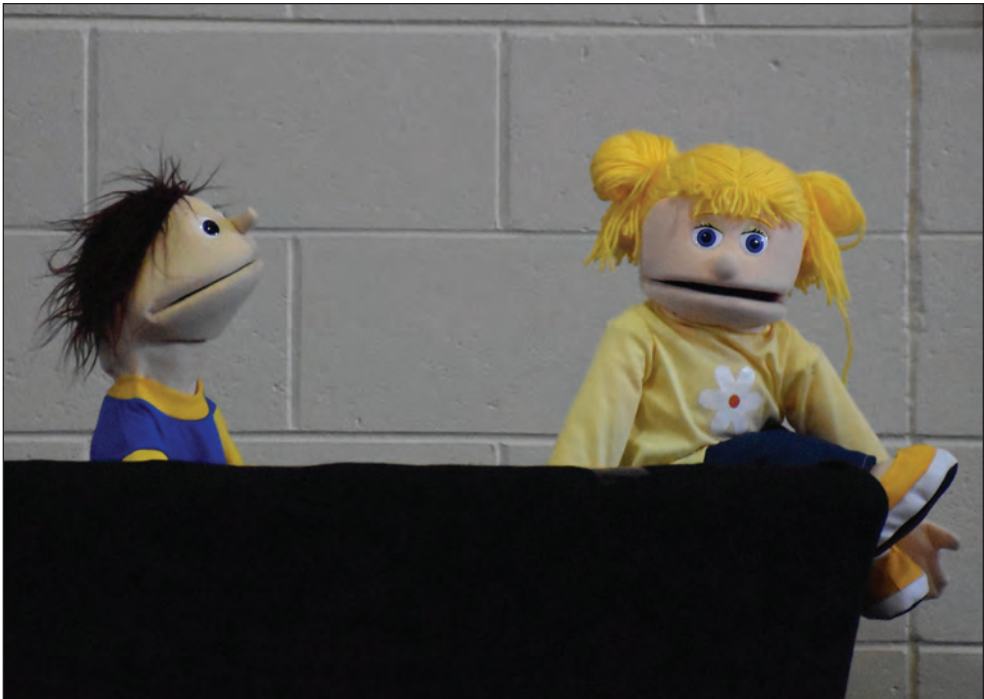

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In this show, it's all about the sauce

Twin brothers star in 'Spaghetti Western or Mission Im-pasta-ble'

Audiences should not expect anything mellow about the melodrama "Spaghetti Western or Mission Im-pasta-ble," which Pulaski High School will be performing the last weekend in April.

In this show, audiences find Grannie Smith and her granddaughter, Petunia Pearl, running a restaurant and hotel with the fun name of the Hoot 'n' Holler, but they're behind on the mortgage, which is held by the dastardly Duke Dreadful, who plans to take it from them with the assistance of his dear Saucy Sally. While the hero, Kirk Ketchum, and his sidekick, Harriet Holdem, are doing their best to lead the effort to save the business, Grannie and Petunia decide to enter a spaghetti sauce contest in the hopes of winning the prize money and getting out of debt.

The show is family friendly, which means that all audiences should get a kick out of it.

While melodramas are entertaining enough on their own when reading the script, the PHS show has an additional twist with the hero and villain being played by twin brothers Cooper and Hayden Witte.

"This might be my experience talking, but I feel the production is going very smoothly," said Cooper Witte, who plays Kirk. "I like a lot of the humor that is displayed within the play, and I really like the people I am cast with."

He finds it interesting to be facing off against his brother in the show.

"It was a thought that popped into my mind when I first saw the casting for the play, and it had come to realization that me and my brother were really two of the only senior boys with a lot of experience under our belts, and there was going to be a specific male lead and a specific male villain," Witte said. "I didn't think that it was going to happen. Being able to perform as a lead with my twin is just another experience I don't think I'll ever be able to forget."

Amy Tubbs, the show's director, noted that "Spaghetti Western" is a newer show in the pantheon of theater productions, and she liked the pasta theme.

"That was not a theme we had for a melodrama yet," Tubbs said. "We just thought it would be something different

and something fun, and it has been."

In the tradition of far-out names and characters, Tubbs said the show has a dirty character named Dusty, whose sauce has a raccoon tail and tree branches in it. However, it might not be a match for the sauce Grannie and Petunia come up with, which has a secret ingredient, especially after Duke Dreadful sells Dusty some snake oil that makes his sauce less than palatable.

"It's a melodrama, so everyone's got to go down," Tubbs said.

Greater prairie-chickens booming once again

I cringe as I set my alarm for 4 a.m. I am not a morning person, but on the rare occasion when the benefit far outweighs the unwelcome blare of my alarm clock, I make the sacrifice. In this case, there was no doubt that it would. I hope to witness one of the most remarkable displays in all the birding world — the early morning “booming” of the greater prairie-chicken.

The adult male greater prairie-chicken is a barred brown-and-white chicken-like grouse with a small head, rounded wings and short tail. He doesn’t sound very interesting, but for a few weeks in the spring, when the male wants to establish his territory and attract a mate, he is nothing less than spectacular. With his head low and wings held stiffly by his side, he clicks his tail and raises ear-like plumes on his head. Then he blows up bright orange air sacs on his neck, transforming himself into a dazzling performer, all the while drumming with his feet in double time.

When the orange air sacs inflate, they produce a booming vocalization that can be heard up to a mile away. It is a resonant three-noted “who, who, whooooo” along with whoops and cackles. Males clash relentlessly at these gatherings, chasing each other, leaping into the air and striking with wings, feet, and bills. As they pass, females they perform “flutter jumps” — leaping into the air while flapping their wings, all part of their courtship display.

The booming ground

where the males “perform” is called a lek. Leks usually are on higher ground and have little to no vegetation. During the courtship displays, only a few males, mostly experienced older males, are accepted by females for mating. The males with the largest eye combs, longest legs and best territories (nearest the center of the booming ground) appear to have the best breeding success.

No pair bond is formed during mating. While the

female proceeds to select nest sites and rear young, the male continues his spirited ceremony to charm more females. After the breeding season, they all gather in flocks.

Greater prairie-chickens are non-migratory. In winter, they create horizontal tunnels in the snow which insulate them from the freezing temperatures. Feathers on their legs and feet help keep them warm. During winter months, they can be observed perched in trees feeding on buds.

The greater prairie-chicken is listed as a threatened species in Wisconsin. According to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the statewide population of

this species has decreased dramatically over the last 50 years. This year, the DNR reported 288 male prairie chickens on 37 leks. These leks are primarily located on four state-owned properties in central Wisconsin, with a majority concentrated on the Buena Vista Grasslands.

The Wisconsin DNR manages over 30,000 acres as greater prairie-chicken habitat. They have written a 10-year greater prairie-chicken management plan in cooperation with the greater prairie-chicken advisory committee and approved by the Natural Resources Board. The Society of Tympanuchus Cupido Pinnatus, scientific name for greater prairie-chicken,

is a nonprofit organization also dedicated to protecting prairie chickens.

Threats to our Wisconsin greater prairie-chickens include habitat loss and fragmentation as well as a new threat, a 7,109-acre solar project planned to directly adjoin the Buena Vista Wildlife Area grasslands. The project will be four times larger than any previously approved solar facility in the state and will be the second largest solar project in the nation. While many conservation groups support solar energy, they oppose how close the project will be to the greater prairie-chickens and their habitat.

Jim Keir, a former 20-year Buena Vista Wildlife

manager and DNR prairie chicken expert, stated: “In my professional opinion, the current greater prairie-chicken population is alarmingly low, and any significant negative impact to the birds and their habitat may be the tipping point that leads to endangerment and extirpation from Wisconsin.”

Birdwatchers from around the world travel to Wisconsin in April to attend the Central Wisconsin Prairie Chicken Festival. The festival includes birding tours, observation blinds, nature walks and exhibits. While the festival has already taken place this year, you can still enjoy seeing prairie chicken videos on the Wisconsin Prairie Chicken Festival YouTube page. UW-Stevens Point also offers prairie chicken tours and information at <https://www3.uwsp.edu/wildlife/pchicken/Pages/default.aspx>.

When my alarm buzzes in the dark of night, I rise without hesitation and drive to central Wisconsin. As a sunbeam peeks over the horizon, I begin to make out chicken-like birds with wings stiff, tails clicking and ear plumes erect suddenly breaking the silence with the beating of their feet. Like little orange suns appearing across the prairie, their air sacs inflate with a “who, who, whooooo.” As their melodic booming fills the air, joy fills my soul. Let the show begin.

Planting trees can make difference for communities

Trees provide many benefits to the environment and our health and well-being. These long-lived members of our landscapes and communities provide shade, help reduce energy costs, clean the air we breathe, prevent soil erosion and stormwater runoff, and attract and provide homes for birds and pollinators. National Arbor Day, celebrated on the last Friday of April, recognizes the important role trees play in our environment.

Spending time among the trees also helps boost our immune system. Studies reveal that tree-filled landscapes help decrease domestic conflict, as well as aggression and violence at schools. A mindful walk through the woods, known as forest bathing, helps reduce blood pressure and stress. It increases focus and energy levels, improves sleep and much more.

When planting new trees, make sure to select

one that will fit in the space when mature and thrive in the growing conditions. Plant tags and catalog descriptions can provide you with this important information. Consider including trees that provide multiple seasons of beauty with flowers, fruit, fall color and form. Look for those that also support birds and pollinators as they deliver many other environmental benefits.

Select a planting location away from overhead and underground utilities to avoid future conflicts. Avoid plants that eventually could grow into wires or structures that may interfere with utilities and power transmission, creating a real hazard.

State at least three business days before putting the first

shovel in the ground. When your request is received, this nonprofit group contacts all the appropriate underground utilities. The utilities’ locators will then mark the location of the underground utilities in your work area. Contacting them first reduces the risk of injury, the inconvenience of accidentally knocking out power, cable or other utilities, and the potential cost incurred to repair a utility you damage when skipping this step.

Once the location is cleared, you’re ready to start planting. Locate the tree’s root flare (where the roots curve away from the trunk) by gently pulling the soil away from the trunk as needed. Dig a hole two to five times wider and the same depth as the distance from the root flare to the bottom of the root ball. Set the tree in the hole, carefully remove it from the container and loosen or prune off any circling roots. Cut back burlap and

wire baskets when planting balled and burlapped trees.

Plant the tree so the root flare is even with or slightly above the soil surface. Roughen the sides of the hole and backfill with the existing soil. Water thoroughly and spread a 2- to 3-inch layer of mulch over the soil surface, keeping the mulch away from the tree trunk.

Continue watering throughout the growing season, the following year and as needed once established. Check the soil moisture and thoroughly water the root ball and surrounding soil when the top few inches of soil are crumbly and slightly moist. Apply 10 gallons of water for every inch of the trunk’s diameter at 4 1/2 feet high.

Milwaukee, and Box in the Wood will be the first troupe in Wisconsin to perform it.

“She’s fairly local,” Demaskie said. “Her publishing company’s on the border of Wisconsin and Illinois. It’s a fairly new show, too. It was written in 2022.”

Demaskie added that Beverly, one of The Bean Shack’s customers, was specifically designed to be a Midwestern woman, but a lot of the characters have the Midwestern accent that everyone knows and loves.

“That’s all in the script, too,” Demaskie said. “I think it’s been fun.”

Choosing a murder mystery was an easy decision for Demaskie, who was part of a classic mystery for Box in the Wood a few years ago.

“I really wanted to do a murder mystery in general,” Demaskie said. “Murder mysteries are my favorite genre. I was in ‘And Then There Were None’ (by Agatha Christie) when we did it, and that’s my favorite play of all time. As soon as I knew I was directing something, I wanted to do a murder mystery, and my assistant director showed me the show.”

Demaskie said that audience members won’t have to worry that the show’s limited to one corpse on the stage.

“In ‘Café Mocha Murders,’ people start dropping,” Demaskie said. “Starting with Steven. We

don’t know what happened to Steven, and we’re not talking about Steven.”

Despite the spectre of death that hovers over all murder mysteries, Demaskie feels that “Café Mocha Murders” will touch audience members’ hearts.

“Even though this show is a murder mystery, I think it has a lot of heart, and there’s a good message to it, and there’s a lot about family and camaraderie,” Demaskie said.

As part of marketing efforts, Demaskie and her crew did an interview with Strasse to get her take on why she wrote the play. In the interview, Strasse reiterates the “heart” of the show.

“She never really wanted to write a comedy,” Demaskie said. “That wasn’t really her deal. She liked the dramas with a lot of intricate, inter-spliced characters, but people just kept telling her. ‘Write us a comedy. Write us a murder mystery.’ So, she decided to write this, and she was very adamant that she wanted to include a moral, a message, something for the audience to take away, and I think she did a really good job with that.”

Having that moral in place makes putting together the show — whether its the lights, the set pieces or the actors’ performances — a piece of cake, according to Demaskie.

“It really helps you with designing the show,” she said. “If you know what you

want the theme to be and you know what you want the audience to take away, you can make sure that, from everything from how people do their characters down to how we build the set, you can make sure that everything encompasses and helps drive home that moral.”

To that end, one set piece might be very familiar to Shawano residents. The bar where the cast makes their coffee concoctions was obtained after Angie’s Main Café closed a few years ago. Demaskie further created the warm coffee shop feel by getting furniture from the Habitat Restore, which included a table in the shape of a coffee cup.

Another unusual step with the show is VIP seating at some tables that are part of the set, allowing some audience members to be immersed in the show.

The excitement for the show is not limited to the director. Jennifer Maglio, who plays Beverly, likes how the cast has been able to bond with the playwright, something atypical in most shows because the writer is either far away or has passed.

“I like how excited the writer is for this particular performance because she’s from Wisconsin, but this hasn’t been played in Wisconsin,” Maglio said. “Her family hasn’t seen it yet, and she’s so excited that it’s being played near her family for the first time.”

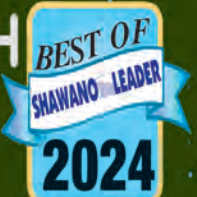

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DNR spring hearing in Shawano re-elects CDAC delegates

There were few fireworks or discussions April 14 during the Shawano County spring hearing hosted by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and state Conservation Congress.

A total of 13 people attended the annual hearing at Shawano Community Middle School, according to Duane Beyer of Shawano, who was re-elected to a two-year term as chairman of the county's five-member Conservation Congress. Mark Conradt of Shawano was re-elected to a three-year term as vice chairman.

Beyer and Conradt hold the same posts on Shawano County's Deer Advisory Council, which will hold its next meeting at 7 p.m. April 29 in Shawano Community Middle School. Other county delegates are Andrew Heinz and Bob Bohardt of Shawano and Mark Heidemann of Marion.

The council determines how many free antlerless deer tags are issued for each paid archery and gun deer tag. They also determine whether they want the county to maintain, increase or decrease the deer population. In virtually all Central Farmland Zones, because of continually growing herds, most CDACs choose to maintain or decrease the herd.

Those attending the 72 hearings (one in each county) were al-

lowed to vote in person on ballots that covered a variety of DNR hunting and fishing management questions, as well as topics for the Natural Resources Board and Conservation Congress. None of the votes (other than delegate votes) are binding but serve to advise the state and Conservation Congress about the views of sportsmen and other wildlife lovers. Residents also could vote online for three days.

Results will appear at <https://dnr.wisconsin.gov/about/wcc/springhearing>.

Topics that probably most interest Shawano County and surrounding residents include a plan to reduce the overall daily panfish limit from 25 to 10 on Shawano Lake and dozens of other lakes in the state, allowing CDACs to extend the archery season to Jan. 31 even if they do not authorize a Holiday Hunt (antlerless only hunt during the Christmas holiday), using technology like cellular trail cameras to monitor

traps, allowing fall turkey hunting in northern Zones 6 and 7 and requiring bear baits on public land to be labeled with a person's name and address or DNR number.

Beyer said he welcomes the chance to offer an extended bow season without necessarily offering a Holiday Hunt. Some landowners who hunt their own property may not welcome a Holiday Hunt, because they can't shoot bucks during their last few days of bow or crossbow season. Beyer noted that several snowmobile clubs have fought against the Holiday Hunt, because they need to log trail maintenance hours to obtain state funds but may be doing so during the last week in December. He added that although some snowmobilers didn't want hunters in the woods while they rode trails, poor snowfall during most of the past 10 winters doesn't support that argument.

He encouraged those of all interests to attend the April 29 CDAC meeting and share their thoughts.

One topic not on the spring questionnaire is the state's process of distributing spring turkey tags. This is one of my hot-button topics for several reasons. First, with today's computerized processing that can do thousands or

even millions of data computations in seconds, why are we still applying for turkey tags by Dec. 10? Since I buy a patron license every year, I am applying for my 2026 tags in March or April of the previous year. That's the way it works. But most of us are not thinking about turkey hunting in December, and it's easy to forget to apply.

What boggles my mind is the number of surplus tags left for the bonus tag sales in mid-March. This apparently got the attention of DNR conservation warden Jake Donar, who is also a member of the DNR Turkey Advisory Committee.

According to a Milwaukee newspaper, Donar told the committee April 2 that many hunters were having trouble drawing their first or second choice.

Donar's questions prompted the DNR to analyze license data from 2022 to 2024, which revealed an astounding fact: an average of 26% of those drawing a tag never purchased them. The DNR has speculated that some hunters may not be able to hunt on the season dates they originally drew, but the long lag between notification of getting drawn (usually in December or January) and the turkey season is likely a factor, too. Some hunters may simply forget they drew a tag

and just buy one during the bonus tag sales. Or some patron license holders may apply for a turkey tag even if they aren't sure they will hunt (because the application fee is included in their licenses).

The DNR is now considering a complete revision of the process.

Have you ever gotten a phone call from someone saying there's a problem with your computer? They might say they're from Microsoft, Apple or even your bank. They sound super helpful, but here's the truth — they're

not here to help. They're trying to scam you. These fake "tech support" calls are on the rise, and they can lead to stolen money, locked accounts and big headaches. That's why local community banks are warning cus-

tomers: hang up and don't click. Here's what usually happens: You get a call or pop up on your computer saying something is wrong. The person says they need remote access to fix it. You give them access — and

boom. They're in your system and eventually your bank account. Some even ask you to "refund" money they "accidentally" put in your account. "These scammers are smooth talkers. They sound kind and professional, which makes people trust them," said Connie Zuleger, chief operating officer at Prevail Bank. "But no real tech support team will ever ask for access to your computer out of the blue." Here's what you can watch for: Pop-ups with scary messages about

viruses, phone calls saying there's a problem with your computer or bank account, anyone asking you to download something or visit a website, and requests for your online banking password or for remote access. "If it feels fishy, it probably is," said Natalyn Jannene, assistant vice president of marketing at AbbyBank. "We tell our customers to slow down, hang up, and call us directly. It's always safer to double-check." At each local bank,

teams are trained to watch for unusual transactions. If something doesn't look right, bankers will reach out to you directly. Many banks also teach customers how to spot scams through workshops, emails and one-on-one help. Never give control of your device to someone you don't know. Don't share your banking info unless you call the bank yourself. Talk to someone you trust before sending money. Call your bank if something feels off. They are there to help.
