

Waqsecewan Language Center opens doors

Menominee building seen as resource to keep tribe's ways, culture alive

The Waqsecewan Language Center formally opened its doors Aug. 1 in Keshena as MenominiyoU celebrated a big step in preserving the Menominee language.

Menominee Tribal Legislator Joey Awonohopay noted that the building was many years coming. He recalled sitting with a group of elders who were still fluent in the language and asked them for assistance with creating language classes. In the 2000s, language programs were part of the public school system, but tribal members wanted to expand even more so that parents and other community members could speak the language and provide a resource outside the classroom where the children could practice their words.

"This is still yet the beginning of something beautiful for our people and the children yet to come," Awonohopay said. "We look out and we see the people we work with, and so we think about the generations haven't been born yet. We've had amazing things happen. Look

at today. We have signs on our reservation that explain our language."

Awonohopay noted that most tribes, including the Menominee, suffered the effects of the 19th and early 20th century United States boarding schools, which were designed to rip the language and culture of the tribes from the children who were forced to attend.

"We have elders who grew up when it was forbidden to speak or even write our language," Awonohopay said. "Today we can speak it in the open air."

Regina Washinawatok, who sits on both the Waqsecewan board of directors and the Menominee Indian School Board, used stronger language when describing the boarding schools to over 100 people at the grand opening, saying those schools were designed to "destroy" the language.

Washinawatok noted that it took the work of the Menominee's ancestors to make sure the language did not die out completely.

"Whispering the language to each other out on the playground or at night when the lights were turned out, so they

wouldn't forget who they were, and they wouldn't forget our Menominee language," Washinawatok said. "Our ancestors were the ones rounded up when we were confined to reservations in the 1800s in these boarding schools that were designed to destroy our language, destroy our culture and destroy our very identity."

The Menominee are a resilient people, Washinawatok said, noting that a group of people in Zoar went to great lengths to keep the language from fading away into obscurity, as well as the Menominee ways and religion. Now that task lies in the hands of Waqsecewan.

"Language is the soul of our nation," Washinawatok

Community-based Bigs meet a few times a month to expose their Little to

Ellsworth will be starting seventh grade in the fall.

"Ellsworth and I have had so many adventures together, but his favorite memories are swimming, Green Packers, Green Bay Gamblers and Green Bay Blizzards games, go-karting, Bay Beach, watching movies, attending Shawano High School musicals, playing board games and going to Shawano Sun Drop Dayz," Going said. "A few of my highlights have been attending two Packer games together (these

tickets were donated by a couple who couldn't attend). It was the first time we both were at a Packer game, and we got to experience it together."

Ingold to seek speedy trial in case of homicide

Michael Ingold, a suspect in a 2022 homicide, is expected to file a motion for a speedy trial following an Aug. 2 motions hearing that saw Ingold leave the courtroom over an hour into proceedings.

Defense attorney Julianne Lennon said she planned to file the motion later in the day for the speedy trial. Ingold, 59, has been in custody at the Shawano County Jail since July 2022 on a \$1 million cash bond, making it two years that the case has been in the court system.

The court is expected to bring up the speedy trial motion at another hearing at 8:30 a.m. Aug. 21 in Branch II of the Shawano County Courthouse. Tentatively, Ingold's trial could begin Nov. 18 and is expected to last four weeks.

The criminal complaint states that at 4:13 a.m. June 25, 2022, the Shawano County Sheriff's Department received a 911 call

from Ingold, where he stated that he woke up and checked on his girlfriend, only to find her deceased.

An autopsy showed that Sheila A. Laudon, who was 59 at the time, was strangled to death.

Ingold told the deputies that he got home at 6:30 p.m., talked with the victim, turned on the television and fell asleep on the couch, the complaint said. He stated that he woke up around 2:30 a.m. and heard the victim in the kitchen saying that she was getting a beer. He then claimed that he woke up again at 4:01 a.m. and found her deceased in the bedroom.

Detectives received the autopsy report of the victim's death on July 21, 2022, stating that the cause of death was manual strangulation.

On July 27, 2022, two detectives interviewed Ingold at the sheriff's department, told Ingold that the victim died from strangulation and that the detectives believed that he caused it. Ingold responded, saying, "No it's not, no it's not, I

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didn't touch her," according to the complaint. Ingold acknowledged he and Laudon were the only two people in the house but continued to deny touching her, according to the complaint.

If convicted, Ingold faces life in prison if convicted on first-degree intentional homicide with a domestic abuse modifier.

Lennon is seeking to get Laudon's medical records and has made a motion for the court to order Laudon's physician, Dr. Anthony

Defranco with ThedaCare, to provide the records for an in-camera review with the court or to simply provide copies to the state and defense. Lennon noted Laudon had an enlarged heart and questions whether her heart condition caused her death instead of the finding of strangulation in the autopsy report.

Lennon requested in June that slides from the autopsy be scanned and sent to her expert witness so he can form an opinion to what caused Laudon's

death. According to online court records, the court granted Lennon's request June 28. In the Aug. 2 hearing, Lennon pointed out copies had been provided to the state's experts but not to hers.

Assistant District Attorney Laura Nelson objected, noting that the expert witness is currently subject to a Daubert hearing, which is also expected to be addressed at the Aug. 21 hearing. She argued that the witness could be disqualified but would still have copies of evidence in the case.

"It's part of this procedure that we have to have the Daubert hearing first," Nelson said. "Otherwise, we're just setting a precedent that evidence is being released ... where we're providing Dr. (Carl) Schmidt material for his classes. Once the court qualifies him as an expert, then we can have the evidence transmitted."

District Attorney Greg Parker questioned the possibility that Laudon died from a heart attack, consid-

ering the autopsy report confirmed strangulation as the cause of death.

"There nothing's there finding a heart attack or anything related with respect to the heart," Parker said. "It simply says strangulation is the cause of death."

Judge William Kussel Jr. said that there could be some relevance in regards to Laudon's heart condition but did not rule on the matter.

Lennon said she was uncertain that issuing a subpoena for the medical records would get her anywhere. She noted the state got its copies by citing the exception for law enforcement.

"I'm not a member of law enforcement; therefore, I'm not going to fall under that exception," Lennon said. "Can I try to subpoena them? Yes. I anticipate that, in all likelihood, they might say those are privileged records and they're not going to hand them over."

said. "It is our way of how we see the world and how we describe it. Our language is a very descriptive language. That's why some of our words are so long, because it's describing the thing you're talking about."

She added that there are 28 words just to describe snow.

The plans to build Waqsecewan began to form June 22, 2020, in the midst of the coronavirus pandemic, according to Burton Warrington, the executive director for MenominiyoU. Warrington noted that it was fortunate that Miron Construction was selected to build the new Menominee Nation High School across the street from Waqsecewan, as his organization asked the company to design and build the new language center.

"There was a saying I read back in college. It

says: 'Today's actions are going to be tomorrow's history,'" Warrington said. "We're just playing our part at this point in time, and there a lot of ancestors who played their part, so we're doing our part for this moment in time. Our grandkids are going to take it farther than we can dream."

Waqsecewan is the Menominee name for Lillian Nelson, one of the last fluent speakers of the Menominee language. Tribal Legislator Gary Besaw pointed out that Nelson was always available to give her time to talk in the Menominee language and describe the tribe's culture and ways. Besaw noted it takes a whole village to save a language, but Nelson played a big part, so it was decided to name the center after her.

"She would say that we are social beings, and this

is our gang," Besaw said. "We've got to keep it going, because the language is going to show you how to behave. That's why she wanted this here."

Menominee Tribal Chairwoman Gena Kakkak said that opening the language center helps to normalize the language again and revitalize the tribe's culture.

"Our language is the essence of who we are. It carries our stories, values, histories and our way of life," Kakkak said. "This beautiful new facility is more than just a place to learn. It's a center for our community for engagement and empowerment, allowing us to connect to our language. It is a space that ties us to our ancestors that will guide future generations by honoring our past and securing our future."

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During the open house at Waqsecewan Language Center on Aug. 1, Menominee tribal members were able to sign up for classes and workshops.

blame him," Going said. "Ellsworth is very excited to have Sean Clifford (Packers backup quarterback) ride his bike to the practice field on Aug. 7."

The Big and the Little have impacted each other's lives over the years.

"He shared that I showed him how to read better, how to be kind and how to pick good friends,"

Going said. "As for me, it has been very cool watching him grow physically and emotionally the past seven years. I also feel like I have another 'family' in my life as his biological family has always made me feel loved and appreciated. You can never have enough families."

Going treasures the bond the two have created.

"I feel like it has provided me the opportunity to create a special bond with a young child who will, hopefully, be positively impacted by this relationship," she said. "It has given me purpose as my daughters have grown up, moved away and are now independent. Most importantly, I feel like my personality is much more light

and not as serious. It seems being around children just puts me in a joyful mood! I am so grateful."

Going recommends anyone considering joining should certainly give it a try.

"Once you do, you will never look back," she said. "The benefits for the Big and the Little are numerous. You truly build an

amazing relationship and just feel so good inside that you have a very special person in your life."

In 2023, Big Brothers Big Sisters served 31 children in Shawano, Bonduel and Gillett, partnering with public and private schools for site-based mentoring.

According to its website, when compared with their peers, youths

matched in the program experience 84% improvement in socio-emotional competence, 82% improvement in avoidance of risky behaviors and 83% educational success.

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Shawano County to open campground for NFL Draft

Director hopes to see three-quarters of available slots filled

It's no secret the 2025 NFL Draft will be held in Green Bay on April 24-26, 2025. Shawano County businesses are busy promoting themselves in hopes their products and services won't be a secret, either.

In that vein, the Shawano County Park Campground will open earlier than normal in the season to accommodate anyone needing a campsite during the event.

Keith Marquardt, Shawano County parks director, hopes to fill 75% of the available openings. With 100 campsites, and campers expected to stay anytime from Wednesday to Saturday night the week of the draft, that's 400 possible nights.

"We're not going to raise our rates; we're just going to keep our normal rates, which are \$35 a night, including water and electricity," Marquardt said. "We'll have the bathrooms, at least the heated one, open. I don't think we have any reservations yet."

Marquardt is also president of the Shawano County Tourism Council.

For now, the campground is promoted on the parks department's online reservation website at www.shawanocountyparks.com/parks/.

Marquardt said the Highway and Parks Committee opted to keep the rates the same.

"It gets to a point where, 'Do you need to price gouge everything?'" he said.

There are no minimum stays required during the NFL Draft.

"It can be one night. It can be three nights; it can be four nights," Marquardt said. "We have three-night

minimums on holiday weekends, two-night minimum just on weekends, but that time of the year, it's just extra money, extra revenue for us."

Normally, campsites aren't rented out until the first week in May.

"Once the chamber and the tourism decides where they're putting their advertising involved with the Green Bay chamber, hopefully we'll be full," he said. "I would hope at least three quarters of the nights, at least 300-400, are booked. I don't know how many people are coming from out of the area that would haul a camper or a tent or something like that. I think the

cottages and all that will certainly fill up. Camping? Yeah."

Campsites at the Brown County Fairgrounds and Reforestation Camp Campground will also be available earlier than normal, but Marquardt said he heard those rates will be higher than normal.

The store at the county park will also be open during that weekend. Staff training is often conducted that weekend, but Marquardt said it can be moved forward a week.

"It wouldn't be hard for us to open," he said. "We get enough staff coming back from year to year that we wouldn't have a lot of training to do."

Also, he's not sure how much time campers will spend at the park. After all, they're in the area for the draft. The campground, like a hotel room, is a place to spend the night before heading out again the next day.

"We'll play it by ear," he said. "It's a new experience for all of us. It's exciting, though."

College of Menominee Nation reaffirms commitment to climate action plan

The College of Menominee Nation declared its renewed commitment to the climate, locally and globally, in the re-signing of Second Nature's Climate Leadership Statement, as a part of the 2024 Sustainable Development Institute Intern Report Out.

The climate action plan that follows this statement requires participants to develop and support internal task forces, joint actions and resilience assessments that reach out from two months to several years in the future. These plans are then made public, to encourage others to participate.

CMN President Christopher Caldwell, who was recently appointed to the Second Nature board of directors, spoke at the college's Keshena campus July 30.

"Whenever I speak to

groups, I always mention evidence of Menominee sustainability — that our reservation forest can be seen from space," he said. "Seeing our forest stand out in contrast to the surrounding farmlands shows that vision, values and resiliency result in positive change and impact. Indigenous sustainability thinking applied more broadly can be seen in many other tribal nations and Indigenous peoples' communities across the globe. There are lessons to be learned and shared to help develop solutions today for our generations tomorrow."

Jennifer Gauthier, Sustainable Development Institute director, also spoke.

"As Menominee people, we have always adapted to the environment around us," she said. "Our Menominee moons

are proof of this, as there are several versions of our moon calendar that are reflective of a particular time and place. Even now, discussions are taking place within our language community to consider making adjustments to reflect what our hunters, harvesters, fishers and gatherers have been noticing for some time."

Staff and faculty members across the College of Menominee Nation will work to put the climate action plan into practice throughout all parts of the college.

The college's Campus Climate Commitment was originally signed by the college's founding president, Verna S. Fowler, in 2008. It was most recently reaffirmed in 2016 as a part of CMN's Sustainability Committee's work on an Academic Quality Improvement Program.

Rudnick gets bond hearing in sexual assault case

Jacob D. Rudnick, 30, of Seymour, will be back in court Aug. 9 for a bond hearing, hoping to be able to reduce the \$200,000 cash bond he currently faces.

Rudnick is being charged with two counts of third-degree sexual assault and one count of second-degree sexual assault for an attack that allegedly took place in a park in the Town of Lessor on Halloween night in 2022. The Seymour Police Department initially took the victim's statement and collected evidence from her before handing it over to the Shawano County Sheriff's Department. The case is scheduled for a three-day trial Dec. 3-5.

Rudnick is involved in another case involving a sexual assault that reportedly took place in July 2023 in Lessor. In that case, he faces two counts of second-degree sexual assault. The trial for that case is also scheduled for three days, from Nov. 6-8.

The bond hearing was set at a status conference July 31 in Branch II of the Shawano County Court-

house. The court also set a final pre-trial for 10 a.m. Oct. 28.

Criminal complaints allege that both incidents occurred after Rudnick first encountered the victims online via Snapchat. The first victim told law enforcement a friend had been messaging a guy who "became freaky." She said she talked with the guy whose screen name was "ccuddlebug" and that he "wanted to be friends."

The victim told law enforcement that she rode with Rudnick to the park at 1 p.m. Oct. 31, 2022, according to the criminal complaint. She claimed that Rudnick forcibly attempted intercourse on a park trail, in a vehicle and in the women's restroom at the park. The complaint states that the victim, who has disabilities, allegedly stayed with Rudnick at his home for a couple of days before going to the park.

The second victim reported the sexual assault on the same day it happened and told law enforcement she initially met Rudnick on the dating site Hily on July 17, 2023. After a day, the two switched to communicating on Snapchat, and this

time Rudnick allegedly went by the screen name "nightrider165."

The victim's in-person encounter with Rudnick took place two days later at a park in Black Creek. The victim had a female friend who drove her to the park.

After chatting and walking around for a bit, Rudnick allegedly suggested going to another park and that the victim should ride with him, with the friend following.

On the way, the two vehicles were separated by distance, and the friend tried to text the victim, but Rudnick allegedly took the phone away and started to grope the victim. Rudnick allegedly drove the victim to Moeller Ridge Nature Park and assaulted her before taking her to her mother's house and dropping her off.

Rudnick faces up to 40 years in prison for each of the second-degree assaults, along with \$100,000 in fines, and the third-degree assault charges each carry 10-year prison sentences and \$25,000 in fines.

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Notice of Pending Application for Proposed Dredging and retaining wall repair

The Village of Tigerton, c/o Jon Witter, 221 Birch St, PO Box 147, Tigerton, WI, 54486, has applied to the Department of Natural Resources for a permit to conduct hydraulic dredging and repair an existing 405' linear foot concrete retaining wall. The project is located in SW 1/4, SW 1/4, Section 09, Township 26 North, Range 12 East in Village of Tigerton, Shawano County.

The project involves the anticipated removal of approximately 9,380 yd³ of non-hazardous, soft sediment over 2.28 acres by a barge operated, hydraulic dredge. The dredge is a rotary agitation cutter head and suction with 8-12" diameter pipe size. The dredged material will be pumped into properly sized geotubes, treated with polymers and allowed to dewater before being taken to an upland location within the Quad Park. The trucks will be sealed to prevent spillage. The haul route has been approved by Shawano County Highway Department and Village of Tigerton. The existing concrete wall will be repaired where needed along 405' linearfeet.

The Department will review the proposal provided by the applicant and any information from public comments and the public informational hearing. The Department will determine whether the proposal complies with ss. 1.11, 30.20, and 30.208, Wis. Stats., and ch. NR 150, Wis. Adm. Code, and ensure that the required mitigation meets the standards in s. 281.36(3r), Stats. if the project impacts wetlands.

The Department has made a tentative determination that it will issue the permit for the proposed activity.

A request for hearing must include the docket number or applicant name and specify the issues that the party desires to be addressed at the informational hearing.

If no hearing is requested, the Department may issue its decision without a hearing. If a public informational hearing is held, comments must be postmarked no later than 10 days following the date on which the hearing is completed.

The final decision may be appealed as indicated in the decision document.

Constitutional questions confusing

Wisconsin Farmers Union is taking a clear stand on two upcoming constitutional questions appearing on the Aug. 13 ballot. Both are designed to limit the power of the governor to distribute federal funding. If they pass, the balance of power within our state government will be upset, and our state will become even more dysfunctional. On the ballot, we will see these two poorly worded constitutional questions:

- “Delegation of appropriation power. Shall section 35 (1) of article IV of the constitution be created to provide that the legislature may not delegate its sole power to determine how moneys shall be appropriated?”
- “Allocation of federal moneys. Shall section 35 (2) of article IV of the constitution be created to prohibit the governor from allocating any federal moneys the governor accepts on behalf of the state without the approval of the legislature by joint resolution or as provided by legislative rule?”

The union advocates voting no on both amendments. We don’t need more legislative red tape and partisan gridlock — especially when disaster strikes.

Farmers have so much to lose when a disaster hits. Many know how important relief is when avian influenza strikes a poultry operation, milk can’t be picked up due to flooded roads, or your neighbors are forced to close their businesses. As we have learned through repeated disasters in Wisconsin, the governor’s office is the most effective arm of government to act swiftly, getting money and relief where they need to go.

Many will remember that a wet fall and spring set the stage in 1993 for severe floods across Wisconsin. Agriculture losses reached \$800 million with 47 of the state’s 72 counties declared federal disaster areas.

With former Gov. Tommy Thompson presiding over the distribution of funds, over \$76 million in federal and state aid went to Wisconsin communities for individual and family grants, public assistance grants, business loans, temporary housing, health services, crisis counseling, community development block grants, disaster unemployment assistance and highway recovery.

Multiple times during his administration, former Gov. Scott Walker asked for federal disaster assistance. The two 100-year floods that struck northwest Wisconsin in 2016 and 2018 took out

roads, bridges and people lost their lives caught in flood waters. Walker declared a state of emergency for multiple counties, sent in the National Guard and asked former President Donald Trump for federal disaster relief.

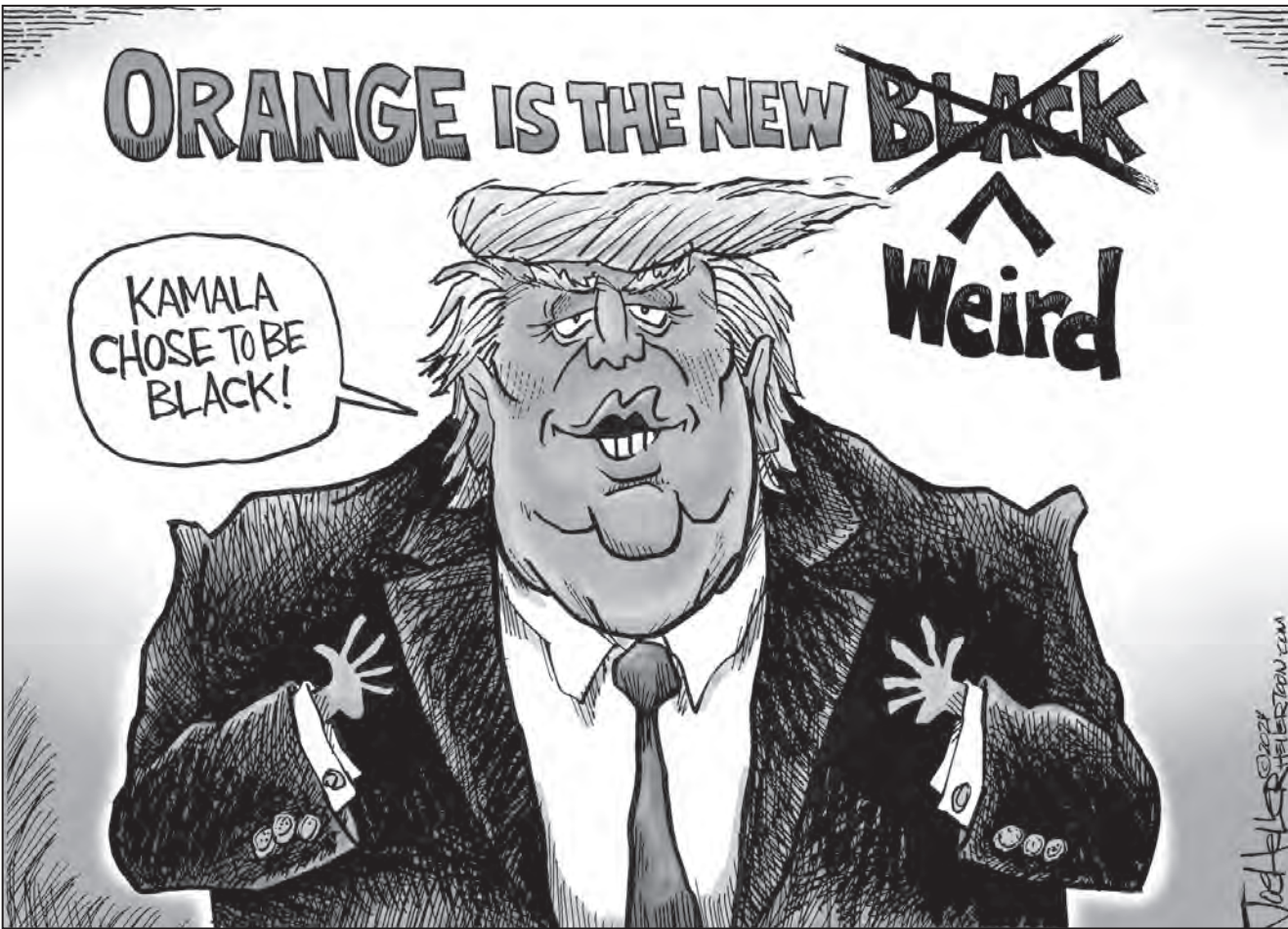
In April 2018, Walker visited farm country to see firsthand the loss of structures and animals from a heavy April blizzard. Standing beside two Wisconsin dairy operators, Walker said, “We’d be asking for as much help as we can get.”

Regardless of which party is represented in the governor’s seat, that individual may be asked to distribute federal dollars quickly to communities that need them the most. We gave the state’s executive this power during the depths of the Great Depression, because we recognized that, in a time of need, the function of this position is way more important than who sits in it and which party they represent. The legislature still retains the purse strings for the entire state budget, but acting quickly and decisively during a crisis is a power that we’ve granted to the executive branch for good reason.

If we give new constitutional powers to legislators who have not demonstrated the will to work, to govern together or to work with the other branches of government, we can expect even more dysfunction and red tape. Our Wisconsin Legislature is particularly known for inaction and dysfunction. In 2020 in the depths of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Wisconsin State legislature was the least active full-time state legislative body in the country.

Statewide election turnout for Aug. 13 is expected to be slightly over 50%, so it is absolutely crucial to vote on Aug. 13, and to get others to turn out to vote. The wording of the two ballot measures is intentionally confusing, so we must do what we can to educate our neighbors to vote “no” on both amendments. Wisconsinans are so weary of riding the partisan crazy train, but it is crucial that we show up at the polls and vote “no” on these changes as they will only make us go further off the rails.

Raze Shawano City Hall to build new library

Lately, there’s been talk circulating about building a new courthouse and library and possibly moving the Shawano County Sheriff’s Department, or jail.

Shawano area woman dies in highway crash

One person is dead following a two-vehicle crash Aug. 4 on state Highway 29 in the Town of Hartland.

About 12:55 p.m., the Shawano County Sheriff's Department dispatch center received multiple 911 calls indicating there was a two-vehicle crash with unknown injuries on Highway 29, just outside Doc's Harley Davidson, which is just west of County Road F.

Upon arrival, officials found that one of the vehicles' occupants was not conscious and not breathing. A deputy, along with assistance from a citizen, began CPR on that woman. CPR was continued, but unfortunately, due to the injuries sustained in this crash, the woman was later pronounced dead at a hospital.

The initial investigation showed the woman was a passenger in a vehicle that was exiting Doc's Harley Davidson, attempting to go west on Highway 29. The driver of the vehicle

failed to clear the intersection and was struck by an eastbound vehicle on the rear driver's side of the vehicle. Both vehicles continued into the median of the highway, where they came to rest.

All occupants in the vehicle headed eastbound on Highway 29 were OK, according to a sheriff's department press release. The driver of the at-fault vehicle sustained serious, non-life-threatening injuries and was transported to a hospital. The passenger, who was deceased, was identified as an 80-year-old woman from the Shawano area. She was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

This crash is still under investigation. At this time, the name of the deceased will not be released, and no further information is available, according to the sheriff's department.

The department was assisted during the crash by Shawano Ambulance, Bonduel EMS, Bonduel Fire Department and the Shawano County Coroner's Office.

No further information or names will be released at this time.



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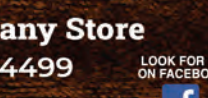
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Traump, Cruz, wade into congressional race

Democrat leads fundraising, but 3 Republicans have split larger pool of donations

For the last eight years, the Republican congressman in northeastern Wisconsin has crushed opponents, winning more than 60% of the vote in every contested election. In 2022, Democrats couldn't even find a candidate to run.

Rep. Mike Gallagher retired from the U.S. House in the spring, and Democrats hope that creates an opening in the 8th Congressional District, which curves from Door County through Green Bay and Appleton up to the Michigan border.

Three strong Republican candidates are jostling for the nomination in the right-leaning district. Democrats have coalesced around one: Kristin Lyerly, an OB/GYN physician from Kaukauna.

Of the four candidates, she raised the most money in the first half of 2024, with more than \$890,000, according to her campaign finance reports filed with the Federal Elections Commission.

The doctor's practices in Wisconsin and Minnesota perform abortions, and she is making reproductive rights a major issue in the campaign.

In comparison, the trio of Republicans raised a total of \$1.7 million in the first half of the year, an ominous sign for Democrats. Donald Trump won the district by more than 15 points in 2020.

The GOP field is split among state Sen. André Jacque, who represents the Door County part of the district in the state legislature, former state Sen. Roger Roth, who used to represent the Fox Valley part of the district in the state legislature but left to run for lieutenant governor in 2022, and the Trump-endorsed Tony Wied, best known for previously owning the local gas station chain Dino Stop.

Wied leads the Re-

publicans in campaign donations, having raised more than \$810,000 in the first half of the year. But most of that — \$500,000 — comes from a loan he made to his campaign, according to his July filing with the Federal Elections Commission.

Roth raised more than \$710,000 in the first half of the year, while Jacque raised about \$220,000, according to their filings with the FEC.

Lyerly reported spending the most — nearly \$600,000 — in the first half of 2024 and had a little more than \$300,000 in the bank at the end of June, according to her latest filing. Wied and Roth both reported spending more than \$140,000 each in the first half of the year, and had about \$670,000 and \$560,000, respectively. Jacque reported spending about \$90,000 and had about \$130,000 left.

Prof. Aaron Weinschenk, chair of the UW-Green Bay political science department, said Wied's "outsider" status might help him win the nomination, along with the "information cue" of the former and possibly future president's endorsement. But that knife can slice both ways.

"Trump-backed candidates tend to get a slight boost in primaries,

although they get a slight punishment in general elections, so it may be harmful later on in the process," Weinschenk wrote in an email. "Here in the district, we are seeing a fair amount of TV advertisements already. I've seen Wied ads, Roth ads, and some ads from outside groups too, which is usually a sign of a competitive race."

Trump endorsed Wied on his social media platform Truth Social.

In the post, Trump also jabbed Roth, calling him "RINO Roger Roth, who is a 'clone' of Paul Ryan, and no friend to MAGA."

Roth has received endorsements from U.S. Rep. Scott Fitzgerald of Wisconsin and from Scott Walker, though the former governor is nowhere to be found on his website. Roth is a captain in the Wisconsin Air National Guard and is also backed by an independent group called Elect Principled Veterans, which supports moderates. The group has reported spending \$75,000 to support Roth.

Texas Sen. Ted Cruz has endorsed Jacque in his highest-profile backing. The anti-abortion group Pro-Life Wisconsin has also endorsed him.

Top donors to each candidate

Per federal law, an indi-

vidual can donate a max of \$3,300 to a congressional candidate per election. Because candidates must run in a primary and a general election, individuals can give \$6,600 per election cycle.

Wied received the maximum from both James and Sarah Wied of Green Bay, from both James and Meghan Greene of De Pere, from both Angelo and Jennifer Ninivaggi of Appleton, and David Charles of New Franken, according to his filing.

He also received the maximum donation from billionaire megadonor Dick Uihlein, an heir to the Schlitz fortune and founder of the Uline packaging company along with his wife Liz, another megadonor. The Uihleins put huge sums behind their favored candidates using their Super PACs, to which they can donate unlimited amounts and that can spend unlimited amounts promoting and attacking candidates through advertising on various media.

Roth received \$3,300 donations from both Dick and Liz Uihlein, according to his filing.

Roth also received maximum \$6,600 donations from both John and Lisa Dykema of De Pere, from both Gregg and Deobrah Kunes of Delavan, Ryan Downs of Appleton, Dave

Miller of Hortonville, Terrence Fulwiler of Algoma, Todd Kelsey of Waupaca, Sandy Ballou of Madison and Lawrence Wiley of Madison.

Jacque, who is staunchly pro-life, has raised the least money. He reported maximum donations from Chad Fradette of Pulaski and Paul Lubinski of De Pere.

Ten members of the Zignego family, which runs Zignego Ready Mix concrete company headquartered in Waukesha, each gave Jacque \$3,300.

State Rep. Chuck Wichgers, a Republican from the Milwaukee suburbs, gave Jacque \$2,000.

Lyerly has received the maximum donation from Laurie Murphy of De Pere and John Miller of Fox Point. Miller is a major donor to Wisconsin Democrats. He also gave the maximum this year to another Democratic candidate, Peter Barca, in the 1st Congressional District in southeastern Wisconsin.

Sage Weil, owner of Civic Media, a network of Wisconsin news radio stations and a partner of The Badger Project, has given Lyerly \$3,300. Scot Ross, a prominent liberal pundit from Madison, has given Lyerly \$2,000.

Most of Lyerly's donations have come from the national Democratic fund-

raising platform ActBlue. **'Uphill battle' for out-party**

Democrats last won the 8th Congressional District in 2008, but Republicans retook the seat in the Tea Party wave election of 2010 and have held it ever since.

Winning in the Republican-leaning district will be "an uphill battle," Weinschenk wrote.

A major wild card is the earthquake at the top of the Democratic ticket, with Vice President Kamala Harris becoming the presidential candidate so late in the campaign.

Weinschenk noted political science research has suggested that presidential candidates can impact down-ballot races, like those for Congress, if they excite voters and increase turnout.

Abortion is likely to be a major factor in the race for president and for the 8th District, Weinschenk said. Harris is likely to play up the issue nationally, and that could help Lyerly. Also, Jacque is fiercely opposed to abortion and his victory in the primary could set up a very stark contrast between the two candidates, Weinschenk noted.

Walenski holds many certifications for academic excellence in course design and delivery, including through the nationally lauded Quality Matters (QM).

“I hold the QM teaching online certificate, which I earned through a rigorous certification program comprising seven workshops,” Walenski said. “These workshops are aligned with QM’s online instructor skill set and focus on essential competencies for effective online teaching.”

Additionally, Walenski completed coursework on applying the quality matters rubric facilitator certification and the higher ed QM coordinator training.

“These certifications have prepared me to facilitate the online APPQMR workshop, where I guide faculty members at the College of Menominee Nation in course preparation, navigation, management and assessment,” she said. “As a QM coordinator, I am trained to implement Quality Matters at CMN, reinforcing our commitment to providing high-quality online education.”

In June, Walenski led CMN’s online faculty through an intensive workshop that “delves into the fundamental principles of the QM rubric and the essential elements of the QM quality assurance process. This workshop focuses on the QM rubric and guides faculty in reviewing and improving the design of their online and hybrid courses.”

In July, three CMN faculty members joined Walenski at Instructure-Con in Las Vegas, which showcased best practices and forthcoming innova-

tions in using the Canvas platform.

“I am excited that CMN is offering online classes as it is another teaching method we can utilize to reach our students both near and far,” Sarah Vander Corput said. “Online learning offers flexibility in scheduling and learning methods while also providing technical growth and experience for our students.”

In the past two weeks, Walenski led online faculty through a training on the complementary component of quality course design — meaningful student feedback.

“At CMN, we recognize the importance of culturally relevant and effective training,” she said. “That’s why our Regular and Substantive Interaction workshop was meticulously crafted by the instructional designer and faculty members who dedicated six months to researching, developing and deploying it. Built by faculty for faculty, this training reflects

“Watching faculty embrace this new endeavor and work diligently to change their course delivery was exciting. They learned and adapted to ensure that the quality we’re known for stays in our courses. I am excited to hear the students’ perspectives on our online courses.”

businesses. She was personally invited by The Blend’s owner, Alex Hartwig, to open a clothing operation there. Kretschmann noted that over the 2 1/2 years she was there, she saw the store thrive and people liked her clothes.

In April, Hartwig talked to Kretschmann about the vacant property that is now Simply Sassy and thought that it would be a good fit for her.

“The second I walked in here, I just had this overwhelming feeling of this is where I’m meant to be,” Kretschmann said.

Connecting on a personal basis with her customers was something Kretschmann felt she was missing with her online store and The Blend. She says that she was craving a personal connection

with people, to help them just navigate the shopping experience.

Kretschmann wants her customers to think of her when they need help in selecting clothes. In Simply Sassy, she says that she is noticing a wide range of people coming in, from teens to people in their 80s.

Customers message Kretschmann often when they have a special occasion coming up and ask what she has in the store that would work for them. She will send them pictures of clothing and even try things on for them.

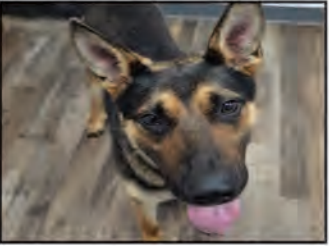
“I will make an appointment for them to come in, and I will pull things, so that when they walk in, everything is ready for them to try on,” Kretschmann said.

“I want to bring value

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Coming to America traps husband in Civil War

According to the story my dad told me, in 1856 my great-great aunt, Margarethe Holzschuh, threw caution to the wind. At age 31, with zero prospects for marriage in her village of Geisfeld, Bavaria, she signed a contract to emigrate to America as what later would be called a mail order bride.

After a grueling 14-week journey across the Atlantic Ocean and half of North America, she and her brother, John George, and his fiancé, Anna Maria, arrived in the Town of Lima, Sheboygan County. I can't help but wonder what that moment was like when Margarethe and her prospective husband, Johann Walter, met for the first time. Did she use my cast iron pot to make him a nice dinner? The romantic in me hopes so.

Margarethe already knew from their correspondence that Johann was definitely husband material. At first sight, she had to be pleased. He was 25 years

old; 5 feet, 4 inches tall, with hazel eyes, black hair, and a swarthy complexion. She described him to her mother as gut aussehend (good looking).

He'd come to America from Darmstadt a year earlier, traveling with his sister Elizabeth who was eloping. Yes, Johann was a decent fellow, so why not? Besides, to refuse his proposal would require her to reimburse him for her passage, not to mention that her biological clock was ticking loudly. Within days, she said the vows and signed the documents that yoked her to a virtual stranger.

It turned out to be a good match. Except for Sundays, the couple's days consisted of hard labor from dawn to dusk. Working as a team, they prospered beyond their wildest dreams. By 1862, they owned a large beautiful farm. Still, there was a deep hole in their lives, a void that most certainly made Magarethe's heart ache.

She was barren, a consummate failure for a woman in those days.

Unable to understand why God was punishing them by withholding children, Johann had another nagging concern. He was following the national news via Die Seebote, a German newspaper published in Milwaukee. The paper was filled with stories about the bloody war between the states that Abraham Lincoln's generals appeared to be losing. The editor routinely derided Lincoln, accusing him of using immigrants as cannon fodder in his war against slavery. Johann knew well his old country's history. Had he traded civil unrest in Germany for civil war in

America?

At first, he brushed aside his fears. More than enough men were volunteering to fill Wisconsin's quota. Then the horrors of war lessened previous enthusiasm. In what became the nation's first federal draft, Secretary of War Stanton notified Wisconsin Gov. Salomon that all able-bodied males between the ages of 18 and 40 must register. At the same time, Stanton demanded 50,000 additional Wisconsin recruits. How the governor got them, well, that was his problem.

Overall, Wisconsin was devoted to the Union cause, but anti-war sentiment was fierce in southeastern counties like Sheboygan where a large

number of Germans had settled. A German immigrant himself, Salomon could not understand why his fellow immigrants would go so far as to forego intended U.S. citizenship to avoid military service, or why those like Johann who already held citizenship were desperate to avoid serving their adopted country.

There were the usual means of draft-dodging such as medical deferments. One creative method that was very popular involved volunteer firefighters. These men were considered essential in their local communities and thus exempt from service. Unsurprisingly, the number of fire department volunteers skyrocketed. The pattern was so pervasive that the governor was forced to deny exemptions to those not on fire department rosters prior to Stanton's announcement of the draft.

As far as Johann was concerned, he was not

about to enlist, especially when Margarethe came to him with the news. She was pregnant. Fully believing it was a miracle, on Jan. 16, 1864, she gave birth to a baby girl they named Margaretha. At age 39 she had finally found her happily ever after. Sadly, happily-ever-after lasted less than a year.

The following November, Johann got a telegram. He had been selected for military service and assigned to Company D13, Wisconsin Infantry. Margarethe was inconsolable. This was far worse than leaving Bavaria. Johann petitioned the local Draft Board for an exemption. How was his wife, who had never completely recovered from childbirth, to care for their daughter and run the farm alone? His appeal was flatly denied. On Dec. 4, 1864, Margarethe bid Johann goodbye, completely convinced she would never see him again. She was not wrong.

Want to become a DNR community scientist?

Residents can become community scientists by participating in the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources' (DNR) Operation Deer Watch and the Game Bird Brood Survey.

These surveys are designed to measure the reproductive status of deer and game birds by establishing ratios of adults to juveniles (e.g., fawn-to-doe ratios).

This data helps indicate the productivity of Wisconsin's deer and game bird populations. The data from these surveys, along with harvest information, provide DNR scientists with the key elements needed to make management decisions for these species.

"Wherever you are in Wisconsin, you can help the DNR manage wildlife by collecting data in your area," said Paul Frater, DNR surveys coordinator. "Sightings can easily be submitted through our Survey123 app, and every submission increases our dataset and helps us understand how wildlife are doing throughout the state. The DNR encourages everyone interested

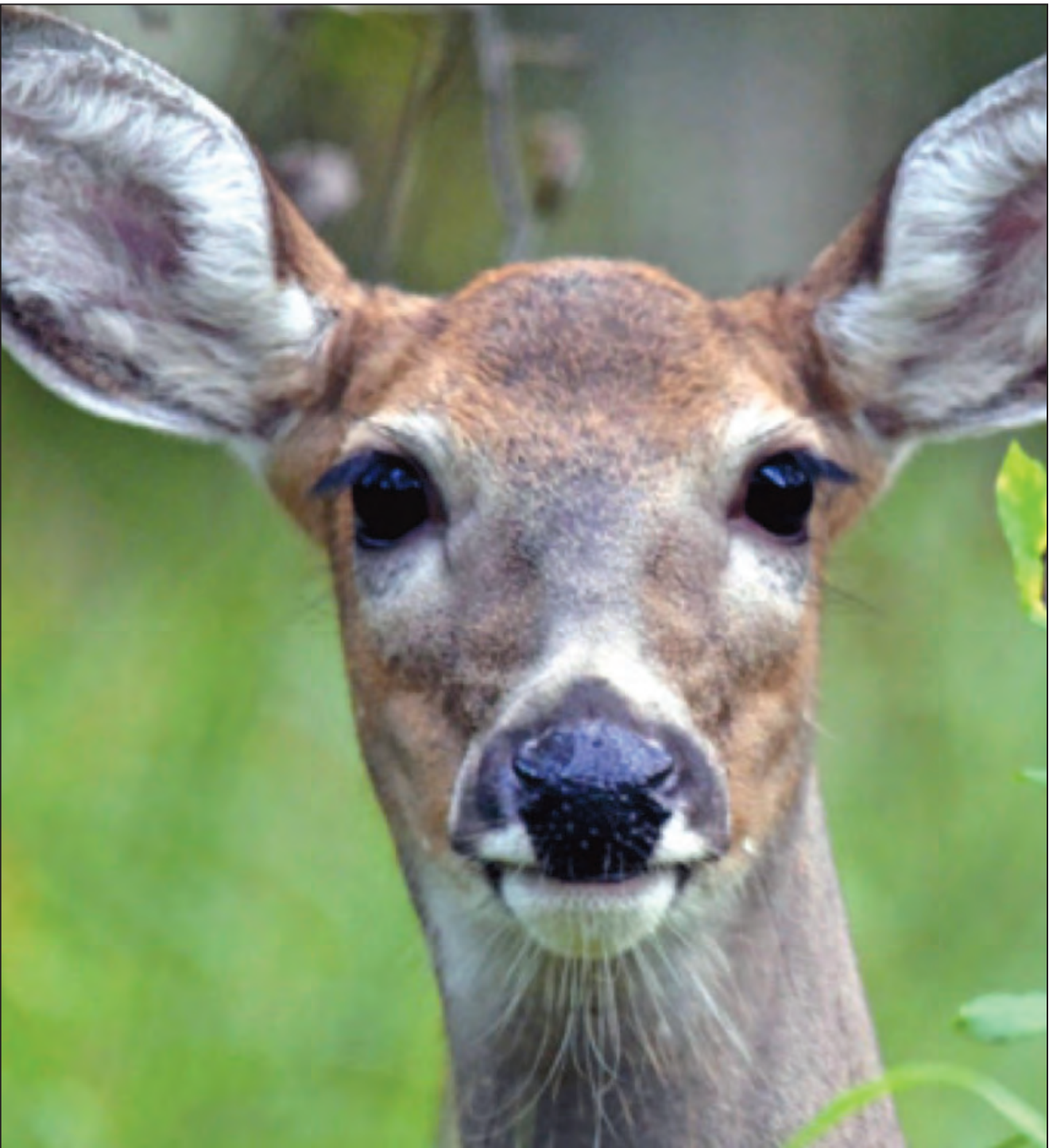
in wildlife – from hunters and trappers to outdoor enthusiasts – to take part."

Participation in Operation Deer Watch and the Game Bird Brood Survey requires no registration, and observations can be recorded using a mobile device. In Operation Deer Watch, members of the public can report location, age, sex and the number of deer seen from dawn to dusk during the summer months.

This information helps to determine the fawn-to-doe ratio and, ultimately, deer population estimates. The deadline to submit observations is Sept. 30.

As for the Game Bird Brood Survey, residents can collect information on the types and numbers of game bird broods they observe during the summer months. This information is the basis for monitoring the reproduction of game birds for that breeding year. The deadline to submit observations is Aug. 31.

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At 65, it's clear Speedo days are over

As you read this, I am less than a month away from the big 6-5.

Lord, I'm old. As one approaches those senior moments and plentiful-but-pitiful discounts (see, the glass is half full), you are bound to contemplate those great milestones that are past and those that are coming.

"Your Speedo days are over," a physical therapist recently commented.

I'm not exactly sure what made him say that, but I chuckled at his not-so-subtle humor. Later, I thought, "WTH?" I've never worn or owned a Speedo, and I'm OK with that. I once made my wife angry and ill at the same time on a Florida beach when I said, "Look at that." and she got a quick, long-lasting glimpse of a leather-tan senior in said Speedo. "I hate you." was the only thing she could manage. We still joke about it years later.

Loyal readers (you do read my drivels, right?) will recognize that what I lack in ability, I make up

with enthusiasm. If you can't blind them with brilliance, baffle them with BS. It's a T-shirt and a lifestyle.

I've learned 10 lifetimes of information about hunting and a bit about fishing, because I'm a voracious reader (and book lover), I've met many experts as a full-time outdoors writer for almost eight years and grew up with a dad, a granddad and two brothers who loved to hunt.

I've also stumbled through the woods and tripped over woodcraft almost accidentally for almost 60 years. When you fall down enough, some of that hunting dirt and moss and pond scum is bound to soak in.

Patience came from bowhunting. Living in Wisconsin now, it's easy to forget the "corn deserts" and vast mostly deerless woods of northern Illinois in the 1970s, where my older brother, Brian, and I spent countless hours waiting for the whitetails we rarely saw. We shot a few with shotguns, and he tagged a couple with a longbow, but I had to get a compound bow to bag my first archery buck in Carroll County.

My early love of hunting came from rabbit and duck hunting. My dad grew up on a farm during the Depression, and rabbits were food (as an adult, he wouldn't eat them because he had

eaten so many as a kid), so game laws to him were just a suggestion. Starting with a .410 bolt-action and eventually moving to a 20-gauge, I pursued bunnies every Saturday, normally with my uncle's mixed-breed, overfed coon-beagle cross named Tinker Bell.

Growing up on the Mississippi River at Fulton, Illinois (Lock and Dam 13), I saw plenty of ducks. Dad never owned a boat and didn't swim, so we were shore hunters. I dropped a few coots and wood ducks, with an occasional teal. I once saw one of the big flights of mallards, possibly 10,000 or more ducks, in a machine-like formation that made a churring sound. I stared up in awe from the Johnson Creek bottoms and begged Dad to shoot.

"They are too high," he whispered, teaching me my first lesson in sky busting. Another hunter with a long-barrelled goose gun took a shot and pinwheeled a single duck. "See, Dad?"

He shot. Can we shoot now?" He just shook his head. I get it now.

I've never shot a "book" buck, or anything close, but I'll tell you that the 7-point, scrub-racked buck I shot with an Ithaca Deerslayer at 88 yards in 1978 is my best trophy. It was my first deer and it's still on my wall. I also shot a dandy, symmetrical 8-pointer on public ground in Wisconsin, also with a shotgun slug, and he's on my wall, too.

When I watch deer hunting shows on TV and they start talking about shooter bucks, I change the channel.

In hunter safety class, we talk about ethics and the stages of hunting. There is a shooting phase when we want to shoot at everything we see and shoot plenty of ammo. Take your kid on a pigeon or crow shoot if they are in this phase. I had an open dump and rats, the absolute best live shooting gallery.

I planned to share some hunting insights, but I scoff at most modern

gear and gimmicks. Ozone pumps? Scent blockers? Charcoal-lined clothing? One magazine had the audacity to risk angering advertisers by writing about dogs that found owner-touched socks in the bottom of a pile of scent-blocker-sprayed clothing in a matter of seconds.

Deer have more scent receptors in their noses than dogs. If the wind is wrong, you will be busted. Save your money for a better knife or flashlight.

If there's one thing I've learned in six decades of hunting and outdoor adventures is that there's always more to be learned each year. Sharing the woods and waters with family and friends is all that matters. Pass on your knowledge to the next generation and save this nation's precious hunting heritage, so they can feel the same outdoor passion burning in their hearts.

Hunters with disabilities can sign up for fall hunt

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds eligible hunters hoping to participate in the gun deer hunt for those with disabilities to contact and confirm a location with a hunt landowner sponsor before Sept. 15.

Thousands of acres of land are available for this year's hunt, which will take place Oct. 5-13. Hunters should contact sponsors directly to participate in the 2024 hunt.

Some properties can accommodate more hunters than others, so hunters are advised to contact potential sponsors as early as possible to determine availability.

"This special hunt offers hunters with dis-

abilities the opportunity to deer hunt during a time and in a place that is more accessible for them," said Brooke VanHandel, DNR assistant deer and elk specialist. "We are so thankful for our landowner sponsors who are willing to partner with hunters and open their properties to allow more individuals to participate in Wisconsin's deer hunting tradition."

To sign up for a hunt, hunters or assistants should provide their name, contact information and DNR customer ID number. To be eligible, hunters must possess a valid Class A, C or D disabled permit or qualifying Class B permit. Eligible hunters may sign up for one sponsored property per year and

must possess a gun deer license.

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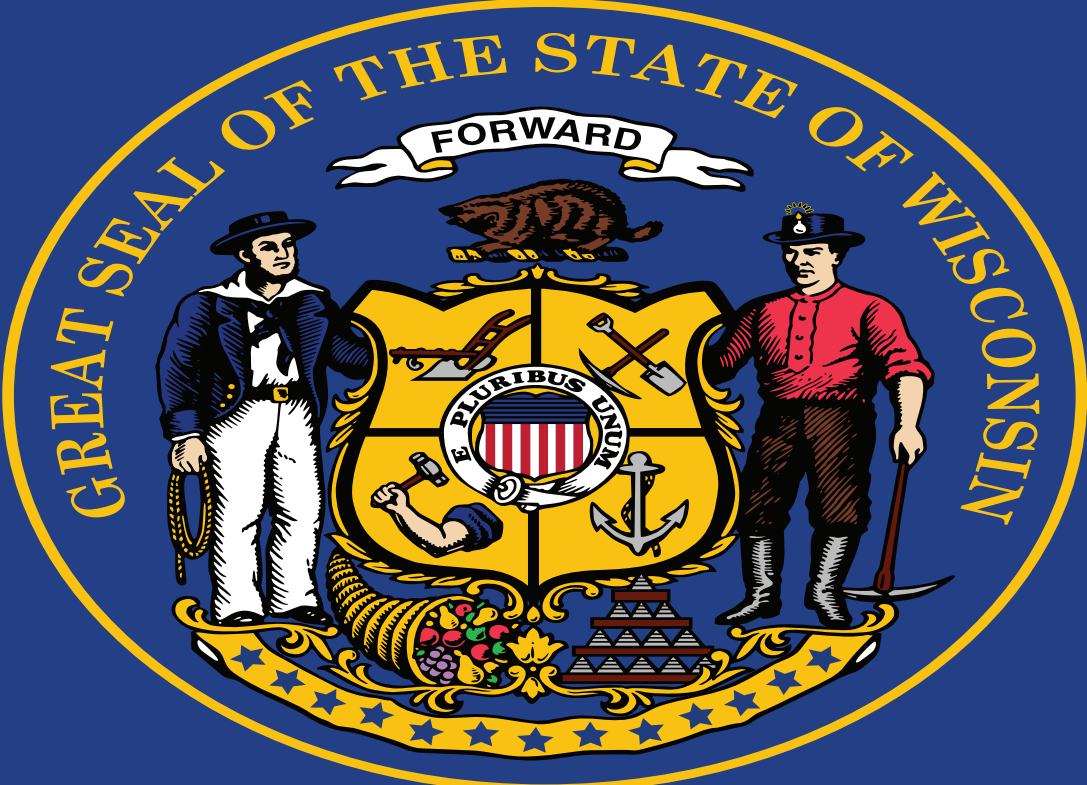


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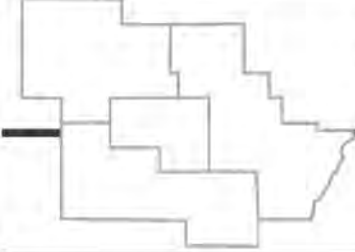

Grilling burgers and hot dogs can attract a crowd, and that's exactly what the Shawano County Sheriff's Department had in mind.

Dozens of people flocked to Washington Park in Wittenberg on July 31 to meet some of the county deputies and enjoy a tasty meal. Some of the children even played sports with the deputies. An added touch to the event was face painting, although most of the focus of the event was to introduce law enforcement in a positive light.

At one point, the deputies found themselves with one hamburger but no hamburger buns to nestle it in. Fortunately, the event was sponsored by Wittenberg Sentry, and a couple of employees quickly went out to resolve the situation.

It's the first time the sheriff's department has done this type of community outreach, but there are plans to keep doing so. Deputy Nathan Thornborrow is leading the charge, but it's something that originally started with the Shawano Police Department — with Thornborrow's brother, Tyler, planting the idea in his head.

“Tyler's the one who's been spearheading this,” he said. “I'm just kind of grabbing onto the coattails and riding it a little bit. It's a great thing to have these pop-up events and have a great time.”

“We find local businesses and local donors that are willing to sponsor one of the lunches,” he said. “This week, it was Wittenberg Sentry. They brought out all the food — burgers, Gatorade, chips and all that type of stuff.”

The John Reinke Sr. Memorial Fund also gave for the cookout in the form of footballs and other sports equipment that allows law enforcement to play some games and make the event a positive one.

“Now we have bins of balls to play with the kids with,” Nathan Thornborrow said. “It gives the kids a positive experience with law enforcement, fills their bellies in the summer-time and gets them out of the house. We get to see moms and dads, too, and grandmas and grandpas.”

Nathan Thornborrow knows how important it is to keep hitting home positive experiences with the police, especially in light of national news highlighting officer-involved shootings. He already tries to keep things positive in his role as a school resource officer with several area school districts.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at an election to be held in the several towns, villages, wards, and election districts of the State of Wisconsin, on Tuesday, August 13, 2024, the following questions will be submitted to a vote of the people pursuant to law:
2023 Assembly Joint Resolution 6 Enrolled Joint Resolution **To create** section 35 of article IV of the constitution; relating to: the appropriation authority of the legislature and the allocation of moneys Wisconsin receives from the federal government (second consideration). Whereas, the 2021 legislature in regular session considered a proposed amendment to the constitution in 2021 Senate Joint Resolution 84, which became 2021 Enrolled Joint Resolution 14, and agreed to it by a majority of the members elected to each of the two houses, which proposed amendment reads as follows:
SECTION 1. Section 35 of article IV of the constitution is created to read: [Article IV] Section 35 (1) The legislature may not delegate its sole power to determine how moneys shall be appropriated. (2) The governor may not allocate any federal moneys the governor accepts on behalf of the state without the approval of the legislature by joint resolution or as provided by legislative rule.
SECTION 2. Numbering of new provision. If another constitutional amendment ratified by the people creates the number of any provision created in this joint resolution, the chief of the legislative reference bureau shall determine the sequencing and the numbering of the provisions whose numbers conflict.
Now, therefore, be it resolved by the assembly, the senate concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution is agreed to by the 2023 legislature; and, be it further **Resolved, That** the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to a vote of the people at the election to be held on the second Tuesday of August 2024; and, be it further **Resolved, That** the questions concerning ratification of the foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution be stated on the ballot as follows:

QUESTION 1: “Delegation of appropriation power. Shall section 35 (1) of article IV of the constitution be created to provide that the legislature may not delegate its sole power to determine how moneys shall be appropriated?”
QUESTION 2: “Allocation of federal moneys. Shall section 35 (2) of article IV of the constitution be created to prohibit the governor from allocating any federal moneys the governor accepts on behalf of the state without the approval of the legislature by joint resolution or as provided by legislative rule?”
EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS AS TO THE TWO QUESTIONS
Explanatory statement regarding Question 1: The Wisconsin Constitution requires the legislature to appropriate funds from the state treasury only by passing a law, which requires a vote by both houses of the legislature. Wis. Const. art. VIII, § 2. Question 1 would add a new provision to say that the legislature cannot delegate this “sole” power to appropriate funds.
A “yes” vote on Question 1 would vote to create a new provision of the Wisconsin Constitution—Wis. Const. art. IV, § 35(1). That provision would prohibit the legislature from delegating its duty that it pass a law in order to appropriate money from the treasury under Wis. Const. art. VIII, § 2.
A “no” vote on Question 1 would vote not to add Wis. Const. art. IV, § 35(1) to the Wisconsin Constitution. Explanatory statement regarding Question 2: In times when Wisconsin receives undesignated federal funds from the U.S. government, the Wisconsin Constitution does not limit the ability of the governor to choose how the funds he accepts are divided among state and local agencies. Question 2 would add a new provision to the Constitution to prohibit the governor from choosing how to allocate such federal funds he accepts unless the legislature, through a joint resolution or some other process to be developed by the legislature, agrees with the governor's proposed allocation of those funds.
A “yes” vote on Question 2 would vote to create a second new provision of the Wisconsin Constitution—Wis. Const. art. IV, § 35(2), which would prohibit the governor from choosing how to allocate undesignated federal monies he accepts unless the legislature, by joint resolution or other process, agrees with the governor's proposed allocation of such funds.
A “no” vote on Question 2 would vote not to add Wis. Const. art. IV § 35(2) to the Wisconsin Constitution.

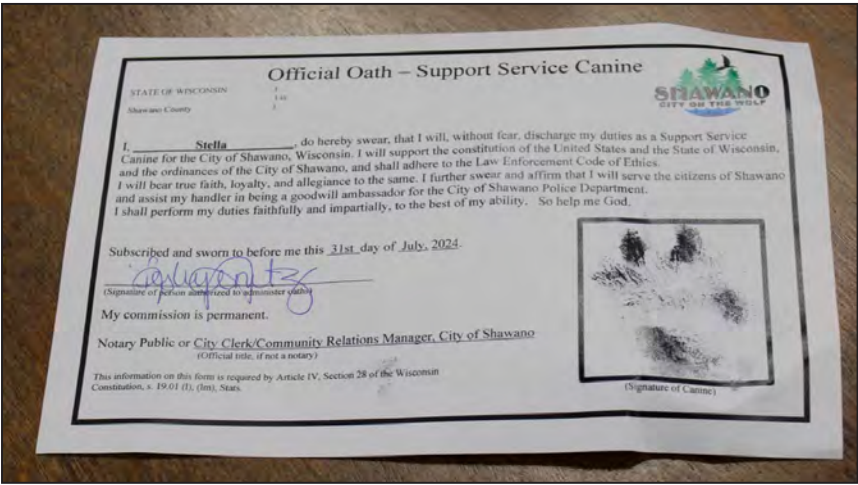

our flight school, avionics, mechanics. We're a good catch-all."

The airport is home to 26 aircraft and just last month became the permanent home to its first-ever jet, a small, commercial Cirrus Vision Jet.

Flight lessons at the airport are handled by Shawano Flying Club, which recently organized with a core membership of about 15 people with a Cessna 182.

"They fly nearly every day with students, and a lot of those are high school students," Isom said.

"We've seen a really big interest in flight training."

Green Bay and Appleton airports have towers, and towered takeoffs and landings are required for a pilot's license. However, Shawano is smaller and has less air congestion, which makes it a great place to learn, Isom said. Shawano is close enough to the towers when you need them, but far enough away to enjoy the skies without them.

"Geographically, we're in a great spot," he said.

Locally, the Northern

Flight Alliance has taken on a role of education, from organizing the recent involvement in the Air-Venture Cup Race over Shawano to helping youths with flying lessons.

Even though Shawano County is withdrawing from sharing airport ownership with the city of Shawano as of Jan. 1, 2025, Isom said there will not be any difference in airport operations.

"The city is absolutely ready for the task," he said.

An Army Black Hawk helicopter visited the Shawano Municipal Airport Fly-in and Car Show in 2023, and another will be back in 2024. The speed of planes and helicopters is often measured in knots, as knots provide better navigational consistency for pilots and sailors than miles per hour.

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Is it a mile or is it a knot?

Everyone understands speed when noted in miles per hour. Yet, when they hear speed referenced in "knots," many don't understand the difference and gloss over the reference, assuming it's similar to miles per hour.

The term "knot," in reference to currents, is defined as one nautical mile per hour and is used to measure speed. A nautical mile is slightly more than a standard mile.

- One nautical mile equals 1.15 miles equals 1.85 kilometers – 1 knot equals 1.15 miles per hour equals 1.85 kilometers per hour
- One knot equals

20.251969 inches per second equals 51.44 centimeters per second

The term knot dates from the 1600s, when sailors measured the speed of their ship by the use of a device called a "common log." This device was a coil of rope with uniformly spaced knots tied in it, attached to a piece of wood shaped like a slice of pie.

The piece of wood was lowered from the back of the ship and allowed to float behind it. The line was allowed to go out freely from the coil as the piece of wood fell behind the ship for a specific amount of time.

When the specified time had passed, the line was pulled in and the number of knots on the rope between the ship and the wood were counted. The speed of the ship was said to be the number of knots counted.

Knots offer a more consistent method of navigation than miles per hour. As previously mentioned, a single knot represents one nautical mile traveled per hour. A nautical mile, though, translates into one minute of latitude. Therefore, knots provide better navigational consistency for pilots and sailors alike than miles per hour.

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How planes fly and more trivia

1. If you've ever stuck your hand out the window of a car, you've experienced the basic principle that keeps airplanes in the air. As they reach high speeds, the wind resistance against the bottom of the airplane's wing increases, and when it gets high enough, it pushes the plane into the air.
2. The first solo flight across the Atlantic Ocean was performed by Charles Lindbergh.
3. The aircraft used on the first cross Atlantic solo flight was "The Spirit of St. Louis."
4. The Lockheed SR-71 Blackbird is the fastest airplane of all time, with a speed of 2,190 mph, set on July 28, 1976. That's three times the speed of sound.
5. There are 6 million parts in a Boeing 747.
6. The world's largest airplane, the Antonov AN-225, was destroyed during the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022. It was a massive cargo plane originally built to launch the Soviet space shuttle. Now, the largest airplane is the Roc, which was built to launch satellites into space.
7. A blimp has a motor but no wings. A glider has wings but no motor.
8. The first air traffic controller was Archie League
9. A plane first flew around the world without stopping in 1949 when the U.S. Air Force B-50 Superfortress Lucky Lady II took 94 hours and 1 minute, with four in-flight refuelings. In 1986, an airplane flew around the world without being refueled in flight, taking nine days, three minutes, and 44 seconds. Visitors to the Shawano Municipal Airport Fly-in and Car Show can get an up-close view of an airplane, including the chance to talk to the pilot about the aircraft. There are 6 million parts in a Boeing 747, and while there aren't than many parts on a plane at the local airport, there are enough to make one's head spin.

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Aircraft sorted by categories, classes and types

Like cars that are known by make and model, aircraft are similarly grouped.

First is the category, the broadest classification of aircraft based on their intended use and operating environment, such as airplane, glider or helicopter (rotorcraft).

Next is the class, a more specific division within a category based on design and performance characteristics, such as single-engine or multi-engine.

Finally, there is the type, which refers to a specific make and model of an aircraft, such as the Boeing 737 or Airbus A320.

Here are a few examples of aircraft categories, as described by the Pilot Institute.

- An airplane is an engine-driven, fixed-wing, heavier-than-air aircraft that achieves flight through the reaction between the air and its wings.
- Gliders include aircraft designed to fly without an engine and rely on natural air currents for lift through the reaction between the air and the wing.
- Rotorcraft includes aircraft that use rotating blades to generate lift, such as helicopters or gyroplanes.
- The lighter-than-air



category includes aircraft that can hover and stay in the air by utilizing a lighter-than-air gas that is contained within it, such as airships or balloons.

- An aircraft under the powered lift category, such as the Bell Boeing V-22 Osprey, is capable of vertical takeoff, landing and low-speed flight. An aircraft in this category depends on engine-driven devices (e.g., propellers) or thrust (i.e., a jet engine) for lift at low speed but non-rotating surfaces (i.e., wings) at higher speeds.
- A powered parachute is precisely what it sounds

like – a person hanging from a parachute with an engine and propeller behind them.

- Weight-shift control is a category of powered aircraft, such as an ultralight trike, with a pivoting wing and fuselage that is only controllable in pitch and roll through the change of the center of gravity (i.e., no control surfaces).
- A rocket is an aircraft propelled by expanding gases generated by an engine using self-contained propellants (i.e., rocket fuel) and not dependent on the intake of outside substances (such as air).
