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Officer-involved shooting leaves one dead

The state Division of Criminal Investigation has been called in to investigate an officer-involved shooting incident on a highway south of Oconto on June 8.

The DCI reports the Oconto County Dispatch Center received multiple calls starting around 2:41 p.m. about a reckless driver on northbound U.S. Highway 41. A sheriff's deputy found a vehicle matching the description and stopped the vehicle near Frog Pond

Road in the Town of Oconto.

The driver got out of the vehicle already injured, and while the deputy tended to the driver's injuries, a passenger got out of the vehicle armed with a knife, according to the DCI. The passenger approached the deputy, refused to comply with commands, and was shot.

First aid was rendered, but the passenger died at the scene. The driver was transported to a local hospital and is being treated for non-life-threatening injuries, according to the DCI.

No law enforcement personnel were injured. The deputy has been placed on administrative leave, as required by the sheriff's office policy.

The DCI said it is reviewing evidence and will turn over investigative reports to the Oconto County District Attorney when the investigation concludes. Investigators are also asking anyone who may have witnessed the incident to contact DCI at 800-394-6215 and leave a message with what was witnessed and how to contact you.

Fatal UTV crash charges filed

Charges have now been filed in a fatal UTV crash that occurred May 29 in the Town of Doty.

Oconto County authorities have charged Scot Haas, 53, of Waukesha, with homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle and homicide by negligent use of a motor

vehicle.

The crash was reported about 9:07 p.m. at the intersection of County Road T and Boulder Lake Lane in the Town of Doty.

Initial reports said David Weinmann, 56, of West Chicago, Illinois, appeared to have been ejected

from the cargo portion of the UTV. Mountain Area Ambulance transported Weinmann to the Aspirus Langlade Hospital in Antigo, where he later died of his injuries.

Haas is scheduled to make an initial appearance in Oconto County Circuit Court on July 25.

Monkeypox case in Oconto County considered 'isolated exposure'

Oconto County Public Health officials say a reported case of monkeypox in the county is considered "an isolated exposure."

In a news release, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services and Oconto County Public Health said they were recently notified that a non-Wisconsin resident who tested positive for monkeypox was visit-

ing Oconto County while they were contagious.

The agencies have contacted people who were exposed to this individual and are monitoring them for signs and symptoms.

To protect patient privacy and ensure compliance with federal HIPAA laws, additional details about the patient cannot be re-

leased, the departments said.

Based on the information available at this time, the risk of widespread transmission of monkeypox to the public is low. Monkeypox does not spread easily from person to person. People must have close, sustained contact with an infected person to get the virus, the agencies said.

OCONTO COUNTY CIRCUIT COURT

Proceedings of June 10

Ethan Curtis Wykle, 18, Oconto, pleaded no contest to possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that occurred March 1. Charges of bail jumping and misdemeanor possession of THC, from a May 5 incident, were dismissed but read into the record in a plea agreement. Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled sentencing for Aug. 1 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Brandon J. Neumann, 28, Gillett, pleaded guilty to misdemeanor charges of resisting or obstructing an officer and operating a motor vehicle while his license was revoked, in connection with an incident that occurred Nov. 23. A felony bail jumping count was dismissed but read into the record. Judge Michael T. Judge sentenced him to 31 days already served in the county jail and levied fines and costs totaling \$1,132.50.

Rachel L. Micoley, 53, Oconto, pleaded no contest to a misdemeanor charge of resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that occurred May 13. The charge was amended from a felony in a plea agreement. Conley imposed but stayed a nine-month county jail sentence and placed her on a year of probation.

Proceedings of June 8

Bond was set at \$25,000 cash for Nathan R. Neldner, 29, Oconto Falls, after he was charged with felony bail jumping and misdemeanor receiving or concealing stolen property, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred June 4. Neldner was already awaiting trial on charges of burglary, eight counts of theft and bail jumping, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 27. His initial appearance on the new charges was adjourned until June 16.

Proceedings of June 6

Mark A. Martin, 54, Gillett, pleaded no contest to homicide by intoxicated use of a motor vehicle and a misdemeanor count of obstructing an officer, in connection with the Oct. 3 crash that claimed the life of Christopher Wayne Matchopato, 54, of Keshena. Judge revoked Martin's bond and ordered him placed in custody, scheduled sentencing for Sept. 13 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Damian Lee Murphy, 20, Abrams, pleaded no contest to homicide by negligent operation of a motor vehicle and misdemeanor charges of reckless driving and two counts of negligent operation of a motor vehicle, in the Aug. 14, 2019, crash that killed Albert W. Reppert, 71, of Midlothian, Illinois. Judge accepted a deferred prosecution agreement and suspended the felony case for two years. On the reckless driving charge, Judge sentenced Murphy to one year in the county jail with good time and work-release privileges. On the other misdemeanor charges, Judge placed Murphy on two years' probation

with conditions that include maintaining absolute sobriety and 80 hours of community service. The felony charge may be expunged from his record if he successfully completes the terms of his sentence.

Stephan Laurants Gengler, 34, formerly of Wrightstown, was sentenced to three years in prison, followed by six years of extended supervision, for possession with intent to deliver amphetamine, and fleeing an officer and causing great bodily harm, in connection with an incident that occurred July 13. The prison term is concurrent with a sentence he is already serving at Redgranite Correctional Institution. Among other conditions of Gengler's extended supervision, Judge ordered that he maintain absolute sobriety, complete an alcohol and other drug abuse assessment and follow through on recommendations, and not operate a motor vehicle without a valid driver's license and approval from his corrections agent.

Mitchell Anthony Kohel, 34, Whitelaw, pleaded no contest to causing injury by operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (second offense), in connection with an incident that occurred Oct. 25. Conley scheduled sentencing for July 26 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Casey Douglas Frank, 28, Pulaski, pleaded no contest to possession of child pornography, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred June 1, 2021. Six other counts were dismissed but read into the record. Judge scheduled sentencing for Aug. 29 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

An Aug. 16 jury trial was scheduled for Paul M. Fletcher, 42, Green Bay, on charges of first-degree reckless endangerment, burglary while armed with a dangerous weapon, false imprisonment, and misdemeanor counts of operating a firearm while intoxicated and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred March 12. A final pre-trial conference was scheduled for Aug. 1.

Proceedings of June 3

On a defense motion, Richard W. Sotka, 47, Rosendale, will be permitted to live in Iowa while he awaits trial on Oconto County charges of stalking and misdemeanor counts of bail jumping and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Sept. 1, 2021, and an alleged Oct. 31 restraining order violation. He must first waive extradition between the two states, and Judge Michael T. Judge ordered that he notify the sheriff's department anytime he will be traveling to Oconto County. Sotka may still have no contact with five individuals and may not come within a mile of the victim's home. A status conference was scheduled for June 16.

Cheryl Lynn Nelson, 56, Pulaski, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated (fifth or sixth

offense), in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred March 8. A pre-trial hearing was scheduled for July 25.

Michael L. Christensen, 20, Suring, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to repeated sexual assault of the same child, use of a computer to facilitate a child sex crime, child enticement and exposing genitals, in connection with incidents that allegedly occurred between June and September 2021. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 14.

Dustin W. Freed, 25, Green Bay, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred March 18. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 14.

Veronica M. Floring, 28, Suring, pleaded no contest to two misdemeanor counts of possession of THC in connection with an incident that occurred Oct. 27 and was placed in the Volunteers on Probation program for two years. Felony counts were dismissed in a plea agreement.

Gregory Joe Meyer, 34, Lena, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Nov. 8. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 14.

Diamond Latrisha Jones, 23, Gillett, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to maintaining a drug trafficking place and misdemeanor counts of possession of THC and possession of drug paraphernalia, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 31. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 14.

Landon W. Burkett, 17, Oconto, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and pleaded not guilty to robbery with the threat of force and misdemeanor disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 16. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for July 14.

Proceedings of June 2

A bench warrant was authorized for Florentino Hernandez Rodriguez, 25, Lena, after he failed to appear to be arraigned on charges of false imprisonment and misdemeanor fourth-degree sexual assault and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred Jan. 24.

Skylar Alexis Anwash, 20, Wabeno, pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that occurred March 13, and was placed on one year of probation. A felony charge was dismissed in a plea agreement.

Proceedings of June 1

Stephanie J. Termaat, 38, Oconto, pleaded no contest to harboring or aiding a felon, in connection with an incident that occurred in the days after her son, Logan

Race, shot a Menominee, Michigan, man in the back during a botched robbery Dec. 28, 2020. Judge Jay N. Conley scheduled sentencing for July 26 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation. Meanwhile, Race, 18, was sentenced in September to five to 20 years in a Michigan prison, and as a result the district attorney's office dismissed Wisconsin charges related to the incident.

Dykes Garfield Jupp, 52, Green Bay, pleaded no contest to fleeing an officer in a motor vehicle and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that occurred April 25. Judge scheduled sentencing for July 20 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Ashlee N. Webster, 27, Keshena, was placed on three years' probation after a prison sentence was imposed and stayed for possession of methamphetamine and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that occurred Nov. 16. Among other conditions of probation, Conley ordered that she refrain from possession or consumption of alcohol or other drugs without a valid prescription and complete all assessments and treatments deemed appropriate by her corrections agent.

Andrew William Kizaur, 26, Amasa, Michigan, pleaded guilty to possession with intent to deliver amphetamine in connection with an incident that occurred Dec. 19. Judge scheduled sentencing for July 20 and ordered a pre-sentence investigation.

Cecil A. Seivers, 59, Oconto Falls, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of aggravated battery of a physically disabled person and misdemeanor counts of battery and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 15, 2021. Arraignment was scheduled for June 16.

Phillip John Waupoose, 38, Neopit, waived his right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of substantial battery intending bodily harm, intimidating victim/damage property, and misdemeanor counts of criminal damage to property and disorderly conduct, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred March 29, 2020. Arraignment was scheduled for July 14.

Jeffrey S. Wenzel Jr., 22, Oconto, waived his right to a preliminary hearing, then stood mute and a not guilty plea was entered on his behalf to a charge of possession of methamphetamine, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred April 3. A pre-trial conference was scheduled for June 16.

Katie M. Novoselatz, 24, Suamico, waived her right to a preliminary hearing and was bound over on charges of child neglect and misdemeanor resisting or obstructing an officer, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred May 7. Arraignment was scheduled for June 16.

Rick reflects on time at Novitiate

Building was once called the finest home north of Milwaukee

One former Alexian Brother took a trip back to the place he began his career.

Pat Rick, who lives in Austin, Texas, joined the Shawano Rotary Club on June 6 to tour the Alexian Brothers Novitiate, where he reflected back on his time at the novitiate. Rick wrote a book in 2011, titled, "The Abbey & Me," partly detailing the seizure of the novitiate by the Menominee Warrior Society in 1975.

"I was a high school student trying to decide what to do with the rest of my life," said Rick. "I joined because I was always interested in medicine growing up."

According to Rick, the Alexian Brothers are a group of men who for 900 years have cared for those who are sick and in need to make them feel comfortable.

"They have always been taking care of the sick and dying," said Rick. "They got their start in Europe during the plague — they have a great reputation — and I thought that is the job for me."

Rick said he came to Shawano in 1966 and became an Alexian Brother.

"Everyone had a different experience here depending on what your job was," said Rick. "I was an outdoorsman, so I did not spend a whole lot of time inside."

He explained that a day for him looked like getting up in the morning to go to church, going to breakfast and then working around the property, whether it be mowing the lawn, shoveling snow or other chores.

"We did all of this in silence," said Rick.

One tradition that Rick highlighted was ice skating on the cesspool on the novitiate's property.

"I don't think it was unusual to ice skate there," said Rick. "It no longer exists, but we enjoyed doing that."

Rotary member Curt Knoke, who spent time photographing the novitiate, explained what the seizure was.

"The Menominee Warrior Society came to the novitiate and stormed it," said Knoke as he explained that the society demanded the property be turned over to the

Menominee Reservation. "They had control of the novitiate for 30 days in 1975."

He explained that damage occurred to the building from the seizure, as well as from law enforcement shutting off power, and vandals.

"When I started taking pictures

here 20 years ago, there was not one glass pane that was not broken," said Knoke. "That was so sad."

According to the building's history on the Gresham Novitiate website, the building was constructed in 1939 by Jennie Peters for her sick daughter. Her daughter passed away before construction was completed. Peters donated the mansion to the Alexian Brothers in 1948. In 1952, Alexian Brothers added different buildings and structures to the mansion. In 1975, the Menominee Warrior Society seized the building and the 30-day standoff began.

Through different ownership of the novitiate, Rick said there was an idea floated around to tear the building down. Rick was among those who opposed this and fought to keep the building standing.

"The previous owner said that they wanted to flatten the building, dig a hole and put the building in there," said Rick. "I suggested to them to leave the mansion standing. It has even more history. It can be repaired."

He added that owners of the building throughout the years have not attempted to refurbish the building.

"We have someone who is now just renovating the roof," said Rick. "That tells you that these owners are serious about keeping this place around."

Rick also spoke on what the novitiate means to him.

"I made a decision to leave and if I had to do it over again, I would repeat it," said Rick. "This place will always hold a special place in my heart. I didn't leave mad, I just left to find out what I wanted to do next in my life."

Knoke also spoke on the role that the novitiate plays in Shawano County.

"It is a beautiful area," said Knoke. "I heard that at one point this was the finest home north of Milwaukee. It has fascinating history."

Rick is scheduled to be on site to host tours and give history about the building on the first Saturday of the month until October.

Court exam questions Renel's competency

Cecil man disputes exam, prompting need for competency hearing

A competency examination has deemed Aaron Renel, a man who led law enforcement on a chase and a standoff in a military-style vehicle, not competent to aid in his defense, but Renel is pushing to move forward with a trial anyway.

Renel, a Cecil resident, has been charged with felony count of fleeing and eluding an officer in a vehicle

County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. said that the exam showed Renel was currently not competent, but that he could be restored to sufficient mental health to face his crimes if he receives "inpatient remedial services."

and second-degree recklessly endangering safety, along with a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer.

At a status conference June 13, Shawano-Menominee

Renel, who appeared without an attorney, disputed the court's exam, saying he has taken 17 psychological evaluations through the veterans administration as a disabled veteran, and that they have all come back positive.

Renel told Kussel that he has an attorney, but online court records do not show one on file. He also claims to be a Medal of Honor recipient.

"I'm trying to find out why I'm in court," Renel said. "I've been held for 35 days. I just wanted to make that clear, sir. I have the same rights as a senator."

The Shawano County Sheriff's Department responded on the evening of May 8 to reports of a heavy truck-type military vehicle on state Highway 29 in western Shawano County travelling down the roadway with a flat tire, thus causing a traffic hazard.

Renel allegedly led deputies on a short chase, coming to a stop in about a half-mile on the eastbound lane median of the highway near County Road G in the Town of Seneca. The eastbound highway was shut down due to the incident.

Renel, 39, allegedly would not

cooperate or exit the vehicle. Because of comments allegedly made by Renel and the conditions of this incident, the Shawano County Special Response Team responded to this scene. Deputies, including trained negotiators, communicated with Renel for about four hours.

About 9:30 p.m. Renel allegedly tried to escape, heading eastbound on Highway 29. Deputies tried to stop the suspect vehicle, using the snowplows in an attempt to perform a moving roadblock. The vehicle then crossed the median and began heading eastbound in the westbound lanes of the highway.

Renel allegedly came back to the eastbound lanes but then again crossed the median and was driving the wrong way down the highway before being stopped by a deputy driving a snowplow from the Shawano County Highway Department.

Renel is currently being held on a \$10,000 cash bond.

Kussel plans to schedule a competency hearing to resolve the issue of whether the case can proceed to trial.

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35 arrested in large-scale drug task force op

The Shawano County Drug Task Force, in concert with the Northeast Tri-County Drug Enforcement Group, arrested 35 people around the county June 9 following a large-scale effort to target illegal drugs.

Three people were arrested for possession of methamphetamine, while four were arrested on possession of THC — the active drug in marijuana. Two of the arrests involved narcotics, while another two involved fentanyl and heroin. Six of the arrests included charges of drug paraphernalia.

Many of the arrests included non-drug-related crimes, including seven incidents of operating with a revoked license, six outstanding warrants, five bail-jumping charges, four incidents of operating without a license, two incidents of resisting or obstructing officers and one count each of possessing an electric weapon, felony misappropriation of identification, operating while impaired and probation violation.

The task force conducted 98 total traffic stops, issuing 123 warnings and 50 citations.

The Northeast Tri-County Drug Enforcement Group, which also includes Oconto, Marinette and Forest counties, works regularly with Shawano County on drug and traffic sweeps like this one, according to Chief Deputy George Lenzner. He noted that each

county sets up a large-scale interdiction at least once a year, with this one targeting an area from Gresham east to Cecil. An interdiction for the west side of Shawano County occurred last fall, albeit on a smaller scale.

"We try to move them around," Lenzner said. "I doubt you'll see another one on this large of a scale this year. It takes a lot to get something organized with all these other counties."

Lenzner said that eight of the nine overdose deaths documented by the sheriff's department in 2021 were fentanyl-related, and the goal of this sweep was to get as much of the drugs off the street as possible.

"We're trying to get some of this fentanyl and meth and heroin — the dangerous drugs — off the streets," Lenzner said. "This is just one way to help accomplish that."

Lenzner said he'd hoped to get more of the dangerous drugs off the streets with the traffic stops, but cleaning up issues with outstanding warrants and driving without licenses was helpful, too.

"I'm not real surprised with the number of arrests, because we know there are a ton of people driving around with warrants and without valid license," Lenzner said. "Drug activity is out there, and we always want to get more drugs off the streets. We're happy that we got some meth and heroin and fentanyl off the street. We'll take what we can get and hopefully save somebody's life."

THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SHAWANO, WISCONSIN, DO ORDAIN that Chapter 4, Traffic Code, Section 4.08 Parking regulations (1), (ff) S. Water Street, through (tt) number of parking spots is hereby repealed and recreated as follows:

Except as otherwise set forth in the Code of Ordinances, the following parking restrictions shall apply in the City of Shawano:

(ff) S. Water Street.

1. There shall be no parking, standing or stopping on the west side of S. Water Street from the curbline on Wescott Avenue northerly for a distance of 475 feet.

(gg)Waukechon Street.

1. There shall be no parking, standing or stopping on the east side of Waukechon Street from the curbline on Green Bay Street southerly for a distance of 225 feet.
2. There shall be no parking, standing or stopping on the west side of Waukechon Street from the curbline on Green Bay Street southerly for a distance of 160 feet.
3. There shall be no parking, standing or stopping on the west side of Waukechon Street from the south curbline of Birch Hill Lane south for a distance of 581 feet (to the north curbline of Dallman Lane).

(hh)Woodlawn Drive.

1. There shall be no parking, standing or stopping on the east side of Woodlawn Drive commencing at the intersection of East Green Bay Street and Woodlawn Drive thence continuing north 920 feet to the place of beginning, which shall be the start of the no-parking zone, and said no-parking zone shall continue for a distance of 330 feet to the north from the point of beginning to the end of the no-parking zone.

(ii)No parking except for authorized vehicles. Except as herein permitted, no person shall park, stop or leave standing any vehicle in the following places unless authorized by an official traffic control sign:

1. At any curb marked as a taxi stop or stand.
2. At any curb or City parking lot designated as parking for City personnel.

(jj) Loading zones.

1. Definition. "Loading zones" are hereby defined to be those areas within the City limits, not located on Green Bay Street or Main Street, which are designated to permit temporary parking, stopping or standing for the purpose of loading or unloading trucks, buses or other service or supply vehicles.
2. Restrictions. Any vehicle stopped within a properly designated loading zone shall be attended by a licensed operator so that it may be moved in case of an emergency or to avoid obstruction of traffic.
3. Zones designated. Those areas designated by the Field Committee after written application, investigation and approval shall be designated as loading zones.

(kk) Temporary parking for funerals. Temporary parking for funerals at all City churches shall be allowed, provided that the funeral homes furnish signs indicating that temporary parking shall be allowed. When an area is so signed, all persons parking in said areas for funerals shall be exempt from all other provisions of this section; provided, however, that said temporary parking shall be for a period of not longer than two hours.

(ll)Free parking. Notwithstanding any other provision contained herein pertaining to timed parking, all parking within the City on public property on special promotion days set aside by the Chamber of Commerce shall be free parking.

(mm)Parking lot regulations.

1. The maximum speed limit driving on or through a municipal parking lot shall be 10 miles per hour. All traffic patterns shall be one-way in accordance with designated markings or signs.
2. All parking in municipal parking lots shall be strictly in accordance with markings designating individual parking stalls. No vehicle shall be parked in such a manner as to encroach upon or over the lines marking such stalls.
3. No person shall throw or deposit any type of debris or waste material on any

municipal parking lot.

4. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Code, no person shall park in a municipal parking lot between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

(nn) Overnight parking regulations. Notwithstanding whatever may be provided in § 4.08(1) and (8), overnight parking shall be provided between the hours of 3:00 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. in the five parking spaces located on the east side of the Community Hall (Parking Lot No. 7), the 11 parking spaces located in Parking Lot No. 3 located on the east side of the 100 block of South Washington Street, and the first six parking spaces located immediately west of South Andrews Street along the north side of Parking Lot No. 8. The fee for said overnight parking shall be as set by Council resolution, which fee may be prorated on a monthly basis, said permits to be issued to be in effect from the first day to last day of the month. The Department of Public Works shall sign each parking space to designate it as permit parking only from 3:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m. The administration and collection of revenue generated by said overnight parking shall be carried out by the City Clerk. Upon payment of the fee, the Clerk shall issue an identification sticker or card which the operator must display in the car during said parking hours.

(oo) Miscellaneous parking restrictions.

1. Parking in driveways. No person shall park or leave standing any motor vehicle in any private driveway without the permission of the owner or lessee of the property upon which such driveway is located, whether or not such driveway is posted to limit or restrict parking.

2. Parking heavy vehicles in residential districts. No operator of a motor truck, truck-tractor, trailer or semitrailer or any other vehicle or combination of vehicles, other than motorbuses, weighing more than 10,000 pounds shall park such vehicle on any highway other than a routed state trunk highway in any residential district except for such time as is reasonably necessary to facilitate the loading or unloading of the vehicle.

3. Night parking restrictions. When signs have been erected at, or reasonably near, the corporate limits as provided in W.S.A. § 349.13, no person, except physicians on emergency calls, shall park any vehicle on any street or alley between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. of any day, except on Saturdays and Sundays the prohibited hours for parking, as set forth above, shall be between 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m., said restrictions to be in effect between December 1 and March 1.

4. Parking trailers, campers or motor homes on City streets. No owner or operator of a trailer, camper or motor home shall park such vehicle on any City street in a residential district for more than 48 hours without permission of the Police Department.

5. Parking policies and procedures. The parking policies and procedures recommended by the Field Committee and adopted by the Common Council are hereby incorporated by reference so that all of such policies and procedures are incorporated as part of this Code. Any amendments and/or additions which occur after the adoption of this subsection are also adopted by reference.

(pp)Parking during snowstorm emergency.

1. Emergency declarations. In times of emergency due to excessive snowfall, or when it is deemed advisable in the interest of public safety, the Chief of Police may, in his or her discretion, either through the Police Department or by signs placed or erected, close off streets, portions of streets, divert or regulate traffic and prohibit parking, stopping or unloading as the occasion may require, and all pedestrians and drivers of vehicles shall conform to these regulations. Appropriate signs shall be erected in accordance with W.S.A. s. 349.13(1), which signs shall inform motorists entering the City that the City has in force a snow emergency ordinance.

2. Parking regulations during snow emergencies. Whenever an emergency exists and the Director of Public Works shall have caused announcement thereof to be made by the radio stations whose normal operating range covers the City, no person shall park, or suffer to be parked, any vehicle of any kind or description in an area marked by temporary no-parking signs or between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., inclusive, upon any street in the City, provided that, notwithstanding such emergency restrictions, vehicles may be parked for a period of time not longer than three minutes for actually loading or unloading of passengers, or 30 minutes for actually loading or unloading of property, and provided further that no other regulation restricting parking as to place, time or manner is violated thereby.

3. Authorization of erection of no-parking signs. Pursuant to the provisions of W.S.A. s. 66.325, the Director of Public Works is authorized to erect temporary no-parking signs during the existence of an emergency created by a snowstorm or excessive snowfall which impairs or prevents the full use of any highway, street or roadway for transportation.

4. Snow tow-away zones. The Director of Public Works is hereby authorized to cause the towing away of vehicles parked in violation of this subsection. The owner of said

Shawano County hires attorney for land dispute

A local woman says she is starting to see change on the Shawano County Board of Adjustment.

Carney Garcia recently reported violations to Shawano County regarding property that is shared on Shawano Lake. Garcia's original complaint stemmed from two homeowners who built into a shared lot without pulling

permits and used 2-foot setbacks, as opposed to 25-foot setbacks.

After claiming that the Board of Adjustment quickly voted to pass an after-the-fact variance for the deck during its April 14 meeting, Garcia filled a writ of certiorari against the board. A writ of certiorari is a request for a higher-up board to review the judgment of a case.

"In response to the writ, the county has hired attorney Andrew Smith, who

seems to be well-versed in municipal law and in the operation of county boards," said Garcia.

Garcia said that she noticed a difference in how the June 9 meeting was operated.

"It seems like he may have already had an influence on the Board of Adjustment," said Garcia. "The board seemed to apply the variance criteria when making their decisions. In fact, their long periods of silence proved

that they were making decisions with an abundance of caution."

According to Garcia, the Wisconsin statute for approving variances has three criteria — there has to be a hardship, it can't be against public interest and the variance has to be valid due to conditions that are unique to the property.

NEW Media contacted both Shawano County and Smith for comment, but neither replied by press time.

vehicle shall be charged for such towing and shall be subject to prosecution and penalty as provided in §§ 4.16 and 4.17 of this chapter.

(qq) Removal of illegally parked vehicles. Any vehicle parked or left standing upon a highway, street or alley or other public grounds in violation of any of the provisions of this section or § 4.01 of this chapter is declared to be a hazard to traffic and public safety. Such vehicle shall be removed by the operator, upon request of any police officer, to a position where parking, stopping or standing is not prohibited. Any police officer, after issuing a citation for illegal parking, stopping or standing of an unattended vehicle in violation of this chapter, is authorized to remove such vehicle to a position where parking is not prohibited. The officer may order a motor carrier holding a permit to perform vehicle towing services, a licensed motor vehicle salvage dealer or a licensed motor vehicle dealer who performs vehicle towing services to remove and store such vehicle in any storage garage or rental parking grounds or any facility of the person providing the towing services. In addition to other penalties provided by § 4.16(4) of this chapter, the owner or operator of a vehicle so removed shall pay the cost of towing and storage.

(rr) Registration record of vehicle as evidence. When any vehicle is found upon a street or highway in violation of any provision of this chapter regulating the stopping, standing or parking of vehicles and identity of the operator cannot be determined, the owner, as shown by the ownership registration of the vehicle supplied by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation or a comparable authority of any other state, shall be subject to the appropriate penalty.

(ss) Unlawful removal of parking citations. No person other than the owner or operator thereof shall remove a City parking ticket from a motor vehicle.

(tt) Number of parking lots. The municipal parking lots shall be numbered and referred to as follows:

1. Parking Lot No. 1: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of West Fifth Street described as follows: commencing at the southeast right-of-way corner of West Fifth Street and North Washington Street intersection, which is the point of beginning; thence easterly 116 feet along the south right-of-way line of West Fifth Street; thence south 163 feet along the west line of the City alley; thence westerly 119 feet; thence north 163 feet along the east right-of-way line of North Washington Street to the point of beginning.

2. Parking Lot No. 2: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of South Washington Street described as follows: commencing at the southeast right-of-way corner of West Green Bay Street and South Washington Street intersection, which is the point of beginning; thence east 90 feet along the south right-of-way line of West Green Bay Street; thence south 210 feet along the west line of the City alley; thence west 98 feet; thence northerly 211 feet along the east right-of-way line of South Washington Street to the point of beginning.

3. Parking Lot No. 3: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of South Washington Street described as follows: commencing at the southeast right-of-way corner of West Green Bay Street and South Washington Street intersection; thence southerly 237 feet along the east right-of-way line of South Washington Street to the point of beginning; thence east 102 feet; thence south 168 feet along the west line of the City alley; thence west 105 feet; thence northerly 169 feet along the east right-of-way line of South Washington Street to the point of beginning.

4. Parking Lot No. 4: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 Block of South Washington Street described as follows: commencing at the southwest right-of-way corner of West Green Bay Street and South Washington Street intersection; thence southerly 284 feet along the west right-of-way line of South Washington Street to the point of beginning; thence continue southerly 108 feet along the east right-of-way line

of South Washington Street; thence west 139 feet; thence north 71 feet; thence east 40 feet; thence north 40 feet; thence east 103 feet to the point of beginning.

5. Parking Lot No. 5: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of South Washington Street described as follows: commencing at the northeast right-of-way corner of West Division Street and South Washington Street intersection which is the point of beginning; thence northerly 198 feet along the east right-of-way line of South Washington Street; thence east 106 feet; thence south 196 feet along the west line of the City alley; thence west 114 feet along the north right-of-way line of West Division Street to the point of beginning.

6. Parking Lot No. 6: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of East Green Bay Street described as follows: commencing at the southwest right-of-way corner of East Green Bay Street and South Sawyer Street intersection; thence west 102 feet along the south right-of-way line of East Green Bay Street to the point of beginning; thence south 182 feet; thence west 100 feet to the east line of the City alley; thence north 184 feet along said alley line, to the south right-of-way line of East Green Bay Street; thence east 98 feet along said right-of-way line to the point of beginning.

7. Parking Lot No. 7: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of East Division Street described as follows: commencing at the northeast right-of-way corner of East Division Street and South Main Street intersection; thence east 188 feet along the north right-of-way line of East Division Street to the point of beginning; thence northerly 294 feet; thence east 108 feet; thence southerly 294 feet; thence west 103 feet along the north right-of-way line of East Division Street to the point of beginning.

8. Parking Lot No. 8: the municipal parking lot located on the 100 block of South Andrews Street described as follows: commencing at the southwest right-of-way corner of South Andrews Street and East Green Bay Street intersection; thence south 254 feet along the west right-of-way line of South Andrews Street to the point of beginning; thence continue south 146 feet along the west right-of-way line of South Andrews Street; thence west 217 feet; thence north 146 feet; thence east 217 feet to the point of beginning.

9. Parking Lot No. 9: the municipal parking lot located on the 200 block of South Sawyer Street described as follows: commencing at the southwest right-of-way corner of South Sawyer Street and East Division Street intersection; thence south 127 feet along the west right-of-way line of South Sawyer Street to the point of beginning; thence continue south 123 feet along the west right-of-way line of South Sawyer Street; thence west 217 feet; thence north 123 feet; thence east 217 feet to the point of beginning.

10. Parking Lot No. 10: the municipal parking lot located on the 600 block of South Main Street described as follows: commencing at the southeast right-of-way corner of South Main Street and East Richmond Street intersection; thence south 150 feet along the east right-of-way line of South Main Street to the point of beginning; thence east 155 feet; thence south 104 feet; thence westerly 155 feet; thence north 115 feet along the east right-of-way line of South Main Street to the point of beginning.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication as provided by law.

Study states that Shawano Lake contributes \$39 million to economy

UW-Oshkosh seniors conduct research on financial impact

A UW-Oshkosh student-led study claims that more than \$39 million was contributed to the local economy by means of Shawano Lake.

The students in Professor Marianne Johnson's senior-level public economic class worked with various organizations and governmental bodies to run the study, including the DNR and the Shawano Parks Department.

"Here at UW-Oshkosh, we have something called the Center for Customized Research, and they solicit projects from all over the state, dealing with local economic impacts," said Johnson. "I asked the person who runs the program if they might have a project that my students could work on this spring."

Shawano Country Chamber Executive Director Nancy Smith said that she and Peter Thillman, Shawano County Economic Progress Inc. chief economic development officer, pitched the idea after Johnson had called with her request.

"This has been a question the chamber has received over the years: What is the economic impact of Shawano Lake to the area?" said Smith.

Johnson said that three projects were pitched to the class for their assignment.

"My students thought that Shawano Lake was the most interesting," said Johnson. "We talk a lot about things that are shared or are public goods, like lakes and parks. We also cover a lot of environmental projects. I think that because we have been talking about that for a couple weeks, the students wanted to do Shawano Lake."

She walked through the process of how the students collected the data for the study.

"We brainstormed all of the different ways that people might be using the lake," said Johnson. "To measure the economic impact, we really want-

ed to see if the lake is bringing people in. Are they renting boats? Are they fishing? Are they staying in hotels? We brainstormed a long list, and then different students volunteered to do different things."

In the study, the students concluded that more than \$29 million was contributed to the local economy in 2021 through direct and indirect spending from Shawano Lake visitors, which is different than total economic impact. With using data from previous years, the study states that in 2021, there was a total impact of \$39 million. That \$39 million includes taxes on lakefront properties, spending by owners of second homes and direct and indirect spending from lake visitors.

That figure is up about \$5 million from 2018, when there was a total impact of \$34 million from Shawano Lake.

"It was a lot of fun, because during the middle of the semester, everyone had their own piece and could not see the big picture," said Johnson. "At the end of the semester, when we started to put everything together, they were all pretty surprised by the amount of money."

Smith said she was not surprised by the amount of money that Shawano Lake brings in to the area.

"Many visitors travel to our area specifically to utilize the lake for fishing, water sports, tournaments, other events, or to simply enjoying the scenic beauty," said Smith. "These visitors obviously spend money with many local businesses and lodging properties."

Johnson said one point in particular stuck out to her after reading the students' study.

"It was the extent of second-homeowners around the lake. Out of more than 800 homes around the lake, more than 500 are second-homeowners,"

said Johnson. "They come from all over the United States. Their home addresses are Florida, Texas, New York and Arizona."

Smith also spoke on the surprising impact of second homes on the lake.

"This is something we have not measured before," said Smith. "The study shows these homeowners contribute an estimated \$3.5 million to our local economy."

Johnson also pointed out that the lake accounts for about half (or 46%) of all of the tourism in the county.

She also expressed gratitude for the cooperation her students received as they worked with various businesses and organizations to collect data for their study.

"We had students working with the Wisconsin DNR. We had students who worked with the Shawano Development Corporation, and we had students who worked with Shawano County Parks," said Johnson. "Everyone was so helpful in helping us complete this study."

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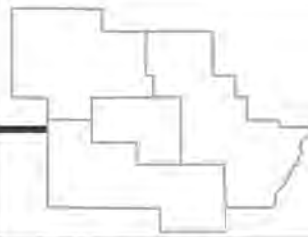

State needs to act on gun legislation

We all deserve the right to feel safe in our homes, our workplaces, our schools, places of worship and everywhere we visit.

But as we were once again brutally reminded in the wake of two mass shootings in the span of 10 days — one at a grocery store, the other an elementary school — our right to be safe in our communities and the freedom to live without fear of gun violence is sorely lacking.

The shooting at Robb Elementary School in Uvalde, Texas, on May 24 marked the 212th mass shooting in the United States so far in 2022. As we join in mourning another senseless gun violence massacre, aghast at the sorrow of the parents and loved ones of the children and teachers who were lost in Uvalde, we also join in raising our voices and demanding action.

President Joe Biden rightly asked in the hours after this latest mass shooting tragedy, when will we stand up to the gun lobby?

While places like Buffalo and Uvalde can seem far away from us here in Wisconsin, the gun lobby is working to influence Wisconsin politicians and

derail common sense gun safety laws. Politicians like Republican Sen. Ron Johnson — who, as of 2019, had received more than \$1.2 million in campaign donations from the National Rifle Association and is still in Washington, D.C., opposing measures to keep deadly firearms out of dangerous people's possession.

Those who have been granted the privilege of governing in our names, whether it be in federal, state or local office, need to put constituents over greed, listen to our voices, and they need to act.

In Wisconsin, Gov. Tony Evers is advocating for common sense gun safety measures supported by an overwhelming majority of Wisconsin residents.

Recent polling from Marquette University Law School shows that more than 80% of all Wisconsinites,

including 78% of households that own guns, support mandatory background checks for all firearm purchases. That same polling revealed that over 80% of people living in Wisconsin are in favor of Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) legislation, a measure that would allow law enforcement and family members to petition courts to keep people who are a danger to themselves or others from having guns.

When Evers called for a special legislative session to take up these common sense proposals, the Republican legislators in charge of the state Senate and Assembly refused to even allow a debate, much less a vote on the bills.

It's clear what is holding Wisconsin back from taking action to help us live free of the fear of gun violence — it's conservative politicians siding with the gun lobby.

In fact, Republicans in the Wisconsin Legislature this last session didn't just refuse to debate common sense safety laws; they acted to pass bills that would have made it easier to bring guns to places like schools and

churches and put them into the hands of teens.

The bills were publicly opposed by a deluge of leading organizations from across the state — including the Children's Hospital of Wisconsin, the Wisconsin Association of School Boards, the Wisconsin Association of School Nurses, the Wisconsin Education Association Council and End Domestic Abuse Wisconsin. Thankfully, Evers swiftly vetoed the bills, preventing them from becoming law.

Whether it's parents, students and teachers showing up to protests, or public organizations opposing specific legislation, the people of Wisconsin have spoken: We want sensible gun safety measures that will save lives.

Together, we can demand that our legislators, our senators and every elected official pass common sense legislation like background checks and ERPOs, to help ensure that every Wisconsinite and every American can live in freedom and without fear of gun violence.

Profit margin too thin not to charge more

This is in response to the recent letter to the editor "Restaurants nickel and dime their guests." First, I'd like to thank Richard Sarnwick for patronizing our local restaurants. Shopping and dining locally helps keep our businesses and economy strong.

Owning and running a restaurant is one of the most challenging businesses even during normal times, but especially now. We are very lucky and grateful our restaurants have survived over the past two years. First, they were forced to close. Then they dealt with slower customer traffic. Then their cost of doing business increased due to higher prices for their supplies and labor, and now it is a major challenge for them to find workers. I have the utmost respect for restaurant owners, operators and their staff.

As far as the added fee for custom-

ers utilizing a credit card, it is most definitely not to "nickel and dime" their customers, but simply to try to recoup what the credit card companies charge them every time someone uses a credit card. The average profit margin for a restaurant is between 3-5%. They can't afford to lose anything from a sale. Depending on what credit card-service a business uses, the processing fees charged to the business can be as high as 4% plus an additional 10 cents per transaction.

It doesn't take a mathematician to realize those fees eat into an already razor thin profit margin. Raising prices across the board for all customers is something our businesses are trying very hard not to do right now, but many will need to do this just to stay in business. Businesses have to make a profit, or they won't exist. It's as simple as that.

What's not so simple is running a business in this challenging environment and tight labor market. Kudos to all our businesses for all their hard

work and dedication to our communities. Without them, there is no community.

To help finance the business expansion, Holz secured a \$10,000 microloan through Oconto County Economic Development Corp. She used the microloan to purchase inventory and to make the down payment on the Lakewood building.

"The microloan will help me get a good start there, because I could purchase the Lakewood property without pulling money out of the current boutique," she said.

OCEDC low-interest micro business loans are available to small

business owners who want to expand their businesses, purchase equipment, or need extra working capital for other expenses.

"Microloans are very versatile, depending on the business owner's needs," said Samantha Boucher, OCEDC tourism director. "The loans are available to small businesses that are ready to transition to the next phase of growth."

To qualify, businesses must have annual sales under \$1 million and fewer than 25 employees. Other factors may also be considered. Microloans are available at an interest rate as low as 3% for up to five years. Loans range from \$1,000 to \$10,000.

"Contact our staff, and we'll help you with the microloan application process," Boucher said.

In addition to the microloan, Olive + Birch Boutique qualified for a \$10,000 Main Street Bounceback grant from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corp. These rapid-response grants help new and existing businesses open a new location or expand operations. The deadline for the Bounceback grant was recently extended to Dec. 31, 2022.

"We're committed to helping startups and existing businesses get the help they need to succeed. The Main Street Bounceback grants give organizations more working capital to support growth," Boucher said.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. 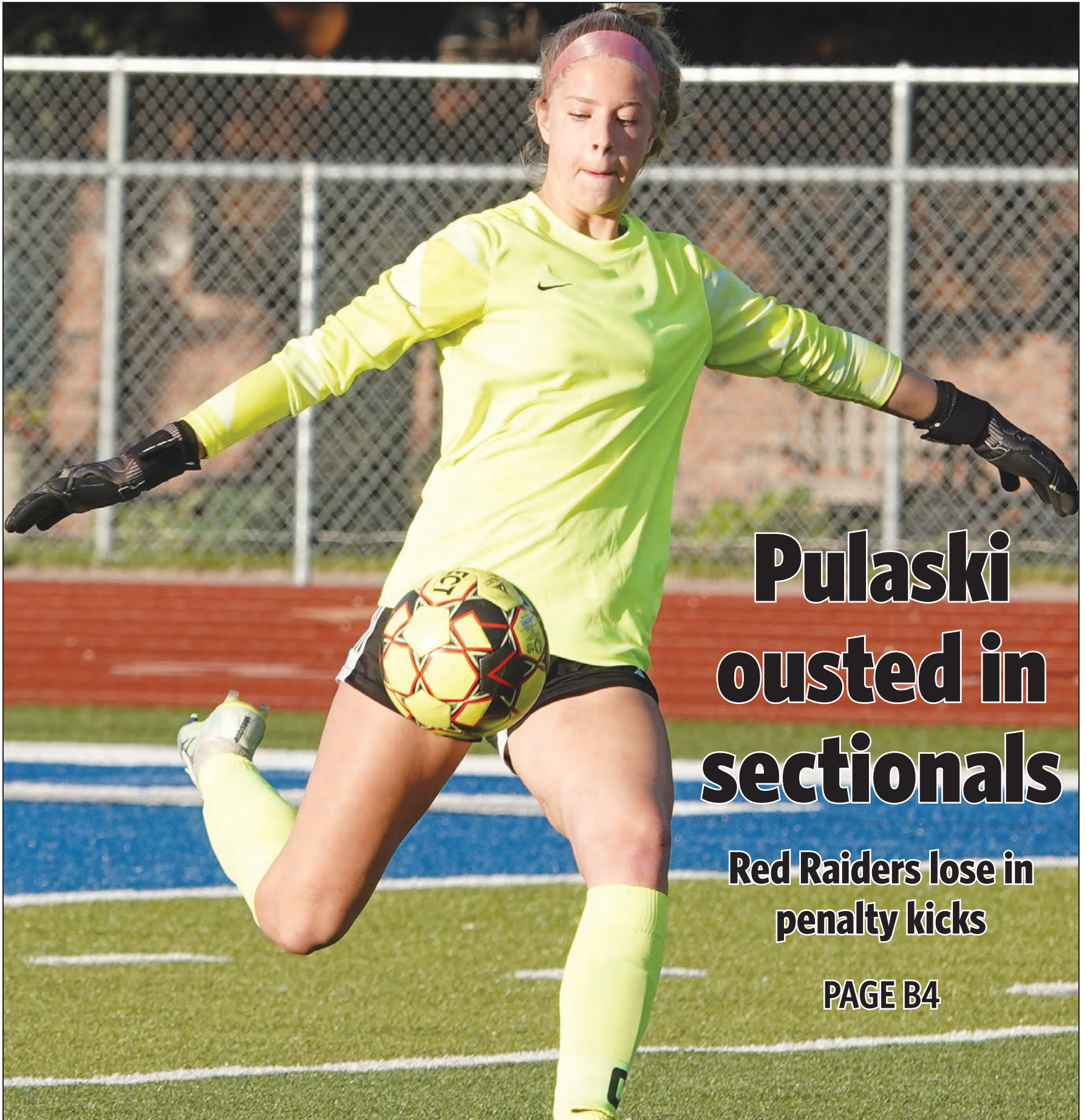

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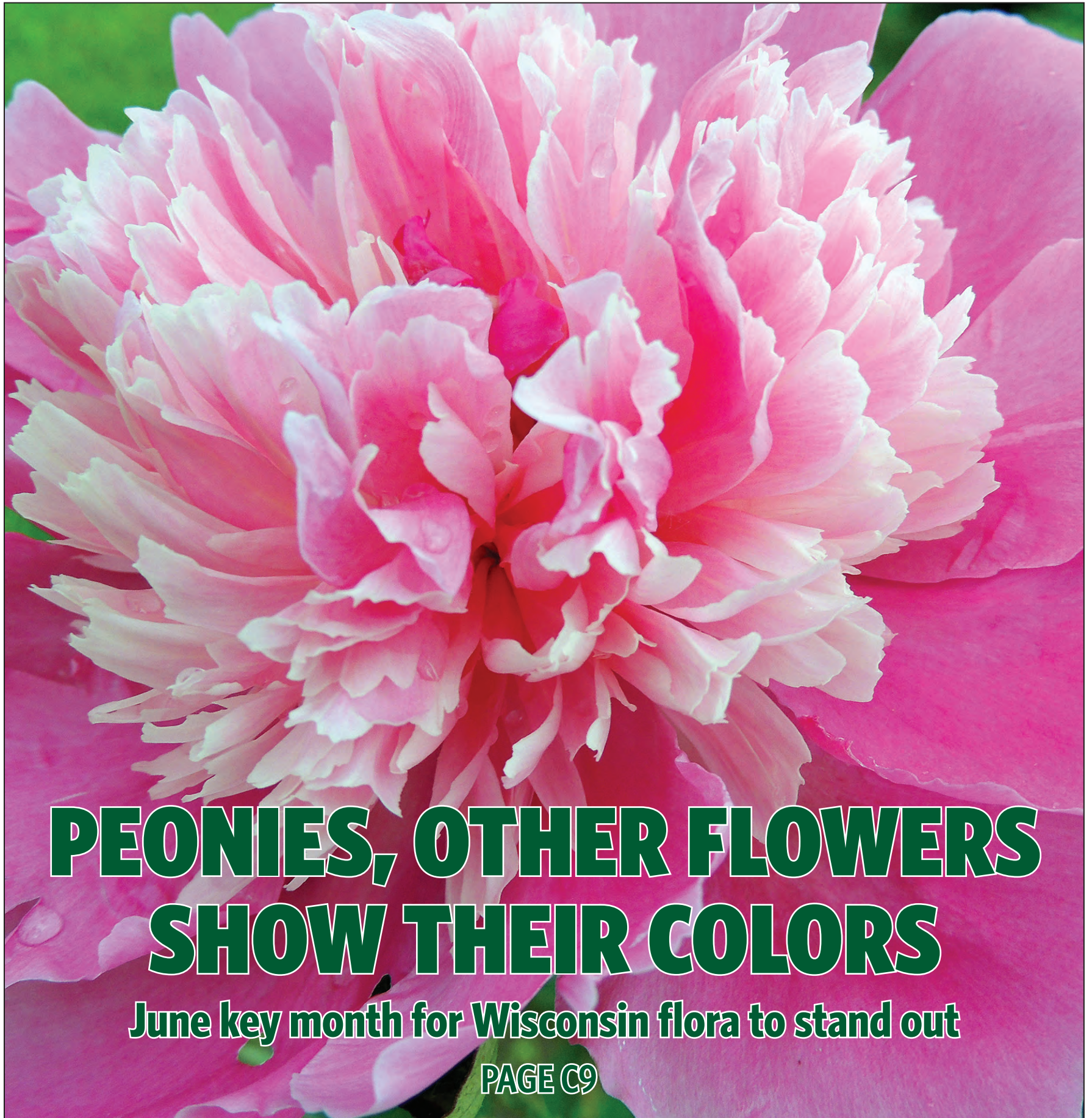
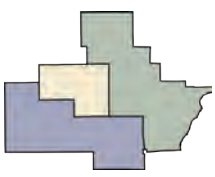

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Enjoy breakfast in an open barn

Brunch on the Farm to be held at Triple D Dairy

A rural Clintonville dairy farm is gearing up for a big day later this month.

The Shawano County Farm Bureau will hold its annual Brunch on the Farm on June 26 at Triple D Dairy. David and Connie Viergutz own and operate the farm with their children, Jacob and Erin, at N12098 County Road D, Clintonville.

"The farm has been in the family 150 years this year," David Viergutz said. "We farm about 1,150 acres of corn, alfalfa and soybeans and milk approximately 500 cows with 500 young stock."

"This is the third time the family has hosted the brunch," Connie Viergutz said. "We did it back in 1989 and 2006, so it's been awhile. We kind of knew in the future that we'd maybe want to do it again. We approached the Shawano County Farm Bureau and said, 'If there's a chance, you need someone and you're looking at this side of Shawano County, keep us in mind.'"

Activities will get going at 7 a.m. with the Dairy Dash and Stroll 5K Run, followed by a Lutheran church service at 7:30 a.m.

Breakfast will be served from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and the menu includes scrambled eggs with diced ham, sausage, hash browns, cheese, cinnamon bread, milk, juice, and an ice cream sundae with strawberries or maple syrup.

"Working with the Farm Bureau trying to organize things has been great," Connie said. "We already keep our farm very clean. A lot of people really like the look of our farm because we keep it up."

David Viergutz grew up involved with the farm from a young age.

"I probably started when I was 8 or

10 years old pushing feed to the cows with a scraper and doing whatever I could at that age," he said. "It kind of progressed from there."

A barn fire in 2020 caused the Viergutzes to consider selling their cows and quitting dairy farming, but they decided to move forward instead.

"We went from 80 cows to 200 and it gradually grew from there," David Viergutz said. "You try to invest in the stuff that's going to help you the most and make you more efficient. About a year and a half ago, we put ear tags on cows to monitor their health. It's like a Fitbit for a cow. It

monitors their temperature, how much they're eating, whether they're sick. That was a real timesaver and a help for the cows. As far as the cropping part of it, we do variable rate spreading as far as fertilizer and planting so we're not wasting any fertilizer or seed. It's a money saver because you're not over-applying."

Jacob and Erin Viergutz graduated from Clintonville High School. Jacob Viergutz recently graduated Fox Valley Technical College's farm industry short course and is back working at the farm. Erin Viergutz is studying elementary education and playing basketball at Concordia University

"Jacob plans to take over the farm, and it all depends on when we're ready," David Viergutz said. "He's a lot more tech-savvy than I am. He easily adapts to the technical part of it more so than I do."

Connie Viergutz is expecting about 4,000 people to show up June 26.

"You will be able walk into one of our freestall barns, and we will have our nutritionist and veterinarian there to answer any questions," she said. "They'll have a petting zoo for kids and other educational things. You'll be able to get on a wagon tour, go through another barn and drive by our new calf barn. The new calf barn is a tremendous, efficient way we've improved a lot of stuff, not just with labor, but with the health of the calves. It really has helped."

The Viergutzes said running a successful family farming operation takes commitment.

"A little bit of luck, a little bit of knowing what you're doing and a lot of understanding of your spouse," David Viergutz said. "You have to give and take and it's a combination of everything. It takes a great commitment because you're on call 24/7 and sometimes, you don't have a lot of time off."

"I don't know if it's the love of the land or the work that we do that keeps family members doing what we're doing. Apparently, we enjoy it. Otherwise, we wouldn't do it."

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Oconto County farms added to century farm list

Wagner, Fosick and Rowell homesteads to be recognized

Three Oconto County homesteads are being added to the state Century Farm and Home roster this summer.

The Century Farm and Home Program began in 1948 in conjunction with the State of Wisconsin's Centennial Celebration. There are currently 9,817 Century Farms and Homes nestled throughout the Badger State. The Sesquicentennial Program similarly originated in 1998 as part of the State's Sesquicentennial Celebration and has since honored 982 families.

To qualify for the award, families are required to provide proof of continuous family ownership of a Wisconsin property for either the last 100 or 150 years.

Oconto County is the home to 109 Century Farms and Homes and three Sesquicentennial properties. As you drive along the country roads, you may come across properties with their century farm or home signs displayed in their yard. Newly designated farms are recognized during the Wisconsin State Fair each year.

The 2022 recipients of the Century award are Troy and Marla Wagner, from the Town of Lena, William Fosick, in the Town of Mountain, and Michael and Lori Rowell, in the Town of Abrams.

Myra Fosick Wyant applied for the award for her father, William. He purchased the land from Holt Lumber Company in 1920. Holt Lumber had built the barn, and 40 feet of the original barn is built with logs. This is a beautiful and well-preserved farm nestled in the woods of Mountain.

When asked why she applied, Fosick Wyant said she wanted to make people aware and to preserve local history. Though she does not have any children, she has many nieces and nephews. The farm is expected to stay in the family.

Troy Wagner grew up spending much time on his grandparents' farm in the Town of Stiles.

He worked and learned from his grandparents as he grew up, and the farm holds a special place in his heart. The farm has been in his family for four generations since 1897.

The Wagners purchased the farm in 2018 and restored the property. The land is currently being farmed. When asked why they applied for the Century Farm award, he said he wanted to honor

his grandparents and preserve the history of the property.

The Rowell Family Farm was settled in 1911 by Michael Rowell's great-grandparents, so he is the fourth generation on the farm. Rowell said he got the farm from his parents in 1983. He had always heard about the Century Farm program and decided to apply last year.

Rowell said he found the application very easy to fill out using his Land Abstract and encourages other to apply. The farm will be going to his nephew, so the fifth generation is secure.

Oconto County is also home to three sesquicentennial farms or 150 years of ownership.

People with property that has been in the family for 100 or 150 years should consider applying for century or sesquicentennial status. FARM LIFE FROM A FARM WIFE

Golf course beckons with a cry of 'Fore!'

"Fore!" The one-word warning was heard loud and clear, most recently on the links of the beautiful 18-hole golf course situated along the pond in scenic Marion. While this particular warning was not voiced (this time) by yours truly, I've been known to holler it every now and again.

Golfing for me was a foreign term, reserved only for those who knew what they were doing, exact opposite of me. Golf etiquette was uncharted territory, so when asked to join a women's golf league way back in the 1970s, I cringed.

From USGA.org, I learned about Francis Quimet, not a "gentleman" but a humble, working-class underdog, never anticipated to win at a game only the rich could afford. Every week, I watched and learned and practice makes perfect. Sort of. Almost weekly, my ball got a bath; there was a hole with not quite a full-length pond placed strategically (i.e. mentally challenging) before the green. During my play, the sound of "Fore!" was heard alongside the splash of "plunk."

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Summer perennials add color to the garden

The rush of May is over, and now the colors of June begin to greet gardeners with their beauty and grace. June begins the abundance of color and bloom that will last into July, August and September. Each month, the colors will grow stronger. Each month, the variety of blooms will increase. For now, we enjoy the colors of June.

Columbine, in all of its forms and colors, is one of my favorites of the June perennials that now put on a spectacular show in gardens and even in our woodlands. Wild native columbine is colored red and yellow and does exceptionally well here in our area

where it grows abundantly among the Navarino sand hills. There are many excellent varieties of garden hybrid columbine that come in practically every color. Striking combinations and massive flower spikes make this a favorite among spring and early summer blooms.

Many of the unique columbines bloom in down-facing form, perfect for hummingbirds to feast upon the rich nectar. Other columbines, especially some of the newer hybrids, bloom facing upward, showcasing the unique, star-shaped pattern of their petals. Other columbines bloom wide open and flat, like a clematis. The colors of columbine make them a favorite among gardeners. Each bloom may be bi-colored in red and white or purple and white or blue and white or solid bright yellow or alpine blue. There are so many wonderful colors to choose from.

Canada anemone is another great early spring summer wildflower, blooming in snow white. These are commonly grown as garden plants for the rich flush of color they give early in the summer. Unlike Japanese anemone that bloom late in fall, these provide an instant burst of brightness early in summer.

Delphinium is another wonderful perennial for late spring and early summer. Tall spires of blooms in shades of blue, purple, pink and white make delphinium a favorite among gardeners, as well as hummingbirds and butterflies that visit our garden beds.

Lupine, both the wild native version as well as garden hybrids, blooms profusely in June. Dense spikes of colorful

blooms, solid colors or bi-colors, make this a favorite. These spikes may reach 18 inches in height or more, making them a striking presence in the garden.

A wide variety of penstemons, or beardtongues, also make their show-stopping appearance during June. There are native penstemons, as well as garden hybrids that do wonderfully in our area. Many are pink or purple

or red in color, while the native tends to be white or light lavender. Like all of these blooms, hummingbirds feast upon the spikes of flowers produced by these perennial plants.

It wouldn't be June without the massive, sweet-scented blooms of bearded iris. Sugary in scent and profuse in bloom, bearded iris do well here in our area especially in sandy

soils. The colors of bearded iris vary from near black to pure white and everything in between.

Oriental poppies are another showpiece plant for June bloom. Often, these may reach 6 inches across in the good hybrids and feature blooms in bright orange, pink, purple, watermelon, white and red.

The baptisias, or false indigo, are another exceptional group of perennial plants for June. Many of these are quite large, as large as any bush, growing 4-5 feet high and wide when in full spike. Baptisias have colorful blooms that are available in shades of yellow, blue, pink, purple — even a series of fancy, chocolate-colored baptisias.

Visit your local garden center and add some of these beautiful early summer perennials to your landscape. While we wait for the prairie plants of July and August, these colorful beauties offer ornamental value, as well as great value to birds, butterflies and pollinators.
