\$37.63M referendum goes to Oconto Falls voters

School district seeks new middle school, secure entries, roof repair

The Oconto Falls School Board on Aug. 22 gave final approval to placing a scaled-back referendum question on the Nov. 8 ballot to build a new middle school and bolster security at the entrances to all school district buildings.

The \$37.63 million question also includes overdue roof repairs, especially at Oconto Falls Elementary School, a 30-year-old building that still has its original roof.

Voters in April rejected a \$49.9 million referendum that had at its centerpiece a \$31 million middle school to replace aging Washington Middle School. Surveys and community comment showed public support for the middle school project but more reluctance over several of the additional projects, such as a new drop-off area at OFES and a new cafeteria at Abrams Elementary School.

Those extras are removed from the new question, which the citizen planning committee introduced to the board Aug. 8. The board took a couple

of weeks to review the proposal and seek input from the public.

"I'm glad we took the extra two weeks to get community feedback," said board member Bryan Baumier. "It helped frame a decision in my mind on how to move forward with this."

Board member Jan Stranz said the data in the surveys was important, but she was impressed by what respondents said in the individual comments.

"I was really pleased with the amount of information that people were willing to share," Stranz said. "I think that shows an engagement."

Board member Sarah Schindel said she had several people question why the district was asking for roof repair dollars when they were already included in past referendums. Schindel said the board needs to be "crystal clear exactly how much of the roofs we're doing" so the public understands the referendum only includes the roofs that are in serious need of replacement.

Board member Adam Adler said the other needs remain, but the new question borrows for only the absolute necessities.

"We've pretty much whittled down to the middle school and some absolute necessities with the secure entrances — and even with the secure entrances those have been scaled back to just changing how the doors and entry systems work," Adler said.

Baumier said the community made it clear that the core issue is replacing the middle school.

"Duct tape and Band-Aids isn't going to work if we're here to be fiscally responsible. You can't go much further with that building the way it is," Baumier said. "So we're getting the main thing, which is the new middle school, and the next biggest thing is the safety of our students. And then if we want to take care of our current investments, the buildings, take care of the roofs."

The public can rally around those three key issues, he said.

The board unanimously approved a resolution calling for a referendum on the proposed issuance of general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed of \$37.63 million.

He officially began working for the Suring school district on Aug. 22. The Suring School Board thanked the staff that assisted with the interview process, along with CESA 8, which facilitated the superintendent search.

Orlich succeeds Todd Carlson, who served as interim superintendent after the departure of Kelly Casper in a controversy over student searches.

David Honish, administrator of CESA 8 in Gillett, said four candidates were interviewed for the Suring position. The others were Samuel Engelland, activities/athletic director at the Hortonville School District; Wayne Johnson, a retired superintendent; and Linda Layer, grant director at the Sparta Area School District.

County passed over for national research reserve

Selection would have put Oconto County in the running to secure a major research facility

Oconto County officials were surprised to learn Aug. 23 that estuaries in the county have not been recommended as part of a new National Estuarine Research Reserve (NERR) in the Green Bay coastal area of Lake Michigan.

The announcement had been expected following an Oconto County Board resolution Aug. 18 in support of locating a NERR in the county.

"I thought we made a strong case," Oconto Mayor John Panetti said. "This is very disappointing."

Panetti and clean water activist Steve Heimerman appeared before the county board to explain the process prior to a unanimous vote of support.

The designation would have opened the door to federally funded research into the estuaries — the site where a river enters a lake — for the Oconto and Pensaukee rivers.

A river brings oxygen, current and nutrients into a lake, Heimerman told the county board.

"Unfortunately, it brings in pollutants, sediments and other problems, too," he said. "So studying what happens in this area is very critical to keeping the entire ecosystem healthy."

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) has established 30 NERRs around the country, most of them in salt-water locations on the coasts, but they have also been established along Lakes Superior, Ontario and Erie, Heimer-

man said.

The University of Wisconsin-Green Bay is working with NOAA to establish the new estuarine research reserve, and nine sites along the bay had been identified as candidates. The Peshtigo River, lower Green Bay and Sturgeon Bay were announced as recommendations Aug. 23.

According to materials provided

to the County Board by UWGB, each NERR site provides a "living laboratory" in which scientists and educators conduct research, outreach, and education regarding estuarine-based natural resources.

At the heart of the effort is the fact that creation of a NERR brings with it the establishment of a local research facility, including a visitor and infor-

mation center, a testing facility with lab and a \$1 million annual operating budget, six full-time staff, and the potential to attract hundreds of thousands of dollars in grants for research, Panetti said.

The facility site would be chosen in 2024 and begin operations in 2026, he said.

"The NERR facility is the golden nugget," Panetti said. "Becoming a research reserve is nice and it's important, but getting the facility is the critical element."

Green Bay is considered the largest fresh-water estuary in the world, and the research and learning center has the potential to attract visitors from around the world, and so local officials are very interested in locating the center in Oconto County, Panetti said.

Public hearings on the site selection committee's recommendation are scheduled for Sept. 7-8, the first day on the UW-Green Bay campus and the second day virtually. Panetti said he plans to testify in favor of the Oconto County sites.

"We're not going to quit, and we'll keep trying," he said.

City Council approves establishment of Main Street redevelopment district

Private, public sector aim to work together to improve downtown Oconto Falls

The Oconto Falls Main Street Committee got down to business Aug. 23 after the City Council approved the boundaries of a zone where the public and private sectors plan to work together on downtown revitalization.

The council also accepted a draft redevelopment plan for the zone, which covers an area of North Main Street roughly from just north of Caldwell Avenue to just south of Central Avenue.

Several business owners came to an Aug. 22 public hearing to query city officials about any plans for their specific properties, but City Administrator Peter Wills and Kristen Fish-Peterson, principal and CEO of consulting firm Redevelopment Resources, said it would be up to the committee to recommend changes.

Fish-Peterson said her company's study identified a number of chal-

lenges to downtown revitalization, including vacant storefronts, a number of buildings that are being used in ways that don't conform to zoning, several "non-interested" property owners who are letting

their buildings go and the need for "a road map for revitalization."

The draft plan's goals are increasing economic development, attracting businesses downtown, increasing the tax base and reducing the number of non-productive properties, blight elimination and code enforcement, Fish-Peterson said.

The consultant's study, funded with a USDA grant to the city, showed that about one-third of the properties in the target area are parking lots, vacant, nonconforming or underutilized.

"Those buildings have a higher and better use," she said. "You have at least 10 vacant storefronts. If you could fill those, it'd be awesome."

Supporters of the effort said improving Oconto Falls' downtown area will be a slow process that needs the cooperation of the private and public sectors. Wills cited Green Bay's Broadway district as an example of how an area can slowly change for the better.

Elizabeth Holman, a committee member and Oconto County Board supervisor, said the City of Oconto has made strides to improve its downtown area in recent years, and she would like to see similar progress in Oconto Falls, adding that some absentee landlords are contributing to the downtown issues.

"It's just that there's people on Main Street who aren't from Oconto Falls, and to me it's like they don't care. They're taking their income from their apartments or this or that, and they just don't care, and it's disheartening," Holman said. "We

live here. We want to see a beautiful (downtown), and we all have to work together and get it done, and it needs to be done."

Barb Salscheider, a downtown business owner and active main street committee member, said as the city and business owners invest in improvements, it will have a domino effect.

"Keep coming to meetings if you want to see what the next step will be. Because we're going to keep having meetings, and we're not going to quit, and we're going to keep going forward," Salscheider said. "Let's keep on and bring our Main Street back to what it used to look like. That's what we need."

The city council unanimously approved the map of the redevelopment district and agreed to review the zoning code and compliance issues, while investigating financial resources to help business owners improve and repair their buildings.

Fire station proposal moves forward

Oconto Falls Fire Department to move into new quarters by end of 2024

The Oconto Falls City Council approved rezoning Aug. 22 that will permit construction of a new fire station on the south end of Memorial Park after a public hearing.

The state Department of Administration earlier this summer allocated \$7 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act dollars under a short timetable that required return of a signed grant agreement by Aug. 25.

Fire Chief Tim Magnin said the goals of the project as listed in the grant application include the need for more space for equipment and offices, the ability to use the building as a community shelter if necessary, larger meeting rooms to accommodate the

growing volunteer force, and a location that allows for better response times.

The city has contracted with Five Bugles Design to deliver a conceptual design by Sept. 30 and schematic drawings by Nov. 15. The plan is to break ground in spring 2023 and move into the new building by the end of 2024.

Neighbors shared several concerns about the site — at the intersection of Chestnut and Union avenues and Columbia Street — during an informational session on Aug. 11. Among those concerns were the danger of collisions with fire trucks exiting onto the street and how the city will adjust its snow removal plans, since that area is currently used to pile snow during the winter.

Rob Krzyzanowski, client sector leader for Five Bugles Design, said now that the site is approved, "we'll put more pencils down" and take care of some of those concerns. One option is to erect flashing lights that would be activated to alert drivers that the trucks were responding to an emergency.

One person at the public hearing noted that the fire station will cut off the south end of the old track and asked if the city would remove the track altogether. City Administrator Peter Wills responded that public input will be sought on the future of Memorial Park.

Alderman Mat McDermid noted that a master plan for the park was developed a few years ago. That plan has been disrupted first by recon-

struction of the main ball diamond and now the fire station, sending the city back to the drawing board.

Krzyzanowski said Five Bugles Design can help with park planning, too.

"I mean, we master-plan entire sites all the time," he said. "The fire station is one thing that we do, but we can ultimately go into those other spaces and conceptually give you ideas on what those areas could look like, and implement them for years down the road or next week. We can plan around that a little more as we get started."

The motion to rezone a small parcel of land and enable the project passed 5-1, with Alderman Ashley Bahrke dissenting.

Oconto Falls trail cleanup to begin in earnest

Crews from Frank's Logging of Peshtigo were expected to begin work in Oconto Falls starting Aug. 22, clearing downed trees from the fitness trail and tubing hill area.

A severe thunderstorm roared through the area June 15, leaving hundreds without power and knocking down trees — especially in the woods near River Island Golf Course, where the trail and tubing hill are located.

During the Aug. 16 meeting of the Oconto Falls City Council, Alderman Devin Wirtz said Frank's Logging was in town working at the Howard Eslien property, and a supervisor came over to the trail to take a look at the damage.

The company offered to clear trees that were lying on the ground, snapped off or hanging in a dangerous position, at no cost to the city, Wirtz said. Frank's expects to recover its financial investment by selling the wood for lumber, he said.

The street department has already

been through the area clearing the road to the tubing hill shelter, City Administrator Peter Wills said.

Wirtz said once Frank's Logging has completed its work, he and other volunteers with the Oconto Falls Area Cycling Coalition planned to go through the trails picking up remaining sticks, branches and other debris.

"I guess our main focus is to get the main trail ready for the Run For the Trails at the end of September," Wirtz said, as well as the third annual Fatty in the Falls fat bike races this winter.

The eighth annual Run for the Trails half-marathon, 10K and 5K races are scheduled for Sept. 24. Proceeds from this event go to the fund to create and maintain a recreational trail system throughout the Oconto Falls area.

The races begin at ST Paper Stadium and lead runners through wooded trails, scenic neighborhood roads and riverfront views. For information, visit ocontofallschamber.com and scroll down to the Run for the Trails link.

Bus route reduction leads to crossing guard talks

The Oconto Falls School District and the city of Oconto Falls are in talks about possibly sharing the cost of hiring more crossing guards, in the wake of the district's decision to stop offering bus service to students who live within a mile of school.

The school board made the move last month after months of futile attempts to hire more school bus drivers. Faced with the prospect of starting the 2022-23 school year short at least one driver, the board suspended the route for students who live within a mile of a central point between Oconto Falls Elementary and High schools and Washington Middle School.

City Administrator Peter Wills told the city council Aug. 16 that the decision affects about 148 students.

"At this point, they're trying to evaluate before school starts, surveying the families who are impacted as to how many are actually going to be walking versus vehicles," Wills said. "They're evaluating that before talking about adding more crossing guards."

The situation probably calls for more warning signs, and the district offered to pay half the cost of any new guards at key intersections, he said.

The council passed a motion authorizing Wills to arrange for the necessary signage and continue talks with the school district as needed.

Peterson takes library job in Oconto

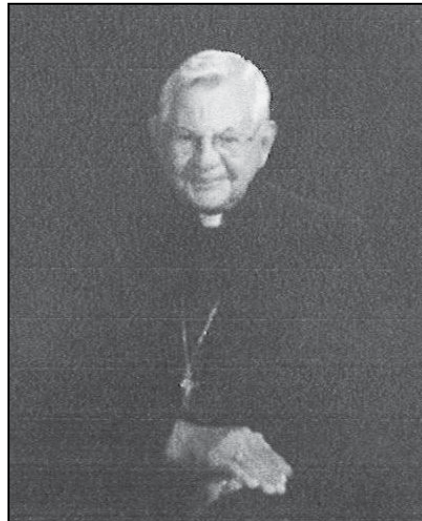
Wilbert H.C. Winkler

"Wink," as he was known to his friends, was born to Albert and Elsa Kohls Winkler in Gillett on May 27, 1933. The eldest of five children, he came from humble beginnings on a dairy farm. He dreamed of a career in veterinary medicine, but God had other plans for him. Wink graduated from Gillett High School in 1951, then attended Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa, majoring in German and graduating in 1955. He went on to study at the Evangelical Lutheran Theological Seminary (now Trinity Seminary), where he earned his Master of Divinity in 1958.



Curiosity always pushed him to continue learning, and over his lifetime he earned degrees from The Ohio State University (sociology and criminology), Michigan State University (studies in religious leadership and literature), University of Wisconsin-Madison (German), Winona State College (education) and Covington Theological Seminary (Doctor of Sacred Theology, with concentration in Old Testament and Hebrew). Later in life, he also earned certification as an EKG technician and phlebotomist.

He also shared his love of learning with others, teaching high school and university classes in German, as well as many adult Bible study classes on his book, "The

Book of Jonah, the Runaway Prophet," and numerous other topics.

Wink served Lutheran congregations in North Dakota, Ohio, Wisconsin and Florida, from 1958 to 1990. While serving in Ohio, he joined the Air Force Reserves, becoming the TDY Air Force Chaplain at Lockbourne Air Force Base in Ohio. After retiring from the ministry, he joined the Air Force Civil Air Patrol, rising to the rank of major.

Wink had a variety of interests throughout his life. He loved to travel the United States and worldwide, even co-owning a travel agency for a time along with his wife, Judith, and their youngest daughter. He had a special talent for learning languages and was always interested in adding to his knowledge. Wink was introduced to the science of embalming in mid-life and was often called to help at area funeral homes.

Wink met his first wife, Judith C. Berndt Winkler, at Wartburg College. They were married for 47 years, and together they raised three children — Deborah Winkler Stokes of Bloomington, Illinois, Mark Winkler (Carol) of Deland, Florida, and Sara Winkler Rittersbach (George) of Stuart, Florida.

He enjoyed six grandchildren, Collin Stokes (Ashley) of Chatsworth, Illinois, Nicole Klemp (Tim) of Jacksonville, Florida, Leah Stokes (Enrique Palma) of Orlando,

Florida, Benjamin Winkler (Isaac) of Minneapolis, Minnesota, Tess Rittersbach of Queens, New York, and James Rittersbach of Port Orange, Florida. He was also great-grandfather to Tearson and Aidison Stokes, Karina Palma and Anna and Madison Klemp.

His family was very happy when he found love a second time with Judy Sposato. They married on Aug. 16, 2003, and Wink was always proud to call her two sons, Scott Sposato (Helene) and Andrew Sposato, his own and he loved their children, Brook Simmons, T.J. Simmons, Joshua Sposato (Makaylah) and Jaytaylor Sposato, as is own. He enjoyed being great-grandpa to Braydon, Vander and Capri Sposato.

Judy was his best friend, and she became his loving caregiver over the last few years. She taught Wink to relax and enjoy retirement, and he truly did. He learned to cook and smoke meats, and these he did with a passion, even developing his own spice blend that was sought after by restaurants, along with his signature smoked bacon.

MenominiyoU becomes beacon for tribe

Language classes during pandemic help to reignite love for ancient tongue

Efforts to reclaim Menominee language and culture were born out of the recent coronavirus pandemic, and one program is seeking to teach it to the adults currently part of the tribe.

MenominiyoU sees a sickness on the reservation, according to Ron Corn Jr., one of its founders, and language is the cure, he revealed during a Wisconsin Act 31 event Aug. 18 at Menominee Casino Resort. The program started as an online language classroom through Zoom, since people could not meet face-to-face for much of 2020 on the reservation.

"Nobody knew what was going on, and things were touch-and-go for a little bit," Corn said about the early days of the pandemic. "It was a little bit scary, watching it come across the ocean, and the next thing you know, they're shutting down schools. That's when I knew something was going on."

There are more than 9,000 enrolled Menominee tribal members, but less than 0.0006% are first-language Menominee speakers, making the tribal tongue an endangered language. When the pandemic brought his work life to a halt, Corn knew the time was right to reverse the trend and keep the language from fading into the mists of history.

He and a friend, Burton Waupoose, who is the executive director for MenominiyoU, had been discussing doing something that reintegrated the Menominee language, but finding time to do it was a factor. That changed when the pandemic shut down everything.

"We were talking on the phone, and he was like, 'If we were ever going to do this, all this stuff we've been talking about, now is probably the time. If we don't do it now, we may never do it,'" Corn said. "It started out simply as creating an online platform to teach and learn and communicate in the Menominee language."

Although the primary purpose was the language reintegration, the MenominiyoU group on Zoom quickly

became a family, Corn said.

"I was taken at what that social connectivity meant, to be seeing and talking to people," Corn said. "The language seemed to be getting transmitted, even though it was digital. We did it a couple of times, and then we realized, 'Whoa, we may be really on to something here.'"

Once realizing the potential for reigniting an almost-dead language, it became a beacon for the Menominee tongue, Corn said.

"On reservations, we have a few holes in the canoe," Corn said. "There are needs; not just one need, but there's lots of needs in our community."

He noted there are a lot of social ills like alcoholism, drug addiction and domestic violence that plague reservations, and he believes the return to Menominee ways — including speaking the language — can serve as the medicine that saves the people.

Corn noted that he didn't have an education beyond high school, and he opted to study the Menominee language, culture and history instead. Even though modern society frowns on not pursuing higher education, he said, being able to develop Meno-

miniyoU because of his alternative study is just as rewarding to him.

"That's worth fighting for, to me," Corn said. "The language hasn't had safe space for a long time. From 1887, when John Adams declared no Indian talk at the schools as a means of assimilation and knowing that allowing us to keep speaking the language we would never fully assimilate, we have not had safe space since."

Now, MenominiyoU has eight staff members eager to keep efforts going. In the summers of 2021 and 2022, the organization has conducted youth immersion programs to get younger generations involved. That effort has helped to form a new charter school the Menominee Indian School District is starting in September, which will incorporate Menominee language and culture.

MenominiyoU has helped Michael Waupoose, formerly working for the tribe to help children in crisis and provide youth services, find a renewed focus. Now the organization's director of operations, Waupoose said the pandemic showed something was missing in his life. Being able to speak his people's language again was, as Corn had said, the medicine

Waupoose needed.

"Typical Menominee, I was late," Waupoose said. "They were about six months into their first cohort, and I just sent a simple message online asking if they had any language resources for me. I got a message back asking if I had anything going on in a half-hour, saying 'We're having a Zoom meeting, but if you like, you can join.'"

Waupoose said his experience as a participant gives him a unique perspective, and having the language back has really helped his life.

Corn noted that he has a 4-year-old grandson who is already a bilingual learner. However, the language cannot thrive until everyone is able to speak it again, he said.

"At the end of the day, it makes no difference if Ron Corn knows every single word in the Menominee language. That doesn't save the language at all," Corn said. "Language cannot be revitalized without you, and that's the message we want to leave with you. Be a part of something bigger than yourselves, and get that language back into the community."

Daily check-in services for seniors living alone

Dear Savvy Senior,

Can you recommend any services that check in on elderly seniors who live alone? I live about 200 miles from my 82-year-old mother and worry about her falling or getting ill and not being able to call for help.

Dear Worrywart,

There are actually several different types of check-in services, along with some simple technology devices that can help keep your mom safe at home while providing you some peace of mind. Here are some top options to look into.

• **Check-in app:** If your mom uses a smartphone, a great solution to help ensure her safety is Snug (www.snugsafe.com), a free app that would check in on her every day to confirm she's OK. This app is used by thousands of elderly seniors who live alone and want to make sure that if something happens to them, their loved ones will be notified quickly so they can receive help in minutes, rather than days.

Here's how it works. After down-

loading the app, your mom will choose what time(s) throughout the day she'd like for Snug to check in. Snug will send a push notification at those times asking your mom to check in by tapping the big green check button on her smartphone screen. If she doesn't check in within 10 minutes or respond after multiple pings, Snug will notify her emergency contacts and share her last known location so that she can receive fast help.

For extra peace of mind, your mom can purchase Snug's premium plan (\$10 per month) where, in addition to notifying her emergency contacts, Snug will request an in-person wellness check by a police officer who will visit her house to confirm she's OK and provide assistance as needed. The app works with iPhone and Android smartphones.

loading the app, your mom will choose what time(s) throughout the day she'd like for Snug to check in. Snug will send a push notification at those times asking your mom to check in by tapping the big green check button on her smartphone screen. If she doesn't check in within 10 minutes or respond after multiple pings, Snug will notify her emergency contacts and share her last known location so that she can receive fast help.

• **Check-in calls:** If your mom doesn't use a smartphone, another option to help ensure her safety is a daily check-in call service program. These are telephone reassurance programs usually run by police or sheriff's departments in hundreds of counties across the country and are usually provided free of charge.

Here's how they work. A computer automated phone system would call your mom at a designated time each day to check in. If she answers, the system will assume everything is OK. If she didn't pick up or if the call goes to voicemail after repeated tries, you (or whoever her designee is) would get a notification call. If you are not reachable, calls are then made to backup people who've also agreed to check on your mom, if necessary.

The fallback is, if no one can be reached, the police or other emergency services personnel will be dispatched to her home.

To find out if this service is available in your mom's community, call her local police department's non-

emergency number. You should also check with the area agency on aging in your mom's area — call 800-677-1116 for contact information.

• **Technology devices:** You may also want to invest in some simple technology aids to keep your mom safe. One of the most commonly used devices for this is a medical alert system that costs about \$1 per day. These systems come with a wearable "help button" that would allow her to call for help 24/7.

Another option that's becoming increasingly popular is smart speakers, like Amazon Alexa or Google Home. These devices work with third-party applications — Ask-MyBuddy.net and MySOSFamily.com — that would let your mom call multiple emergency contacts with a simple verbal command.

Be sure to check out Amazon's Alexa Together ([Amazon.com/AlexaTogether](https://www.amazon.com/AlexaTogether)), a new \$20 monthly subscription service that helps families support and keep tabs on their older loved ones who live alone through an Alexa-enabled device.

Private companies to provide speech services

Director claims former employee's 'warnings' scaring off pathologists

The Shawano School District is not going to be able to fill all of its vacant speech pathologist positions and will instead have to turn to private sector companies to fill the mandated services needed.

Tom Deschant, pupil services director, told the Shawano School Board on Aug. 22 that the necessity would not be as great if a former employee hadn't "warned" a prospective candidate for one of the vacancies about the current employee atmosphere in the district.

Dot Com Therapy will be providing online speech pathologist services to about 125 students within the district, while MJ Care, based in New Berlin, will be providing in-person services to another 45 students who have issues that online services can't resolve, according to Deschant.

"A lot of thought goes into this," Deschant said. "I know that each of our board members want what is best for our students."

Dot Com Therapy will be charging \$2,712 per student for its services, for a total cost of \$339,036 to the district. MJ Care is offering in-person services at a rate of \$78

per hour, including an overtime charge of 1½ times the hourly rate, as well as a mileage rate of 50 cents per mile.

Deschant claimed the private sector contracts were necessary due to what he described were "personal attacks" and "complaints formed in misinformation." He noted the concerning behavior has come out of public forums and comments, and he claimed the guidelines for public comments were not being adhered to.

"The negative things, they need to go through the proper channels," Deschant said.

He noted that he received an email from someone who was offered a position in the district who ultimately declined to take the job. Deschant, reading from the email, said that the applicant had been contacted by a former employee who gave a "strong warning" about working in the district, and the applicant was hesitant to come to Shawano.

"That person also reached out to a person who did accept the position," Deschant said. "That reaching out is going to cost the district \$40,000. That's money that could have went to other things like staff trainings."

School districts are mandated to provide speech and language pathology services, whether there is sufficient staff or not, to students who have an individual education plan (IEP). With the first day of school coming next week, Deschant said the contracted pathologists were the only option to keep Shawano out of mediation with the

Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction.

"I kept the positions open as long as possible in order to try to get people here, but it's a very hard position to fill," Deschant said. "I can tell you, looking at the private sector, it's a hard game there, as well."

Deschant did not name the person who allegedly warned the applicant about the work environment, but Erin Davids, a pathologist who left the district earlier in the summer, posted on the Facebook site for Citizens Listening and Advocating for Shawano Schools, that she was getting messages and texts about Deschant's claims and refuted them.

"I never spoke to the speech therapist who verbally accepted and then declined the job. I don't even know his/her name," Davids wrote. "The one speech therapist I have spoken to reached out to me and she accepted the job."

Although the contracts were approved unanimously, board member Mart Grams had strong reservations about having the bulk of students with IEPs getting services virtually instead of face to face. He noted that he received those services when he was in junior high and credited them for making him who he is today.

"They cannot be in front of a screen, and if you can't find somebody, we need to raise the ante," Grams said. "Yes, the private sector gets paid more, but they're well-trained. I'm willing to pay them \$100,000 before I pay anyone else \$100,000, because those services are

essential."

Deschant said the district had utilized Dot Com last year, so there was experience with the company.

Board member Jeana Winslow was concerned about whether the method of service that the two companies provide would be comparable, or whether the students receiving the virtual care would be negatively impacted.

Deschant claimed it would be equal, saying that every pathologist contracted is licensed in the field.

"Their methodologies are sound," he said. "We're not talking about them sitting on a screen and doing a program. They have a live person that's behind that screen. They're getting anything that any other student would get."

Kris Going, a former instructional coach for the district, expressed concern about the additional costs, noting that a staff member would need to be in the room with the student receiving the virtual services, especially those in the lower grades.

"I think you might need a person to facilitate that kid in front of a computer," Going said.

Deschant said that the district would have a paraprofessional accompany students to the room where the virtual services would be administered, the same as what was done last year.

The contracts can be terminated with 90 days notice. Deschant said the district is going to keep the vacant positions open in the hopes of finding candidates to conduct in-person pathology services.

On Aug. 15, Hauer said that she received a call from Russ Gehm, Bonduel Village president, who said the building was taken off the market.

"He said that it is no longer for sale and that the library can continue operating," said Hauer.

Judge gives Wilson more time to find defender

Green Bay held on \$1,000 cash bond after drug arrest

Chevalier charged with possession of methamphetamine, narcotic drugs, drug paraphernalia, bail jumping

A Green Bay man was recently charged with a handful of criminal charges stemming from an Aug. 16 incident.

Louis J. Chevalier, 31, was charged Aug. 18 with one count of possession of methamphetamine, one count of possession of narcotic drugs, four counts of bail jumping and one misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia.

If convicted, Chevalier faces fines of \$10,000 and 3½ years in prison for

possession of methamphetamine and possession of narcotic drugs, \$10,000 in fines and six years for each bail jumping charge, and \$500 in fines and 30 days for possession of drug paraphernalia.

In the criminal complaint, a Shawano County sheriff's deputy responded to the area of County Road HH and Pioneer Drive in Wescott after Menominee Tribal Police allegedly pursued a vehicle to Shawano County. When arriving at the house, the deputy saw a vehicle present and used a K-9 unit to sniff the driver's seat. Another deputy had allegedly

seen a smoking device in plain view in the vehicle.

The owner of the residence gave law enforcement permission to search their house. After Chevalier was taken into custody, a search of the vehicle allegedly found a cut pen with a black residue on the inside. Police also allegedly found "a large sum of cash."

When searching the bedroom that Chevalier was in, law enforcement allegedly found the top to a metal container next to the bed, which contained a white, powder substance on it. The deputy searching the room, also allegedly found the container,

which allegedly had "a significant amount of white powder" inside, according to the complaint.

The deputy then tested the powder in the container, which came back to allegedly test positive for fentanyl. According to the criminal complaint, the net weight of the powder was 1.06 grams. The smoking device was tested and came back positive for methamphetamine. Finally, after counting the cash, deputies concluded that there was \$1,720 total.

Annie's Campground sold for \$2.05M

Positive Ventures from Appleton submits winning bid

Annie's Campground west of Gresham will be under new ownership after the Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court approved the sale of the property to Positive Ventures LLC, based in Appleton.

The sale was finalized Aug. 23 after Judge Katherine Sloma approved Positive Ventures' bid for over \$2.05 million. There were nine sealed bids total for the property, according to attorney Seth Dizard, who has been the receiver for the property since May.

In a report to the court, Dizard wrote that there were 128 separate expressions of interest, and out of those, 90 executed confidentiality agreements. The bids ranged from \$527,777 to \$2.5 million.

The \$2.5 million bid came from Bob and Geri Enterprises LLC, which owns the Black Otter Supper Club in Hortonville. However, according to the report, the officials did not present evidence of its ability to pay for the sale by the deadline of Aug. 19, so the next best offer was Positive Ventures.

The campground was put into receivership April 25 after Bank First reported that it was owed about \$1.5 million, excluding collection costs and attorney fees. Since then, Dizard paid past-due property taxes of over \$25,000 to the Town of Seneca, which were the taxes due in 2020 and 2021, along with getting extensions from the state to prevent the campground from being closed due to the lack of a seller's permit and three failed inspections.

The campground had been owned by Ann Retzlaff, who is charged with fleeing and eluding officers and two counts of second-degree recklessly endangering safety from the 2021 incident, as well as a misdemeanor count of resisting or obstructing an officer. She also faces misdemeanor

charges through Menominee County for resisting and failing to stop.

When arrested again on April 20 in Wittenberg, the Shawano-Menominee County District Attorney's office filed felony and misdemeanor counts of bail jumping for not appearing in court in November 2021. Retzlaff is also facing two misdemeanor counts of disorderly conduct during her arrest and her subsequent processing in the jail.

In the criminal case, Retzlaff has claimed she was rescuing an employee from an alleged sex trafficking operation on the Menominee Reservation when law enforcement from two counties tried to pull her over in May 2021. Since initial charges were filed, Retzlaff has skipped court appearances and had bench warrants taken out against her, the latest of which put her in the Shawano County Jail in April of this year, when Marathon County Judge Mark Moran ordered she be held on a \$25,000 cash bond, which was later reduced to \$15,000.

Retzlaff posted bail in early August, and shortly after her release, Dizard filed a restraining order

against her, claiming she entered the property without permission and could potentially disrupt the operation of the campground.

A man stood up in the gallery at the hearing, claiming he was representing Annie's Campground, but Sloma immediately rebuffed his request to approach and speak.

Sloma said at the beginning of the hearing that Retzlaff has filed for Chapter 7 bankruptcy and claimed the campground is still hers, but Sloma reiterated that the court's position is that Retzlaff and the campground are different entities because the bankruptcy was filed after the campground went into receivership. She said only licensed attorneys representing the campground could be part of the hearing.

Dizard said that he and an attorney with Bank First had come to an agreement that any surplus money left after paying back the bank and other entities will be held in trust until the bankruptcy proceedings commence.

Cleanup continues from 2019 windstorm

Jones Spring Recreation Area remains closed, but most campgrounds stayed open

Imagine a line of logging trucks stretching from the Town of Lakewood to Decatur, Alabama.

Those trucks would hold just under 300 million board feet of timber. That's how much has been salvaged so far following a July 19, 2019, windstorm that caused extensive damage to more than 100,000 acres of northern Wisconsin's Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest.

Much of that damage occurred in the forest's Lakewood-Laona Ranger District, where John Lampereur is stationed as a silviculturist.

The storm has since been classified as a derecho — a widespread, straight-line windstorm associated with a fast-moving group of severe thunderstorms.

"A typical summertime front goes from west to east; a derecho turns 90 degrees and it runs through an area kind of like a freight train would," Lampereur said. "It just keeps coming and coming. It's very common for them to be 400 miles to as much as 1,000 miles long. This one actually came out of the Dakotas."

"It hit about 286,000 acres across Wisconsin and for the longest time, we weren't able to accurately determine exactly how many acres were impacted," he said. "It actually took quite a few weeks before we had enough aerial photo coverage, satellite imagery and interpretation work to figure it out. We had about 130,000 acres of the national forest that were impacted, and there was a lot of county, state and private lands around that were also affected."

Cleanup efforts began shortly after the storm ended.

"The top priorities were public safety and the safety of our employees," Lampereur said. "The first efforts were reopening roads and trails. We're talking hundreds of miles of roads that were bottled shut — in some cases, miles of roads of continuous timber 10 to 15 feet deep. Our sawyers were able to open most of the roads with chain saws in the first months. Opening the more heavily blocked

roads was more of a job for heavy equipment and logging contractors with processors. Some of those roads took almost a month to reopen."

Another challenge was getting an accurate assessment of the damage, according to Lampereur.

"After getting satellite imagery and aerial photography, it took many weeks of painstaking photo interpretation to identify areas of heavy, moderate and light damage," he said. "In the end, we determined that there were about 130,000 acres impacted, with about 60,000 acres having greater than 25% damage."

The storm's aftermath can still be seen along County Road T south of the Town of Townsend in northern Oconto County. The storm hit Boot Lake Campground and the adjacent Jones Spring Recreation Area. The campground remained closed for the rest of 2019, but reopened in 2020.

Jones Spring, however, remains closed to the public.

"Boot Lake Campground was heavily damaged," Lampereur said. "The weekend of the storm, it was almost fully occupied, but a lot of

people that saw the storm coming got out of there. The day after the storm, our saw crews worked for about eight hours to cut all the campers out of there. The campground was closed until the following summer while it was contract logged."

The storm also caused extensive damage to Jones Springs, a 3,200-acre nonmotorized recreation area with hiking and cross-country ski trails and walk-in campsites. It is also managed for hunting.

"It had severe damage to about 80% of that area," Lampereur said. "All of the trails were blocked shut. The most cost-effective way to rehabilitate and reopen the area was through the use of salvaged timber sales. Our staff was able to prepare and sell nine sales to clean up about 2,000 acres, including most of the trails. A lot of those sales are still ongoing and so for the public's safety, the area is still not open to the public. It's going to have to remain closed until the logging operations have been completed. All the other recreational facilities have been reopened for public use."

Mike Brown, ranger for the

Lakewood-Laona Ranger District, said the storm's impact was not heavy when it came to the district's recreation areas. Some campgrounds experienced damage but remained open, he said, which helped when visitation rates increased during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"It was a little inconvenient to be without Boot Lake for a year, but once we brought it back on line, we were doing well," he added. "I think we might have had one injury at Boot Lake and one at Bagley Rapids Campground, but nothing life-threatening. We felt pretty fortunate that we got off that easy."

Lampereur called the derecho the largest storm damage event since the establishment of the Chequamegon and Nicolet as separate national forests in 1933.

"In 2007, the Quad County Tornado impacted about 10,500 acres of national forest lands in the Mountain and Lakewood area," he said. "This was a very large and destructive event, but looking back, it was a training exercise for the 2019 storm."

Reforestation starts following windstorm

Derecho wiped out 300 million board feet of timber that needs to be replaced

Cleanup from a devastating windstorm that blew through a portion of the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest three years ago recently switched from a salvage operation to reforestation.

Forest officials reported the heaviest damage from the storm, which has since been confirmed as a derecho, in northern Oconto County.

"In the three years since the storm, we've sold about 145 salvage sales on about 28,000 acres for a total of just under 300 million board feet of timber," said John Lampereur, a silviculturist with the C-NNF forest's Lakewood-Laona Ranger District.

"That would be the equivalent of 59,600 loaded logging trucks and if you parked them bumper to bumper, they would extend for a distance of 847 miles or the approximate distance from Lakewood, Wisconsin, to Decatur, Alabama, on U.S. Highway 41.

"We couldn't have done it by ourselves. Our friends in the DNR have been a huge help. Under the Good Neighbor Authority, DNR foresters have helped the (U.S.) Forest Service manage more of its land base and, without our partners in the forest products industry, none of the recovery would have been possible. We prepare the sales, but all those loggers are the ones that move the wood."

Timber sales as a result of the storm continue, Lampereur said.

"We still have a lot of active sales going on, but they're gradually starting to close," he said. "The heaviest-hit portions of the storm area are going to be regenerated naturally. They're going to resprout or reseed the tree species that were present before the storm. There'll be tens of thousands of acres of young aspen, northern hardwood and oak and that'll be welcome news to grouse and deer hunters."

Meanwhile, pine plantations destroyed by the storm have been salvaged.

"They'll be site-prepared and planted over the next few years," Lampereur said. "This past spring, we

began planting the first 425 acres with red pine, white pine and tamarack seedlings. Most of the areas are being planted with red pine, but they're going to have a scattering of white pine and tamarack for increased biodiversity. We'll be planting similar numbers in the spring of 2023 and 2024. Over the next 10 years, we'll need to remove competing vegetation from the plantings several times so they'll be free to grow."

The storm left large trees that blocked roads and trails in the forest. Lampereur said the Forest Service identified areas near private properties and first focused on areas with conifers, the biggest fire hazard. He noted that pine species are soft woods that

deteriorate rapidly, so they were hit first before going into areas that were less of a concern about fuel for fire and more of a concern for timber value.

"Other areas – campgrounds and other facilities – we wanted to get those areas cleaned up," Lampereur said. "It was a constant reassessment of those areas. We really didn't anticipate being able to sell as many as we did for as long as we did. We pretty much thought 18 months was all we had, and it actually ended up being about twice that. We've done a pretty good job of cleaning things up out there. It's in recovery, and we have large expanses of young forest coming in. It's definitely a change in the landscape."

Dairy system evolving, so milk prices must, too

Dairy farming today looks vastly different than it did at the turn of the century. Farms big and small are more sophisticated in how they conduct business. From implementing more sustainable practices to adopting cutting-edge technologies, the list of ways dairy farmers look toward the future is growing every day.

All the exciting modernizations present an interesting duality: The federal system through which these innovative agribusinesses are paid is nearly 100 years old, with little meaningful reform since its inception.

That could — and should — be changing.

The pandemic freshly revealed cracks in the system that have grown too big to ignore. With lingering memories of record-large milk check deductions, seemingly every group tied to dairy is now exploring options for milk pricing reform.

Most of those ideas are more narrowly centered around tweaking the Federal Milk Marketing Orders (FMMOs). Edge Dairy Farmer Cooperative, the third largest dairy co-op in the country, is taking a broader approach.

In developing our reform priorities, which we announced in June, we took a step back from the heat of the moment to focus on the future, just as our farmer leaders do. We asked

ourselves, “What will the future dairy farmers and processors need to find success?”

The farmers of the future are looking to not only create but sustain value for the milk they

produce. To do so requires adaptation and transformation of their business models to capitalize on market opportunities.

Tomorrow’s processors are looking for farmers who understand their individual milk markets and pricing, align with the strategic vision of their businesses and are built to be financially and environmentally sustainable.

FMMOs have served the dairy community reasonably well over the years by facilitating the orderly marketing of fluid milk. However, a steady decline in fluid milk consumption has tested their sustainability — both today and for the future.

Edge looks to ensure the system’s long-term viability, but also to provide structure and certainty if FMMOs are someday dissolved. We see flexibility and fairness as fundamental principles in this reform.

Differing product mixes and milksheds across the various regions in the United States present obstacles to a true one-size-fits-all approach. Uniform change would not be sustainable. It’s time to allow individual orders within the FMMOs to operate with more flexibility to adapt and find relevancy. How can each order better incentivize processors to participate?

Of course, there will still be cases where operating outside the orders makes sense, and there are some areas of the country where farmers have opted out of the federal orders completely. In the cases when milk flows outside the orders, there should be expectations in place to ensure business is done in a fair and transparent fashion. (Go to www.voiceofmilk.com/FMMO to see Edge’s priorities in detail.)

As a cooperative, Edge has a unique perspective in the push for reform because its farmer members around the Upper Midwest ship to more than 30 independent processors, each unique in its product mix and markets. These differences have allowed for friendly competition and options for farmers to align themselves with processors based on values and long-term strategy.

One of the highest-priority items for our members remains building

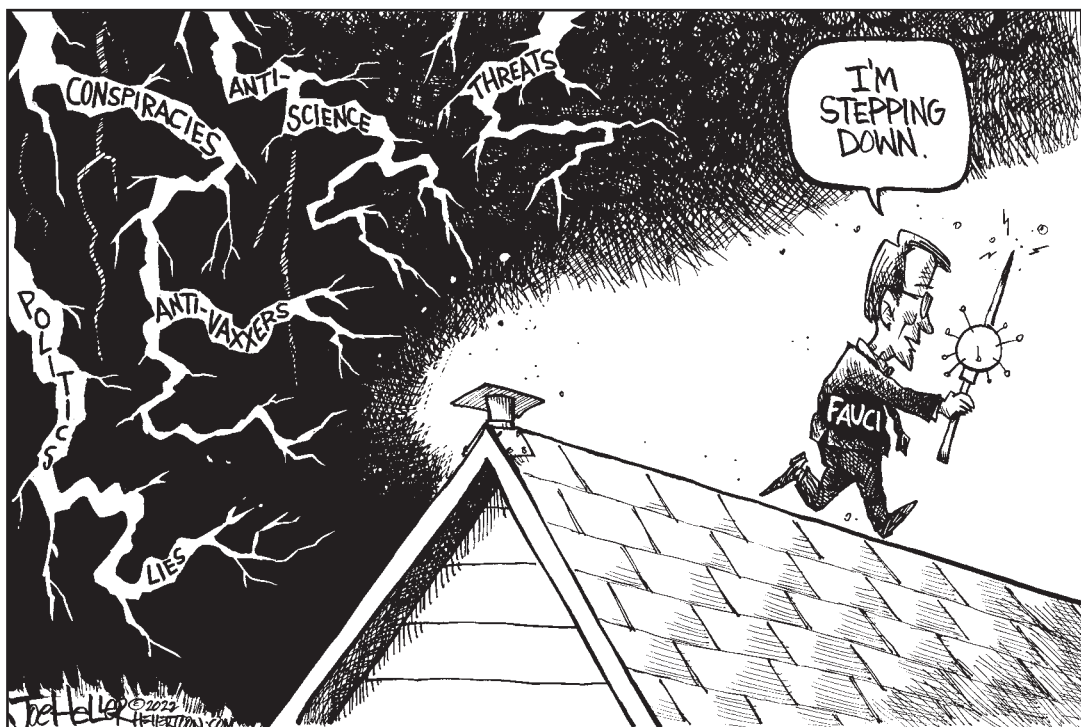
the relationship between farmer and processor. Unfortunately, many of these relationships are frayed. For far too long, they have simply been transactional. Edge hopes to foster stronger relationships built upon common values, trust and transparency.

There is still much work to do. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack put our community on notice when he said he expects consensus before any reform is to be addressed. It’s a tall order to think everyone will agree on all terms, but as an industry, we must work to find commonalities in our approaches to improvement. For our part, Edge continues to pursue collaboration, building relationships one at a time, and welcomes participation from as many stakeholders as possible.

Change can be difficult, but it is part of evolution. It cannot be questioned — dairy is evolving. Milk pricing must as well.

We are excited to see a future where farmers and processors are aligned in strong and strategic alliances, working toward success for all.

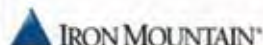

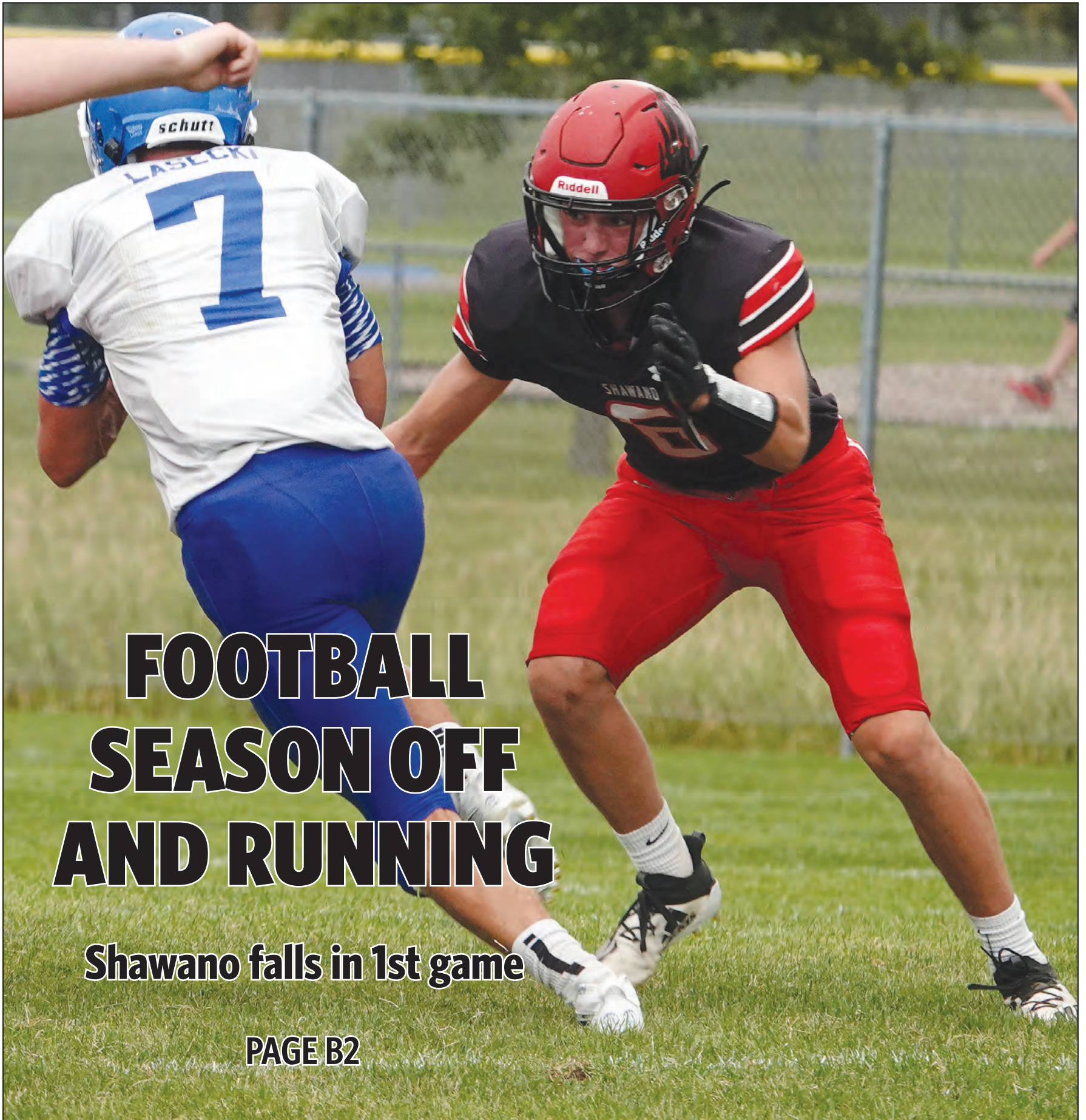

Shawano drops opener to Wrightstown

Little mistakes add up for Hawks

The Shawano Community High School football team fell short in a 20-18 nonconference loss to Wrightstown on Aug. 19 in Shawano.

A turnover near the goal line on its first possession of the game and inability to capitalize on any conversions after scores turned out to be the difference for Shawano in the tightly-contested matchup.

Shawano coach Alan Tomow was proud of the team's effort despite being undermanned — with Ashton Henning, the team's leading receiver from last year, among others, missing due to injuries.

"There were situations that we didn't execute and some mistakes that we made," said Tomow. "We know our margin for error is really thin, and we made a few mistakes at times where we couldn't."

The first mistake came on the first possession of the game. After Shawano marched over 60 yards down the field, a pass from new senior starting quarterback Michael Metcalf-Grassman at the 1-yard line was intercepted.

"I threw it a little bit behind the receiver, I probably should have just tucked it and run it in — I think I had an angle," said Metcalf-Grassman. "Wasn't a great decision. Can't do that at the goal line, we need to score if we are that close. That one's on me."

Wrightstown was able to advance the ball 35 yards before Shawano's defense stiffened and forced a punt after a tackle for loss by senior Jacob Landon.

Shawano's offense took over at its own 45 and was able to work the ball down the field in less than four minutes for the game's first points. The big plays on the drive were a 15-yard run from Metcalf-Grassman and 12-yard pass from Metcalf-Grassman to sophomore Jerzy Bocker.

Junior Lucas Nuthals powered in from three yards out to cap the drive, but the point after try was no good.

Wrightstown was moving the ball down the field when heavy rains followed by lightning hit the area,

forcing a roughly hourlong delay.

The Tigers converted a big fourth down when play resumed and tied the game up a couple plays later.

After forcing a Shawano punt, Wrightstown appeared poised to score before the half, but a backward pass was scooped up by senior Adam Kunderinger and returned 94 yards to instead put Shawano up 12-6 at halftime.

"Coach (Ron) Schmalz, his saying, scoop and score — I didn't hear any whistles, ball was on the ground, picked it up, scoop it, run it back to the end zone for a touchdown," said Kunderinger on the play.

Wrightstown's run-heavy offense opened the second half with a five-plus minute drive that ended in a score, and after a two-point conversion, the visitors led 14-12.

Shawano went three-and-out on its next drive, but its defense stiffened and forced a punt to get the ball right back.

Taking over at the Wrightstown 47, the Hawks methodically worked the ball down the field before Metcalf-Grassman connected with Landon on an 11-yard score on the

first play of the fourth quarter. The two-point conversion try again failed, leaving the door open for Wrightstown to just need a touchdown to grab the lead.

The Tigers ran 13 plays, all runs, on the ensuing drive, before scoring with five minutes and change remaining.

Needing only a field goal to regain the lead, Shawano looked to be on its way to at least getting that opportunity before a penalty derailed the drive.

Metcalf-Grassman had just hit Bocker for a first down, but a block in the back was called, forcing the Hawks into a third-and-11 play from its own 45. Metcalf-Grassman tried to connect with Landon on a deep pass down the middle of the field on third down, but the ball fell incomplete, and no flag was called despite some contact between Landon and Wrightstown defenders as the ball was coming down.

A fourth-down pass from Metcalf-Grassman to Landon picked up just 10 of the 11 yards Shawano needed, and Wrightstown was able to run the clock out from there to snag the win.

"We definitely learned that we have to be sound in our assignments, especially with a team like Wrightstown that's going to lull you to sleep with the run game," said Landon. "You have to be ready every play for that counter or that little trickery that they run. And then some baseline knowledge, like they weren't going to throw the ball — and when they did, we ended up getting a score off it (Kunderinger's touchdown). I think our guys should have maybe keyed in a little better on that they are gonna run the ball."

Badgers seek to reclaim status as Big Ten contenders

Wisconsin used to make trips to the Big Ten Championship Game a nearly annual excursion.

Not anymore.

After playing in five of the first seven Big Ten championship games, the Badgers have made it to Indianapolis just once in the last four years. They blew a chance to get there last year by losing at Minnesota in their regular-season finale.

That gives them extra incentive as they enter this season a Western Division favorite once again. The 18th-ranked Badgers would prefer to go a step beyond that.

"The goal is to win the Big Ten, obviously," running back Braelon Allen said. "It hasn't been done in 10 years. That's definitely the main focus and something we harped on all summer long, our desire to be in Indianapolis and bring home a Big Ten championship."

Wisconsin will need consistency, which the Badgers lacked a year ago.

They lost three of their first four

games before winning seven straight once Allen grabbed a featured role. Then their offense sputtered at Minnesota before a Las Vegas Bowl victory over Arizona State.

Wisconsin will try to produce a faster start with plenty of new faces.

Coach Paul Chryst brought in former Baltimore Ravens tight ends coach Bobby Engram as offensive coordinator. On defense, the Badgers must replace eight of the top 10 tacklers from a unit that allowed the fewest yards per game and yards per play of any Football Bowl Subdivision team last season.

The defense's inexperience means the offense must perform better.

Allen rushed for 1,268 yards and 12 touchdowns as a freshman. He benefits from the return of Chez Mellusi, who ran for 815 yards in nine games last season before tearing his anterior cruciate ligament.

Mellusi could only watch last year as Wisconsin struggled at Minnesota when Allen was held in check.

"I was sitting on the couch," Mellusi said. "I was at home watching that game. So it was very difficult for me.

It was hard. Not even just me, I feel everyone on this team is going to do everything they can to make sure that doesn't happen again."

Mertz back at QB

Graham Mertz enters his third season as Wisconsin's starting quarterback realizing he must get steadier.

Mertz owns a 13-7 record as a starter. He has a combined 16 touchdown passes and four interceptions in the 13 wins. In the losses, he threw 12 interceptions and three touchdown passes.

He will be working with new wideouts. Chimere Dike is the only returning Badger who had more than 86 yards receiving last season.

Herbig's return

Although Wisconsin must reload on defense, the Badgers return their 2021 sack leader.

Outside linebacker Nick Herbig had nine sacks as well as 14½ tackles for loss last season.

Transfers in secondary

Wisconsin's defensive backfield

includes plenty of proven players who got their experience at other schools.

The Badgers added cornerbacks Just Clark (Toledo), Cedrick Dort (Kentucky) and Jay Shaw (UCLA) plus safety Kamo'I Latu (Utah).

New LB coach

Chryst brought in Mark D'Onofrio this summer to replace Bill Sheridan as inside linebackers coach. D'Onofrio hadn't coached since 2018 but is a former defensive coordinator at Temple, Miami and Houston.

Sheridan joined Wisconsin's staff in February after spending two years as Air Force's defensive line coach, but he resigned less than three months later. The NCAA is investigating Sheridan and three other former Air Force assistants for potential rules violations.

Bob Bostad, who coached Wisconsin's inside linebackers last season, is back to his old position as offensive line coach. Bostad previously coached Wisconsin's offensive line from 2008-11.

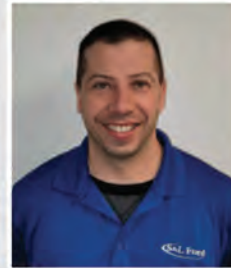

Coach speaks on development of several young players

Rookies and younger Green Bay Packers' players were at the forefront as the Packers beat the New Orleans Saints 20-10 in both team's second preseason game on Aug. 19 at Lambeau Field in Green Bay.

Second-string quarterback Jordan Love played a major portion of the game for the Packers, recording 113 yards and one touchdown. Third-string quarterback Danny Etling provided the highlight of the night though as the quarterback ran in a 51-yard touchdown with 8:29 left in the fourth quarter. Etling's rush proved to be the game-sealer, as Green Bay kept New Orleans out of the end zone for the remainder of the game.

Green Bay Packers head coach Matt LaFleur spoke on Love's development after the game, as well as his impression of the young quarterback in the game.

"I thought that there was a lot of good," said LaFleur. "I saw a guy that was making off-schedule plays and running around — there was some times where we did not have great protection. He stood in the pocket and was throwing on rhythm."

On an early play in the first quarter, instead of throwing a pass, Love instead tucked the ball and ran for a first down. LaFleur showed praise for Love as he continues to develop and make the right play, especially in a situation like that.

"That is something that is a fine line in terms of how you coach it," said LaFleur. "They brought pressure on that play and I couldn't tell how hard (New Orleans') safety came down on our slot receiver. Jordan was decisive and that is the big thing. I see a much more decisive player out there. That will lead to a much more effective player."

Speaking on his own development, Love said that he feels much better this season, compared to seasons past.

"I feel confident and more comfortable back there," said Love. "I think that just comes with getting more reps and getting more plays."

"First of all, he is just so much fun to be around — he's got a great personality and fits in well with all of the guys," said LaFleur. "And he is a talented guy, he is a very good athlete. That (run) was something that was not called, but he saw the safety barrel down and close in, so he just pulled it and went. I think Danny has done a lot of great things. He is making our decision very difficult."

On the defensive side of the ball, LaFleur pointed to safety Micah Abernathy, linebacker Isaiah McDuffie and defensive back Shemar Jean-Charles as players who stood out immediately to him.

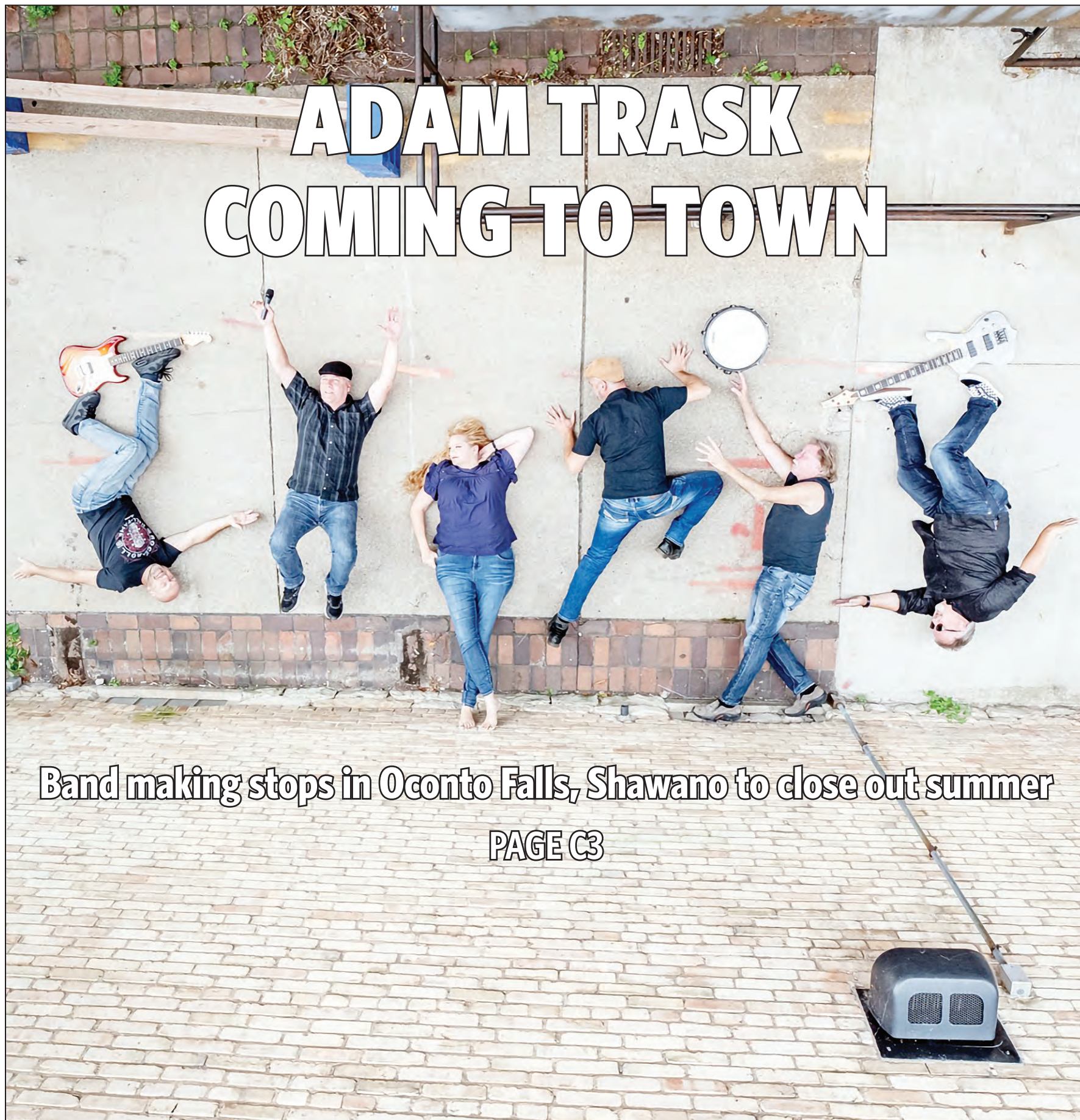

Adam Trask rocking summer to a close

Green Bay band has started for some rock hits but was formed after being fired by 'Little Eva'

The Adam Trask Band will be bringing some vintage rock 'n' roll to the area in late August as summer begins to wind down.

The band will be playing at East Side Beach in Oconto Falls from 6-9 p.m. Aug. 26. Folks will be able to bring a lawn chair to the beach or dock their boat and watch from the water. The concert is free, but food and refreshments will be available to purchase.

After playing in Oconto Falls, the Adam Trask Band will be coming to Shawano on Aug. 28 at The Lighthouse Sports Bar and Grill, W6440 Gumaer Road. The band will be performing from 4-8 p.m.

The band saw its beginnings back in 1981, according to its leader and guitarist Roger Ihde, but it vanished from the scene for a 25-year period. Ihde said the band members all went into other bands around 1985, but then they reunited in 2012.

"We got back together when the guy who had done sound for us passed away from an aneurysm, and we all got together to do a fundraiser to help his widow pay for the funeral," Ihde said. "We had so much fun that we decided to re-form the band."

Ihde noted that a lot of the original band members have gone into retirement, leaving him still leading the band. However, when they all came together over 40 years ago, a love of music bonded them and made them want to perform.

"We all came to be part of a backup band for this other person, and we had so much fun playing together that, when that situation didn't work out, we started our own band," Ihde said.

The reason the backup band didn't work out, according to Ihde, was because a lady claimed to be Little Eva, an American singer known for the 1962 song "The Loco-Motion." There was just one problem, though. The Green Bay woman trying to form the backup band was White, while the real Little Eva — born Eva Boyd in 1943 — was Black.

"I knew Little Eva was Black, and this woman wasn't, but I thought, 'Let's just see what she

has for chops," Ihde said. "We kept practicing and went and did the first show. She was absolutely atrocious, terrible. After the show, I went to her and said, 'There's a few problems with our show.'"

After Ihde told the faux Little Eva that she wasn't really Little Eva, he and the other band members were fired on the spot, he recalled. That was the catalyst for the Adam Trask Band to be born.

"If you're going to claim to be somebody, make sure you're the correct ethnicity," Ihde said. "I never heard from her again, and I never knew her real name."

The name Adam Trask comes from a character's name in the John Steinbeck novel "East of Eden." James Dean played the son of Adam Trask in the first film adaptation of the book, according to Ihde, who noted that his brother came up with the name for it.

Ihde said Adam Trask started out as a lounge band but eventually started to become a full-on rock band.

While 1980s music is a source that the six-piece band taps into,

Adam Trask performs a variety of classic rock, modern tunes and even some country crossover hits. Ihde noted that the band has opened for Huey Lewis and the News, Joan Jett and the Blackhearts and Ruby Star and the Grey Star Band. The band has previously been seen performing at major events in De Pere and taking the stage at the Shawano and Kewaunee county fairs.

"It's funny, because '80s music is becoming huge now, so basically we're playing some of the same songs," Ihde said. "We are throwing in some modern stuff, but we're playing some '70s, '80s, '90s, 2000s as far as rock goes, but we're also playing some funk, like Bruno Mars' 'Uptown Funk.' We just learned Lizzo's 'About Damn Time.'"

Being able to evolve with the times is vital for the band's survival, he added. It helps to attract more people than playing one type of music.

"You've got to do a little bit of everything," Ihde said. "You can't just stick to one genre, in my opinion. If you want to be a rock band, you can still be a rock band,

but we throw some other things in there, do some Carrie Underwood and stuff like that."

One thing that makes Adam Trask unique, in Ihde's view, is that the band has both male and female vocalists, which helps to expand its repertoire.

"A lot of bands just have a singer or it's all guys," he said. "Having a guy and a gal singer helps to do everything to Pat Benatar to Billy Idol and all that."

If that's not enough to attract music lovers, Adam Trask boasts some other honors. Ihde recalled that the band was the first band outside of Milwaukee to win the Battle of the Bands put on by radio station WAPL. Adam Trask also came in second place once in the Miller High Life Rock To Riches Song Writing Contest, he said.

"Music has always been very important to everybody in the band," Ihde said. "Music moves us in a different way. Musicians are a different breed. I've been playing music since I was in high school."

State natural areas preserve native landscapes

Does Hagar Mountain ring a bell?
How about Diamond Roof or Tar
Dam Pines?

The state Department of Natural Resources designated the Oconto County properties as state natural areas, and they are three of almost 700 such areas found throughout Wisconsin.

Thomas Meyer, a conservation biologist with the DNR's State Natural Areas Program, said the properties have been singled out for a good reason.

"The focus is to try to set aside the best remaining examples of Wisconsin's native communities," he said. "The focus is not on providing recreation, although you can in most cases hunt, fish and hike on them. This is really focused more on nature and the species that are found there."

Oconto County is home to 21 other SNAs: Barney Creek, Battle Creek Hemlocks, Bonita Country, Camp Five Lake, Cathedral Pines, Charles Pond, Forbes Springs, Glocke Lake, Kelly Lake Hemlocks, LaFave Swamp, Lake Lackawanna, Nelligan Lake, North Branch Bottoms, Peshtigo Brook Meadow and Woods, Priest Rock, Snow Falls Creek, South Branch Beech Grove, Sunrise Lake, Thunder Mountain, Thunder River Swamp and Waupee Lake Swamp.

Shawano County is home to six SNAs: County K Woods, Jung Hemlock-Beech Forest, Kroenke Lake, Navarino Cedar Swamp, Navarino Sedge Meadow and Wolf River Bottoms.

"State natural areas are different from state parks in that we don't actively facilitate public access and use," Meyer said. "It doesn't mean you can't go there, but we're not going to put in a 6-foot-wide trail. There might be a little footpath or a little dock to access water, but we're not providing picnic tables, campsites or anything like that."

Hagar Mountain State Natural Area can be found northeast of Mountain off County Road W. The area features several rare plants, one of Wisconsin's largest turkey vulture roosting sites, numerous

rock outcrops and one of the few waterfalls in the Chequamegon-Nicolet National Forest.

The site takes a little work to find. Head east from Mountain on County W for 3 miles to the junction with Forest Road 2630 (Bear Paw Road). Continue on County W for a half-mile to a cabin at Fire No. 13124, park along the highway and head north on a foot trail that runs along the property line from the east side of the cabin.

Other SNAs provide easy access to the public.

Shawano County's Navarino Cedar Swamp and Navarino Sedge Meadow are part of the state-owned Navarino Wildlife Area south of Shawano and east of Clintonville. The area has several access points and parking areas along state Highway 156, County Road K and town roads.

"This is a program that actually goes back to the 1950s," Meyer said. "Some of the conservationists at the

time recognized that native plant and animal communities were starting to dwindle in places that they used to take their students.

"They said, 'Look, we need to have some kind of program that protects the last remaining prairie, old-growth forest or unique wetland,'" he said. "They got legislation passed that created the State Natural Areas Program."

Meyer said the program has a process to get a property designated as an SNA.

"We have a team of ecologists that will go out to a proposed site," he said. "We may have gotten a tip from the public or maybe this piece of property is already state-owned. A property manager could say, 'Hey, I've got this back 40 here, and I think it has some unique habitat for different plants and animals.'

"Our ecologist goes in and does an assessment. What they're looking for is the percentage of native species compared to invasive species. Then, they look at evidence of past disturbance like a barbed wire fence or old plow lines to determine whether this still has viability as a native community that might be worth protecting."

Most SNAs don't get a lot of foot traffic.

One that does, however, is Parfrey's Glen, which became Wisconsin's first state natural area in 1952. The property, now part of Devil's Lake State Park near Baraboo, includes a narrow sandstone ravine and several rare plant species.

"It probably gets a half-million visitors a year," Meyer said. "It really depends where they are in relation to population centers and whether they're attached to a state park or other high-visitation property."

Information on each SNA can be found on the DNR's website – dnr.wi.gov – and searching state natural areas by county.

"I think 95% of the time, the effort is worth it," Meyer said. "I spent two hours slogging through this god-awful, insect-infested swamp to get to some of the natural areas I've been to. It's really nice, but was it worth the journey? For me, it usually is because I'm a trained ecologist, and I like plants and animals."

Barn swallows triumph over misfortune

Every summer, a pair of barn swallows makes the underside of my boat lift cover their home. This year was no different. By the end of July, you could see five tiny heads sticking atop the muddy nest with their bright yellow bills smiling back at me. Although my husband is not a fan of bird poop in his boat, he knows these swallows bring me great joy.

I knew when a parent was approaching with a mosquito or dragonfly because all five babies would simultaneously open their mouths big and wide and flap their wings hard and fast as if to say "Feed me, feed me." I swear, nothing could be cuter. One early August evening, I went to check on them and all was well, but the next morning my husband came in and reported the nest was gone. What? Gone? Where?

There were no remnants of the nest and no sign of the babies, only two frantic, squabbling parents dashing and darting all around. I was horrified. Was it a person? A predator? The weather? All seemed unlikely. Perhaps the nest was unable to hold the baby swallows any longer and simply fell. Whatever caused it, the nest and my babies had vanished.

so lost and cold. I know I should not intervene with nature unless absolutely necessary, so I forced myself to leave him be in hopes that his parents would find him. Hours later I checked on him and he was gone. My heart was in turmoil. Did the parents find him or did something else get him?

Then I noticed something on the end of the dock. What is that? My goodness, it is a baby swallow. The same one? Who knows. At the same time an eagle, most likely in search of a tasty snack, also noticed this helpless babe. Before I could panic, the parents swiftly swooped to action, pestering the eagle until he went on his way. Relieved, I quickly left so the parents didn't have to worry about me, too.

For the rest of the day, through

Devastated, I began to cry, but through my tears, I saw a tiny little baby bird sitting on the shore. I felt relief and worry at the same time. A baby is alive. How wonderful, but he looked

binoculars from my living room, I watched this vulnerable survivor. The wind was picking up, and violent storms were approaching. There was no way he would make it through the night on that dock. I had to do something so I called the nearest wildlife rehabilitation center. The rehabilitation worker asked me to send a photo of the bird and another showing how close the boat was from the dock. She assessed that the bird was big enough to get itself to the boat to take cover from the storm. I would not have to intervene.

I left the bird alone, but I was still concerned. My husband had built a small carpeted ramp for our dog to get from the dock onto the boat. I thought we could put the ramp down for the bird, you know, just in case it could hop but not fly. We slowly walked down the dock towards the boat. Just as my husband gently laid down the ramp, the baby barn swallow took off flying. Hallelujah, he can fly. My heart leapt with joy. I knew then that I no longer had to worry about this sweet creature. He will be able to find shelter tonight and hopefully reunite with his parents in the morning.

I have to admit, I still didn't sleep well. With each thunder crash, lightning strike and wind gust, I wondered how the baby, the parents and, well, all of the animal world was enduring this storm. As soon as the sun approached the horizon, my worried, anxious self ran out to see what I would find.

My eyes couldn't believe what they were seeing — four baby barn swallows sitting on the dock bench with wings flapping and bills opened wide as Mom and Dad filled their mouths. My heart overflowed as I realized four of the five babies have survived. As I watched through happy tears, amazed at nature's wonders, the fifth baby landed onto the bench and joined the others in beckoning for a bite. The barn swallow family was together once again!

Amidst all the havoc the world and its people go through every day, this story may seem trivial, but watching these small, fragile barn swallows overcome their struggles gives me hope that perhaps we can, too.

Most channel catfish are tasty, but they definitely have a fishy taste. Growing up on the Mississippi River for the first 20 years of my life, I ate plenty of channel cats, but they are not my favorite eating fish by a long cast.

I had to move north to Wisconsin and settle near the Wolf River before finally trying flathead catfish. I would put its firm, white meat up against any of my other table favorites listed in the first paragraph above.

Maybe it's the way Robin Saylor and his wife, Heather, of rural Larsen prepared it, but I don't think that's the only reason it was so delicious. He removed the dark belly meat when filleting it. She combined the Cajun and regular flavors of Shore Lunch breading before rolling the cubed meat in it and then deep frying it in a huge skillet over an open fire.

We were sitting in the Saylor's back yard, about 10 feet from an inlet of the Wolf River, before I popped that first chunk of flathead goodness into my mouth. Boom. The word "catfish" will forever take on a new meaning to me.

What's more unique than this delicious fish is the way Saylor catches them. He's learned the relatively unknown sport of setlining, which is more reminiscent of trapping than fishing.

Saylor credits Dan Rudebeck, one of the old-timers in the Boom Bay portion of the Wolf near Larsen, with teaching him this disappearing fishing method. They first became acquainted in the duck blind, then Saylor learned the tricks to turning long ropes and huge hooks into muddy-green gold: Beneath those frog-like hues is one of the best meats on the river.

Setlining has its own set of regulations and license. The setline also

must be tagged with the tag provided, which is numbered to match the license number. Only rough fish, catfish and turtles may be caught and kept from a setline; all game fish must be released immediately. A long nylon rope is the main body of a setline. Large hooks (Saylor uses 7/0 size) that must have a 3/4-inch gap or more between the shank and barb tip are required. The setline is anchored to the bottom of the river and tied between posts. One includes the setliner's flag, which includes the license number. This allows game wardens to quickly identify the angler. A setline can include no more than 25 hooks.

A bank pole (also called a set pole) is set into the bank and can include only one or two hooks, with a minimum size of 3/0. Setline licenses are \$11.25 for the metal tag attached to the flagged anchor

pole; bank pole licenses are \$3 and include five tags.

Specific waters are designated as legal for both methods of passive fishing. The season on the Winnebago system (which includes the Wolf, Fox, Shioc and Embarrass rivers) opens the Saturday closest to May 20 and closes Sept. 30.

Saylor prefers using suckers as bait on his setline, which he purchases from a bait shop. Those live bait must be at least 5 inches long on inland waters.

The cleverest part of his setline setup is the looped line trick he uses to attach or remove hooks from the main rope setline. Each hook is tied to a loop, which in turn is looped to additional loops tied in the 550-foot rope setline. Since setlines must be checked every 24 hours if hooks are attached (even with no bait), Saylor can quickly remove the hooks but leave the setline if he doesn't want to check it for a day or more.

Saylor and other setliners contribute to the state's knowledge of this species when they find and report

tags that biologists place on the fish during hoop netting and electrofishing surveys, according to Tom Meronek, Oshkosh team fisheries supervisor of the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.

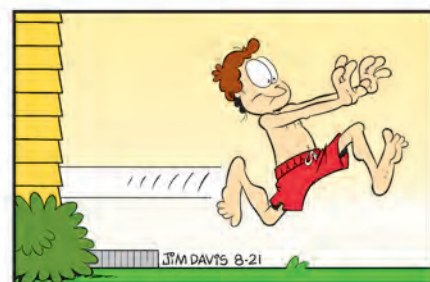
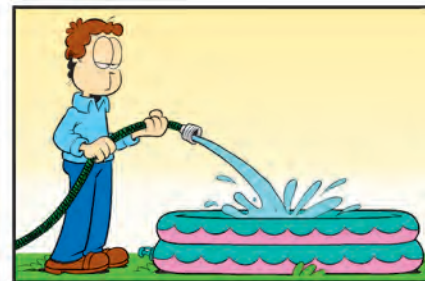
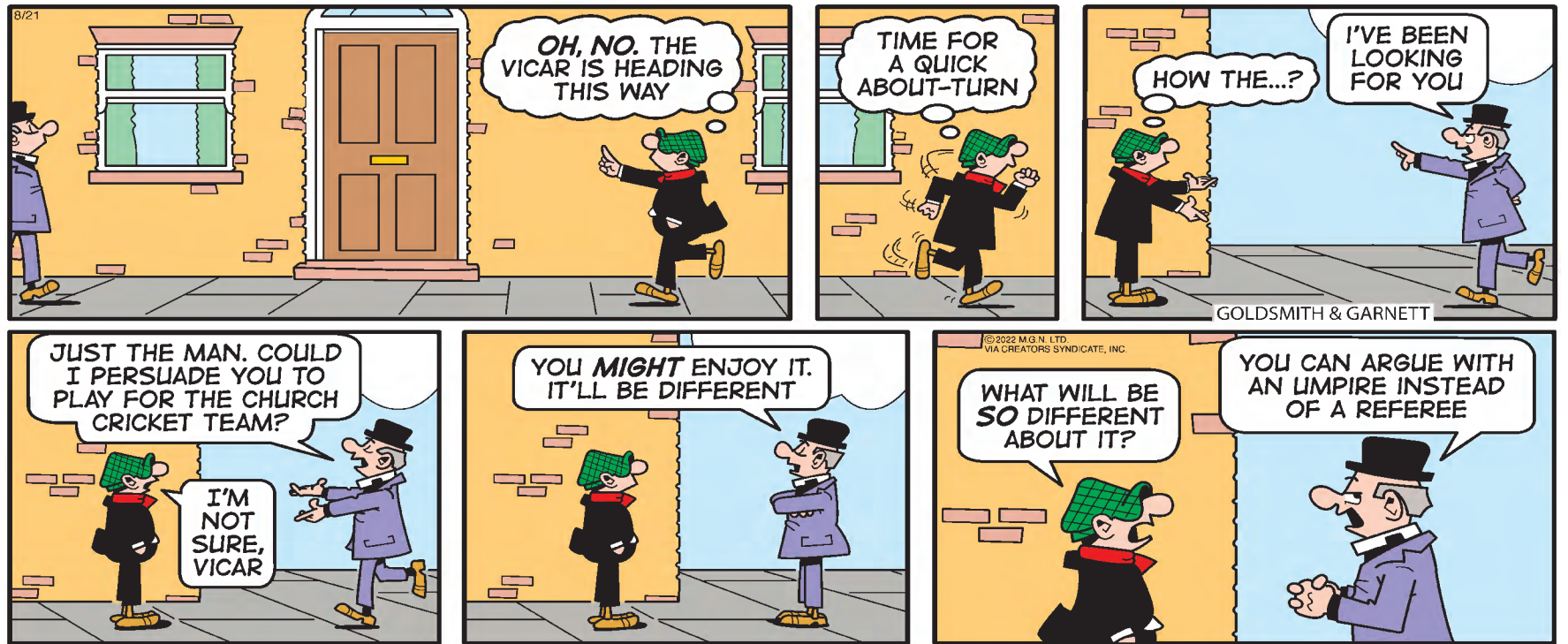
"This information is crucial, evaluating exploitation, movement and population metrics," he said. "Anglers are asked to leave the tag intact if the fish is released but can still report the information."

Flatheads on the Wolf have reached 40 years old. By age 5, they are about 20 inches long and by 10, they are 30 inches or more. A 40-inch fish is about 15 years old, Meronek said. The otolith, a bone in the catfish's head, is used to determine exact age, but the fish must be killed to do so.

Saylor plans to teach his son the unique sport and, based on Everett's grin, this tradition on the Wolf will carry on.

Oconto receives new fire suppression tool

The Wisconsin Masonic Foundation and Pine Lodge 188 have donated a fire suppression tool, made by GreenEx, to the Oconto Fire-Rescue Department.

This device weighs about 11 pounds and can be tossed into a burning room or building, emitting an environmentally safe aerosol for 35 seconds. This will extinguish any fire in an enclosure up to 5,300 cubic feet.

This unit can help save lives by reducing the temperature of a fire from 1,000 degrees to 200 degrees in less than a minute, allowing fire personnel quicker access to the building. The tool can be critical in rescuing people and pets trapped in burning buildings, according to the fire department.

It also allows a first responder to begin fire suppression before any fire department equipment arrives or can be deployed. The tool has a 15-year battery that never needs recharging and can operate in temperatures down to 50 below zero.
