Gillett council, review board approve new TID

Tax incremental financing reserves use of funds for municipal infrastructure

The city of Gillett has authorized its fourth tax incremental finance district (TID) after action Sept. 15 by the city council and joint review board.

Creation of a TID can generate additional revenue for a city. The increased property tax from new development within the boundaries of a district is reserved for municipal use for 20 years rather than shared with other taxing entities such as schools, the county or state.

The money can then be used to improve infrastructure within the TID. Art Bahr, community development specialist for MSA Professional Services, a Baraboo-based civil engineering firm that prepared the TID 4 plan, estimated that the new district could provide Gillett with \$1,059,110 for

infrastructure projects if the expected development occurs.

Activities and improvements in the newly designated TID 4 are intended to encourage and attract business growth to the city, Bahr said.

"I did try to stay conservative, so if you see there, I've only got about six new structures in the next 20 years," he said.

A TID can fail in its purpose if a community borrows for infrastructure and the expected development does not occur. For that reason the boundaries of TID 4 were drawn to include areas where businesses are already planning or building, including the corner of North McKenzie Avenue and Pine Street, where a new Dollar General store is under construction.

Other potential projects are a storage facility expected to be completed next year, a couple of new homes in

2024, and a multi-family dwelling by 2028.

"This is in hope we can develop some of the vacant areas in the city area," Bahr said.

Community support and promotion are important to ensure a TID succeeds, he said.

"Sometimes when TIDs don't work like we've experienced in the past it's because the boards didn't market those TIDs right or they didn't promote the city for growth at the right time," Bahr said. "Sometimes it's the economy that does it, many times it's because the boards don't really make an effort to work with the people in the community to build things."

In a pair of special meetings, the Gillett City Council and then the Joint Review Board unanimously passed resolutions approving the creation of TID 4. The last step is submitting the project plan and documentation to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue for certification.

Gillett School Board to add student reps

Junior and senior class presidents to make regular reports

The Gillett School Board will be adding student representatives after approving a proposal brought forth by three Gillett High School seniors on Sept. 15.

Blake Goudreau, Evan Peterson and Alex Peterson appeared at the school board's regular monthly meeting to ask that the junior and senior class presidents be included to serve as a more direct liaison between the board and student body.

The Oconto Falls High School administration appoints the student

representatives to its school board, but Goudreau said the group that prepared the proposal felt it would be better to have the elected class presidents serve.

"We believe it would be best if the students elected these representatives because they would represent those who would speak their words the way they wanted them to be spoken," Goudreau said.

The class vice president would be a backup should the president have a school activity or other commitment on the night the board meets, they said.

While underclassmen are still a part of the school, waiting until junior year to be eligible as student representatives would give them time to become familiar with the school environment, Goudreau said.

Board member Katie Daul suggested that as the concept evolves, the students should consider adding freshmen and sophomores to the mix.

"It would be a great leadership learning opportunity," Daul said.

In response to a query from board member Cliff Gerbers, Superintendent Todd Hencsik said the student representatives would make regular reports to the board and could share feedback on things like how the start of the school year or homecoming week were handled.

Board member Jamie Heroux said it's a good idea to get regular input from the student body.

"The interaction we usually get with the students is when there's a complaint," Heroux said.

Board member Nannette Mohr said students had representation on the board a number of years ago and "it worked out well."

The board unanimously accepted the students' proposal.

Arraignment scheduled in fatal crash

An Oconto Falls man is scheduled to be arraigned in Oconto County Circuit Court on Sept. 26 on a charge of homicide by the intoxicated use of a motor vehicle.

Thomas Edward Wolf, 56, Oconto Falls, is charged in connection with a crash Aug. 3 that claimed the life of Bart Erdman, 60, also of Oconto Falls. He also is charged with a third offense of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated, a misdemeanor.

Judge Michael T. Judge held a

preliminary hearing Sept. 14 and found probable cause Wolf had committed a felony, binding him over for trial. Wolf is expected to plead not guilty during the Sept. 26 appearance, and a pre-trial conference would be scheduled.

The criminal complaint indicates Wolf was driving a pickup truck and Erdman was on a motorcycle, both of them traveling south on County Road I near Beaver Lake Road in the Town of Oconto Falls, when the truck rear-ended the motorcycle.

The impact threw the Harley-Davidson into the east ditch and caused the pickup to spin counterclockwise and turn over at least once, also coming to rest in the ditch, the complaint said. Erdman was ejected and pronounced dead at the scene.

Sgt. Ben Schindel of the Oconto County Sheriff's Department interviewed Wolf later that night in the hospital. Wolf allegedly said he was traveling south on County Road I at about 50 mph "when he all of a sud-

den saw a bright light come out of nowhere." He tried to stop but didn't remember anything specific until his pickup overturned and came to rest in the ditch, the complaint said.

A preliminary breath test at the hospital showed a blood alcohol content of .124%, or more than 1½ times the legal limit, according to the complaint.

Wolf remains free after posting a \$50,000 cash bond.

Complaint: Man took secret video of teen in shower

Bond was set at \$15,000 cash for Michael James Bullock, 39, of Surging, after he was charged with invasion of privacy with a surveillance device and capturing an intimate representation of a victim younger than 18, in connection with an incident that allegedly occurred July 6.

A criminal complaint filed Sept. 6 in Oconto County Circuit Court

indicates that investigators brought Bullock's home computer to the state Division of Criminal Investigation office in Appleton on Aug. 30 to be searched by a forensic analyst.

The analyst allegedly found two videos showing a 17-year-old girl entering and exiting a shower. It appeared that the camera had been set up on the counter area of the bathroom and the girl did not seem to be aware it was there, the com-

plaint said. The girl was recognizable from her driver's license and a family photo her mother had shared with investigators.

The last few seconds of one video shows, about 90 seconds after the girl left the bathroom, a man entering who allegedly appeared "to fit the size and weight of Michael Bullock" and placing a cup on the counter near the camera before the recording ends, according to the complaint.

According to the complaint, the analyst also located the videos in the computer's "frequently viewed" folder, where 17 videos were listed in the quick access bar but appeared to have been reviewed.

Bullock's initial court appearance was adjourned until Sept. 14, when Judge Michael T. Judge scheduled a preliminary hearing of the charges for Oct. 10.

Students partake in conservation day in Navarino

Career exploration was a major emphasis for fifth grade students

Students at Sacred Heart Catholic School, Olga Brenner Intermediate School, St. James Lutheran School and Gresham Community School got a crash course in environmental education on Sept. 15.

The Navarino Nature Center hosted the Shawano County Youth Conservation Field Day, where experts at nine different stations throughout the nature center taught students about topics concerning environmental conservation. Those key points included wetlands, animal pelts and soil among other topics.

"This is a field trip for fifth grade students in Shawano County," said Shawano County Conservationist Scott Frank. "It has been successful — we have got positive remarks from teachers and principals."

A major point of emphasis that Frank wanted to get across to the students was talking about careers in conservation for the students down the line.

"In fifth grade, they typically have a segment about career exploration," said Frank. "They take a survey to see what interests them. We have every presenter talk about their career and how they got there. The presenters just talk about the realm of possibilities in their career path."

Another point that Frank wanted to exhibit was the different aspects of environmental education.

"You try to come up with some of the bigger areas of environmental subject matter, like our forests, our wildlife, our wetlands and soils and our conservation wardens," said Frank.

He added that with including talks surrounding conservation wardens, the students also learn a little more than just the environment.

"With our warden topic — the teachers really liked it," said Frank. "They incorporated a little bit of boater's safety and ATV safety as a part of their talk."

At each station, students were taught about specific topics in each area of study. Those topics ranged from forest management to alternative energy to invasive species.

"This year, regardless of the first session or the last session, the students

were all energetic, enthused and into the topic and program that we engaged on together," said Frank.

Shawano County Field Day started in 2013, with just Olga Brenner attending. That has since grown to include other schools. Frank said that the idea of hosting Youth Conservation Field Day came from the lack of environmental education for students.

"We knew that there was a gap in environmental education," said Frank.

"When we originally met, we talked with the Navarino Nature Center because they have youth programming with the schools and students coming out at different age groups, but didn't have the fifth-grade age group."

Frank said that he was approached by local teachers, who came from different school districts, in 2010 asking why Shawano County did not have a Youth Conservation Field Day.

"That is why in 2012, we took it real serious to figure out what to do," said Frank. "I went and visited Waupaca, Marinette and Outagamie Counties to see how they held theirs. In Outagamie County, they have got it where they invite all of the schools over three consecutive days. The challenge with that is that you can't have every presenter take all three days."

In order to reach more schools in Shawano County, a field day was started in the Wittenberg area earlier this year, to include schools in Wittenberg, Birnamwood and Bowler.

"We are trying to eventually get there to have as many schools as possible come," said Frank.

After hosting both events in two different areas of the county, Frank said that the difference comes from those who attend.

"Around Shawano, you are getting a lot more kids that aren't growing up in the rural area," said Frank. "Regardless of if they came from Gresham or Olga Brenner, they were very observant of what the landscape looked like at the nature center. That is what I want them to learn."

Shawano County replacing courthouse trees

Visitors to the Shawano County Courthouse can expect a new set of trees in front of the building sometime next year.

"We needed to take down the four red maple trees that were located on the front lawn," said Steve Dreher, facilities and grounds director. "We took those down and now we have re-landscaped the front of the courthouse."

Dreher said that the trees were taken down, due to branches growing just a bit too large.

"Basically, we had some limbs that grew great big beams," said Dreher. "No grass was growing underneath there or anything like that."

He added that the county contacted the Shawano city forester about cutting the branches. According to Dreher, the forester said that if they were to cut the tree branches, the trees would probably die.

"He said that the trees had lived their expected life and like any tree, it is going to die," said Dreher. "We chose to take them down rather than having a windstorm take one down and put it on top of the veterans memorial."

In place of the trees, Dreher said that the county is looking into getting younger trees planted in the spring.

"There will be a couple of deciduous trees and a couple of evergreens," said Dreher. "The nurseries are all out of trees, so we have to wait for them to get their spring stock in and then we will put in some trees."

New bus donated as driver shortage continues

Bus route elimination led to traffic jams as school got underway

An anonymous donor has gifted the Oconto Falls School District with \$75,000 toward the purchase of a new diesel school bus.

The vehicle would replace a 2003 model bus that is long past its prime, Superintendent Dean Hess told the school board Sept. 19.

"This is a significant donation that allows us to spend money on other priorities," Hess said.

The board accepted the donation with "a huge debt of gratitude," said board secretary Jan Stranz.

The announcement was a bit of good transportation news in a fall that has been challenging for the school district. With an ongoing bus driver shortage, the board voted this summer to eliminate one bus route and service to families who live within a mile of school.

Even with that reduction, Hess

said, the district is shorthanded.

"We still have one of our routes that is not being covered, and on a daily basis the transportation supervisor and one of the mechanics are splitting that. One drives in the morning, the other in the afternoon, and when possible we get someone to sub in, but that's only worked out about three times this year."

As has been the case for about two years now, the school district is casting a wide net in search of new bus drivers and/or substitutes, Hess said.

The schools have made regular pleas on social media, placed a banner along the road at Memorial Field, set up a booth at the Oconto County Youth Fair, and placed weekly ads in the Oconto County Times Herald, he said.

"Any other ideas are welcome," Hess said.

Like many districts and private bus companies, Oconto Falls has been struggling to find bus drivers, in part because the work involves up to two hours of work in the morning, a long gap, and another two hours or so in the afternoon.

Board member Ken Harter said he has received several comments that "driving bus is not a problem

— it's the kids," and asked if the administration has thought about putting adult monitors to ride along.

Hess replied that it's hard to find help in general, with at least one crossing guard position still posted, for example.

There has been some progress, he said. Three or four people are currently in the pipeline. One person is undergoing training to obtain the required commercial driver's license (CDL), which the district provides as part of the recruitment package. Another person has a CDL already and expressed interest in being a morning substitute driver.

"We have some possibilities for the future, but at this point it's important that people understand and appreciate the transportation team, the people that we have," Hess said. "We are doing everything we can to retain them while at the same time recruiting other folks."

The decision to eliminate service within a mile of schools has generated its own headaches. North Farm Road, where Oconto Falls High School and Oconto Falls Elementary School are both located, saw traffic jams at the beginning and end of the school day for the first few days

after schools reopened Sept. 1, Hess said.

One parent who saw children darting through the gridlock invoked a state law that requires schools to develop and implement a "district hazardous plan" to address dangerous conditions, specifically citing the intersection of Farm Road and Sunrise Court across from the elementary school.

Administrators worked with the Oconto County Sheriff's Department and the city of Oconto Falls to work up a plan that includes locating crossing guards at three key intersections, including Sunrise Court, with increased law enforcement and signage, Hess said.

The board approved the plan, which must now be shared with the state Department of Public Instruction. Hess did say the congestion has alleviated somewhat since the start of the school year as parents find alternatives to driving right up to the school, such as dropping their kids off and having them walk the last block or so.

"But the first few days, it was really challenging," he said.

Downtown plaza construction work complete

Delays of light fixtures, fire feature push opening celebration back to next spring

The new downtown plaza in Shawano is pretty much complete, with the exception of lighting, which is expected to be at least a few weeks out, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard.

The city had anticipated a completion date of Sept. 1 at the latest for the plaza to be finished, and Sheppard reported Sept. 14 to the Shawano Common Council that everything is ready to go, save the lights. He noted that some people have already started using the plaza for respites from work, playing music and more.

“Everything pretty much, as far as the construction, is complete,” Sheppard said. “All of the lighting components, all of that stuff, hopefully, is going to start trickling in. We heard we’re going to receive some stuff at the end of September, and hopefully that’ll be the light poles.”

Sheppard noted that after some recent rains, he went out to the plaza and was pleased with the lack of puddles, which he attributed to the good work in pouring concrete. He encouraged the council to check out the plaza and to provide feedback.

“I think the landscaping that they did has really tied it together,”

he said.

Sheppard said city officials have been holding numerous discussions about programming at the plaza next year. The lack of lighting has limited some of the things that can be done this year, but there are plans to utilize the plaza as part

of the downtown's Oktoberfest celebration, as well as expand the number of lit Christmas trees for the Festival of Trees that will pop up just after Thanksgiving at Franklin Park.

“We think we have the staff in place now with some of the rear-

ranging we did recently with our parks and recreation program manager and then working to develop other partnerships like the library and the BID (Business Improvement District) and some of these other groups that are going to be able to help us fill that space with various events of all different kinds to make sure we're programming it and using it, and that it's not a big, concrete park that's not being used,” Sheppard said.

The fire feature to be displayed near the Stubborn Brothers Brewing Company has also been delayed, according to Sheppard, who quipped that the shipping label has been made, at least, but it's unclear when that will arrive and be installed.

Because of the minor delays, Sheppard said plans to dedicate and formally open the plaza will be pushed back to spring 2023, once everything is in place. He noted there are a couple of non-construction related items that need to be sorted out, too.

“It doesn't have a name yet,” Sheppard said. “The plan is to make sure it's 100% perfect and then do something really nice in the spring-time so we can really show it off.”

Shawano teen arrested in Racine County chase

Passenger allegedly gave teen alcohol, lied about her identity to police

A high-speed chase involving the influence of alcohol put a Shawano teen and a Clintonville woman in hot water in Racine County.

The teen was charged with first offense operating while intoxicated, fleeing and eluding, speeding, possession of open intoxicants and operating with a suspended license. The woman, identified as Desiree Webster, was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, possession of open intoxicants, obstructing a police officer, misdemeanor bail jumping and felony bail jumping.

County deputies saw a Jeep Compass allegedly driven by the teen traveling southbound on Interstate 94 at 107 miles per hour at just after 2 a.m. on Sept. 19. According to a press release from the Racine County Sheriff's Department, the deputies attempted to stop the vehicle, but the lights and sirens were ignored. Deputies were eventually able to catch up with the vehicle at the exit ramp to state Highway 11, according to the release.

Deputies saw open cans of Twisted Tea in the console cup holders, according to the release, and saw vomit on the inside of the passenger door and the exterior of

the vehicle's passenger side.

Webster and the teen both came back with breathalyzer test results of 0.11, according to the release, above the legal limit. Webster is being held on \$7,000 bond, while the teen's bond is \$5,000.

The teen allegedly told deputies that Webster provided her with the alcohol and encouraged her to drink in the vehicle and flee police, according to the release.

A later press release from the sheriff's department revealed that Webster had initially claimed her name was Destiny Spruce, which prompted the county to add the obstruction and felony bail jumping

charges.

A search of online court records showed that Spruce, the person Webster claimed she was, had two misdemeanor cases outstanding in Shawano County for domestic abuse battery and disorderly conduct. Webster, on the other hand, has a felony case still open in the county involving multiple drug possession, delivering and manufacturing charges along with seven counts of felony bail jumping.

That case will be coming back before Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court Judge William Kussel Jr. at 1:30 p.m. Oct. 26 in Branch II.

Ban books and they'll return more powerful

There's a line in "Star Wars" that resonates with many people even after 45 years. When Obi-Wan Kenobi faces off in a light saber battle against Darth Vader, he warns: "If you strike me down, I shall become more powerful than you can possibly imagine."

It's a powerful line that sets up the subsequent films in the franchise, but it's something that could also apply to the books we read. The effort to ban books from library shelves, schools and other places has found a renewed strength in 2022 as self-righteous arbiters who think they know what is right and pure for the rest of society to read.

Gay characters? Oh, no. We can't have them.

That book has a character who is Black? Latino? Gasp. Where are my pearls so I can clutch them?

A story where Christian faith is questioned and put to the test? Must have been written by heathens who pre-ordered their ticket to hell.

It sounds like I'm describing some policies laid out in Russia or China, where human rights are curtailed. Sadly, this is happening in hometown America, where we love our freedom of speech (cited in the U.S. Constitution's First Amendment) and will blow off anyone's buns who try to infringe on our rights (guaranteed in the Second Amendment) — and it's getting worse.

Pen America released its report "Banned in the USA: Rising School Book Bans Threaten Freedom and

Students' First Amendment Rights" in April, and it showed over 2,500 instances of books being banned in schools, with Texas accounting for 30% of those instances.

However, it happens in Wisconsin, too, with around 50 cases being cited in schools alone.

Recent reports show book bans aren't in any danger of stopping. The American Library Association is reporting 681 documented attempts to ban or restrict books in schools, colleges and public libraries just in the first eight months of 2022. Note that it's documented attempts. How many books are being pulled in shadow and secrecy because one or two people find them offensive, oftentimes claiming offense without actually reading said books?

Going back to the Pen America report, it cited that 41% of the banned titles involve LGBTQ themes or characters. Another 40% feature protagonists who are not lily white in skin color, and more than 20% of the titles address racism. At least 40% of the bans are due to political pressure designed to restrict teaching or learning.

Those are the combined cases, but then there are some individual stories that should curl your hair. Take a skip across Lake Michigan to

the state that bears its name. James-town Township voted in August to defund its only library because it had books with LGBTQ themes, cutting its budget by 84%, about \$245,000. That sounds like a death knell, but then a GoFundMe campaign raised the money lost, including a \$50,000 donation from famed author Nora Roberts.

The Associated Press reported that the public library in Ridgeland, Mississippi, got \$110,000 of its funding yanked after the town's mayor said that LGBTQ books in the facility offended him as a Christian. That's when the fur flew, literally, as furies — writers, artists and role players who dress up in costumes depicting wolves, cats and other animals — jumped in and held fundraisers to help the library recoup some of what was lost.

The list goes on, including two school board members in Virginia who suggested taking the books they were banning and holding a public burning of those books "so we can identify within our community that we are eradicating this bad stuff."

Yes, this is happening in America, land of the free. Instead of using common sense and not entering a cave where a wild bear may be sleeping, folks are suggesting we should kill the bear and display its pelt like a trophy in order to protect the public good.

Once upon a time, it was easy to ban books with efforts to bring them back facing an uphill battle. However, that was before knowledge

became digitized. Now, the Brooklyn Public Library has announced a campaign called "Books Unbanned" that allows young people across the country to apply for a free library card that allows them access to the library's eBook catalog. Other libraries and bookstores are putting "banned books" on display for all to see as Banned Books Week is underway this week.

At some point, you would think people wanting to yank books off of shelves would give up the ghost, considering the techniques can be traced back to colonial days, but it just proves that those people do not have the benefit of book knowledge if they don't realize that stories are everywhere, in dozens of formats. When you pluck one off the shelves, just like weeds, others come to take their place.

At the same time, making a spectacle of pulling books, threatening to roast them like marshmallows or announcing that library funding will be yanked has only served to galvanize people in communities who are willing to put out the cash to counter the bigots and racists in public office. Not only that, people like to shake up the status quo, and when a book is banned, people will go out and buy the book just to see what the fuss is about.

So go ahead. Ban the books. They'll just come back more powerful than you can possibly imagine.

Work on Highway 32 in Oconto County complete

The Wisconsin Department of Transportation Northeast Region has announced completion of all major construction on 10.2 miles of state Highway 32 from Trinity Church Road through the village of Suring to County Road AA in the town of Breed.

The project also replaced the Highway 32 bridge deck over the south branch of the Oconto River north of County Road M in Suring. Work began April 11. The \$7.77 million project finished on time and on budget, according to DOT officials.

The project included resurfacing in downtown Suring, replacement of the bridge deck north of County M, widening of paved shoulders, replacement of various culverts and sidewalk curb ramps, and pavement markings and signage. Northeast Asphalt, Inc. from Greenville was the prime contractor.

Improvements provide a smoother and safer ride for motorists, according to the DOT. Replacing the bridge deck and resurfacing the roadway pavement extends the life of the pavement structure and bridge

while reducing future maintenance costs. Repair and replacement of culverts helps ensure adequate drainage to mitigate possible flooding. Wider paved shoulders provide a better recovery area for errant vehicles. Enhanced sidewalk curb ramps that meet current ADA standards provide a safer crosswalk.

Minor clean-up work may take place in the project limits. No traffic impacts are expected to occur.

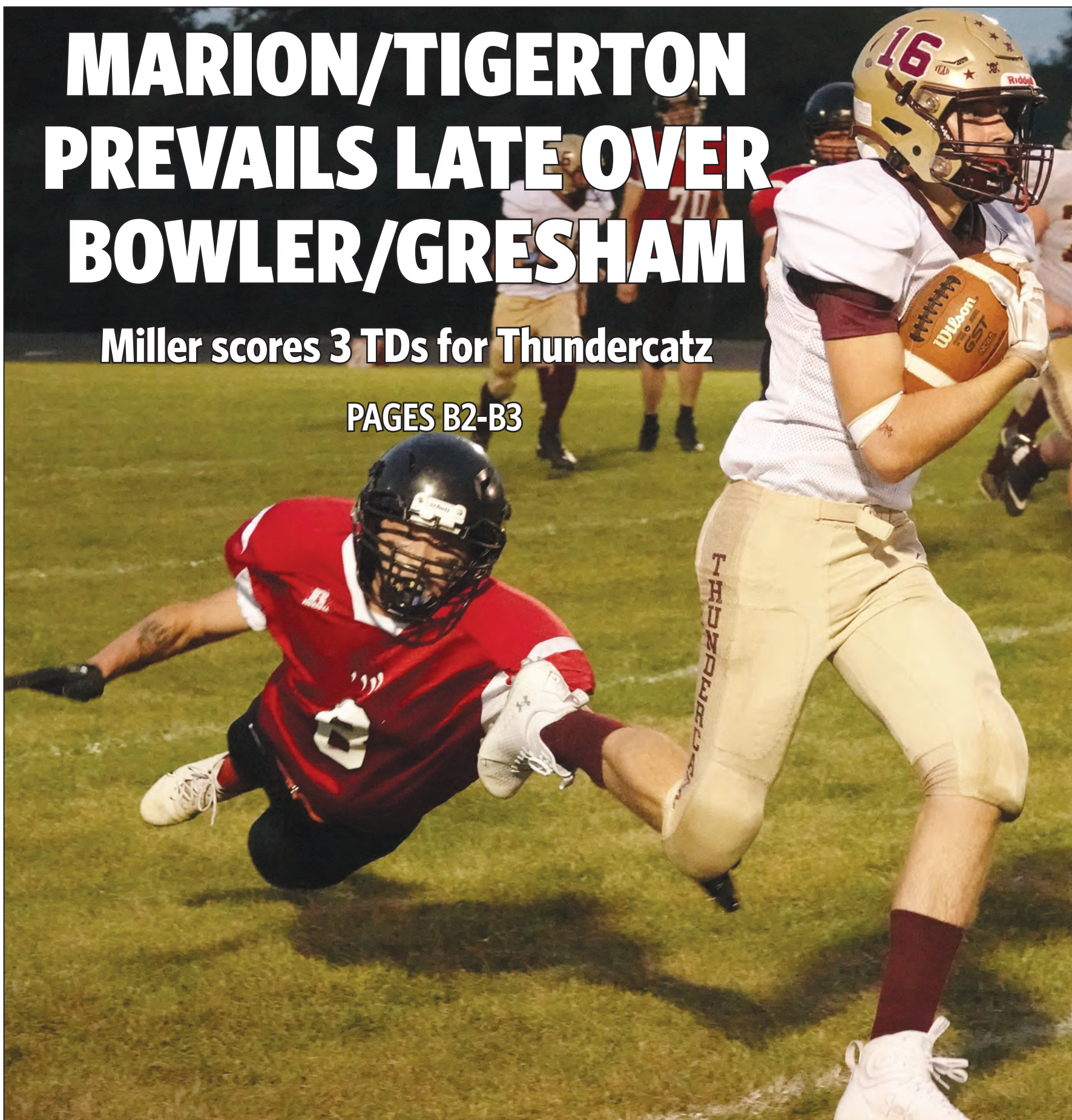

Marion/Tigerton knocks off Bowler/Gresham

Thundercatz rally late after losing lead

The Marion/Tigerton football team lost a two-score lead but rallied late to secure a 28-22 win over Bowler/Gresham in a Central Conference 8-player battle on Sept. 16 in Bowler.

Bowler/Gresham took its first lead of the game with a touchdown early in the fourth quarter. The teams combined for four turnovers in under a two-minute span before Marion/

Tigerton took over at the Bowler/Gresham 32-yard line.

Marion/Tigerton used the running game to move the ball toward the end zone, and were helped out by three penalties from the hosts. On second-and-goal from the 13-yard line, Marion/Tigerton quarterback Braxton Genskow found Parker Miller on a touchdown pass, and after a two-point conversion, the visitors led 28-22.

"It was more or less my teammates," said Genskow of rallying late. "They saw my head go down (after throwing an interception) and all my teammates know I get down on myself a lot. They all came over

to me, gave me my pep talks and it put me in the zone mentally. They prepared me. I came back out, and we executed."

"We don't worry about that last play because we can't change anything about that," said Miller. "We go on, we move forward. That's all we did. We kept our heads high."

Bowler/Gresham's offense worked the ball all the way to the Marion/Tigerton 14-yard line, but four straight incomplete passes ended the team's chance to at least tie it. Marion/Tigerton then picked up a couple first downs to seal up the win.

The touchdown pass from Genskow to Miller was a familiar sight in

the contest, with the duo connecting for three total scores.

After the teams traded three punts to open the game, Genskow threw a screen pass to Miller, and Miller took the ball the distance for a 56-yard touchdown.

The visiting Thundercatz also scored on its next offensive drive, with Ethan Carlson scoring on a 21-yard run.

Bowler/Gresham got back into the game when quarterback Emmitt Kietlinski scrambled for a 47-yard touchdown a little more than halfway through the second quarter.

With under 20 seconds to go in the first half, Genskow and Miller

connected again, this time on an 8-yard slant pass.

"My quarterback," said Miller on what allowed him to score three touchdowns. "He puts the ball in spots and I catch it. It's all on him."

Marion/Tigerton appeared in control, but Bowler/Gresham continued to battle and eventually starting to chip away at its deficit.

The hosts got within six, 20-14, after Kietlinski hit Conner Kaquatosh on a 32-yard touchdown pass. On the drive, Kietlinski converted a fourth-down run to keep the offense on the field.

The momentum continued to swing in the favor of Bowler/Gresham after stopping a fourth-down pass from Marion/Tigerton, giving the hosts the ball at the Thundercatz' 35-yard line.

Kietlinski and Beau Brunner connected for a 20-yard gain before Kietlinski scored his second rushing touchdown of the day. A two-point conversion pass from Brunner to Kietlinski gave the hosts their first lead.

"We could tell in the first half we were there, we just couldn't get that spark," said Kietlinski, adding it was the team's best showing of the year. "So at halftime, we kind of talked about shoring up our blocking on offense and some pass things to try to get a little more time. And on defense, we just wanted to keep busting the gaps and keep stopping their run."

"I was very happy with how we came out there and did it in the second half. We just ended up coming a little bit short."

The string of four turnovers in less than two minutes began with Bowler/Gresham recovering the ball after Marion/Tigerton wasn't able to handle a short kickoff.

On the second play of the Bowler/Gresham drive, the team fumbled the ball over to Marion/Tigerton, with Sam Anhueser recovering. Marion/Tigerton got in just three offensive plays before Kietlinski picked off a pass. The Thundercatz got the ball right back, with Anhueser picking off a pass that was batted around a few times.

Chargers rally late to claim 5th set

The Wittenberg-Birnamwood High School volleyball team is seeking a fourth consecutive Central Wisconsin Conference-East Division title this fall.

The back-and-forth battle between the two conference foes began right at the start of the match.

Bonduel got off to a quick 4-0 lead behind strong serving from Hailee Thompson before Witt-Birn won the next eight points as Lilly Betry served. Witt-Birn led 11-7 and looked to be in control, but Bonduel went on a 6-0 run as Abby Stoltenow served.

The teams traded points for awhile before Metropulos helped the Chargers take control. She delivered three kills on a 6-1 spurt from the visitors, and Rogowski soon

ended the first set with a kill.

Set two saw Witt-Birn leading in the early going. The Chargers were up 13-9, but the Bears scored six of the next eight points to tie things up. After helping Bonduel get back in the set, Audrey Weier then gave the hosts the lead with a kill.

The teams were neck and neck in the final few points of the set, being tied at 20, 21 and 23. After a Rogowski kill tied things at 23, a Witt-Birn attack landed just out of bounds, and a Bonduel ace secured the set win.

"We knew that they had two really good hitters (Rogowski and Metropulos), so we worked a lot in practice on coverage, so we were prepared for their hitting because that was their powerful point," said Weier. "I think we did really good with that."

The third set saw Witt-Birn jump out to an early 6-1 lead. A couple Metropulos kills and an ace from Allison Linke bumped the lead up to 10, 12-2.

Bonduel battled hard to get back within three points on a couple different occasions, but a couple more Metropulos kills and a run of three straight aces from Betry helped the Chargers pull away.

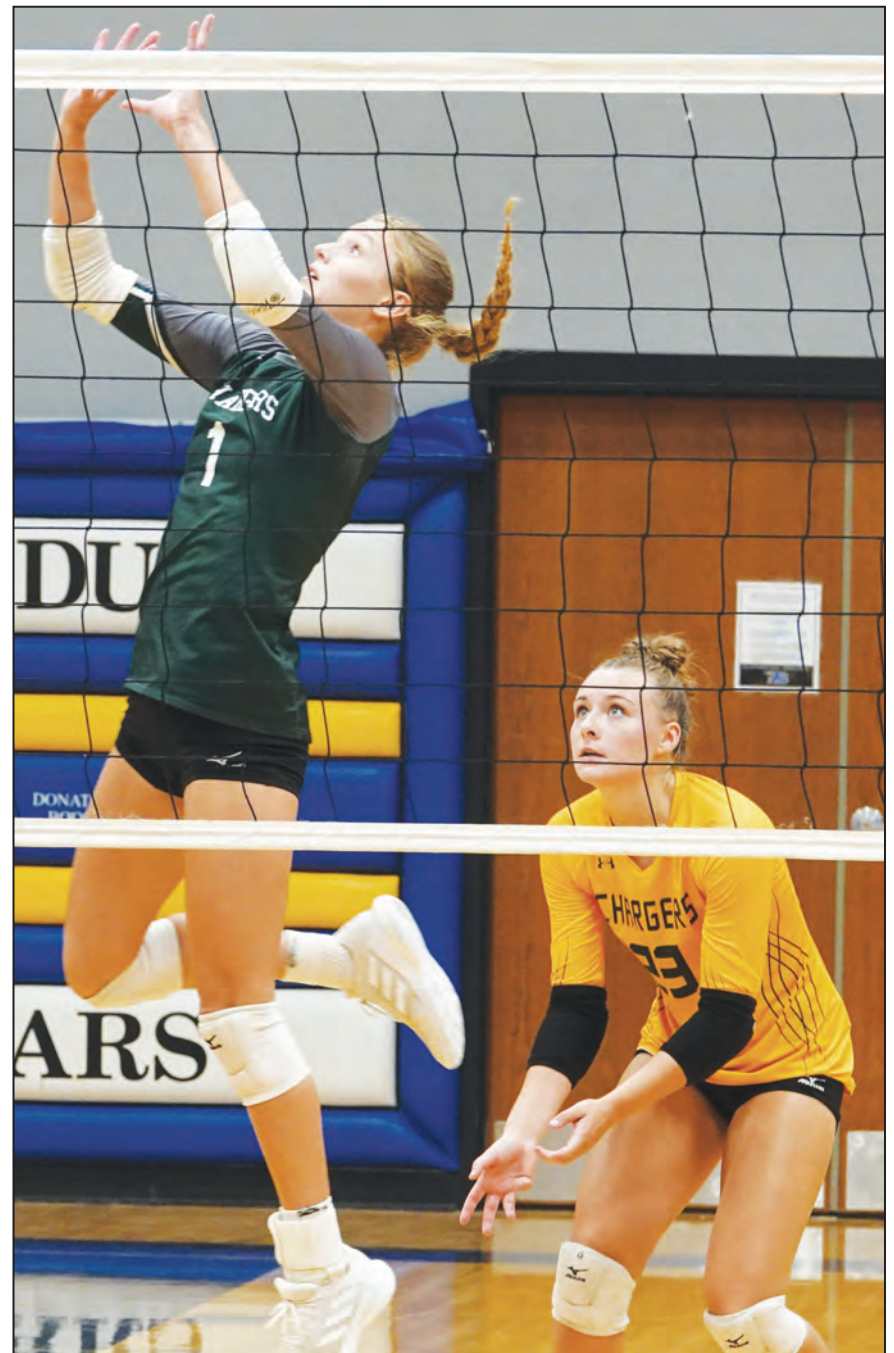
The fourth set was a much tighter battle, with neither team ahead by more than two until Bonduel went on a 5-1 run to go ahead 12-8. Weier and Nakiyah Henning had kills on the run for the Bears.

Despite coming up short in the

"It's really all mental, mental blocks, getting rid of that. Having one good play and holding on to that," said Weier on how the team can limit big runs from opponents. "Putting the first ball down and not giving them free balls, really trying to contain them."

The Gresham/Bowler boys soccer team dropped a Central Wisconsin Conference match to Northland Lutheran on Sept. 16 in Gresham, falling 5-1.

"He passed it up to me, I got past all the defenders and then I shot it into the goal," said Belongia of the play.

Unfortunately for the co-op, the strong start to the match didn't serve as a sign of things to come. A couple minutes after the first goal, Northland Lutheran scored the equalizer.

The visitors' constant attacking led to tons of shots on goal, but Gresham/Bowler goalie Kaidyen Zaitz and the defense in front of him did a solid job at keeping the match tight.

Northland Lutheran took the lead with a goal in the final minutes of the first half.

The visitors then took control with another score early in the second half. As the deficit started to grow for Gresham/Bowler, the effort level began to go down, according to a couple co-op players.

"I feel like once they started scoring their goals, we got demoralized," said Edward Castellanos. "As they kept scoring, we kept getting more and more demoralized. So we need to work on that."

While Zaitz and the defense were able to fend off several attacks, on one of the few occasions the group did not, Northland Lutheran took advantage for its fourth goal.

Gresham/Bowler was able to push the ball into Northland Lutheran's side of the field a couple times late in the match, with Castellanos getting a few cracks at scores, but the visitors' goalie was able to turn away the shots.

Eventually, Northland Lutheran netted its fifth goal to finish off the scoring for the match.

Gresham/Bowler interim coach Cory Bougie still walked away from the match pleased at the team's performance, commenting that they played hard.

Only having 10 players, with each needing to play all game, took its toll on the co-op, but the players also didn't use it as an excuse.

"I don't know, with only 10 it's pretty hard, as you'd probably guess," said Zaitz. "I'd say we did pretty good. There were a couple goals I could have saved, but it happens."

"It's hard, because you can't sub out to anybody and get a drink. You have to play all game and you get really tired," said Belongia.

Along with not getting down on themselves after falling behind or giving up goals, Castellanos didn't think there were a ton of things the team really had to clean up.

"We did great but passing, we need to up that a little bit," said Castellanos. "But other than that, I think we did good all the way around."

From the perspective of the goalie, Zaitz said the team needs to a better job of marking up. "There were a lot of times where someone would run through and there'd be no one on them."

Wisconsin routs New Mexico State

Badgers have nearly 600 yards of offense

The Wisconsin Badgers football team bounced back from a loss with a 66-7 rout of New Mexico State on Sept. 17 in Madison.

It was a slow start for the Badgers, who led just 7-0 after a quarter. Wisconsin scored three touchdowns in the first four minutes of the second quarter and finished the quarter with 28 points. Wisconsin added 21 more points in the third quarter and added a

ninth touchdown and field goal in the final quarter.

Wisconsin outgained New Mexico State 595-242. The Badgers passed for 335 yards and had just four passes fall incomplete.

Graham Mertz threw for 251 yards and three touchdowns. He threw two touchdowns to Skyler Bell and a score to Keontez Lewis. Mertz was intercepted once and sacked once.

Backup quarterback Myles Burkett completed four of his five

passes for 84 yards.

Bell finished with four receptions for 108 yards. Dean Ingram had three grabs for 63 yards, and Clay Cundiff had two catches for 57 yards.

Running back Braelon Allen scored three touchdowns in the game, but only finished with 86 rushing yards. Isaac Guerendo scored two touchdowns and tallied 77 rushing yards, while Chez Mellusi had a touchdown run and 71 rushing yards.

Outside linebacker C.J. Goetz led the Badgers' defense with six total tackles, including 1½ tackles for losses. Inside linebackers Jake Chaney and

Maema Njongmeta and cornerback Ricardo Hallman each intercepted a pass. Nick Herbig had the lone sack.

Wisconsin's Nate Van Zelst kicked a 27-yard field goal for the final points in the contest.

It was the first time Wisconsin topped 60 points in a game since 2019 and most points since 2014.

Wisconsin opens up Big Ten Conference play on Sept. 24 on the road against Ohio State. The Buckeyes improved to 3-0 on the season after a 77-21 win over Toledo on Sept. 17. Wisconsin has not beaten Ohio State since 2010, with eight straight losses since.

Boys, girls state tournaments relocated to Middleton

The Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Board of Control approved an executive staff recommendation to move the boys and girls state hockey tournaments to Bob Suter's Capitol Ice Arena in Middleton, effective in March 2023, at its September meeting on Sept. 16.

"We are excited about the opportunity to host the upcoming WIAA boys and girls state hockey championships at Bob Suter's Capitol Ice Arena," WIAA Assistant Director LeVar Ridgeway said. "With the move, we look forward to creating a great state championship atmosphere for our student-athletes, coaches and fans in a hockey centric facility."

The WIAA and Bob Suter's

Capitol Ice Arena agreed to a two-year term. Built in 1999, the venue received a multi-million dollar renovation in 2018 that added significant amenities and upgrades. The facility is equipped with two full sheets of ice with seating for 2,611 spectators, a state-of-the-art sound system, scoreboard and a high-definition video board.

The arena also has a media broadcasting booth, eight public locker rooms, six public bathrooms, and one family restroom. It is the current home for the USHL Madison Capitols and Madison Capitols AAA hockey.

"We are thrilled to be hosting the WIAA state tournaments for the

next two years," Bob Suter's Capitol Ice Arena President Ryan Suter said. "We are thankful to the WIAA for entrusting us with this historic event and believe our venue will provide an incredible atmosphere for the players and fans. We look forward to working with the WIAA and the City of Middleton to host this event and crown state champions."

The boys and girls state hockey tournaments are scheduled for Thursday-Saturday, March 2-4. The state tournaments competition time scheduled will be slightly altered to accommodate the change in venue.

"The Wisconsin Hockey Coaches Association is excited about this option for the WIAA state hockey tour-

naments," President Brian Brandt said. "The WIAA and WHCA have worked collaboratively to give the best experience for our athletes and showcase their talents in an exciting environment."

The boys state hockey tournament has been held at the Veterans Memorial Coliseum at the Alliant Energy Center since the inception of the event in 1971. The only exceptions during that span was in 1974 and 1975 when it was held in Green Bay and in 2021 when the state tournament was held in Wisconsin Rapids during the COVID-19 pandemic. The girls state hockey tournament has been held in conjunction with the boys tournament since the sport was added in 2002.

The meeting will begin at 8:30 a.m. on Sept. 28, originating from Northwood Technical College, 2100 Beaser Ave., Ashland. The board will act on items 1-4 and 7-8 as listed on the agenda, which can be found at dnr.wisconsin.gov/About/NRB/2022/Sept.

The public is encouraged to watch the August board meeting on the DNR's YouTube channel (www.youtube.com/watch?v=V-Pp-skgBVk&ab_channel=WIDNRTV).

On Sept. 27, the Wisconsin NRB will tour and/or receive presentations at Saxon Harbor Campground & Marina, Copper Falls State Park and

Kreher Park Pavilion. No action will be taken.

During the September meeting, several items the board will be considering include:

- Preliminary public hearing and comment period for the Statement of Scope for Board Order WA-12-21, for proposed rules affecting chapters NR 600 to 679 to modify and expand universal waste management.

- Preliminary public hearing and comment period for the Statement of Scope for Board Order WA-11-21, for proposed rules affecting chapters NR 660 to 679 to incorporate federal hazardous waste regulations promulgated since the previous authorization of the Wisconsin hazardous waste

program, relating to updated test methods.

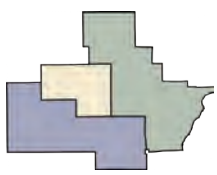

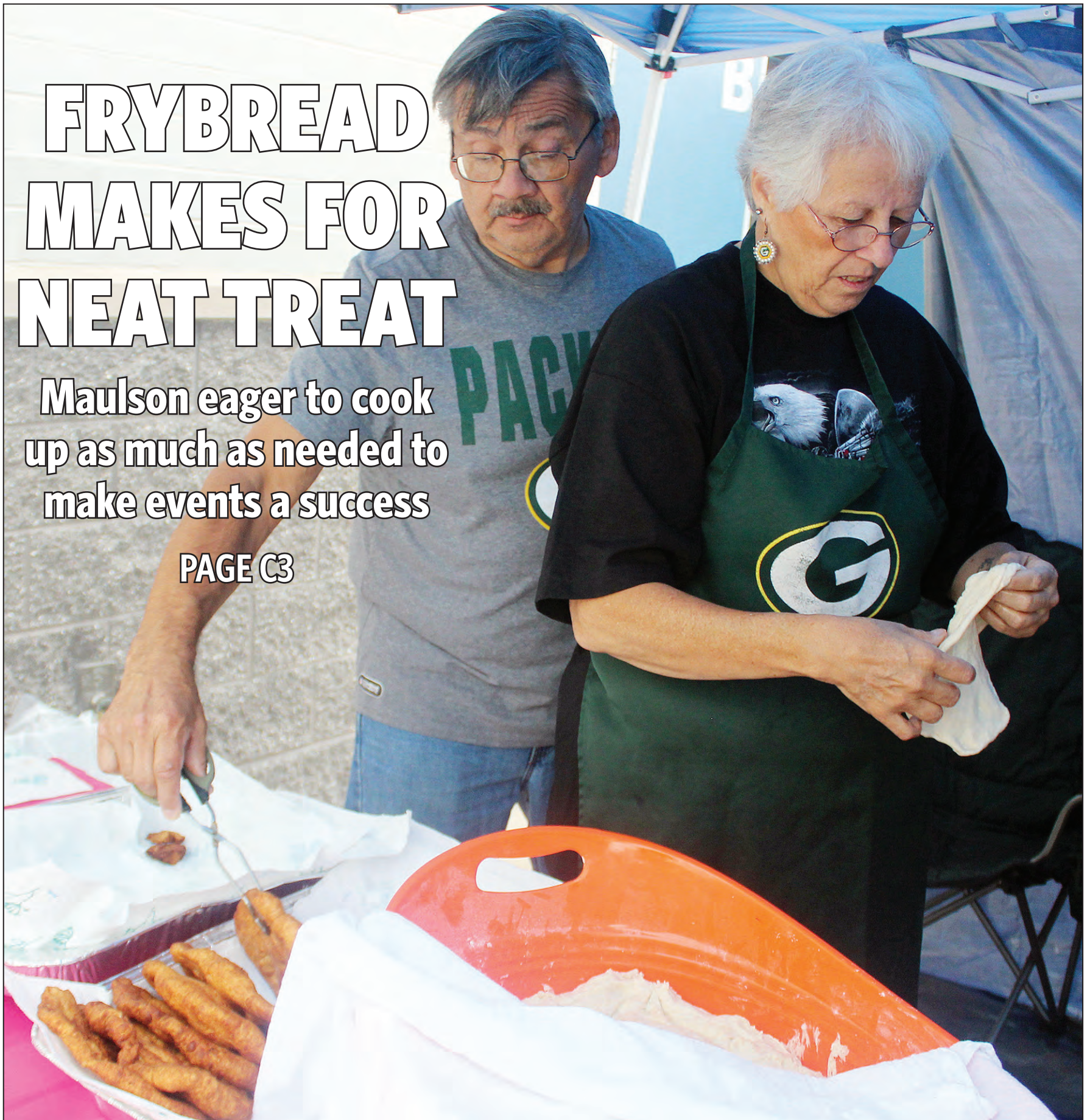

Frybread making personal for Maulson

Menominee woman enjoys how it makes people feel and loves how it tastes

Many a pow wow or cultural event for Native American tribes has the sight of golden, round bread somewhere, often heaped with taco fixings, honey or other foods.

Lorna Maulson of the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin knows the frybread all too well. Many times, she's the one making the bread and cooking it up for people at various events. She recently lent her talents to Wolf River Lutheran High School, cooking up over 150 pieces of frybread to be sold at a taco luncheon fundraiser for the parochial school.

"I'm constantly asked to make frybread for some kind of event," Maulson said. "It seems like almost every week someone asks me."

On the morning of Sept. 11, as she was talking about frybread and how it's made, she dropped a piece of dough into a pan filled with cooking oil. The dough immediately sizzled and started to turn dark. She took out the burnt dough and said that the oil was too hot, and with the help of her husband, Dennis, the oil soon cooled to a point where the bread could be cooked in a fast and efficient way but didn't turn it into edible charcoal.

The history of frybread goes back to when the United States government took control of Native American ancestral lands and herded the people onto reservations. Instead of the crops and animals they usually depended on for sustenance and survival, Native Americans were given flour and other basic materials to make the food they needed. Those materials were made into the frybread that people enjoy today.

"In 1864, the Navajos invented frybread from the surplus given to them of flour, salt and lard," Maulson said.

Although many Native Americans denounce the notion that frybread is a part of their culture, others see the food as a way of surviving tragedy, and the frybread has become a symbol of tribes' resilience. Maulson said frybread is commonly accepted, and she sees it even as a "treat."

"It was a treat to everybody," Maulson said. "Later on, it was served with butter, sugar and cinnamon. There are other things you can put onto it — powdered sugar and more."

The frybread was taken to pow

wows, she said, and that is how the Indian tacos were created. Even though it was softer than a traditional taco shell and thicker than a standard tortilla, a person could easily heap seasoned meat, cheese, lettuce, tomatoes, onions and anything else that makes for a tasty taco.

"Taco meat was added to the frybread, but I add all kinds of stuff to it," Maulson said. "I've made pizzas with frybread. We've put hot dogs with frybread. You can do anything with frybread."

The tacos are still the favorite, though, but Maulson can see why, as America loves tacos of all kinds, coining terms like taco Tuesdays.

"When you add them to a frybread, that makes it more tasty," Maulson said. "It's filling, and if a person eats two tacos, that makes me happy because they're filling."

One time, a lady asked Maulson to put an Oreo into the frybread.

"That was my strangest request

ever," Maulson said. "I didn't enjoy it because I'd rather have an Oreo in milk, but she really liked it. I made her two, and she ate them."

Maulson likes to combine flour, sugar, salt and baking powder with her frybread, but everybody has their own ways, even within her own tribe.

"Each tribe has put their own way of making it," Maulson said, noting that the Ojibwe tribe, which her husband hails from, makes the frybread without sugar. "It depends on what you like. I like the sugar."

Maulson wanted to learn how to make frybread when she was younger, and she went to a class taught by a Fanny LeMay, who taught her the basics. It wasn't until she met Dennis and his mother that she got the chance to make it full time.

"She was heavily involved with the pow wows," Maulson said. "I learned a little more from her how to make big amounts like I do. My mother-in-law taught me, more or

less, what I know about frybread."

Maulson noted that she learned to put a hole in the middle of the frybread just before she puts it in the oil to cook, learning from her mother-in-law that it's supposed to keep bad spirits away.

For Maulson, it takes about a half-hour for the bread to rise enough to prepare it for cooking. Measuring cups and spoons are not required for her, as she often puts handfuls of the dry ingredients into the bowl. It still comes out just fine for her, she said.

Maulson hopes to teach her grandchildren how to make frybread, but she feels that it will be better once they are older. Even though the bread did not exist until the 19th century, Maulson feels it should remain a part of tribal culture, as it has a way of bringing people together through its taste.

"I really love frybread," Maulson said. "My kids love it. To me, it's a treat. It's a symbol of our nationality. I love to see people enjoying it."

Artists coming back into limelight

Miles of Art's return includes creative producers showcasing work at Novitiate

After a two-year absence, the Miles of Art tour is returning Oct. 1.

The 2020 and 2021 tours were canceled due to the pandemic. The work of various local artists will be on display at four locations throughout the county from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The Novitiate, W9711 Butternut Road, Gresham will feature various artists displaying pottery, basketweaving, painting, wood turning, wood carving, quilting, fluid paint and resin art.

"The artists in Gresham used to meet at an old feed mill in town," said Curt Knoke, of Gresham, who is instrumental in correlating the artists with the Miles of Art.

The Novitiate stop on the Miles of Art Tour costs \$10 per carload. It includes a walking tour of the historic Novitiate mansion grounds. Proceeds will be shared with Gresham and Keshena scholarship funds.

The mansion was built in 1939 on a 180-acre property along the Red River. New owners, Renewing Management, purchased the property in 2021. They plan to reimagine and repurpose the former Alexian Brothers Novitiate, with partners in the local community.

Knoke was very positive about the restoration of the mansion.

"There is a new roof now, the graffiti was removed, and new windows could be installed before the Miles of Art tour," he said. "Most of the artists will be inside, but Fred Laedtke's art is too big, so he will have a display of his sculptures outside."

Laedtke is a well-known scrap metal sculptor. He started his craft about 16 years ago after his daughter died.

"I guess it was a kind of therapy," Laedtke said. "J&R Machine in Shawano got me started by supplying an awful lot of materials for me to work with. I get scrap iron from all over the place, junkyards and flea markets. I'll have a good supply of work on display, including some fire pits. My other pieces range in height from 6 to 15 feet, but I won't be bringing the tallest ones to Miles of Art."

Concessions on the Novitiate grounds, by Loretta and Amy Menchaca of Keshena, will include chicken wild rice soup, chili, frybread tacos, burgers on frybread, soda and water.

In addition to the Novitiate stop on the tour, visitors can travel to nearby Aschenbrener Bronze, W10181 Cherry Road, Gresham, which will feature the one-of-a-kind bronze sculptures of David Aschenbrener. Some of his works include metal wall hangings and metal figures.

A featured stop on the tour are the studios of Judy and Lenz Pubanz. Pubanz Art is located at N6725 Balsam Row Road, Shawano. They feature paintings, woodcraft puzzles and photography and have participated in Miles of Art in the past.

The fourth stop on the tour is Off the Wall Stu-

dio and Gallery, 122 S. Main St., Shawano. Paintings, jewelry, sculptures and drawings will be displayed.

"We have local artists," said Tamara Magee, owner of the gallery. "Off the Wall Studio is a gallery, so there is a lot of art. We are known for

our paint and sip nights every third Friday of the month."

Off the Wall has been a participant in Miles of Art for at least three years prior to the pandemic, according to Magee.

Caroline preparing for 34th Colorama

Event attracts horse enthusiasts, but equine not required for fun

What started out more than 30 years ago as a late-season horse ride has turned into an annual event that draws big crowds to a small Shawano County community each fall.

The Caroline Lions Club will hold its 34th Colorama Sept. 29 to Oct. 2, at W12721 Buss Road, just off of County Road G, in Caroline.

"I understand there were four or five (Lions Club) members that had horses and they thought they would give it a try," event chairman and Caroline Lions Club president Jim Polzin said. "The first year, I think they had 100-some horses."

Trails will be open for horse riding all four days.

Colorama also includes live music.

"We have a band Thursday night, Friday night and Saturday night," Polzin said. "A lot of people come up just to camp and for the music. I'll bet half the people that come here don't have horses anymore."

The entertainment lineup includes Bootjack Road (7:30 p.m. Sept. 29); the Brady Luke Band (8:30 p.m. Sept. 30); and Whiskey & Lace (8:30 p.m. Oct. 1).

The schedule for Sept. 29 includes

food in the Lions building; a trail ride; vendors in the vendor area; and free admission to the Bootjack Road concert.

The schedule for Sept. 30 includes a trail ride; food and vendors; and the Brady Luke Band (\$5 admission).

The Oct. 1 schedule includes a trail ride leaving from 10 a.m. to noon; a bean bag tournament at 12:30 p.m.; food and vendors; a Legion Auxiliary craft sale from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.; horse-drawn wagon rides; and Feast with Frontier Friends at 6 p.m.

The Oct. 2 schedule includes a pancake breakfast from 7-10:30 a.m.; a trail ride at 9:30 a.m.; a parade at 1 p.m.; and auction following the parade; and a raffle drawing following the auction.

Shuttle rides will be available throughout the weekend.

Many people take advantage of Colorama's campsites, Polzin said.

"We have almost 1,000 campsites," he said. "Not everyone has campers. Some people get two, one for their camper and one for their horses."

The Lions Club uses proceeds from Colorama to support area organizations.

"After the parade on Sunday, we have an auction and that money all goes to the Lions Camp in Rosholt," Polzin said. "It goes right to the camp. We don't keep any of it."

Colorama is a highlight of the year for many Caroline residents, according to Polzin.

"This is pretty much their last ride of the year and they come and enjoy themselves," he said. "There's always stuff going on."

Cops connect with kids via archery, fishing

Some of us only think of police as life-or-death crimefighters or the enforcers of traffic laws, but a statewide program aimed at keeping kids on the straight and narrow brings cops and kids together to enjoy archery, fishing and bowling while teaching youngsters that the men and women in blue are really pretty cool.

The Cops and Kids Foundation, launched in Sussex by retired Pewaukee Police Officer

Bob Kraemer in 2010, has spread its programs throughout the state and now comes to the Clintonville area.

Children ages 7 to 17 in Clintonville and the surrounding

area can now sign up for the Oct. 12 Badges and Bullseyes program, which will teach the basics of archery to kids at the Clintonville Bow Hunters club grounds, N11517 Boy Scout Lane, Clintonville.

Many Wisconsin police departments have embraced the Cops and Kids Foundation, which has the basic philosophy of “doing things to keep kids occupied when they are not in school,” Kraemer explained.

The program started in the Pewaukee and Milwaukee areas, but has expanded to include Marathon, Merrill, Wausau and others. Although initially aimed at inner-city kids, the expansion now includes kids from all social and economic levels.

Cops and Kids has three major activities: archery (called Badges and Bullseyes), fishing (called Cops and Bobbers) and bowling (called Gutter Busters). There’s also a mentoring program, where some of the volunteer officers eventually become overseers for some kids to keep them on the straight and narrow path.

Law enforcement agencies contact Kraemer’s nonprofit organization, then apply for grants that help cover the initial equipment costs, including archery and fishing gear. The grants cover the program costs for three years, at which point the department either returns the gear or continues it through community donations or other funding.

Clintonville Police Officer Joe LeBreck decided to try the program

as a community outreach effort to kids. LeBreck previously spent four years on the Oconto County Sheriff’s Department and 10 years at the Adams County Sheriff’s Department. At the latter, he was a full-time community policing and crime prevention officer, and that expertise carries over to his work on the Clintonville force.

“I want to leave something behind when I’m all done,” LeBreck said.

The city of Clintonville has embraced the idea, creating a community policing fund and a K-9 Fund to allow fundraising for both. LeBreck and the community organized an Aug. 4 golf outing that raised \$8,000 for the two funds. Donations are always welcome and can be made at the police station.

Community policing can be as simple as making friendly contacts with kids. This summer, Clintonville police handed out freezer pops to kids, walking through back yards and parks to distribute the treats, LeBreck said.

The area’s first Cops and Kids Foundation program occurred May 4, when 24 kids enjoyed fishing on Pigeon Lake through the Cops and

Bobbers program. LeBreck said the program’s donated fishing poles, life jackets and other gear combined with community donations to give every participant a T-shirt and lunch, plus some other goodies. The Pigeon Lake Foundation provided pontoon boats for the kids to ride for better fishing.

“You take them on a pontoon boat, and they think they are on a yacht,” Kraemer said.

Next up is the Oct. 12 Badges and Bullseyes program, which aims to introduce kids ages 7 to 17 to archery.

LeBreck said the participants will meet at the Clintonville Police Station at 9:45 a.m. for rides to the Clintonville Bow Hunters club. Families can pick up their kids at 2 p.m. at the station.

As all Cops and Kids Foundation programs, there is no cost for participants. Lunch is provided.

The eight donated Wisconsin-made Mathews compound bows are fully adjustable for a variety of kid sizes for a proper fit. LeBreck said they will use a drop net to catch the arrows to help reduce the number of lost arrows.

Clintonville-area kids wanting to

register can watch for flyers or email LeBreck at jlebreck@clintonvillewi.gov. A liability waiver is required.

A Gutter Busters bowling program is slated for Dec. 28 at Memory Lanes Bar and Grill in Clintonville. A curling event is being planned for next winter, LeBreck noted.

Kraemer said his foundation takes advantage of the NASP, National Archery in the Schools Program, to get a discounted price on archery gear.

LeBreck noted that the Wisconsin Bowhunters Association, based in Clintonville, has a bow loaner program for youth who may not be able to afford a bow of their own.

Some officers participating in Cops and Kids Foundation programs wear their uniforms (some departments require it), while others dress down in comfortable clothes, but typically wear their badges to remind kids that the men and women in blue definitely have a fun side, Kraemer said.

Truth in packaging — do your eyes deceive you?

Have you noticed that while you are paying the same price for packaged items you routinely purchase, the amount inside keeps shrinking? Take the things you usually buy, starting with your morning coffee, toast, jam, juice and supplements. The cans, bags, jars and bottles might look the same size, but the net weight printed on the package tells a different story. It's called "shrinkflation," and it's been going on for decades.

Twenty years ago, consumer goods came in standard sized containers based on our arcane Imperial measurement system: 8, 16, 32, 64 ounces. (Please don't get me started on why we should have gone metric back in the 1960s). Gradually, I noticed a discernible reduction in the net amount of product inside what appeared to be the same size container. Companies were clearly putting less inside packages to keep prices down and profits up. During this current round of inflation, it's gotten downright ridiculous.

For example: Craving a salty snack, a friend recently put six quarters in an upscale motel vend-

ing machine and pressed the Baked Lays button. With great fanfare and a clunking noise that could wake the dead, the machine dispensed a regular-sized bag that contained exactly seven medium-sized chips. Does the word "rip-off" still have a hyphen?

Another case in point: As I am writing this column, I am sipping my morning coffee while watching the early September sunlight dancing on the Townsend Flowage. To make my java, I opened a fresh bag of Eight O'Clock Hazelnut purchased on sale at Mike's Supermarket for \$7.99. The receipt says I saved \$4. Did I? The same-sized bag has gone from 14 ounces (57 cents per ounce) to 11 ounces (73 cents per ounce) in a single year. I am a words person and definitely not good at numbers, which is why I love my calculator. It says my actual savings was \$1.76.

ing machine and pressed the Baked Lays button. With great fanfare and a clunking noise that could wake the dead, the machine dispensed a regular-sized bag that contained exactly seven medium-sized chips. Does the word "rip-off" still have a hyphen?

It's happened even with the cheaper stuff. The largest cans of Hills Brothers, Folgers and Maxwell House used to contain 48 ounces of coffee. Today, they hold 23. How is it that the same size can, which still looks full when I open it, has a third less coffee? Did the manufacturers plump up the coffee with some kind of vapor? Well, as a matter of fact they did; it's called air infusion. We all know advertising can be full of hot air, but I'll go out on a limb here and say that the products being sold shouldn't be.

Take another common grocery purchase — bread. It may look like the loaf you used to buy, but a traditional two-pound loaf of bread now weighs 22 to 24 ounces. A one-pound loaf of French bread weighs in at 12 oz. A package of what used to be half a dozen hard rolls contains five. That's a 15-25% cut in net product. This clever strategy is designed to increase profits, and it works. What doesn't work is magical thinking. I wish smaller size portions meant Jon would eat less and lose weight, but no such thing is happening here at Otter Run.

Another important thing: As someone who has always lived by my mother's Great Depression "waste not, want not" advice, this state of affairs results in unnecessary, wasteful packaging. Yesterday, I opened a bottle of a dietary supplement I have been taking for years. The box said I was getting 72, and I did. Last year, the same package the pills came in held 90.

Wouldn't you think companies could save money by reducing packaging to an appropriate size? It would help shrink our waste-stream, and they can sell the same product at a lower price. I'd even settle for them pocketing the difference to reduce the amount of garbage and recycling Jon has to take to the dump. It could even save a few pennies on our property tax bill. I am told Townsend's tipping fees are calculated by the ton, which I am sure is still exactly 2,000 pounds.

Health crisis prompts consistent giving

Shawano family, grateful for lives saved, has given to ThedaCare for 18 years

In April 2004, Nancy Marcell and her husband, Corey, had only been home a month with their newborn son, Kaden, when Marcell experienced a health crisis.

"I was just walking on the treadmill in the basement, and my left leg started shaking a little bit," Marcell said. "I thought, 'OK, maybe I'm pushing it too soon.'"

The shaking continued, even after Marcell took a break. Just after she went to find her husband, Marcell suddenly experienced a grand mal seizure.

"The next thing I know, they put me in the ambulance and I went to the Shawano hospital," she said.

Marcell was eventually taken to ThedaCare Regional Medical Center-Neenah, where she underwent an angiogram, which led her medical team to discover that Marcell had a blockage in her sagittal sinus vein.

So soon after bringing their infant son home, the last thing the young couple expected was the very real possibility that a blood clot in Marcell's brain could take her from the family.

"There were many sleepless nights," she said. "We were told that we should bring family members in because they didn't know what was going to happen."

Marcell's medical team was able to resolve the issue without surgery, working to ensure she was comfortable as she recuperated in the intensive care unit. She remembered

feeling like she was in good hands throughout the terrifying event and felt a deep appreciation for care teams.

Her health issue has never returned, and their son, Kaden, also is thriving. This year, he graduated from high school and is on his way to Fox Valley Technical College to study business and finance. He's also an avid golfer with a job at Channel Lake Golf Course.

After her recovery, when the couple later received a letter from the ThedaCare Family of Foundations, Corey Marcell suggested they donate.

"I'm just really happy with everything that the care teams did," said Corey Marcell, who works at Georgia-Pacific in the electro-maintenance department. "I thought they did a really good job, and that's why I wanted to give something back."

For the past 18 years, the Marcells have given to the foundation each year.

"We donate to things that we care about and are close to us," said Nancy Marcell, who worked with her husband at Georgia-Pacific until she left to work for the city of Shawano five years ago in order to spend more time with her parents. "We weren't giving thousands of

Involving everyone is key for Pack's success

Green Bay hopes to continue featuring spread out passing attack

After the week one loss to the Minnesota Vikings, it became clear that the Green Bay Packers had to involve more players in their offense in order to be successful.

This came on the back of only giving running backs Aaron Jones and A.J. Dillon 15 combined carries in that week one loss. Head coach Matt LaFleur and the Green Bay Packers reconciled that by giving Jones and Dillon 37 combined touches in the team's 27-10 victory over the Chicago Bears.

Those results immediately paid off, as the team rushed for 203 yards and Jones scored two touchdowns. With that being a step in the right direction for the Packers, getting all of the receivers involved is still a priority.

"Those are two good players and you are always trying to get your best players the ball," said LaFleur.

Without Davante Adams, Aaron Rodgers completed 19 passes to eight different receivers in week two. The biggest benefactor was Sammy Watkins, as he recorded three catches for 93 yards. Randall Cobb, Aaron Jones and Christian Watson also tied Watkins with the team lead in receptions with three.

With 19 pass completions spread out over eight receivers, that begs the question, is this what Packer fans can expect from the offense this year?

"The days of one guy getting 15 targets and the next guy getting four or five are kind of over," said Rodgers. "We are going to have to find ways to get different guys the football in different spots."

While that may be the case, it may not necessarily be a bad thing for Green Bay's offense. Becoming predictable has been a crutch for Packers teams in the past, so to have seven or eight guys who can serve one part of the offense may be better in the long run than what Packer fans saw with Adams' 28% target share in 2021.

"All of those guys made big plays," said LaFleur on the balanced passing attack against Chicago. "There's a lot of plays where (wide receiver coach Jason) Vrable does such a great job subbing those guys

in and out that I don't even know who is going to be in the game necessarily and that is such a far cry from what we've done in the past here in terms of featuring a guy like Davante."

Allen Lazard, who seemingly took over the No. 1 receiving spot when Adams left, logged his first game of the season in 2022, in the win over the Bears. Though Lazard only had two catches, one of them came in the red zone for a 5-yard touchdown.

That should be a bright spot to Packer fans, as while Lazard is not the same player that Adams is, it became obvious that the Packers wanted to get Lazard involved in an area where he can use his 6-foot, 5-inch frame to succeed.

To go along with Lazard, guys

like Romeo Doubs, Cobb and Watson are being used in positions that play to their strengths, rather than the Packers asking the receivers to do more than they are accustomed to. Lazard in the red zone, Cobb on third down and Doubs catching screens were the major roles that those three respectfully served in Green Bay's week two win.

"There's a lot of different plays for specific guys," said Rodgers. "We had a package for Christian, we had a package for Romeo, obviously a lot of plays for Sammy and for Allen ... and then a couple of wrinkles for Cobby. We have had (Cobb) in the backfield on third down, so that is kind of the way it's going to go."

The most intriguing newcomer that Green Bay brought to town in the offseason though is Christian

Watson. The North Dakota State product started training camp with an injury, but worked his way to starting week one. The first play of his career, saw Watson drop a pass that would have been a 75-yard touchdown.

Continuing to get the ball to Watson seems to be a focal point for LaFleur's coaching staff. After Watson's drop early against the Vikings, the Packers have yet to try another deep shot to him, instead, the Packers have tried to get Watson out into space with sweeps and touch passes.

While Watson does have the makeup to be a deep threat in the NFL, getting him comfortable with the ball in his hands may be the first step to unlocking that potential.

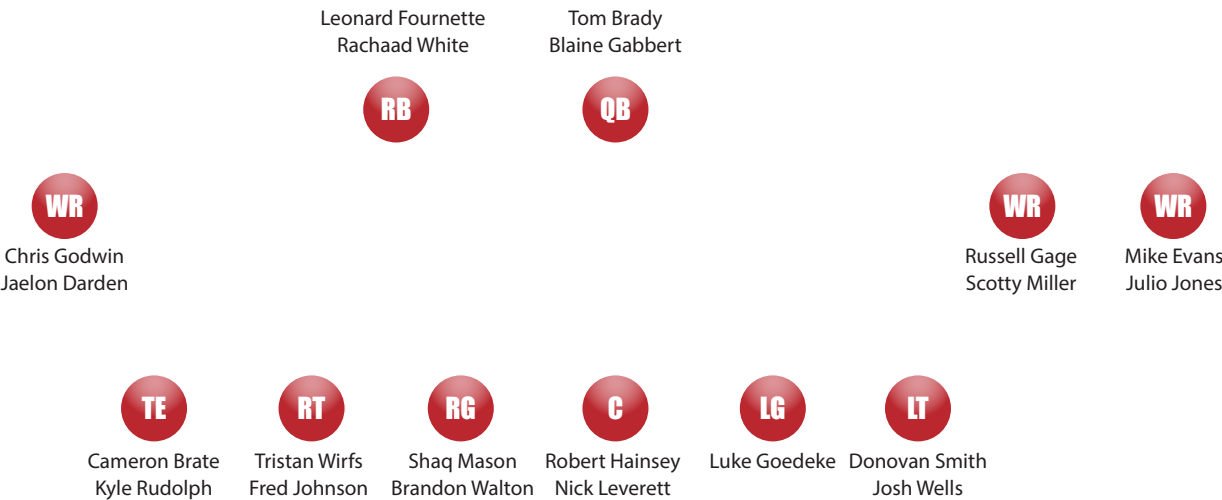

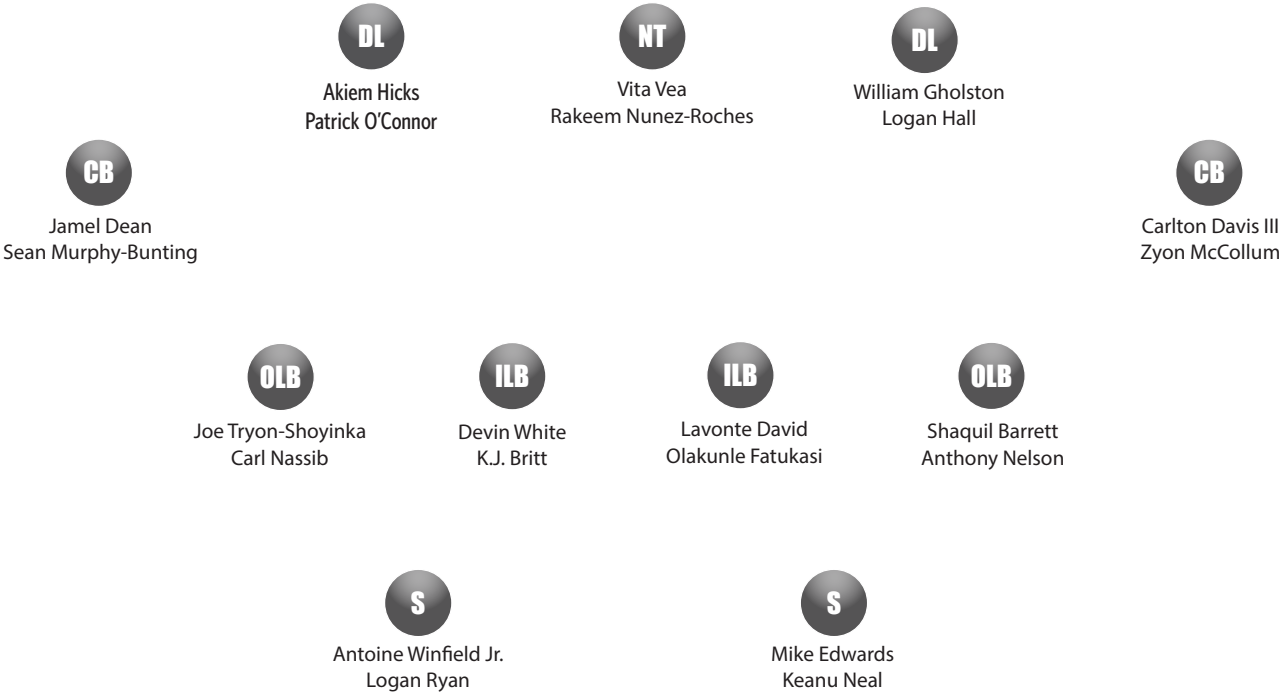

Battle of legendary QBs

For just the fifth time, it will be Aaron Rodgers vs. Tom Brady when the Green Bay Packers travel to face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in a huge early-season showdown on Sunday.

Obviously, given the living-legend status of the quarterbacks, they will be the focus this week. The internal focus of the quarterbacks, though, will be elsewhere. The Rodgers-led Packers offense turned in a dismal opener at Minnesota and an incomplete performance on Sunday night against Chicago. The Brady-led Buccaneers offense has scored only 39 points in two games.

"I'm just trying to temper expectations," Rodgers said after throwing two touchdown passes vs. Chicago

but also misfiring on what should have been a first-drive touchdown to Allen Lazard and botching a handoff to AJ Dillon for an unforced turnover.

"Obviously, I'm going to enjoy the heck out of this one tonight, but we've got a big one next week, a tough road trip, and it's got to be better. This was better than week one but we've got to be better than this if we want to compete with Tampa."

A few hours earlier, Brady had a similar message after a 20-10 victory at New Orleans. The Buccaneers' offense has sputtered through two games. Brady has completed 59% of his passes and compiled an 82.8 passer rating, both marks far distant from his usual standard.

"It's always exciting to go up against the good teams, and I feel like we faced two good teams earlier in the year that we started with," Brady

said on the SiriusXM podcast Let's Go! with Tom Brady, Larry Fitzgerald and Jim Gray.

"We're facing a third one now and we've got to rise to the challenge. And we're playing at home for the first time; it's our home opener. I'm excited to be out there in front of our home crowd. But it's going to take better football on offense than what we've played. We've got to start playing the way that we're capable. And I've got to start doing a better job, and it starts this week."

Brady and Rodgers are two of the best in NFL history. A seven-time Super Bowl champion, the 45-year-old Brady is No. 1 all-time with 626 touchdown passes. That's 55 more than Drew Brees as he continues to rewrite the NFL record book.

Against Chicago, Rodgers became the fifth quarterback with 450 touchdown passes. He's at 451 while

throwing only 94 interceptions.

The quarterbacks, with their limited offenses, will face top defenses. The Buccaneers could be down their three top receivers; Mike Evans is appealing a suspension and Chris Godwin and Julio Jones were inactive last week. The Packers are still trying to find their way without Davante Adams. Injuries have impacted both offensive lines, too.

"It's a big challenge," Brady said. "It's a new defensive coordinator since the last time we played them and they have some really talented players on defense, really physical up front, some great edge rushers."

"Rashan Gary is a former Michigan guy that I love and he's a great player, rushes the quarterback so well. They have really athletic linebackers, first-round pick this year (Quay Walker joining All-Pro De'Vondre Campbell)."

Elgton Jenkins returns

Green Bay got better vs. Chicago with the return of offensive lineman Elgton Jenkins following last year's torn ACL.

A Pro Bowl guard in 2020 who played at a high level in place of David Bakhtiari at left tackle in 2021, he got the start at right tackle. It wasn't his finest performance but Rodgers was thrilled to get back one of the team's top players.

"Let me just say this about success," Rodgers said after the Chicago game, "and I would say the same thing to these guys and have said the same thing: The definition of success isn't always measured in stats. And for Elgton, I thought tonight was an absolutely success. I really do. He's been out for a long time, and he's battled in practice and he's battled in his rehab and he went out there and played an NFL football game. That to me is a successful night.

"A lot of times we get caught up in a definition of success that's never really attainable. So, we live in this feedback loop of negative self-talk and self-criticism that I don't think is good for a healthy ego or good for our own confidence. What I know the guys were telling him and what I feel about him is, that tonight was a huge success for Elgton. And I couldn't be prouder of Elgton Jenkins."

Slammin' Sammy

Without Adams, Green Bay's receiver corps is a work in progress. With rookies Christian Watson and Romeo Doubs not quite ready for primetime, the Packers leaned on veterans Lazard, Sammy Watkins and Randall Cobb against Chicago.

With Rodgers in spread-the-ball mode, Watkins caught three passes for 93 yards. He had a 14-yard catch on the opening scoring drive, a 24-yarder to set up the first touchdown and a 55-yarder on the clinch-

ing drive.

"I definitely don't see him just as a possession-type receiver. I think that was pretty evident last night," coach Matt LaFleur said on Monday. "He still has an unbelievable acceleration. He's so strong. He can run through a ball. It was great to create some explosive plays with him. He just does such a great job of having aggressive hands and running through the football and it created an explosive play."

Watkins' value goes beyond his

ability to catch a few passes. He was an impact blocker to help fuel a Packers rushing attack that topped 200 yards. The blocking ability of Watkins and Lazard opens more possibilities for LaFleur.

"I love the run game," Watkins said. "It keeps you so involved with going down there, cracking safeties. The wideouts are involved the whole game, so you can't go out there and teeter around or take a play off. If you're not blocking, then you really

don't need to be out there, so it's fun.

"I've never been part of an offense that you had to block. In this offense, you have to go down there and crack the safety. You have to get your blocks and, honestly, I think that's fun. It keeps me going, keeps me in the game. And then the next play, they might do a play-action and you're wide open. That's the luxury of being in this offense, blocking and talking trash and hitting guys in the mouth."

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers will travel to face the Tampa Bay Buccaneers at 3:25 p.m. on Sept. 25 at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa. FOX will televise the game.

History

The Packers lead the series 33-23-1. That includes a split of two playoff games. With Tom Brady at quarterback in 2020, Tampa Bay routed the Packers in the regular season and then came to Green Bay and won again in the NFC Championship Game.

Coaches

Green Bay — Matt LaFleur, 40-11, fourth season. Tampa Bay — Todd Bowles, 2-0, first season with Buccaneers; he was 24-40 with the New York Jets from 2015-18.

When the Packers have the ball

Another week, another new coach for the Packers. At least this time, there's continuity, with Bowles having served as the Bucs' defensive coordinator the last three seasons and basically staying in that role as head coach.

Statistically, this is the best unit in the NFL. Brady might be the star but the Bucs are 2-0 because their defense has given up just 13 points in two games. That's No. 1 in the NFL. They're No. 5 in total defense (276 yards per game) and in the top six in third down, passing yards per play, passer rating, sack percentage and interception percentage.

The Bucs run a 3-4 defense. On the line, Vita Vea is flanked by former Bears star Akiem Hicks and William Gholston. Vea, a first-time Pro Bowler last year who has excellent athleticism at 347 pounds, has 1½ sacks and three quarterback hits.

The Packers are excited about the potential impact of an inside linebacker pairing of De'Vondre Campbell and Quay Walker. That's because of the annual impact of the Bucs' inside linebackers, Devin White and Lavonte David. White is off to a red-hot start with 19 tackles, three sacks and two passes defended. He had nine sacks in 2020 and was picked for his first Pro Bowl in 2021.

David, in his 11th season with the Bucs, is good for about 120 tackles per season. Shaq Barrett and Joe Tryon are the outside linebackers. Barrett led the NFL with 19½ sacks in 2019 and added 10 sacks last season.

Jamel Dean and Carlton Davis form one of the best cornerback tandems in the NFL and Antoine

Winfield and Mike Edwards are the safeties. In nickel situations, Winfield moves into the slot and veteran Logan Ryan enters at safety. Offenses have to attack someone and that someone has been Davis. Dean leads the way with two interceptions and three passes defended. Edwards had a pick-six last week. This group will be a huge test for the Packers' revamped receiver corps.

When the Buccaneers have the ball

Last season, the Buccaneers operated the most pass-happy offense in the NFL. They ran the ball 33.5% of the time, the lowest rate in the league. Through two games this year, they've run the ball 49.6% of the time, the sixth-highest rate.

The 45-year-old living legend that is Brady enters his third season as the Bucs' quarterback. In 35 starts, he's thrown 85 touchdown passes vs. 24 interceptions. Last season, he led the league in completions, attempts, yards, touchdowns and yards per game.

Through two games this season, he's thrown for 402 yards with two touchdowns, one interception and an 82.8 rating.

"He still looks pretty good to me," LaFleur said. "He's one of the greatest to ever do it."

Who will he throw the ball to on Sunday? The league suspended Mike Evans for his role in a fight against the Saints last week. Evans, who's topped 1,000 yards in each of his first eight seasons, is appealing. Tampa Bay's other star receiver, Chris Godwin, is back from last year's torn ACL but was inactive vs. the Saints with a hamstring injury. Veteran addition Julio Jones (knee) also was inactive.

The Bucs beat the Saints, anyway, with Breshad Perriman scoring a touchdown and Russell Gage catching five passes. Scotty Miller, who stunned the Packers just before halftime of the 2020 title game, added three catches. On Tuesday, they signed veteran slot Cole Beasley.

The running game runs almost exclusively through Leonard Fournette. "Playoff Lenny" has carried 45 times for 192 yards, a 4.3 average. The Saints stopped him cold last week, though.

The weak link is the offensive line with center Ryan Jensen on injured reserve and guard Ali Marpet's surprise retirement. Donovan Smith and Tristan Wirfs are the bookend tackles; Smith was inactive last week with an elbow injury. His backup, Josh Wells, is not good. Rookie Luke Goedeke, a native of Whitelaw, is the left guard.

Special teams

Ryan Succop, who just turned 36, is back for his third season as kicker. He's made 83.1% of his field goals in his career, including 6-of-7 to start this season. He does not have a big leg, which is why punter Jake Camarda handles the kickoff chores. A fourth-round pick this year, Camarda has punted nine times and allowed minus-3 return yards.

Second-year receiver Jaelon Darden handles punt returns (9-yard average) and veteran running back Gio Bernard returns kickoffs (one return, 14 yards).

LaFleur likes how Green Bay's units are trending under coordinator Rich Bisaccia.

"I thought that's as aggressive as we've been in my time here," LaFleur said. "I think there's a mentality brewing. Again, it's only one game and you've got to do it consistently and our guys know that. Hopefully, we'll see more improvement in this upcoming game."

"We know we've got a great challenge in front of us, too. Tampa Bay is loaded. They've obviously got great coaches but when you combine that with great players as well, it will be pretty significant task."

Q&A WITH ALLEN LAZARD

Q: When did you start kicking a soccer ball as part of your pregame routine?

A: That's been a routine for this is my third year now. I warm up with a soccer ball every day — practice, game. It's always been my thing to clear my mind and be able to focus in on what's at hand. I know that mentally, physically, if I'm kicking a soccer ball, that's implicating to myself that I'm about to be playing football here in a little bit.

Kind of just goes hand in hand of being repetitive, doing the same thing every single day and getting in that mindset so, when I take the field, I'm in the right place mentally and physically to go out there and perform.

Q: Did you grow up playing soccer?

A: I didn't. I started to become a fan of soccer in college; I started playing FIFA a lot. A few years ago, I had just gotten really bored with warming up with high knees and jogging and stuff. So, a soccer ball's a little bit more fun and adds a little more flavor to it, I

guess. I don't know, it's a fun hobby.

I think a lot of other guys have picked up on it, as well, just being able to kick the soccer ball around. Just venturing outside of our football norms in that sense, we have the hoop in the team room and we're playing knockout. Just because we're football players and being able to expand our horizons and be able to make ourselves more multifaceted.

Q: Why soccer?

A: I just wanted to start playing soccer, just wanted to start kicking the ball. I like juggling. I think juggling's really good for balance and control, understanding the body movements and everything puts you in very uncomfortable positions for us, at least, because we're not normally on one leg. Being able to balance while also trying to control a ball and do all the skills that it takes to be able to juggle.

Q: Can you really juggle?

A: Yeah.

Q: Three balls?

A: Three. Never really got to four.

Q: What do you juggle?

A: Whatever I want.

Q: Not knives or chainsaws?

A: Never know.

Q: Back to football. Do you feel any pressure?

A: Nope.

Q: On yourself? Because you've really embraced stepping into that No. 1 role.

A: I've always taken ownership in whatever work I've been doing. This is obviously my job, playing receiver here, and I've taken ownership for the room, so regardless of who we've had in the room the past few years, I've always taken complete ownership. Whether it was me out there on the field or not, those guys are a reflection of me because they're putting on the same uniform that I am, from that regard.

So, yeah, I just plan on going out there, playing to the best of my ability and doing what I can to help the team win.

Q: Did you always have that No. 1 mentality, even when the rest of the league didn't see it?

A: I mean, I've been a No. 1 receiver my whole life until I came into the NFL, so I don't know why I would change my mental view from that standpoint, just because I got to the league and there's other guys around here from that standpoint.

Now, from a depth chart standpoint, obviously it's been different and more clear, but that shouldn't change my mentality I feel like, as far as how I go about my business.

Q: So, even though you were undrafted (in 2018) and didn't make the Jaguars' roster — heck, you didn't make this roster a year later — your confidence never wavered?

A: No, because I feel like I've been doubted my whole life, whether it's been high school, college, here obviously, in different regards of life, as well. I don't take the outside noise and digest it from that sense. I've always just focused on myself and tried to develop to be the best version of myself.

Q: Is there extra satisfaction when the results follow?

A: Absolutely. I don't know why negative satisfaction or dissatisfaction would come from making things come to fruition.

Pack rebounds from loss with win over Bears

Jones leads the way with 170 yards, 2 TDs

The Green Bay Packers bounced back from a division loss against the Minnesota Vikings with a 170-yard and two touchdown performance from Aaron Jones in a 27-10 victory over the Chicago Bears on Sept. 18 in Green Bay.

With 132 yards rushing and 38 yards receiving, Jones logged the first 100-yard rushing game by a Packer against the Bears since Ty Mont-

gomery did so on Dec. 18, 2016. In week one, Jones was limited to just five rushes and eight touches in total. With the lack of touches in week one, Jones still averaged 9.8 yards per carry. The University of Texas-El Paso alum didn't quite reach that 9.8 yards per carry this week, but rather recorded 8.8 yards per carry on 10 more rushes.

Jones was not the only running back that was busy, as A.J. Dillon recorded 61 rushing yards on 18 carries and six receiving yards on one reception. With an extra 10 yards rushing from Aaron Rodgers, the Packers totalled 203 yards rushing, 23 more than the Bears, who finished with 180.

While both running backs served well in their own right, Jones' second touchdown came when both players

were on the field together in the mid-second quarter. Motioning from the left side of the field to the right, Jones took a touch pass and with Dillon lead blocking, Jones hit the edge and converted an eight-yard touchdown down the right-side sideline.

The offensive disparity between the teams came from the quarterback position though, as Packers quarterback Aaron Rodgers went 19-of-25 for 234 yards and two touchdowns, while Bears quarterback Justin Fields completed just seven passes for 70 yards and one interception. Fields' biggest impact came through direction of his legs though, as the 23-year old quarterback ran for 20 yards on eight carries, including a touchdown.

Green Bay jumped out to 3-0 lead on a 40-yard field goal, after a 13-play drive that included six combined

touches from Jones and Dillon. Getting the running backs involved early was a point of emphasis for the Packers as they prepared for the week after the two backs totaled only 15 rushing attempts against Minnesota.

"Coach came out and said that we are going to get you and A.J. the ball more and get you more involved," said Jones. "That naturally put a smile on my face and know that I had to show up when my number was called."

From there, the Bears immediately drove down the field and finished the drive with a three-yard touchdown run from Fields. Bears running back David Montgomery recorded 38 yards on the drive, with rushes of 4, 12, 13 and 9 yards. A majority of the yardage came though as Fields hit former Green Bay wide receiver

Equanimous St. Brown for 30 yards on a flea flicker.

The second quarter was all Green Bay, as LaFleur's gameplan of getting Jones involved came to fruition. Jones scored on the first play of the second quarter, as he took a pitch to the right side of the field and ran in a 15-yard touchdown.

Three punts later, Jones found himself back in the end zone on the touch pass with Dillon lead blocking. The big play on that drive came from rookie wide receiver Romeo Doubs as he took a screen and picked up 20 yards on second-and-28. Veteran Randall Cobb then hauled in a nine-yard reception to pick up the first down to set up Jones' touchdown.

"You could argue that that might have been the most pivotal moment in the game," said LaFleur on Doubs' reception. "Our guys got out and did a great job blocking for him. The guy is electric with the ball in his hands and he is another guy that we have to try and find ways to get him the football."

A quick three-and-out from the Bears' offense gave Green Bay the ball back only one minute and 17 seconds later. A 20-yard reception from Cobb and a nine-yard reception from tight end Robert Tonyan set up a five-yard touchdown reception from Allen Lazard in his first game of

the season.

Seeing Lazard back on the field was a sound sight for Packers fans, as he was projected to be in the No. 1 receiver heading into the season.

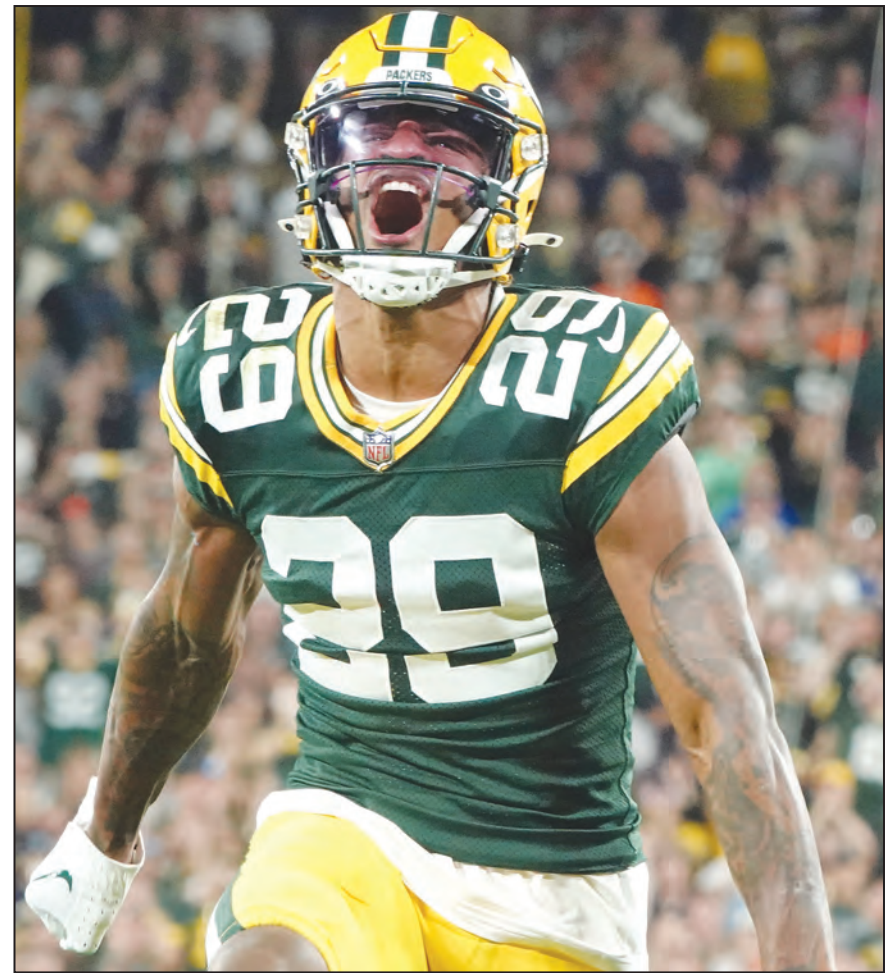
Another player who returned on Sunday was offensive lineman Elgton Jenkins. Jenkins tore his anterior cruciate ligament in November last year in a game against the Vikings.

"If he is not in the lineup, we don't win that game," said LaFleur. "It transcends his level of play — what he is able to bring to us. For his first night out, I thought he did a great job."

This win vaulted Green Bay to 783 wins in the franchise's history, which sets them one win back from the Bears at 784. Over the 203 games in the series between the two rivals, the Packers hold an 103-94-6 record, averaging 17.7 points per game to Chicago's 17.1. On top of that, LaFleur is in his fourth season in the NFL and still has not lost back-to-back regular season games.

"It was a hard fought, physical game — we know that every time we play the Chicago Bears," said LaFleur. "It is a great rivalry. It is a great NFC North opponent. I have a lot of respect for not only their players, but their coaches on that side."

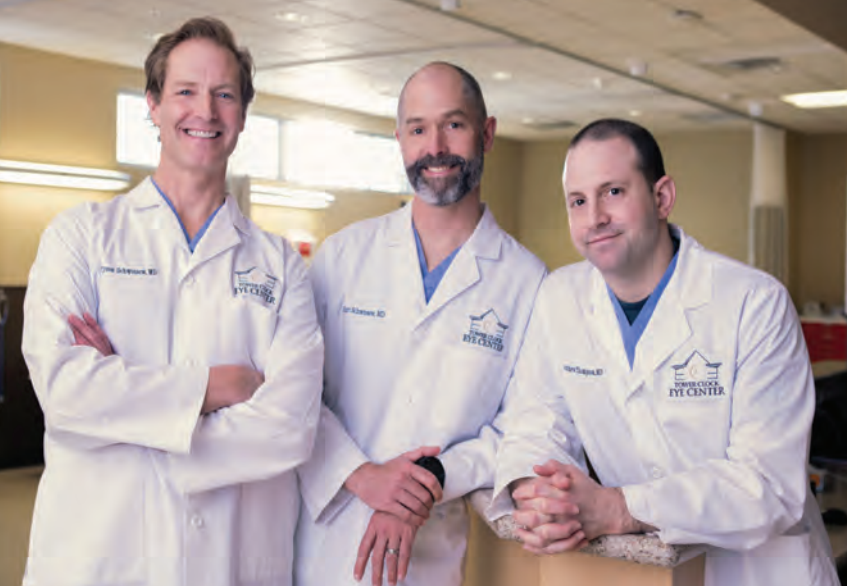
