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Shawano chamber hires new executive director

Wittman has experience working in the Clintonville, Fox Cities Chamber of Commerces

A new face will be at the head of the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce starting in July.

Suzanne Wittman will be starting as the executive director of the chamber on July 11. She will be taking over for Nancy Smith, who has been with the chamber for 20 years.

"She was hired because she has had prior experience with other chambers, like the Clintonville Chamber of Commerce," said Zachary Linsmeyer, Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce president. "She has also worked with a branch of the Appleton chamber — so she has that experience. During the interview process, she also said that she was the Women's Empowerment Center director of the YWCA of Greater Green Bay."

Wittman added that most of her background dealt with working with businesses and communities.

"Much of my work has revolved around business retention and attraction, community and economic development, marketing, management and grant writing," said Wittman.

Having worked for other chamber of commerces in the past, Wittman said she believes that she is ready and suited to take on the role at the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce.

"My chamber experience, as well as my time working for nonprofits has helped me recognize the importance of all of the businesses and organizations within a community," said Wittman. "What makes a community are the people who serve there."

She added that part of the reason why she applied for the executive director position was to continue to help meet the needs of the community.

"I have always loved my time in the chamber

world because it allowed me to meet the people behind the businesses," said Wittman. "As a leader of any chamber, you have to be willing to build strong, authentic relationships if your business is going to succeed."

With experience in nonprofit organizations, as well as tourism, Linsmeyer said that Wittman fit the bill of who the chamber was looking for.

"Obviously the chamber helps out in a variety of different ways and technically, they are a not-for-profit organization," said Linsmeyer. "We wanted someone who has that background in fundraising and also building relationships with businesses in the area."

Linsmeyer pointed to Wittman's eagerness to work with community organizations as a reason why she can successfully work as the executive director.

"We felt that there was a big need for a go-getter right away," said Linsmeyer. "We believe that she has the personality and attitude to be self-sufficient and get things done and run with it right away."

He said that the expectations for Wittman, from the chamber's board, are to pick up where Smith has left off.

"We want her to get familiar with the role and to get familiar with different businesses in the area," said Linsmeyer. "We want her to build off of what Nancy has done for the last 20 years and make the chamber better and continue to work closely with city, county and economic leaders."

Wittman also noted that she wants to continue with what Smith and her staff have laid out in Sha-

wano County.

"I know I have an obligation to continue the good work that Nancy Smith has done at the chamber," said Wittman. "I've been fortunate to have worked with Nancy in the past and am very happy that we'll have a chance to work closely together for a few weeks before she retires."

She added that in order to follow in Smith's footsteps, Wittman will have to learn about the community, as well as continue to build relationships, before jumping right in.

"I have always been someone who has to examine all of the parts before creating that bigger vision, so I will take the time to learn what has worked and be open-minded towards what needs to be changed," said Wittman.

Wittman said that with her past experiences, she could bring something new to the chamber.

"Within the past two years, I've spent much of my time delving into Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) work," said Wittman. "Shawano County and Menominee County are not that different, where we cater to a diverse population. It's important that we recognize this, uphold the traditions that make our communities strong, and work together so we can be an area that welcomes all others, regardless of their background, color or race."

Linsmeyer said that he and the rest of the chamber's board are excited to bring Wittman on.

"We do believe that this will be a success working with Suzanne," said Linsmeyer. "I think that she will be a great addition to the chamber."

Wittman echoed Linsmeyer's excitement level as she starts in mid-July.

"To say I'm excited is an understatement," said Wittman. "I've always felt that the Chamber world was the perfect place for me, so I'm eager to dive in and get to know everyone."

New principal starts at elementary/middle school

Firari in his first administration position after 14 years of teaching

A new face has joined the staff in the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District.

After 14 years of teaching elementary education on the Menominee Reservation and in Clintonville, Nick Firari began his position as the principal of the Wittenberg Elementary-Middle School on July 1.

"I have been all in the elementary level — kindergarten to fourth grade," said Firari. "I am the oldest of seven and have been around kids my entire life. Working with youth is what I always wanted to do, and teaching is a way to do that."

Firari said that he was attracted to the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District to not only further his career, but also to experience what the community has to offer.

"Even though I got to see all the kids at my previous school, I just felt like I could really help support an entire building with teachers, families and students," said Firari. "Being from Shawano and working in Clintonville, I reached out to a couple of contacts and they told me to apply for the position, because I will love the community, staff and the admin team in general. I heard nothing negative about the area."

He noted that the school district has strong community support.

"It is a special place that will have a lot of backing from the community members," said Firari.

With this being his first year in administration, Firari is expecting to see some day-to-day differences from teaching.

"Having that elementary background, I am going to have to get myself acclimated to that middle school level," said Firari. "With

teaching, I had a blueprint of what was going on, stepping into an admin role, it is much different from lesson plans."

As he recently began his position, Firari is already looking forward to some goals that he wants to meet.

"One of my big things is that I want to be a support — I want to provide services for our students, families and staff," said Firari. "I want to provide an educational experience for these students that is impactful and really makes a difference."

Firari said that in order to accomplish this goal, he will continue to build relationships with community members and families.

"We need the students' families and the community," said Firari. "I have already met some community members and staff. In the next month, between preparing for the coming school year, just forming those relationships with my staff and the community would be one of my early goals."

He added that he will join teachers and students in classrooms and around the school, once the school year begins.

"I am a busy body," said Firari. "That's where those connections are made. That's where you see the awesome things that are happening, because we want to showcase those things. That's also another area where I can be supportive, like helping teachers out with plans and supplies. I want to make their teaching even more meaningful to the students."

Firari believes that the community will learn that he will be a supportive part of the Wittenberg-Birnamwood School District.

"I think the community will really understand that I am truly here to help and support and I truly want to make that home-to-school connection to help support our students," said Firari. "We want the students to understand that they are a part of the community and that they have a role here."

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Police conduct critical response exercise

Simulated shooting at Olga Brener tests officers' response time, reactions to school incident

The Shawano Police Department and Shawano County Sheriff's Department conducted a joint critical response exercise June 30 at Olga Brener Intermediate School to test their response time in the event that a school shooting incident would take place.

Most law enforcement, save the command staff, were unaware that such an exercise was taking place, so that leaders could tell in real time how long it took officers to respond. While officers were arriving on scene, Shawano school resource officer Tyler Thornborrow was inside the school, banging on metal with a pipe to simulate gun shots being fired.

The first officer inside the building stopped near the stairwell and listened for a moment to determine where the faux gun shots were coming from. After ascertaining it was coming from the second floor, he hurried up the stairs, stopped in the hall to listen for shots again and then moved quickly to the classroom where he apprehended Thornborrow.

Two more law enforcement officials arrived soon after and quickly hit the classroom. In about 15 minutes, the exercise was over, and the officers on the scene debriefed to see what could be improved for the next time.

Shawano Police Chief Bradley Rabideau and Shawano County Chief Deputy George Lenzner both felt the exercise went well. Both noted the drill had been laid out in advance but pointed out that events like the mass shooting in Uvalde, Texas that killed 19 children and two teachers in May has put officer training in the spotlight again.

"In Shawano, we've been conducting these types of drills and school safety for almost 10 years," Rabideau said. "It's something that you have to constantly train and re-train. Obviously, nationally there's some things that have come up that bring it to the national forefront. However, in Shawano, it's something we've always taken seriously."

Lenzner noted that there are several different scenarios that officers can train on, but there's only so much a training exercise can do without risk to life.

"It's hard to keep it realistic," Lenzner said. "They're not using real guns. Sometimes when we train, we'll use simunitions and actors, using paintballs and soft guns. That makes it more realistic, but with this, we wanted to see how officers respond and get it in their heads so they're always thinking about it."

Lenzner said it was good for the county deputies to take part because their patrols usually are not in the city of Shawano. With the city police handling that area, deputies are responsible for covering the rest of Shawano County.

"These schools are new to them; they're used to going to the schools in the county," Lenzner said. "It's nice to get them in the city schools because there's always a chance they'll have to respond."

While the simulation took place with no staff or students present, Rabideau noted that finding a shooter is not always easy.

"What you quickly realize is that,

even a school like this, even without any chaos going on, it can be difficult to pinpoint where a sound may be coming from," Rabideau said. "Every school is a little bit different. You think of the high school or the middle school or Hillcrest or out in Wittenberg, every school is built slightly different and the sounds carry differently in those schools."

Rabideau noted he had one officer who couldn't break away because he had somebody in custody at Theda-Care Medical Center-Shawano, while another officer had to break away from a call he was on to report to the school.

"Wherever they were is where they came from," Rabideau said. "In a situation like that, officers are probably not going to get a whole lot of information because there is not going to be a whole lot of information coming out except maybe there's an active shooter or an active threat."

Rabideau noted that other area police agencies were not involved

with the exercise in order to make sure their areas were adequately patrolled. Even deputies on the east and west side of the counties were ordered to stand down for the exercise in order to see what the local response was.

"We still need to have coverage," Rabideau said.

Lenzner noted the county is updating maps of the schools and making sure they're digitized so all law enforcement officials have access to them. He said there will also be continuous work done to make sure officers are aware of protocols for when there really is a shooter, like having an area for media and a place where parents can be relocated.

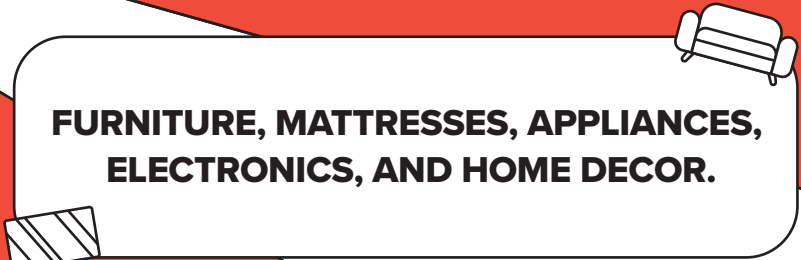
"You know what's going to happen when the public finds out there's a school shooting," Lenzner said. "Every parent is going to rush here and want to get into that school to be by their child."

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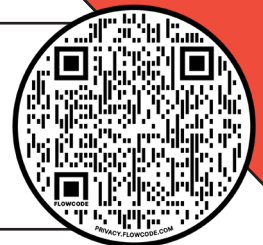

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Proposed Twig's mural gets commission's OK

Twig's Beverage only has one formality to go after the Shawano Plan Commission signed off on a conditional use permit for its proposed mural June 29.

Normally, murals don't fall under the city's purview, according to City Administrator Eddie Sheppard, but once a company's logo or name is featured prominently on the art, it's considered to be a sign, same as any blade sign or frontage sign, and therefore must get city approval if it doesn't fit in the standard sign regulations.

"Murals that are no way identifying the business are not considered signs," Sheppard said, citing the mural with the word "Shawano" that is on the building on Division Street between the downtown area and Franklin Park. "It's the technicality that says when it's representing a business is when it's considered a painted wall sign."

The mural is expected to include 56 square feet of sign space where the Twig's logo will go, with the

full mural expected to 31 feet by 13 feet when completed, and it will be featured on the northern wall of where its soda museum is located on 920 S. Franklin St. The logo will go on a bottle that's expected to be part of the mural, according to zoning administrator Dave Moesch.

Sheppard noted that the bottle was the only thing that needed approval, as the rest of the mural is considered to be art and therefore not subject to the sign code.

"We've tried to figure out a way to make it work but treat it consistently with how we've handled these things

in the past," Sheppard said.

The Twig's mural only has one more hurdle left to go. The permit must gain a final blessing from the Shawano Common Council, which meets July 13.

Twisted tale of lust for control, murder

As a woman and an advocate for personal freedoms including the power to control our own bodies, I have strong feelings about the Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade. I noticed the irony almost as soon as I started reading "Killing Streak" by Merit Clark.

This book had a very complicated plot that boiled down to a lust for control. Sadly, I only have space enough to give you an overview.

Jack Fariel, Corie Farantino and Hennessy Markham grew up in Denver, Colorado. Jack and Corie dated in high school until best friend Hennessy decided to take Jack. The situation was both difficult and painful. Now Jack is a Denver Police detective, Hennessy is long dead due to anorexia, and Corie is married to Hennessy's big brother, Evan.

A few months ago, Corie invited Brice Shaughnessy to stay in their guest house until he could find a place of his own. As the story opens, Jack has just completed one of his final radiation treatments for testicular cancer when he is summoned to the Markham mansion. Brice Shaughnessy has been murdered. He is shocked to see Corie. His long-ago betrayal still hangs heavy between them, but he can't deny his still strong feelings for her.

At the same time, Corie's husband, Evan Markham is busy playing his sick S&M games with his "assistant," Vangie. Markham has honed skills that cause both pain and pleasure in his partners. He

loves the feeling of control he has during a "session." At one time, he convinced Corie to submit to some of his cruel games, but eventually she refused to cooperate. At this point, their marriage is almost over.

Jack doesn't know that there is a painful back story to Corie's life. In her teen years, Corie's father left and her mother made it clear that Corie wasn't a priority. Consequently, Corie turned to her best friend's family for solace. Jessie Markham always made Corie feel welcome and cared for. It seemed natural that Corie would marry Evan and help him start a very successful consulting business.

As Jack peels back the layers of Brice's life, he finds unexpected connections between him and several others. The evidence indicates Vangie is the killer, but Jack feels it is far too easy to be true. His gut says Evan is behind the carefully crafted frame, but he has no proof. As Evan's mental state deteriorates, we learn that his mother killed his severely ill father and put pressure on him to be perfect. Evan developed a very persuasive personality making him very successful, but he also developed a taste for sadism and control.

Through careful planning and business trips he was able to kill without leaving a trace. But lately his lust for release through torture/murder has grown to frightening proportions. As the gruesome deaths pile up Evan tries to stay a step ahead of Jack but he is shattered when Jessie captures and shoots Corie.

Once captured Evan lays out the painful facts about his family, Corie, Hennessy, and Brice's death. That information sends Jack racing

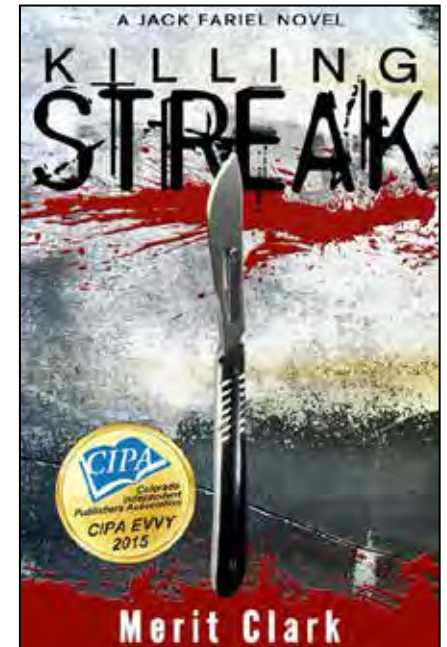

VOTING BY ABSENTEE BALLOT

Any qualified elector who is unable or unwilling to appear at the polling place on Election Day may request to vote an absentee ballot.

A qualified elector is any U.S. citizen, who will be 18 years of age or older on Election Day, who has resided in the ward or municipality where he or she wishes to vote for at least 28 consecutive days before the election. The elector must also be registered in order to receive an absentee ballot. **Proof of identification must be provided before an absentee ballot may be issued.**

You must make a request for an absentee ballot in writing.

Contact your municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to you for the primary or election or both. You may also submit a written request in the form of a letter. Your written request must list your voting address within the municipality where you wish to vote, the address where the absentee ballot should be sent, if different, and your signature. You may make application for an absentee ballot by mail or in person.

Making application to receive an absentee ballot by mail

**The deadline for making application to receive an absentee by mail is:
5:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 4, 2022.**

Note: Special absentee voting application provisions apply to electors who are indefinitely confined to home or a care facility, in the military, hospitalized, or serving as a sequestered juror. If this applies to you, contact the municipal clerk regarding deadlines for requesting and submitting an absentee ballot.

Dryja pitched 45 1/3 innings in conference play, striking out 23 batters along the way. She earned the team's only conference win.

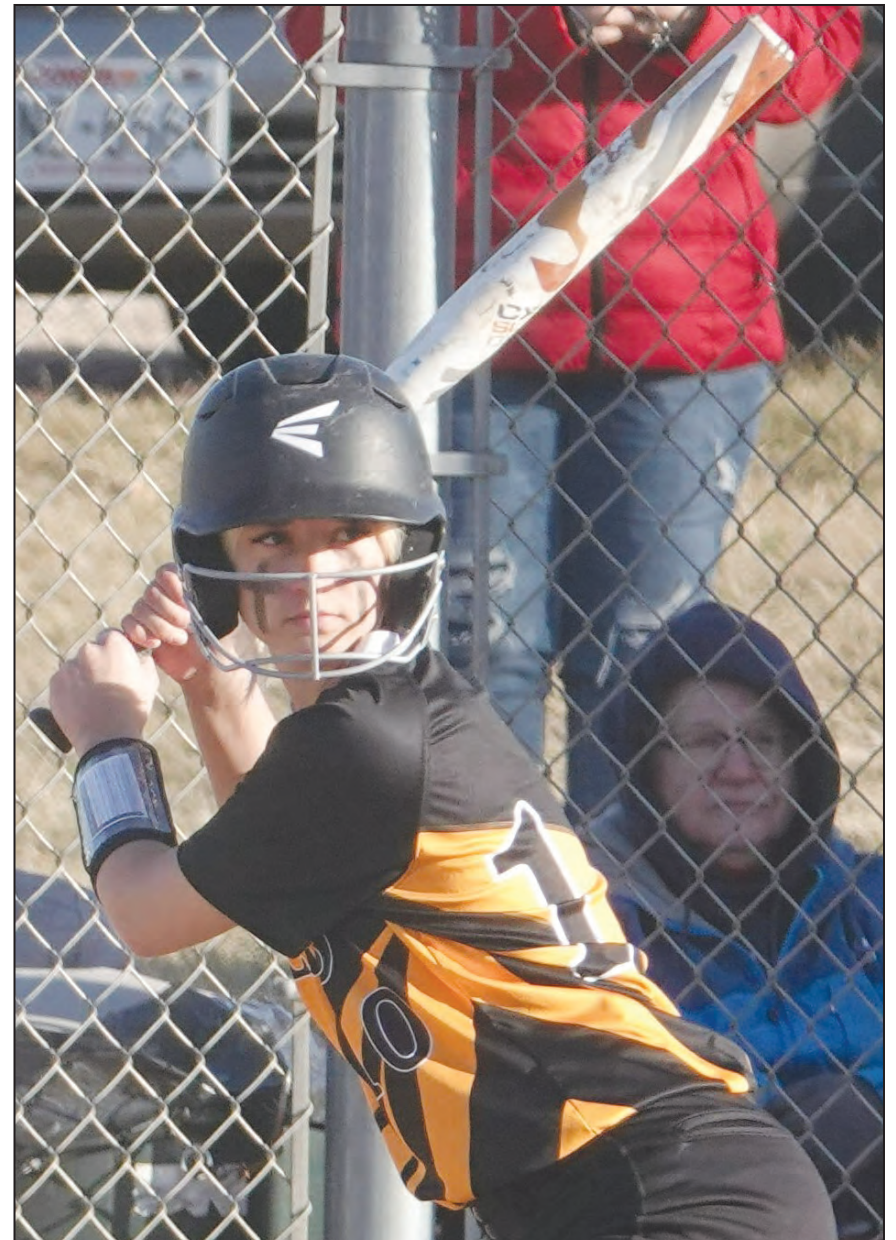

"There was a point that I didn't really believe in myself," Beauchamp told the media June 28. "I didn't have (any) opportunities, and I wanted to be

in the league so bad."

He cried on draft night when the Milwaukee Bucks took him with the 24th overall pick and received welcoming text messages from Bucks stars Giannis Antetokounmpo and Khris Middleton. But it wasn't until he arrived in Milwaukee this week, saw his image on a billboard and met with coaches and team personnel that he finally knew "it's getting real."

"I think all the adversity prepared me for this moment," Beauchamp said. "The obstacles I had to go through to get here was a little different from everyone. Getting through the adversity made me who I am today and made me more thankful of my opportunities. I don't want to lose this opportunity."

General manager Jon Horst said he was thrilled that Beauchamp remained

on the board when the Bucks' pick came up.

"This is an incredible opportunity for us when you look at the player and the person ... and the things he's overcome in his life to get to where he's at," Horst said. "We believe this will be someone who will be a great fit for us both for basketball and from a personality and character standpoint."

Beauchamp's humility has impressed Mike Budenholzer, but the Bucks coach stressed that Beauchamp will have to win a spot on the roster and playing time with a team that won the NBA title in 2021.

The chance to play with a championship-caliber team has Beauchamp excited about landing in Milwaukee.

"It's a blessing to be in a winning situation and with a winning team

because I feel like I'm a winner," he said. "I feel like I can flourish with this team."

Beauchamp sees himself fitting in first and foremost as someone with "young energy" who can contribute immediately on defense while providing outside shooting on the offensive end, a sore spot for the Bucks in last season's playoffs.

"I know there's a lot of attention on Giannis, and I feel like I can knock down that 3-ball in the corner," he said.

Beauchamp, who credited his grandmother for keeping him focused throughout the challenging periods, said he continues to be motivated by a goal he set some time ago, one that reflects the hurdles he's faced.

"My goal is to get my mom a house one day," Beauchamp said.

On the days leading up to the July 1 closing of Angie's Main Café in downtown Shawano, diners by the dozens appeared, getting one last taste of Angie Bistoff's breakfasts and lunches.

Nostalgia reigned at the 1950s-style diner, as guests greeted Bistoff for one last time and reminisced about the 24 years the diner graced Main Street in Shawano.

With just two days to go before the end of an era and 15 minutes before the scheduled 2 p.m. closing, Bistoff was still at the cooktop completing orders, with at least ten tickets hanging above the grill. She worked her magic non-stop to get the orders completed for the waiting customers.

"You should have seen when there were too many tickets to clip above the stove," Angie said with a laugh. "The staff started piling them up for me."

Carry-out orders were sent on their way by her dedicated staff and diners waited patiently at booths, tables and counters. At 2:15 p.m., Bistoff completed the remaining two tickets. By 2:30 p.m., final dessert orders were filled by her staff. A few customers lingered at tables and the counter, while Bistoff and her staff cleaned up.

"Business has been booming since I made the announcement on June 24," she said. "It's been packed every day and I'm so humbled and grateful and thankful that everyone's coming out to see us all. They've become part of the family."

Numerous customers made a point to come in to eat and visit with Bistoff and her staff after hearing about the restaurant's scheduled closing. Long-time customers recalled their favorite meals, talked about the camaraderie with staff and the general social atmosphere found at Angie's. Customers voiced that Angie's will be sincerely missed.

"I'm just overjoyed and wish a big, big thank you to everyone who has come out to support us all these years and I'll see them on the other side — of the counter," Bistoff said.

Despite the number of meals that she needed to prepare, Bistoff took time for hugs and goodbyes with long-time customers and friends, and customers who had become friends.

One customer, Tammy Clauss, said

that she always came to Angie's with her sister, Christine Fletcher, who has a physical impairment, making her very slow-moving.

"Angie always made time to come out from behind the counter and give Chris a hug," Clauss said. "Every time we came in to Shawano, we made it a point that we'd eat at Angie's. Even when my father was alive. We're really going to miss her and all of her staff."

Clauss made her last visit at the restaurant with her family, including three grandsons, one of which is just five weeks old.

"This is his first and last visit to Angie's," she said.

In 1992, Bistoff started as a cook when the location was Popp's Diner, owned by Marvin and Judy Popp. She purchased the diner in 1998 and renamed it Angie's Main Café.

"Judy Popp taught me everything I know," Bistoff said.

When the Pops were selling, she was reluctant to buy the business, but did so and remained for the duration.

She said that the menu stayed the same over the years, with the same recipes.

"I added gluten free items," Bistoff said. "I make my own gluten free bread. Everything here is made from scratch, we use real potatoes, real burgers without fillers. I have veggie burgers. I added a few items to help people with special diets."

Bistoff said she's loved the hard work, but it's gotten to be too much working seven days a week.

When asked what is next, she sighed and said, "I'm just going to take the summer off and get my mind together. I never could have done this without the great team here, the great people that come out here. I always say that I have the best staff in the universe and the best customers and friends. They've supported us all these years, and I thank them from the bottom of my heart."

The building, built in 1948 by Henry Dehn as an ice cream shop, changed little over the years. The future is wide open for its new uses, but Angie's legacy will remain in the hearts of her employees and customers.

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Jehovah's Witnesses eager to resume public ministry

Virtual ministry still an option for officials

Members of the Jehovah's Witnesses in Shawano County have returned back to their public ministry, two years after it was suspended due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The key is living with COVID, so that we can continue to be careful and vigilant," said U.S. Jehovah's Witnesses spokesman Robert Hendriks III.

Shawano minister Jacob Wheeler said that he is both excited and nervous to bring public ministry back to Shawano.

"Within the past couple of weeks, we were able to visit some of our friends at their work and have nice conversations, so that took away some nervous feelings," said Wheeler. "It is exciting for the community, because we are excited to help them see the hope from the Bible."

Wheeler said it is invigorating for him to be able to use literature in public ministry again.

"We have those literature carts every Saturday morning at the farmer's market in Shawano, starting in July," said Wheeler. "I like using those carts, because it allows those in the community to approach us. It also lets us highlight our website, jw.org, where the public can learn more information."

Much like appearing at the farmer's market, Wheeler said there are some local strategies for how the Jehovah's Witnesses are getting back to the public.

"We are able to go out and do some businesses and talk to those who are at work," said Wheeler. "That has been exciting, because we know that we may not be able to contact them at home. It is exciting to just be able to share a brief article. Many have been appreciative of that."

Wheeler said that throughout the time that ministry was virtual, he came to miss the face-to-face interaction between members and the public.

"We can have a genuine conversation and see their reactions and body language when we talk face-to-face," said Wheeler. "Being one-on-one helps me to show more personal interest in them, and hopefully those in our community can really tell that we are not some stranger over the phone."

Hendriks said that June 1 was the date that the organization wanted to look at getting back out into the public.

"We, as Jehovah's Witnesses, have spent a lot of time isolated in our homes and not visiting people — in fact, we have not done our ministry on the streets; we haven't had Bible studies," said Hendriks. "June 1 was that moment in time where we could say, 'Let's begin to look at other ways to be productive in our ministry and turn the page to this living with COVID-19 phase.'"

As of June 1, members of the Jehovah's Witnesses have begun to appear back in public areas, like airports, subways, street corners and community events.

"It is very gratifying, because being isolated and writing one-way communication has been challenging," said Hendriks. "We are very much looking forward to being able to reestablish that personal connection with our neighbors in a safe way."

Public ministry was suspended in early 2020, when the COVID-19 pandemic started to ramp up. Hendriks noted that when deciding to go back to public ministry, officials knew it was going to be a slow process.

"On March 20, 2020, when the

word went out that there would be no more in-person meetings or in-person ministry, we stopped cold in our tracks," said Hendriks. "Most of us thought that the only way we would stop our ministry is if we were in jail or if we died. Within just days of the announcement we realized this was a deadly disease. That decision to suspended in-person activities was a wise one, and it probably saved many lives."

Hendriks added that fatigue started to set in with members of the Jehovah's Witnesses, many of whom wanted to get back out and resume in-person ministry.

"We were excited to say that we know how to be careful and live with COVID," said Hendriks. "We need to start our in-person meetings and ministry again."

He added that the first couple of weeks back in person has been a little bit of a transition.

"The reaction has been careful and nonjudgmental," said Hendriks. "Yes, there has been joy and many have participated 100%, but this is also something that will take time. We are phasing this process, so that we don't

say this is mandatory."

Hendriks noted that the Jehovah's Witnesses will continue to hold virtual meetings and ministries for those who feel more comfortable participating that way.

"For many, this will take time and that is OK," said Hendriks. "We want everyone to make a personal choice. To give people that choice — that is the key. We did not have the choice before."

Wheeler said that before the COVID-19 pandemic, those strategies of using literature and meeting people at their jobs were successful.

"Many times, we will see people pull out their phones after talking to them, and maybe they are looking up more information," said Wheeler.

Moving forward, Wheeler added that Jehovah's Witnesses are continuing to look for more events and venues where they can continue to spread their message.

"We are always looking for more opportunities to find where the public is," said Wheeler.

A new spin on golf: Disc golf comes to Shawano

Father's Day takes on special meaning at the disc golf course at Don Martzke Park next to Shawano Community High School.

For Eric Jansen and his 15-year-old son, Braylon, both of Kimberly, tossing discs at an area course has been a Father's Day tradition since Braylon was 6.

"It's a constant challenge," the elder Jansen said of the sport as the father-son duo warmed up at a practice basket before Hole 1 of the 9-hole course. His parents are retired and live in Shawano, so it's a natural that they would spend Father's Day in the woods of this relatively new course.

Sean Miller, of Cloverleaf Lakes, an avid disc golfer and single-parent dad to two grade-schoolers, says he took up the sport just about the time he became a dad. Tossing a plastic disc was a way to get a breather from parenting responsibilities, if only for a few hours, he explained.

Now his children Zariah, 6, and Silas, 5, regularly accompany him to the course at Martzke Park as well as other courses in Clintonville and New London.

The beauty of disc golf is that almost anyone can play. There are no clubs to be fitted for and to replace as kids grow bigger. That's a good thing for the elder Jansen, as his son is almost as tall as him. Serious disc golfers carry backpacks or bags full of discs for drives, curve shots and putts, but a beginning player could get by with two or three discs.

"Frisbees were way different than they are today," said Miller.

College students in the 1960s started Frisbee golf by tossing discs in garbage cans, and later evolved into a formal sport. Those larger "flying saucers" were bigger and more whippy than today's smaller, more wind-resistant discs. Ironically, the Wham-O Corp., inventor of the Frisbee, is no longer a major player in disc golf. Brands like Innova and Discraft now dominate the sport, and pro tournament players play for huge jackpots.

Miller, who grew up in Shawano, was introduced to the sport seven years ago by his buddy Jeff "Gumby" Waymire of Clintonville. They played their first game together at Olen Park in Clintonville, one of

two courses there. A few months later, Miller became a dad, adding more stress to his responsibilities. The fresh air, walking and repeated throwing of discs was just the exercise he needed at just the right time.

"This sport has tripled in size since COVID," he said. That's a good thing for Miller's nephew, a former Shawano man who now runs an online disc golf company in Salem, Oregon. David Miller's Swift Discs is taking off like the bird it is named after. The 26-year-old entrepreneur was born and raised in Shawano, but had one simple reason for moving away in 2016.

"I could not handle how cold it was in Wisconsin," he said.

It's only snowed around Salem three times since he moved there. He had never actually played disc golf in Shawano, partially because there were no courses at the time. He started playing with friends out there, then got hooked on some of the swirly designs and colors of the discs themselves. Soon he became more of a disc collector than a player.

"I was always looking for these amazing discs and figured I could get them for a wholesale price," he said. He placed his first wholesale order for \$1,000 and Swift Discs was airborne. Although his personal collection has expanded to a modest 60 discs, he now has about 1,000 discs for sale at his growing business,

BY THE NUMBERS

Most discs used for disc golf feature a series of four numbers that show the flight characteristics of that disc. In order, the numbers represent the speed, glide, turn and fade:

SPEED: 1-14 (14 is fastest). Faster discs cut the wind but require more arm strength. Slower discs are generally more accurate, especially for beginners.

GLIDE: 1-7 (7 has the most glide). Glide is the ability of a disc to remain aloft. More glide is better for beginners; less glide is more accurate in strong winds.

TURN: +1 to -5. Turn is short for High Speed Turn, a disc's tendency to turn over or bank to the right (for a right-handed player). A +1 disc is most resistant to turning over, while a -5 is most likely to turn over. More turn is easier for beginners; less turn is more accurate in the wind.

FADE: 0-5 (5 has the most hook at the end of the flight). Fade is short for Low Speed Fade, a disc's tendency to hook left (for right-handers). A 0 fade disc finishes the straightest. High-fade discs are used for skip and spike shots.

which stresses speedy shipping.

David Miller said the sport is popular and growing because it is affordable. The only equipment needed is a few discs, and many courses don't even charge a fee to play. The sport appeals to all ages, and as his uncle and others have proven, it's definitely a family sport.

The biggest foes you are likely to face on the disc golf course are the sun, mosquitoes and ticks, because most challenging courses feature lots of woods. Shawano's course is a bit swampy in spots, so don't wear your new shoes.

The city spent about \$10,000 on the course, including premium baskets and concrete pads, said Matt Hendricks, Shawano's parks and recreation department director. He used his expertise when he worked in Marshall and oversaw construction of a tournament-level disc golf course (Bird's Ruins 28-hole course) to help plan Shawano's course, along with an expert designer. Planning began in 2018 for construction on 18 acres of woods (which also has a cross-country running trail and walking trail), and was completed in 2020.

Additional pruning of trees has been done, in part with the input of players, he said.

"It's one more way to get out and walking," Hendricks said.

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Pay attention to plants, hanging baskets

You have taken the time and creativity to plant or purchase summer blooming annuals, as well as your summer fruit and vegetable crops. Now that the heat of summer has arrived, your plants will thrive beneath the summer sun. Be aware, however, that summer blooming plants, as well as edible crops, do need your attention from time to time to keep looking and performing at their best.

Caring for hanging baskets and combination planters is simple and easy, as long as you stick to a few regular maintenance activities.

Gardening is a verb. It is an action. Once you purchase an annual hanging basket or porch or patio planter, it is not as simple as just setting the planter outdoors or hanging the basket on a hook.

To keep these stunning and carefully created masterpieces looking their best and flowering continuously, it is important to provide at least a minimal amount of care, sometimes daily.

Most importantly, these containers and hanging baskets must be watered thoroughly, sometimes daily. On windy and exceptionally hot days, it may even be necessary to water hanging baskets twice each day.

Once a hanging basket or container dries out, it is sometimes difficult to get it to return to its full glory. Providing consistent, regular watering helps to keep the basket or container thriving.

Fertilizing annual baskets and containers is also necessary to keep these arrangements thriving throughout the entire summer season. Often, gardeners forget to fertilize and the basket or container dwindles in flowering beauty over several weeks during the summer season.

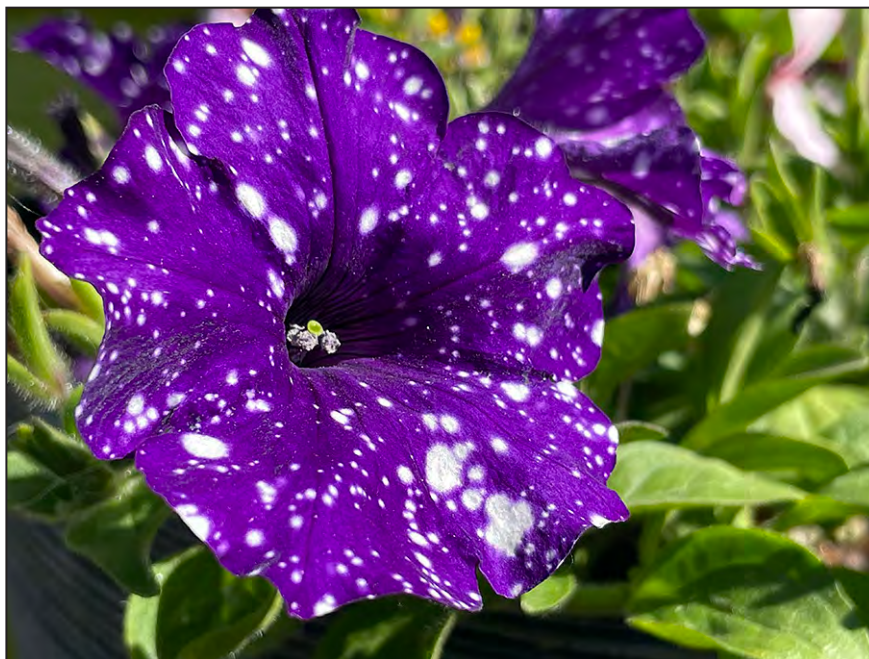
The easiest way to fertilize a hanging basket is to use a high-quality, bloom booster-type fertilizer and apply according to the package directions. I prefer the water-soluble fertilizers over granules, especially for annual planters and baskets. The water-soluble mixtures give instant availability to the food source, whereas the granules often take far too long to release into the soil.

The benefits of an instant fertilizer boost from a water-soluble, bloom

booster fertilizer, such as Miracle Gro or other, is just what your annual planters need to continue to produce new blooms throughout the season. You can fertilize every time you water

using these water-soluble fertilizers at a lighter ratio, or fertilize at full strength every few weeks or so.

Be sure to use the correct fertilizer for the types of plants you have in

your containers. For explosive bloom, it is best to use one of the bloom boosting fertilizers.

One of the most important aspects of container gardening with hanging baskets and planters that many gardeners neglect is pruning, trimming and deadheading.

Even the most stunning and beautiful planter or basket requires some pruning, trimming and deadheading to continue to be vigorous throughout the season. Sometimes, a simple haircut will do. Just shear several inches of growth every few weeks.

Sometimes, you also need to prune at the center of the planter, pinching off old growth and trimming leggy stems.

Deadheading keeps annuals looking healthy, as well as stimulates new growth. Deadheading is simply popping off or removing spent blooms to keep the container looking healthy, as well as encourage new buds to form.

Give your planters and hanging baskets some routine care throughout the summer season to keep them thriving and bringing you joy for months.
