Shawano County Board approves \$60.7M budget

Tax levy increases by \$450K while dropping property tax rate 17 cents

A fresh new set of eyes helped to bring a solid 2022 Shawano County budget before the board of supervisors on Oct. 26, which passed by a 26-1 vote.

Administrative Coordinator James Davel told the board during its budget hearing that the process started in the spring, which was when he officially took the top position in the county, so it was his first time contending with the entire budget. With a new finance director, Carrie Buntjer, and other new employees in the finance department, it allowed for a lot of questions to be asked about status quo items and offered an opportunity to see if savings could be achieved.

"We saw some things that hadn't been discussed before," Davel said. "We questioned things a lot more, and I think it was very beneficial."

The tax rate will be dropping for Shawano County, even though the tax levy is going up \$450,000 to more than \$17.56 million. County property owners were paying \$5.14 for every \$1,000 of assessed value, but they will be paying \$4.97 in 2022. That means that the owner of a property valued at \$100,000 will be paying \$497 in county taxes. It is the first time in over a decade that the tax rate has dipped below \$5.

Buntjer said that the county experienced a 1.52% jump in net new construction, which allowed for a higher levy while dropping the tax rate overall. She noted that was exceptionally high compared with most other counties in the state. There was also a 6.13% increase in equalized valuations in property across Shawano County.

Buntjer pointed out that law enforcement expenses constitute 58% of the total levy expense — 36% for the sheriff's department and 22% for

the jail. Other significant chunks of the levy include the highway department at 18%, human services at 9% and debt service at 8%.

Overall, the budget comes to almost \$60.7 million. Davel noted that the county had some departments that experienced cuts, but in doing so, the administration made sure to open their eyes to alternative funding. He cited the library system as an example, noting that he informed Library Director Kristie Hauer about a number of grant opportunities to offset the cuts.

"We really tried to find some other mechanisms to help out the departments," Davel said. "In some cases, we were successful. In other cases, we weren't."

The county was expecting a 10% increase in health insurance premiums, but the hike wound up much lower at 2.5%. Davel said that saved the county almost \$600,000.

Included in the budget is a 1.5% pay raise that Davel noted was important to approve. He saw it as necessary to try and stop the bleeding as employees leave for other counties and the private sector. The county has 20 vacant positions currently, he said, out of about 370 employees total, and there is at least an eight-week turnaround to refill them.

The pay raise does not apply to jail correctional officers, who received a \$3 bump in pay earlier this year, Davel said.

The pay raise is an anomaly for the county, which Davel noted has failed to provide annually for four of the last seven years. The wage study done by Carlson Dettman in 2014 included annual raises for employees, and not providing annual raises puts Shawano County about 16% behind what surrounding counties are offering.

"The county did not keep up with pay, which was originally what they said they were going to do," Davel

said. "If we'd given incremental raises, we wouldn't be so far behind the surrounding counties."

What is missing from the budget is funding to replace vehicles for the sheriff's department. The county has been trying to find other ways to replace squad cars, such as leasing them, but nothing has been finalized.

There will be \$851,100 in capital improvement projects in the coming year, with \$371,500 coming from sales tax funds. The county will also be utilizing \$266,600 from funding through the American Recovery Act and \$82,500 from funding provided by local tribes, while the remaining \$130,500 will come from the county's fund balance and other funds from specific departments.

More than \$300,000 will go toward replacing boiler systems — \$158,000 for the work release center and \$145,000 for the courthouse. Other notable capital projects include \$100,000 for the register of deeds office to finish removing Social Security numbers from files, \$55,000 for a playground at Hayman Falls Park, \$45,000 for a hiking trail boardwalk, another \$45,000 to install a boat launch dock and replace the boat launch pad at Shawano Lake, and \$20,000 for the library to replace computers and increase Wi-Fi access.

The county also doles out over \$190,000 annually to other entities. In 2022, the county will provide \$105,000 to Shawano County Economic Progress and over \$54,000 for operations and capital for the Shawano City-County Airport. There will also be \$10,000 each going to Safe Haven and the Shawano Area Food Center, along with \$7,241 for security at the Shawano County Fairgrounds and \$3,800 going to the Shawano Country Chamber of Commerce.

Sheriff's detective takes county board to task

Cutting budgets has impacted services to county residents, he says, putting government at risk

The passage of Shawano County's budget did not get much fanfare from the board of supervisors, but one county employee let the board members know what he thought Oct. 26.

Chris Gamm, who has been in the county's employ for 28 years and is currently a detective with the Shawano County Sheriff's Department, said that common sense is not used in the decision-making process that has brought the budgets to the board's attention in recent years. He noted that the recent turnover of employees, with 20 of the existing 370 county job positions vacant, is the worst he's seen.

"You are in an emergency with keeping employees," Gamm said. "In the last year and the year before, you've lost eight department heads. We've lost 50-60 officers with the sheriff's department for various reasons. That's an emergency. Right now, we can't get people to apply, based on wages."

The county, earlier this year, increased the wages of jail correctional officers by \$3 an hour to deal with a loss of employees there, but it was using American Recovery Act funds, which run out in 2024 and will require the county to make an alternative plan. Included in the 2022 budget was a 1.5% pay raise for most of the other employees, but it comes as the county finds itself about 16% behind what surrounding counties offer for pay.

The current funding for the sheriff's department does not provide the adequate training needed to provide protection and service to the communities it serves, according to Gamm.

"The trainees we get are light years behind the training we got years ago," Gamm said. "We need funds in our budget. Our budget has been cut in the last 15 years at minimum. Every year, our budget is cut for no apparent reason except I've heard comments at board meetings and finance meetings that say 'Cut them to the bone.'"

Gamm said it was the supervisors' jobs to be "visionaries" for the county and plan for the future so that constituents can receive the best services, but that wasn't happening. He noted that funding for squad cars has been cut steadily to

the point where the sheriff's department is in crisis mode, and recalled how deputy radios used to be funded a few at a time annually until that funding was cut, and the county a few years ago had to make a large expense to replace radios that no longer functioned.

"I'm not sure how cutting budgets on a regular basis with no justification is, to that end, working," Gamm said.

He noted that Brown County offers \$15 an hour more for the job he does, and Outagamie County pays \$12 an hour more.

"Why wouldn't I want to leave?" Gamm said. "I'm not from Shawano County, but I've been serving this community and want to stay here. You don't have to match them, but at least make it adequate for people to want to stay here."

The detective also called the 1.5% pay raise inadequate, noting that insurance rates were going up 2.5% at the same time that the rate of inflation was jumping 5.9%.

"You need to look at the future and retain your employees," Gamm said. "You need skilled employees here, and they're becoming harder and harder to find."

Gamm recommended that the county look at reducing the amount of its fund balance, noting that it hasn't been touched in two years to contend with emergency expenses.

He noted that the sheriff's department is not the only one in the county hurting. The highway department once reconstructed 20 miles of road annually, Gamm said, but that has been reduced to five miles.

"I would encourage you to start looking at these budgets and loosening the bootstraps," Gamm said.

The county does not provide some services that it should, in Gamm's view. Alcohol and drug addiction are among the county's woes where the county does not provide assistance, he said.

"You're getting free money from the government," Gamm said. "You

push it off. It's been pushed off for years."

The issue with the lack of cameras, specifically for the front views of squad vehicles, is also a concern to Gamm, who noted he obtained a grant for the sheriff's department in 2007 for those cameras, but the cameras are no longer in the vehicles. Gamm pointed out that a lot of crimes have been solved because of the cameras.

There is a plan to address replacing not only the vehicle cameras, but also the body cameras for deputies, which are becoming obsolete, but Gamm feels the county is not moving quickly enough to remedy the problem.

"They not only protect the officers, but they protect the county from unwanted warrants, when the evidence is right there for everybody to see," Gamm said. "I don't see why these are being pushed aside when the money is there, and I think it's shortsighted."

Schairer, who has now hosted this event for 10 years, said an inspiration came from her wanting families to have fun and make memories together being in an unfamiliar area.

"It is not very common these days for kids to experience farm life," said Schairer. "I hope that this experience will help children and families learn about the farm."

She added that this event helps to get children and families away from technology for a while.

"All of our games and activities are handmade," said Schairer. "This helps to get people outside and away from computers."

Schairer said that all of the money that is made from customers is put right back into the farm to keep improving it.

"We put this money back into the farm," said Schairer. "It is used for maintenance and upkeep."

Even though the money gets put

back into the farm, there are occasions where money is raised for people or organizations.

One example of that is the pumpkin stroll and carving that the farm hosted.

"I have a friend who is battling breast cancer right now," said Schairer. "The money that was raised through the pumpkin stroll and carving will go to her and her family to help with expenses."

Schairer said that preparations for next fall will begin on Jan. 1.

"We have to work with Corn Mazes of America to figure out the layout and design of the corn maze," said Schairer. "After figuring that out, we have to figure out where we want to put it. This is a year-long process."

Looking back on this fall season, Schairer said that she was thankful for everyone who came out and spent time at the farm.

"It is such a blessing that families come out and spend time here," said Schairer.

Retzlaff arrested on warrant, posts bond

Case involving high-speed chase in Shawano, Menominee counties drags on

Ann Retzlaff, the campground owner who is being charged with criminal acts stemming from a high-speed chase in May, was arrested on a bench warrant from Shawano-Menominee County Circuit Court for failing to appear for a hearing and has since posted the \$3,500 bond to free herself again.

Retzlaff failed to appear before Judge William Kussel at a hearing on Oct. 26, prompting Kussel to issue a bench warrant compelling her to appear. Retzlaff had sent emails to the court on the day of the hearing saying she would not present her case until “we are back under common law, laws of nature, God’s law.”

Retzlaff, who has said in the emails and previously in court that she was “a sovereign being of light,” was taken into custody after 11 a.m. on Oct. 27 and booked into the jail about two hours later, according to Sheriff Adam Bieber.

Court records show Retzlaff posted the bond in cases spanning both Shawano and Menominee counties later in the day. She is scheduled to appear before Kussel on Nov. 23 at 1:30 p.m. regarding the bench warrant.

On May 15, a Shawano County deputy heard on Menominee County radio traffic about a high-speed chase involving a vehicle registered to Retzlaff for failing to stop at a traffic light, according to the criminal complaint. The chase, starting in Keshena on state Highway 47-55, continued through the towns of Wescott and Richmond, where deputies twice laid out spike strips, and ended on state

Highway 29 just west of County Road MMM.

Deputies with Shawano and Menominee counties initiated a “high-risk stop,” according to the complaint, and shut down traffic on the highway’s westbound lanes. A lieutenant advised Retzlaff to get out of the vehicle, but she allegedly said she was a “sovereign citizen” and would not exit. A deputy used a slim jim to open the passenger door, which is when Retzlaff allegedly tried to drive off, nearly hitting two Shawano County officials.

Eventually, the vehicle was stopped again, and deputies pulled Retzlaff out of her vehicle. According to the complaint, as she was being handcuffed and searched, she claimed the deputies were involved with covering up sex trafficking and said she was rescuing one of her employees from a sex trafficking house on “Crow Territory” in Menominee County.

Retzlaff has had other cases in Shawano County. In April, she had restraining orders against her for harassing Shawano County Supervisor Joe Miller and his wife, Jackie Miller.

In November 2020, a guilty verdict due to a no contest plea was entered against Retzlaff for a case where she made a phone call and claimed she was a sheriff’s deputy.

Retzlaff has yet to have a preliminary hearing on the charges stemming from the high-speed chase. On May 25, she appeared before Kussel and claimed she needed more time to find an attorney. Normally, that would be required within 10 days, but Retzlaff waived the time limit, noting that it was the busy season for her campground, so Kussel agreed to schedule the hearing for Aug. 13.

When Aug. 13 came around, Retzlaff informed Kussel that she still had not found an attorney who was “constitutionally sound” and “not actively involved in many cases.” Kussel agreed to continue the case until Oct. 5 but warned there would be no more continuances.

On Oct. 5, Retzlaff was not present but had informed prosecutors she was ill, which prompted the hearing to be rescheduled again for Oct. 26.

Shawano library desperately needs upgrade

RFP put out to design new facility as talks on where building would go continue

Shawano County officials are looking at building a new public library in Shawano, as the current one is showing its age and getting extremely expensive to renovate.

The county's public property committee met with members of the county library board Oct. 26 and spent an hour bandying about ideas to provide a new library facility, discussing whether it made sense to keep fixing the current facility, expanding that facility, building a completely new facility or find an existing empty building to move into.

The committee approved putting out a request for proposals to have someone design what the new library would look like, noting that it comes with the caveat that whatever firm designs the library might not get the deal to build it. A study commissioned by the library board in 2019 determined that the library is going to need a facility double the size of the current building in Shawano to meet the community's needs for the next 25 years.

The current building across the way from Shawano City Hall on Sawyer Street, built in the 1960s, has some serious issues, according to county building maintenance director Steve Dreher, ranging from mechanics to space problems to environmental deficits. Efforts to do something about the building have been made the last six to seven years, he said, but it has yet to get off of dead center.

"I think most people in the community are pretty much aware of the fact that we need to do something," Dreher said. "I put in a bunch of capital improvement program requests and those were basically and summarily dismissed as lipstick on what is otherwise a pig."

The capital improvement project requests totaled about \$2.4 million, with Dreher noting that he hopes the library's boilers will make it through the winter. The Shawano County Board of Supervisors recently approved its 2022 budget, which only had over \$850,000 in projects.

"There are some hurdles that we need to get through to get the ball rolling," Dreher said.

Supervisor Deb Noffke, currently sitting on the public property committee but has been on the library board for a couple of stints, noted

the library has been deteriorating for more than 15 years and claimed it harkens back to when the facility was a joint venture between the county and the city of Shawano.

"Even though I was a city rep (on the library board), they were chintzy," Noffke said. "They put as little into it as possible."

Supervisor Tom Kautza noted that the library efforts could benefit from some of the funding provided to the county through the American Recovery Act, as libraries are one of the allowable provisions for the money. It is estimated that about \$2 million of the \$3.8 million the county received in May hasn't been earmarked, and the county expects to receive a similar amount in 2022. The money has to be designated by the end of 2024 and spent no later than 2026.

"Obviously, it's not going to be all of it (for the library), because it gets spent very easily," Kautza said. "To me, this is one of the bigger expenditures the county would have coming in the near future. This is one of the bigger problems to take care of, and I think now would be the time when we could set aside some of that

money to make a move."

The library study is recommending that a new library have everything on a single floor, unlike the current facility, which has a main floor and a basement level for the children's department. Noffke expressed concern that there were not many places in Shawano where a single-floor building of about 40,000 square feet could go.

Noffke also questioned whether the building needed to be that big.

"Doubling the existing library space with a declining population we have in the county, I can't get behind," Noffke said, noting that she is an advocate for the library.

Library director Kristie Hauer told the committee that the existing space for the library is not suitable for its current programs.

"From the viewpoint of trying to execute staff and keep people safe and keep parents and kids visible through sight lines, a lot of those issues would be reduced by having it on one floor versus multiple floors," Hauer said. "Right now, we have four entrances into that library, and it is not secure, people."

She noted that there is usually only one person working downstairs in the children's section, which she feels is not the safest and is a security issue.

Library board member Gina Shatters pointed out that the Shawano County library system is unique in that lends out more than books and videos. The library has a lending system for fishing poles, baking pans and other supplies. Shatters encouraged the committee to think outside the box when it comes to figuring out what a new library would look like.

Shatters, the Bonduel representative on the board, fears that having the Shawano library go downhill would negatively impact the other libraries in the county.

"This will help the other libraries when this gets built," Shatters said. "Having something more streamlined, it makes things faster and easier."

Dreher is hoping to have the proposals compiled for the public property committee in early December and have them go to the county board later in the month.

costs, but Marohl enjoys spending time and money making something that makes people happy on the holidays.

Shawano couple moves footwear-fixing operation from Sheboygan to be closer to home

Although the building at 206 N. Lemke St. in Cecil shows the former Main Event Banquet Hall logo, it has a new focus as The Main Event Venue, which now houses City Shoe Repair and More.

Jeff and Elsie Moser purchased the building in May 2021 and remodeled the front section to house their business. Although new to Cecil, City Shoe Repair and More has been in business since 2011, located in Sheboygan.

Bringing a shoe repair shop to Cecil was a huge endeavor for the Mosers. They worked over the summer to move equipment piece by piece from their original Sheboygan location, while continuing to do repairs for customers who live from Sheboygan to Shawano and the Wausau area.

"Every week, we were still doing business, but moved as much as we could," said Jeff Moser. "On Sept. 11, we did one massive move of the heavy stuff (with help from church members), and then we were pretty much done."

Living in Shawano and traveling daily to their Sheboygan location had become a hardship. Elsie Moser adamantly stated she was done with the travel, and that was the impetus to move to Cecil.

The new-to-Cecil business celebrated with a grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony on Oct. 29.

As far as the Mosers know, their business offers the only shoe repairs in Shawano and Marathon counties. "It's a dying business," according to Jeff Moser, but "it's a niche business, at the same time."

"Shoe repair is a trade," he said. "There used to be a school in the Milwaukee area that taught cobbling."

Jeff Moser learned the skills from an older tradesman at Molly's Cobbler in Sheboygan. They started the business in their garage in 2011, and its growth since then is testament to the need for their services.

Moving from Sheboygan hasn't caused any fall-off in their business, according to Jeff Moser. Elsie Moser added: "Our footprint is bigger here."

The Mosers offer free pickup of items that need repair. There is a drop-off collection point at their house in Shawano at 613 W. Green Bay St. After the repairs are completed, they return the restored items to the customer,

also free of charge. Another perk is that they do a free polish of the shoes they repair.

The shop offers professional shoe repairs, using traditional cobbler tools. Repairs are made to boots, shoes and other footwear. In addition to general footwear repairs, the couple does restoration/repairs for purses, leather chaps, baseball glove and accessories, such as knife sheaths and belts. Replac-

ing Velcro, zippers and elastic to restore products is also offered.

Jeff Moser handles the cobbling chores, while Elsie Moser sews, mends and repairs zippers, torn Velcro and purse straps, for example. She said that she's particularly fond of repairing damage to items caused by dog chewing because of how well she can restore these items.

forming repairs "as good as I would like it." She said they bring new life to the items they repair, as shown by the repeat customers they serve.

In addition to repairs, the business also sells new Thorogood Boots, manufactured in Merrill, and is a dedicated repair hub for restoring that brand's damaged boots. Gallagher, Johnson make case for GOP takeover

Opening of Republican headquarters gives opportunity to urge GOP faithful to keep state red

The Shawano County Republican Party opened its new headquarters Oct. 30 in the former Jill's Pet Shop facility at Fairway Plaza with a ribbon-cutting, but the main focus centered on the county's two GOP representatives in Congress.

Rep. Mike Gallagher and Sen. Ron Johnson spent about a minute holding the ribbon and about an hour making their case about why the House of Representatives and the Senate need to be back under Republican control.

Gallagher urged Johnson, who has not yet announced whether he plans to seek a third term in 2022, to continue to be one of the two Wisconsin representatives in the Senate. Further, he recommended that the Shawano County GOP coordinate with Republican parties in surrounding counties to ensure that seat remains red. Gallagher expressed his appreciation to Johnson and to Richard Kucksdorf, chairman of the Shawano County GOP, for continuing to bring awareness of Wisconsin issues to his attention.

"I think among the biggest things people are concerned about, maybe the biggest thing — and honestly the biggest thing I was unaware of going into the (2020) election — was the way certain outside groups sent money through 'nonprofit organizations,' and that money was then funneled to local government officials that are hyperpartisan," Gallagher said, "like the mayor of Green Bay, for allegedly nonpartisan get-out-the-vote efforts."

He added that it seems to be common sense that, if it wasn't already illegal, it should be.

"It distorts our election process," he said.

Johnson noted that the upcoming election matters a lot, because when Democrats had control of both chambers of Congress and the White House, their governance has turned into a disaster, in his view. He questioned if President Joe Biden was actually running the country.

"It is the media; it is the social media. It is every Democrat in Washington that is supporting these radical policies that need to be held accountable," Johnson said. "It's easy to chant, 'Let's go, Brandon.' It's easy to blame only him (Biden), but he's not the only one to blame."

Gallagher also took aim during his remarks to a packed house at Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, who has been the key public face during the coronavirus pandemic. He noted that the mainstream media has been "fawning" over Fauci, and others have been "praying to St. Fauci" but believes him to be the mastermind of "this whole corrupt situation."

"NIH (National Institute of Health) admitted in a letter to Congress last week that Fauci's organization was funding so called gain-of-function research," Gallagher said, claiming the research took a virus and made it more infectious. "This is the research that was being conducted at the Wuhan Institute of Virology (in China), which is where this whole pandemic started, and this is the research that Fauci categorically denied when questioned under oath by Congress."

Gallagher said he would not be satisfied with Fauci being fired, urging that the federal government investigate him and make him accountable for a pandemic that has closed

schools, businesses, houses of worship and more.

"Has anything else upended our lives more than this pandemic?" Gallagher said, garnering applause from the crowd. "It's crazy. People must be held accountable."

Johnson reiterated his position that vaccines should not be mandated, drawing applause of his own. He noted that President Donald Trump's recommendation of hydroxychloroquine as an early way to combat the coronavirus drew ire from health officials and "poisoned the well" for examining other methods beyond vaccines to combat the pandemic.

"If you just compare the COVID vaccine to the flu vaccine, the number of adverse events with the COVID vaccine is over 800,000 in 10 months," Johnson said. "That's 107 times larger than the annual average of flu vaccine adverse events. When we look at deaths, it's 220 times larger."

Johnson noted that he's not opposed to people getting the vaccine if they want, noting that elderly people with comorbidities should do so.

However, he noted that the declining efficacy of the available vaccines and the recommendation for booster shots makes it seem like mandating vaccines in the military and businesses is a bad idea.

"The odds may not be in your favor, but that's not for somebody else to decide," Johnson said. "That's for us to decide."

In other remarks, the withdrawal of the U.S. military from Afghanistan was a fiasco, Gallagher said. He acknowledged that many had the viewpoint that, after two decades in the country, it was time to leave, but the method that Biden's administration conducted the withdrawal was unacceptable to the retired Marine Corps captain.

"This was a humiliation for America," Gallagher said. "This was a betrayal of our own citizens. Since when is it acceptable for America to leave Americans stranded behind enemy lines, to say nothing of the tens of thousands of Afghans we made promises to?"

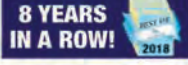

Figure guilt or innocence, not if 'victims' exist

The trial of Kyle Rittenhouse, the man accused of killing protesters in Kenosha in the wake of Jacob Blake's fateful police encounter in August 2020, is underway, but it seems the verdict on political correctness has already come down.

Judge Bruce Schroeder ruled on Oct. 25 that prosecutors cannot call the people shot by Rittenhouse "victims," according to an article on National Public Radio's website. The judge claimed that such a label would presuppose Rittenhouse's guilt and said that even saying "alleged victim" would do the same thing. He informed prosecutors that they could refer to the people Rittenhouse shot as complaining witnesses or decedents.

When I read this part of the story, I had to facepalm myself. We've become a society so triggered by words that we try to soft pedal the truth and sugarcoat bad situations in order to feel good about ourselves — the verbal equivalent of a participation trophy. These people were shooting victims, and there's no getting around that. Whether the bullets came from Rittenhouse's gun is for prosecutors to prove and for a jury to determine.

Then came the other shoe dropping. Prosecutors can't refer to the

three people shot as victims, but Rittenhouse's attorneys are free to call them arsonists, looters and rioters. Hmmm. Who precisely is on trial at the moment?

When police shot Blake over a year ago, it further ignited a national furor over people of color being gunned down instead of being arrested and tried for crimes, and it happened close enough to our backyard to make it particularly uncomfortable for Wisconsinites. The Blake shooting took place three months after George Floyd had been killed by police officers, but the big difference is that Blake survived his encounter with police.

There was plenty of damage and destruction in the days that followed, but there was no loss of life before Rittenhouse showed up, crossing state lines with an AR-15 in response to a call from a Kenosha-based militia vowing to protect businesses from those who were rioting in the streets. Whether he's a cold-hearted killer or just someone defending himself from a mob, it's abundantly clear he was

not supposed to be there as Kenosha burned.

Yet now that the trial has started, we're more worried about what we're going to call Joseph Rosenbaum, Anthony Huber and Gage Grosskreutz than we are with determining Rittenhouse's guilt or innocence. I can see not prejudicing the jury with derogatory terms against Rittenhouse, but when we're more worried about whether victims are victims or not, it's clear the legal system is not running on all cylinders.

This is a trial that everyone is going to be watching with bated breath. We saw how peaceful protests devolved into angry mobs looting and setting fire to everything in sight on several occasions, before any justice was meted out. I can only imagine what happens once the verdict in the Rittenhouse trial comes down.

Yet we're more focused on the word "victim" than anything else? That's ridiculous, and if defense attorneys have a case for proving that Rittenhouse was more victim than perpetrator, they should focus more on the evidence than whether the people who were shot and/or died were victims.

Let's look at the definition of the word "victim." The dictionary says

that one of the definitions is "a person harmed, injured or killed as a result of a crime, accident or other event or action." Maybe Rittenhouse shot them by accident. Maybe he didn't. Maybe someone else pulled the trigger that caused bullets to enter the bodies of those three people. However, you still can't escape the fact that the two dead men and the third one who was shot and survived are victims — classic textbook cases of victims, at that.

Are we going to suddenly stop calling people who suffer beatings, assaults and attacks from domestic violence victims, while we're at it? By the judge's narrow terminology, we should call them "emasculators," "unfortunate spouses" or "convenient punching bags." Where do we draw the line and tell political correctness to take a flying leap?

The focus of this trial, the only focus, should be about whether Rittenhouse is guilty of murder and recklessly endangering the safety of others. If there's evidence of his innocence, that should make the decision easy. If there's evidence of his guilt, same thing. The use of the word "victim" is not going to tip the scales.

Oconto led early in set two before a couple kills from sophomore London Metropulos put Witt-Birn up 5-4. The hosts took nine of the next 11 points before the Chargers won three straight points to trail by just three, 13-10. The Blue Devils then seized control of the set with a 6-0 run.

Metropulos scored a few more points down the stretch, but eventually the hosts were able to finish off the set.

I feel like," said Metropulos about Oconto. "They played really efficiently. They never got down on themselves. It was just a really tough battle all throughout."

Oconto again jumped out to an early lead in set three, taking seven

of the first eight points before Witt-Birn was able to start scoring a bit more. Oconto's lead hovered between seven and nine points before eventually reaching 10 at 24-14. The Chargers won three points in a row before being called for an error that

handed Oconto the win.

Metropulos tallied eight total kills on the night for the Chargers, while Rogowski had 11 digs and nine attack kills. Senior Jadalynn Davids and junior Kiara Deruchowski posted 10 digs each.

Juniors Payton Foster and Lilly Betry totaled nine and eight assists, respectively. Junior Halle Beversdorf was credited with three block kills, while sophomore Layla Huffman had two.

Defense carries Wisconsin to triumph over Iowa

Badgers maintain control of destiny in West Division

Wisconsin safety Collin Wilder was planning his Halloween costume this week when he bought a red and white hat for \$7 at a mall and wrote a message on it with a Sharpie.

Just like that, he came up with the object that best symbolizes how the Badgers have turned their season around.

Wisconsin forced three turnovers and produced six sacks in a 27-7 victory over No. 9 Iowa on Oct. 30 that enabled the Badgers to maintain control of their destiny in the Big Ten West Division race. Each time a Wisconsin player made a big play on defense, he wore Wilder's hat with the homemade slogan, "The Grit Factory."

Consider it a more blue-collar, Midwestern version of Miami's turnover chain.

"That's the mentality of this whole program, is grit," said Wilder, who intended to dress up as a factory worker or mechanic for Halloween. "I feel like that's what this program was built on. When you talk about

the grit factory, this is the factory of grit — the University of Wisconsin."

That mentality has helped Wisconsin (5-3, 3-2 Big Ten) win four straight after losing three of its first four games.

"A lot of people counted us out," said Wisconsin quarterback Graham Mertz, who scored on two quarterback sneaks and threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Jake Ferguson. "Everybody in that locker room, that never even crossed our mind."

Wisconsin's Braelon Allen rushed for 104 yards on 20 attempts. The 17-year-old freshman has run for over 100 yards in four straight games after totaling just 12 carries in Wisconsin's first four games.

Iowa (6-2, 3-2) has been outscored 51-14 in its last two games after being ranked second in the nation just a couple of weeks ago. This was the Hawkeyes' first game since a 24-7 home loss to Purdue on Oct. 16.

Iowa had no answers for a Wisconsin defense that limited the Hawkeyes to 24 yards rushing on 30 carries.

The Badgers built a 20-0 halftime lead as Iowa fumbled three times inside its own 20-yard line in the second quarter, leading to 10 points for the Badgers. Iowa was ranked third and Wisconsin tied for 124th among all Football Bowl Subdivision teams in turnover margin before Saturday's game.

The tone was set from the start of the game after Iowa won the toss and chose to receive the opening kickoff rather than defer.

"We saw they wanted the ball," Wisconsin linebacker Leo Chenal said. "We were like, 'OK, we're going to show you that's not a good decision.'"

Iowa didn't pick up a first down until just 1:15 remained in the second quarter. Iowa's net yardage total didn't get into positive territory for good until midway through the second quarter when the Hawkeyes already trailed 17-0.

"They played really well today, and obviously we couldn't match their tempo," Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz said.

Wisconsin's defense showed its tenacity all day. Linebacker Jack Sanborn exemplified that as much as anyone.

Iowa trailed 20-7 and was threatening to get back into the game in the third quarter when Sanborn returned from a cut on a finger that required stitches. He teamed up with Scott Nelson to stop Iowa fullback Monte Pottebaum for no gain on fourth-and-1 from Wisconsin's 40-yard line, foiling the Hawkeyes' second straight fullback dive attempt.

"I think it's what everyone expected," Sanborn said. "It's Wisconsin vs. Iowa. I think everyone would have been disappointed if they didn't do a

fullback dive there."

Iowa never threatened again. Wisconsin's student section poured onto the field after the game while the Badgers brought out the Heartland Trophy that goes to the winner of this annual matchup. In the meantime, Wilder was left to ponder how he might alter his Halloween costume.

"I don't think I can wear this hat out there," Wilder said. "I don't think I can. It's sacred now. I think I'll have to find another hat."

Scary injury

Pesticide certification exam available online

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is partnering with Pearson Vue to offer the pesticide applicator certification exam online.

The online exam includes a \$45 convenience fee that is paid entirely to Pearson Vue. DATCP will continue to offer a paper exam at no charge.

Commercial and private pesticide applicators can take the online exam either in-person at one of 54 testing centers and tech colleges in Wisconsin, or proctored through a personal computer that includes a web-enabled camera and broadband internet.

Those who take the exam online will receive their results immediately, along with their certification

by email one to three business days after the exam. Individuals who pass the exam receive a five-year certification.

The following exam categories are currently available: field and vegetable crops, turf and landscape, aquatic and mosquito, right-of-way/natural areas, and structural pest control. DATCP will add other commercial and private applicator categories in the future.

Pesticide applicators who are certifying and recertifying must purchase a training manual. The pesticide applicator training number found in the manual is needed to register for the online or paper exam.

Joint pain can be avoided through diet, exercise

Joint pain — caused by arthritis, overuse, underuse, heavy physical activity, sprains or strains — is one of the most common complaints doctors regularly hear.

In a recent national survey, one-third of adults over the age of 45 reported having joint pain within the past 30 days, with knee pain being the most common, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Maintaining a healthy weight is far and away the best way to protect our joints," said Douglas Connor, a sports medicine physician with The daCare Orthopedic Care. "Obesity is the top risk factor for the development of arthritis that we, as individuals, can control."

Connor noted there is also another aspect that should be considered.

"After maintaining a healthy weight, keeping active is the next most important factor," he said. "Motion is lotion for our joints. When

joints get stiff, tight and weak, they hurt more, and then people tend to be less active, which is exactly the opposite of what they should do. That's a bad cycle to get into. It can truly become a 'use it or lose it' scenario."

Referencing the knee, Connor noted that for every pound a person loses, his or her knee experiences four less pounds of weight with every step taken.

"If you multiply the number of steps a person takes over the course of a day, the cumulative effect literally can be a ton less weight on a knee in one day," he explained. "That is truly significant."

Connor observed that ankle arthritis is less common than knee issues, but said some hip pain could also be attributed to being overweight.

"When I talk about weight concerns regarding joints, I'm typically referencing lower body joints," he

said. "Shoulder and neck arthritis would be much less affected by weight."

Shoulders are a different case. "Shoulders are tricky because it is difficult to prevent a shoulder issue outside of avoiding a traumatic injury," said Connor. "As we age, our rotator cuffs often wear out and can develop tears, and we start to lose range of motion and develop arthritis. If someone has shoulder arthritis, I tell them that if overhead lifting activities bother them, keeping their elbows closer to their body will help. The shoulder is going to like that approach a lot more and will likely not be as aggravated."

When it comes to maintaining a healthy weight or losing weight, Connor said diet is incredibly important.

"For better or worse, most of us have a hard time losing weight just by exercising," he said. "We lose the majority of weight through our diet. Eating a healthy diet that includes getting the nutrients we need for good bone health is important. That means we should be sure we are getting enough calcium and Vitamin D in our diet, as well as the nutrients that help us repair bodily injuries. Generally, a well-rounded diet will provide most of the nutrients we need. We're all different, so no specific diet plan is going to work for everyone."

He cautioned those who are already regularly exercising should not forget the importance of warming up and cooling down before and after exercising.

"We encourage everyone to slowly build into a new exercise routine," he said. "It's easy to get excited about an exercise program and jump into it, and pretty soon you are doing more than ever before and things begin to hurt. That's when we worry about the possibility of injury."

Connor noted that when he visits with a patient with arthritis, he discusses the importance of finding exercises that work for them. Tai chi and yoga are two low-impact exercise programs Connor recommends.

"There is good data behind these two exercise activities," he said. "Some studies say tai chi can be as effective as physical therapy for managing knee arthritis. It's a great low-impact activity that can be helpful in maintaining balance, flexibility, strength and stronger core muscles."

He noted that yoga may mean different things to different people.

"Some yoga routines may be difficult for those with arthritis, so experimenting with different programs can help an individual find a routine that works for them," said Connor. "You may not be the most flexible person in the class, and that is okay. Small gains can pay big dividends in making you feel better."

Gather seeds now to replant in spring

November is a great time of year to begin gathering the seeds of your garden wildflowers, even summer annuals, to sow next gardening season. Growing your own perennials and annuals from seed is a great way to save money and get a large number of plants at virtually no cost.

Many of our favorite garden perennials produce vast amounts of seed on large, robust flower heads that are easy to harvest once the blooms fade and the plants go dormant for the season.

Even many garden annuals are easy to harvest for their seed once first frost hits and the plants begin to die back.

Those that are easiest to harvest seeds from are the flowers that produce the largest seed heads and largest individual seeds. This makes collection easy, and replanting of individual seeds late in winter and spring is an easy chore with larger, more robust seeds.

For garden perennials, it is easy to harvest seeds anytime after the plants go dormant. When collecting the seeds of native plants and perennials in the garden, use a paper bag rather than a plastic container or bag that could create condensation, which can often destroy large amounts of seed. Seeds need to be kept cool and very dry over the winter season.

Many of our favorite garden perennials can simply be snipped off and placed in a paper bag, then shaken vigorously to loosen the seeds. It may be easier, in some cases, to simply pry apart the flower head once it has dried with your fingers and thumbs and release the seeds.

From there, simply remove the extra plant material or leaves and store the seeds in a dry container in a cool place for the winter season. Many perennial seeds can be stored in a cool dry basement, or even outside. Just be sure they are kept dry. Any amount of moisture can ruin your seed collection efforts.

Most perennial seeds need a period of cold, much like they would experience outdoors over the winter season. Some gardeners place garden seed in the refrigerator to mimic the cold — a process called stratification; however, refrigerators are sometimes too damp. Cool, dry basements or

unheated garages are ideal, as long as the seeds are protected and kept dry.

Some of the easiest perennials to harvest seeds from are favorites such as purple coneflower, black-eyed Susan, hosta, ornamental grasses, coreopsis, columbine, hollyhocks,

prairie coneflower, oriental poppies, delphinium, cup plant, Baptisia and milkweed.

Annuals that are especially easy to harvest for seed are marigolds, cosmos, zinnias, morning glories, bachelor buttons and sunflowers. Be

aware that for some varieties, new plants may not come true to type, as many of these hybrids can transform colors depending upon what flowers pollinating bees had visited before the seed was formed.

Generally, most annual seeds do not need to have a period of cold as they are not hardy in our area and do not require a freezing period. These can simply be kept in a cool, dry place in an airtight container or envelope until spring planting.

Label your seed containers before storing for the winter season for easy, organized planting later in winter and spring.

If you already know where you intend to plant your perennial seeds, fall and winter are a great time to sow them naturally, just as Mother Nature does. Scatter them over the planting bed, or even on top of the snow, where they will germinate as melting snow comes into contact with the soil.

Many perennials and annual seeds can be started indoors in late winter and early spring to be transplanted outdoors when the growing season gets underway.

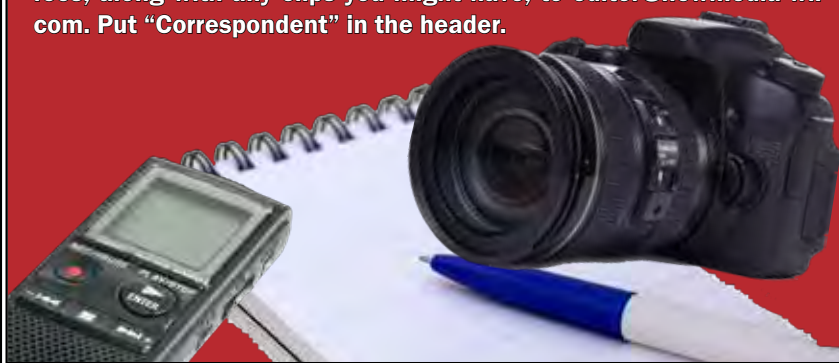

21st 'alphabet mystery' still keeps pages turning

I just finished Sue Grafton's "U is for Undertow," and it kept me reading even after I figured out what happened.

It's early spring in 1988 in Santa Teresa, California. Private detective Kinsey Millhone is about to leave her office when a young man arrives. Michael Sutton tells Kinsey that police detective Cheny Phillips suggested that he speak with her.

Back 1966, a little girl was kidnapped from the tony area known as Horton Ravine. The ransom money was dropped but never picked up, and the child was never seen again.

Michael now believes he saw two men burying her in the woods behind a Ravine property. He wants to hire Kinsey to find the burial site and possibly solve the cold case.

To her surprise, they find the place Michael remembers, but the police only dig up the body of a very large dog. Cheny gives Kinsey a collar with the name Ulf plus the owner's contact information. Why would a dog from a distant city be

Green Bay piling up the wins without core players

Team has been ravished by injuries on both sides of ball

Through eight weeks of the NFL season, the Green Bay Packers own the No. 1 seed in the NFC.

While many wouldn't have called that a shocking development at the beginning of the season, the Pack owning the top spot while having several players sidelined with injuries or while on the COVID-19 list is quite the accomplishment.

At one time or another this season, the following players have missed games this season: wide receivers Davante Adams and Allen Lazard (COVID-19 list) and Marquez Valdes-Scantling (hamstring), offensive linemen David Bakhtiari (ACL), Josh Myers (knee), Elgton Jenkins (ankle), outside linebackers Preston Smith (oblique) and Za'Darius Smith (back) and cornerbacks Jaire Alexander and Kevin King (shoulder) — all of those players are starters.

The Packers even were able to find a way to win without their defensive coordinator Joe Barry on the sideline against the Arizona Cardinals, as he was also on the COVID-19 list.

Yet, the Packers enter week nine of the season with a 7-1 record, tied for the best in the entire NFL.

"I can't say enough about everybody stepping up," said coach Matt LaFleur after the Cardinals game.

"I think we're a gritty football team," said quarterback Aaron Rodgers.

LaFleur later talked about how everyone in the organization has bought into what the team concept is.

"Football is the ultimate team sport. It takes 11 guys to go out there and everybody owning their role, doing their job in order for us to have success," said LaFleur. "Realizing that each individual has their own goals and sometimes it doesn't necessarily go the way they want it to, but for all those guys in that locker room to buy into that team concept — it's a special group of people."

While Green Bay hopes to get

back some of its injured players at some point this season, the team was dealt two more injuries against Arizona.

Tight end Robert Tonyan and running back Kylin Hill were lost to season-ending knee injuries.

LaFleur got choked up when talking about Tonyan after the game, fearing he would be lost for the year with a knee injury.

While it's yet two more tough blows for the Packers and the team's goals and aspirations, the injuries have opened up more opportunities for players to step in and contribute to a team trying to win the NFC North before winning the NFC and then trying to make it to the Super Bowl and win it.

In the stead of the missing receivers, wideouts Randall Cobb, Juwan Winfree, Amari Rodgers, Equanimeous St. Brown and Malik Taylor have been given opportunities to step up.

Winfree ended up with the second-most receptions (4) in the team's win over Arizona, while St. Brown and Amari Rodgers also had timely catches.

The veteran Cobb made his catches count, scoring two touchdowns on three grabs.

Solidifying the offensive line with Bakhtiari out the whole season has been rookies Royce Newman and Myers. Lucas Patrick has played lots of snaps over the past couple games with Myers now out, and earlier in the year, Yosh Nijman played big snaps when Jenkins was out. Veteran Billy Turner has been an anchor for the unit at right tackle.

With the Smiths out, players like Rashan Gary and newcomer Whitney Mercilus have stepped up to provide a boost to the Packers' pass rush.

Defensive linemen Dean Lowry and Kenny Clark have also done their part, aside from being run stuffers.

In the secondary, it's been cornerback Eric Stokes and Rasul Douglas that have emerged

to slow down opposing passing games. Douglas, of course, had the game-sealing interception against Arizona, while Stokes has held his own despite being a rookie. Cornerback Chandon Sullivan had a big INT against Washington, and safety Henry Black picked off a pass against the Cardinals to chip in.

It seems that no matter who has stepped in, they've made a play at some time or another to help the team to a win.

"They're resilient, they don't blink and they just find a way," said LaFleur.

The promising thing for the Packers, aside from their stellar record, is that with the return of some of its better players, the team should only improve.

Now would be a good time to start getting some of the stars back as the Pack prepares for the toughest portion of its schedule, with the Kansas City Chiefs, Seattle Seahawks, Minnesota Vikings, Los Angeles Rams up next before the team's bye week.

Late interception helps Pack top Cards

Green Bay now 7-1, atop NFC

Rasul Douglas was living the life of an NFL journeyman just a few weeks ago, bouncing between camps and practice squads in a frustrating process that is football's version of purgatory.

Finally, the Green Bay Packers liked what they saw. Now he's a Thursday night hero for the league's hottest team.

Douglas corralled an interception with 12 seconds left in the fourth quarter that helped the Packers knock off the previously unbeaten Arizona Cardinals 24-21 in a thriller that featured two of the NFL's top quarterbacks.

The Cardinals looked like they were going to rally to win their eighth straight game but Kyler Murray threw the stunning interception on second-and-goal as the home crowd groaned in disbelief. A.J. Green didn't expect the pass to come his way, never

turned around and Douglas was there to snatch the ball in the corner of the end zone.

It was a big night for some lesser-known Packers players. Douglas was added to the active roster just three weeks ago when the team needed help in the secondary. He was signed off the Cardinals practice squad, where he spent a few weeks earlier this year.

"This is why I love this squad," Rodgers said. "The guy that made the pick was with them (pointing to Cards sideline) for four weeks. He was on the streets. We brought him in. He's starting for us. He's a great dude. He's really meshed well with our team. To come up with a play like that with 15 seconds left is incredible."

Cobb's clutch night was much needed since Green Bay was playing without their two top receivers. Davante Adams and Allen Lazard were put on the reserve/COVID-19 list earlier in the week, but the 31-year-old Cobb responded with two touchdowns that were both tough catches in traffic.

"It was tough in the passing game

at times, but Cobb came up with a couple of big touchdown catches," Rodgers said.

Cobb's 6-yard touchdown catch on the first play of the fourth quarter put the Packers up 24-14. He was once one of the NFL's top receivers — making the Pro Bowl in 2014 with 1,287 yards receiving and 14 touchdowns — but has settled into more a secondary role late in his career.

He only caught three passes on Thursday, but they were important ones.

The Cardinals trailed for most of the night but rallied to pull within 24-21 on James Conner's second touchdown run of the night with 10:45 left in the fourth. Arizona then had a crucial goalline stand late in the fourth — capped by Devon Kennard swatting down Rodgers' fourth-down pass — giving them the ball back at the 1-yard line and an opportunity to go 99 yards for the win.

They almost made it.

Green Bay (7-1) has won seven straight games after dropping the season opener. Arizona (7-1) was trying to set a franchise record for longest

winning streak to start a season but instead tied the mark set in 1974.

Both teams were hampered in the early going by a lack of healthy receivers. The offensive pace picked up in the second half.

Green Bay's offense was a little more conservative without Adams and Lazard. Arizona's top receiver DeAndre Hopkins made a 55-yard catch in the first quarter but tweaked his sore hamstring on the play and didn't play for a big chunk of the game.

The Packers took advantage of a couple Cardinals mistakes to take a 17-7 lead by early in the third quarter.

The Packers grabbed a 10-7 half-time advantage by making a field goal after Cardinals rookie Rondale Moore mishandled a punt deep in Arizona territory.

Early in the third quarter, Murray threw a pass that was deflected by Moore into the hands of Green Bay's Henry Black at the Arizona 14. Five plays later, Rodgers found Cobb in the corner of the end zone for a touchdown and 17-7 lead.

Murray finished with 274 yards passing and two interceptions.

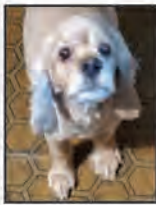

Replacing Bobby Tonyan

Robert Tonyan's season ended before it really got a chance to begin.

Last season, the Green Bay Packers' big-play tight end was one of the NFL's breakout stars. He scored 11 touchdowns – tied for No. 1 among all tight ends – and failed to catch only seven of the 59 passes thrown his way. Through six games this season, he had 11 receptions vs. nine incompletions and only one touchdown.

Tonyan had just started to get rolling, with four receptions for 63 yards and one touchdown vs. Washington and a season-long 33-yard catch vs. Arizona.

That roll might have gained momentum once All-Pro left tackle David Bakhtiari returned to the lineup, freeing up Tonyan to run more routes rather than staying in to contribute with pass protection. Instead, he suffered a torn ACL at the end of his big gain against the Cardinals.

"That's a tough one," coach Matt LaFleur said. "Bobby provided so much, and the thing that you really, truly appreciate about a guy like him is even when he wasn't getting the targets, he was still doing his job. When we were asking him to chip guys, whether it was a guy like Nick Bosa and being able to put him on the ground a couple times. He did an outstanding job both in the run and the pass.

"And then when he was targeted, he made the most of those. I feel sick for him just knowing how much that he puts into this game, not only during the season but in the offseason. He attacks it the right way. I know it's just a little blip on the radar for him. He'll be back. He'll be stronger. He'll be better. But it's definitely disappointing for us as a football team and I know it is for him, as well."

It's a huge loss for the team, which has tight end depth but nobody with Tonyan's skill-set. And it's a huge loss for Tonyan, who will be a free agent this coming offseason and might miss out on a big payday.

"My heart hurts for Bobby, man," said fellow tight end Josiah Deguara, whose 2020 rookie season ended with a torn ACL. "Obviously, went through something similar last year. When he heard the news and was going through those emotions, I offered my support for him, tell him I love him and any advice, anything he needs, I'm here for him. I know he's going to attack it and come back better than he was."

Now, a position so strong that the

team jettisoned 2019 third-round pick Jace Sternberger at the end of training camp might have to adapt on the fly. Veteran Mercedes Lewis, the oldest tight end in the NFL, has started all season but is much more of a blocker than receiver at this stage of his career.

The other options on the roster are Deguara, a third-round pick last year, Dominique Dafney, who started last season working as a bouncer at a bar in Iowa, and Tyler Davis, a sixth-round pick in 2020 who was signed off the Colts' practice squad on Sept. 28.

At 6-foot-2, Deguara (four catches, 28 yards in 101 snaps) and Dafney (zero catches in 62 snaps) hardly are NFL prototypes for the position. The 6-foot-4 Davis has zero career receptions and played five snaps in five games this season.

While all four players might get more opportunities, the best size-for-size comparison to Tonyan on the roster is receiver Allen Lazard. Lazard might not line up as a traditional tight end but he does like doing the dirty work. Plus, about half of Tonyan's snaps came at receiver, so that group could get more chances, too.

"We have a lot of confidence in

those guys in that room. But it doesn't necessarily have to come from that position," LaFleur said. "All our backs do a really good job out of the backfield. It could provide more targets for the wide receiving core. So, we're going to have to get that production in other areas and we'll have to adjust to that."

Turn up the volume

From a schematic perspective, a coach gets little from watching a game on television. Nonetheless, even with a lot of the game plan in place, LaFleur was an interested viewer when the Chiefs hosted the New York Giants on Monday night.

Or, perhaps more accurately, LaFleur was an interested listener. With microphones all over the field providing viewers with a more immersive experience, there are tips to be gained by hearing the on-the-field adjustments.

"I think everybody does that," LaFleur said. "Every week, we have people that go back and watch all the TV copies. You have to watch what you put out there, too, because there's certainly an element to that. You can gain a lot of information just by hearing what the opposition is saying."

It's a two-way street this week. The Packers played in a nationally televised game on Thursday. Those national games have more cameras and more microphones than the typical Sunday noon game. So, while LaFleur's staff was interested in what the Chiefs had to say on Monday, the Chiefs no doubt were interested to hear Aaron Rodgers' audibles vs. Arizona.

That means NFL language is constantly evolving.

"I think that's a constant, just in terms of trying to play the game within the game, you know?" LaFleur said. "Trying to have some dummy calls so that people don't catch on to what you're doing or you might have very similar calls, or some weeks you could have the same call and it means something different. But that is a constant thing you're always evaluating."

Chief concern

While Monday night's performance against the Giants will move up the charts a bit, the Chiefs entered the week ranked 27th in points allowed, 31st in yards allowed, 29th on third down and 27th in the red zone.

Can Green Bay's offense take advantage? Last season, the Packers were No. 1 in the NFL in scoring. This year, they're 16th. Other than superior ball security, the offense is awash in mediocrity. Green Bay is 22nd in total offense, 12th on third down, 20th in the red zone and 28th in goal-to-go situations.

"You've got to give credit to some of the defenses we've played have been pretty stout," LaFleur said. "But I think there's been a lot of missed opportunities. You can look back at the (Arizona) game, having first-and-goal and the ball on the 3 and then having first-and-goal at the 1 and not punching it in. You've got to maximize those opportunities. Certainly, the way the season has started definitely did not help, when you get basically shut out and don't put up the production. It takes a while to climb out of that hole. I thought we've done some good things, but I think we're just kind of scratching the surface of we believe we could be."

To be sure, the injuries have had a role. It's a different offense without the All-Pro Bakhtiari protecting Rodgers' blind side. Ultimately, as LaFleur said a couple weeks ago, stats are for losers. Yes, stats matter. But the only stat that matters is the scoreboard. The Packers are rolling and presumably will get better once Bakhtiari makes his debut and Valdes-Scantling returns from his lengthy absence.

KEYS TO THE GAME

The Green Bay Packers (7-1) will travel to face the Kansas City Chiefs (4-4) at 3:25 p.m. at Arrowhead Stadium. FOX will televise the game.

History

The Chiefs lead the series 7-5-1, though Green Bay has won two in a row and three of the last four.

Coaches

Green Bay – Matt LaFleur, 33-7, third season. Kansas City — Andy Reid, 225-134-1, 23rd season; 95-41 in ninth season with Kansas City.

When the Packers have the ball

The Packers have faced a lot of high-quality defenses fueled by powerhouse defensive lines. Not so this week. Kansas City has allowed 27-plus points in six games, with the lone exceptions coming against punchless Washington in week six and the Giants on Monday night.

The Chiefs are 25th with 27.5 points allowed per game. They are last in yards allowed per play (6.43), 28th in rushing per play (4.64), 29th in passing per play (8.11). They also are 31st in sack percentage, 26th on third down and 27th in the red zone.

Kansas City does have a couple stud players. One of them is defensive end Chris Jones, who had 15.5 sacks in 2018 and a total of 16.5 sacks while earning Pro Bowl honors the past two seasons. He's tied for the team lead with three sacks in six games. Frank Clark is the other end, and Derrick Nnadi and Jarran Reed are the starting tackles.

Unless Clark, Reed and Nnadi get going, this defense's goose is cooked. Clark, who had 32 sacks for Seattle from 2016 through 2018, collected his first sack of the season against the Giants. Reed, a first-round pick by Seattle

in 2016 who had 10.5 sacks in 2018 and 6.5 sacks in 2020, is looking for his first sack with his new team.

Nnadi had 47 tackles last season but only 17 this year. End Michael Danna (three sacks, team-high seven quarterback hits) and tackle Khaleke Hudson, a 320-pound run stuffer, provide the depth.

At linebacker, rookie Nick Bolton leads the team with 66 tackles and nine tackles for losses. With veteran Anthony Hitchens (32 tackles) out on Monday with a triceps injury, Bolton was flanked by Ben Niemann (25 tackles) and Willie Gay (14 tackles, two interceptions). Hitchens and Bolton are the top players by snaps but all four will play. Gay had nine tackles and a pick vs. New York.

Charvarius Ward and L'Jarius Sneed are the starting cornerbacks. On passing downs, Sneed moves into the slot and Rashad Fenton enters at corner.

Sneed is the weakest of the links.

Of the 133 cornerbacks with 20 percent playing time, the 145.1 passer rating he's allowed ranks 129th, according to Pro Football Focus. Fenton is tied for the team lead with four passes defended. Former first-round picks Mike Hughes (Vikings) and DeAndre Baker (Giants) played zero defensive snaps on Monday.

Tyrann Mathieu and Juan Thornhill are the safeties. Mathieu is the Chiefs' other defensive stud. An All-Pro the past two seasons after recording four interceptions and 12 passes defended in 2019 and six interceptions and nine passes defended in 2020, he is capable of turning a game on a single play. He's got two interceptions, including a pick-six, this year. What he's lost athletically he makes up for in veteran savvy.

Veteran safety Daniel Sorenson is the sixth defensive back and a liability in coverage.

When the Chiefs have the ball

This is a star-studded group, with Mahomes, receiver Tyreek Hill and tight end Travis Kelce being among the elite players in the NFL. Thus far, it hasn't added up to elite production.

In 2018, Mahomes won MVP. In 2019, he led the team to a Super Bowl victory. In 2020, he led the team back to the Super Bowl. He threw 114 touchdown passes vs. 23 interceptions during that span, including 64 touchdowns and 11 interceptions the last two years.

This season, he's thrown 19 touchdowns vs. 10 interceptions. Those mistakes are why the Chiefs are scuffling offensively. They're ninth with 26 points per game and 5.99 yards per play, sixth with 4.81 yards per rush and 13th with 6.95 yards per pass. They've

dominated on third down (league-best 55 percent) but are just 19th in the red zone (57.6 percent).

While Green Bay's Davante Adams might be the best receiver in the NFL, Hill is the most-feared perimeter player in the league because of his game-breaking speed. Defenders play so far off him that the underneath game is easy pickings. He leads the team with a league-high 64 receptions for 735 yards (11.5 average) and six touchdowns.

Mecole Hardman is third on the team with 35 receptions, and fellow receivers Byron Pringle and Demarcus Robinson have two touchdowns apiece.

Kelce has 49 receptions for 560 yards and four touchdowns.

With Clyde Edwards-Helaire out with a knee injury, Damien Williams and Derrick Gore combined for 97 yards on 24 carries vs. the Giants.

After getting overrun by Tampa Bay in the Super Bowl, the Chiefs invested heavily on their offensive line. In fact, they're lining up with five new starters.

Left tackle Orlando Brown was a Pro Bowler with Baltimore in 2019 and 2020. Joe Thuney was a Pro Bowl-caliber left guard during his five seasons in New England. Center Creed Humphrey was a second-round pick in this year's draft. Right guard Trey Smith was a sixth-round pick in this year's draft due to medical concerns and not talent.

Right tackle Lucas Niang was a third-round pick last year who was a COVID opt-out as a rookie. The Packers could have had Humphrey but selected Josh Myers, instead.

Special teams

The big matchup will be Packers punter Corey Bojorquez vs. Hardman. Bojorquez is coming off a superb performance vs. Arizona and is seventh in the league with a net average of 43.3 yards per punt. Hardman is averaging 13.8 yards per punt return this season and had a 67-yard touchdown last year.

Harrison Butker has made all 25 extra points and is 9-of-10 on field goals. Second-year punter Tommy Townsend has a 42.9-yard net average with nine punts inside the 20 and zero touchbacks. Pringle will test Green Bay's improving kickoff-coverage unit with his 24.6-yard average.

Green Bay lost rookie running back Kylin Hill to a knee injury last week. He was averaging 19.9 yards per kickoff return with a 41-yarder vs. Detroit. Malik Taylor finished the Arizona game in that role; he averaged just 18.6 yards per runback last year.

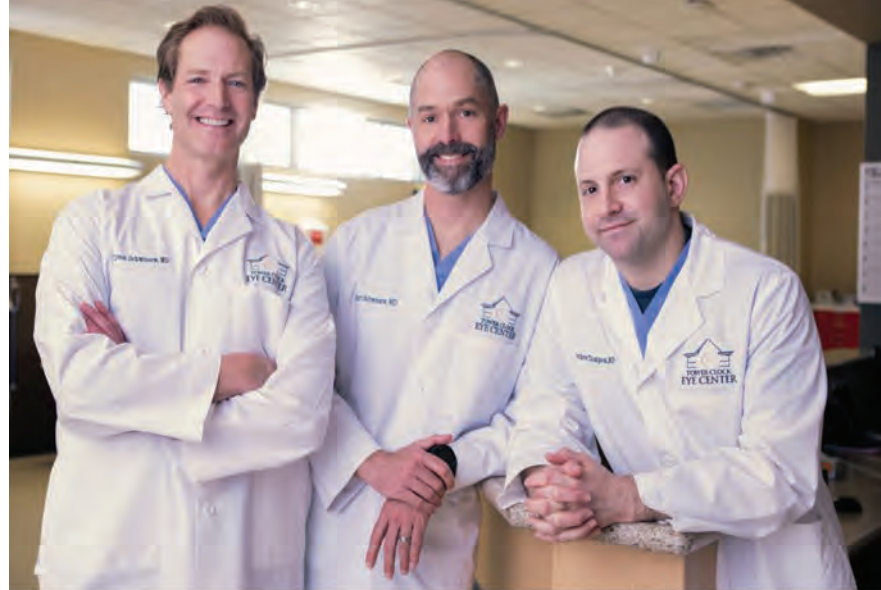
